Distribution of Student-Athlete Majors, 2014-15







Academic Progress Rate (APR)*, Four-Year Rolling Average 2014-15




Degrees by Gender








Demographics of Tenured/Tenure-Track Faculty



Inst. Tenured/Ten-Track by Gender




Faculty Market Salary Gap

Total Section I, II, & III Expenditure Distribution: \$570.5 Million









Section I Revenue Allocation by College and Medical Education

Budget Expenditure Authority, Excluding Medical Education, Dollars in Millions




WY State Health Plan Percent Changes in Employer Contribution



Higher Education Price Inflation (HEPI) and Other Price Indices






Average UW Utility Cost (dollars per square foot)



Number of Students Supported by WICHE PSEP, Academic Year 2015-16


Net Assets and Operating Budget Expenditure Summaries (Dollars in Millions)




Number of KUWR Public Radio Listeners




Percentage of Alumni Association Members, By County







Activities Academic Year 2014-15
