**PERSONAL STATEMENT**

My commitment to shared governance encouraged me to stand for the position of Faculty Senate Chair-Elect. I helped establish the University of Wyoming Faculty Association last semester to provide a venue for faculty to speak up and have their voices heard, given respectful consideration, and incorporated into policy as appropriate. Shared governance is important in good times. But it is critical now as UW faces current fiscal challenges concurrent with a new president and new VPAA.
