This is a guide for course work in the major; actual course sequence may vary by student. Please refer to the online student degree evaluation, and consult with an academic advisor. • Not all courses are offered every semester and some electives may have prerequisites. Students should review the course descriptions in the *University Catalog* and consult with their academic advisor to plan accordingly.

University of Wyoming requirements:

Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 to graduate. • Students must complete 42 hours of upper division (3000-level or above) coursework, 30 of which must be from the University of Wyoming. • Courses must be taken for a letter grade unless offered only for S/U. • University Studies Program (USP) Human Culture (H) and Physical & Natural World (PN) courses must be taken outside of the major subject, but can be cross-listed with the major.

College of Arts and Sciences Requirements:

Students must take two "core" courses in addition to the USP requirements: Diversity in the United States (ASD) and Global Awareness (ASG). • No more than 60 hours in the major subject may be used toward the 120 credit hours required for graduation. • At least 30 hours in the major subject must be completed with a grade of C or better (the major may require more).

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Arts & Sciences Undeclared Notes con't:

* A **single language** must be taken to fulfill the foreign language requirement for an academic program. • Students taking American Sign Language to fulfill the language requirement of the major will have to take other courses to fulfill the USP H requirements.

** Requires MATH ACT ≥ 23 , MATH SAT ≥ 600 , Math Placement Exam ≥ 3 , or $\geq C$ in Math 0925. (University standard)

*** Recommended C2 courses include:

ANTH 2000 Introduction to Linguistic Anthropology (3 hrs)

ENGL 2005 Writing in Technology and the Sciences (3 hrs)

ENGL 2020 Introduction to Literature (3 hrs)

POLS 2200 Politics of Europe and the European Union (3 hrs)

▪ Prospective language majors can take 3050 during the junior year.
