Ernie Nelson named Curator of the Rocky Mountain Herbarium

Burrell Ernest ("Ernie") Nelson has assumed the duties of Curator of the Rocky Mountain Herbarium (RM), replacing Ronald L. Hartman who retired this past fall.

Ernie heralds from Berrien Springs, MI where his dad worked at Andrews University. He was turned on to birdwatching by his high school biology teacher. Upon graduating high school, he and a buddy set out to "explore the West" by jeep, with bird guides and plant press in tow. By chance, they encountered Bob Stolze, a fern specialist from the Natural History Museum (Chicago) on their summer saga, whose encouragement sparked the budding botanist.

Brick-laying helped support Ernie's ensuing academic pursuits at Andrews University, where field studies were his passion. He sought out old-growth forests, and bogs with their pitcher plants and orchids. In 1972, he returned to the Rockies for graduate school, awarded the Aven Nelson Research Fellowship at University of Wyoming, and mentored by John and Charlotte Reeder. His thesis was titled "Vascular Plants of the Medicine Bow Range" supported by the Payson Award. He was hired as Herbarium Assistant prior to graduating.

Ernie has been integral to the botanical inventory of the Rockies that began with the arrival of Hartman in 1977. He helped train fifty master's students in the floristics program, always quick to answer questions and share his knowledge. He has overseen hundreds of undergraduate employees in mounting, databasing and filing specimens, and more recently, imaging specimens. During most summers he has spent many weeks with graduate students assisting in their fieldwork. In the early 1990s, he became Herbarium Manager. He and Ron published floristics papers, several of which were coauthored with graduate students. A life list of almost 400 birds is a feat for most biologists, but Ernie has also made a total of 85,542 plant collections and continues to support student work and research at RM.

Historical Journey of Wyoming's Plant Explorers, from Horseback to Satellites

Botanist and author Robert Dorn will talk about exploration of Wyoming's rich plant life. Advances in technology across three centuries have streamlined the process-from horseback to motorized vehicles, quill pens to computers, and unmapped wilderness to GPS. He received his PhD from the Botany Department (U-WY) and authored Vascular Plants of Wyoming (3rd ed., 2001), The Wyoming Landscape, 1805-1878 (1986), and co-authored with his wife Jane, Wyoming Birds (2nd ed., 1999) and Growing Native Plants of the Rocky Mountain Area (2007).
