Students should review the course descriptions in the *University Catalog* and consult with their academic advisor to plan accordingly.

University of Wyoming requirements:

Students must have a minimum cumulative GPA of 2.0 to graduate. • Students must complete 42 hours of upper division (3000-level or above) coursework, 30 of which must be from the University of Wyoming. • Courses must be taken for a letter grade unless offered only for S/U. • University Studies Program (USP) Human Culture (H) and Physical & Natural World (PN) courses must be taken outside of the major subject, but can be cross-listed with the major.

College of Arts and Sciences requirements:

Students must take two "core" courses in addition to the USP requirements: Diversity in the United States (ASD) and Global Awareness (ASG). • No more than 60 hours in the major subject may be used toward the 120 credit hours required for graduation. • At least 30 hours in the major subject must be completed with a grade of C or better (the major may require more).

Anthropology Program Notes:

Anthropology majors and minors are required to pass courses with an ANTH prefix at the level of C or better. Courses required for the major and minor but taken from another department must be completed with a grade of C- or higher. • A study abroad experience is highly recommended for the junior year. Consult with an academic advisor about programs and courses to take in the sophomore year to prepare.

a A **single language** must be taken for three (3) semesters to fulfill the 12 hour foreign language requirement for the program. • Students taking American Sign Language to fulfill the language requirement of the major will have to take other courses to fulfill the USP H requirements.

b Requires MATH ACT ≥ 23 , MATH SAT ≥ 600 , Math Placement Exam ≥ 3 or $\geq C$ in MATH 0925. (University standard)

c A field school or guided independent research project is highly recommended in the summers of the freshman and sophomore years. Course recommendations include:

- ANTH 4140 Fieldwork in Wyoming Archaeology
- ANTH 4140 Callacpuma Archaeological Project
- ANTH 4140 Croatia Field School

Please consult with faculty about these opportunities, as well as alternative ethnographic and archaeological field school opportunities.

d Lists of approved courses in the subdisciplines are available in the *University Catalog* or from academic advisors.

e Elective courses are expected to complement the student's interests in anthropology and to support subdisciplinary interests. Additional coursework in biological sciences, earth science, or statistics/mathematics is also recommended.
