

Arlit Deuxieme Paris In the small town of Arlit in Niger, the scandalous working conditions in a local uranium mine are uncovered. This film depicts the suffering of those working in the mines and connects their work to a bigger picture of global arms and demand for uranium. Crucially, the film lets us glimpse the dreams and the limited choices people have in Arlit.

In Rwanda We Say...The Family That Does Not Speak Dies This film follows how at first, the coexistence between those who instigated genocide and the victimized is unbearable. Many victims feel rage toward their former oppressors. But gradually, the victims and oppressors start talking to the camera, and then to each other as they start the difficult task of living with each other. The documentary portrays how the people's spirits cannot be crushed by the Rwandan Genocide.

The Overspent American This film scrutinizes "the new consumerism"-- a national phenomenon of upscale spending that is shaped and reinforced by a commercially-driven media system. "Keeping up with the Joneses" is no longer enough for middle and upper-middle class Americans, many of whom become burdened with debilitating debt as they seek to emulate materialistic TV lifestyles.

Was Malthus Right? Population And Resources In The 21st Century The dire prediction by controversial economist Thomas Malthus that the world's expanding population would swiftly outrun its food supply has not come to fruition—yet. This film debates issues such as the powerful influence of technology in refuting Malthus' theory, population projections for the 21st century, and the very real economic and physical aspects of resource depletion.

No Sweat A look into the Los Angeles garment industry. Mostly undocumented workers at American Apparel and SweatX are offered better wages, benefits, even a shot at worker-ownership. But what's really behind the label?

Through The Wire An expose of the United States penal system's mistreatment of political activists, specifically three women incarcerated in the Female High Security Unit at Lexington, Kentucky.

Do The Evolution A Pearl Jam video journey through the history of mankind, from the evolution of life through modern human history. Social and environmental issues such as whaling, Manifest Destiny, vivisection, pollution, genetic modification and techno-progressivism are included.

Children Of Leningradsky This documentary, takes an unblinking look at the reality of homeless children living in Russia today - in particular the ones who call the underground Leningradsky train station in Moscow home. Utilizing verité footage of over a dozen children who speak candidly about their lives, routines and lost dreams, the film captures the sobering reality of post-Soviet Russia, as kids are left behind, get booted out of their homes, turn into prostitutes, are abused, and run away.

Maquilapolis Carmen works the graveyard shift in one of Tijuana's *maquiladoras*, the multinationally-owned factories that came to Mexico for its cheap labor. After making television components all night, Carmen comes home to a shack she built out of recycled garage doors, in a neighborhood with no sewage lines or electricity. She suffers from kidney damage and lead poisoning from her years of exposure to toxic chemicals. She earns six dollars a day. But Carmen is not a victim. She is a dynamic young woman, busy making a life for herself and her children.

Hide Your Words Two young girls, sisters, walk across a barren landscape toward the salt springs and talk about one of their classmates, a 14-year-old girl who was forced to marry a 73-year-old man. Girls don't want to get married until they finish their education, but their father has different ideas.

Sunrise Over Tiananmen Square This documentary explores artist/ filmmaker Shui-Bo Wang's past as a Red Guard during the Cultural Revolution, his stint in the military as a propaganda poster artist, and his teaching experiences in the 1980s, through a rich collage of original artwork, animation, and archival and family photographs.

The Saltmen Of Tibet Shot under extreme conditions in one of the world's most remote and beautiful locations, this film documents the ancient traditions and daily rituals of a Tibetan nomadic community and transports us into a realm untainted by the tides of foreign invasion or encroaching modernity. Step by step we follow the unforgettable, annual three-month pilgrimage to the holy salt lakes of northern Tibet.
