III.	UNIVERSITY UNDERGRADUATE DEGREE REQUIREMENTS				
	A. General Standards				
	1. Undergraduate degrees will be conferred only upon persons who have be accepted into a degree program offered by a college or school of the Universand who demonstrate successful completion of all University, College School requirements established by appropriate regulations or publication in University Bulletin. Individual students are responsible for ascertaining spectrequirements for the degree sought, as well as compliance with publis procedures.	sity , or n the cific

Students 46 47 failing to complete degree requirements within a reasonable [ABF1] 48 period of time forfeit any right to graduate under the requirements in 49 effect at the time of their admission to degree candidacy. 50 51 2. Satisfaction of academic requirements must be demonstrated by appropriate 52 entries upon the official transcript of a student's academic work maintained by 53 the Registrar of the University. 54 55 **3.** Academic requirements established by Colleges and Schools shall specify the number of credit hours to be earned for awarding of a degree within the major 56 57 sought by a student. Colleges may establish requirements for areas of study and 58 specific courses as a part of offered degree programs. Requirements may 59 include academic work for which credit is not awarded. 60 61 4. Successful completion of academic requirements shall be based upon grades assigned by faculty responsible for the academic offering or work. Grades 62 63 assigned to students shall represent the individual faculty member's evaluation of the student's work as described in UW Regulation 6-722. A grade of "F" 64 65 signifies no credit is earned for the completed academic work. Within limitations set forth in UW Regulation 6-710, grades of "S" (Satisfactory) or 66 67 "U" (Unsatisfactory) may be assigned. (For matters related to assignment of grades, see UW Regulation 6-710, Authorization for Use of "S-U" Grades; UW 68 69 Regulation 6-716, Change of Recorded Grades; and UW Regulation 6-720, 70 Assignment and Removal of the Grade of I (incomplete).) 71 72 5. Credit applicable towards a degree may be earned or awarded through (1) 73 classes taken on campus, virtually or at distance settings (including recognized academic courses under concurrent faculty general supervision such as 74 75 internships, clerkships, clinical experience, cooperative programs, etc.); (2) 76 credit by examination; (3) portfolio evaluations, as provided in UW Regulation 77 6-719; and (4) acceptance of transfer credit from accredited colleges or 78 universities, including Wyoming Community Colleges. The following 79 limitations apply: 80

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81	a. Credit by Examination and Portfolio Evaluations: Such credit may be
82	awarded to students in accordance with the provisions of UW
83	Regulation 6-719 (Assessment of Prior and Sponsored-Experiential
84	Learning). All credit assigned for experiential learning based upon
85	portfolio evaluations is excluded from the minimum credit hour
86	requirements set forth in section C below.
87	b. Transfer Credit: The college or school from which a degree is sought
88	must approve the transfer credit and whether it satisfies degree
89	requirements. Students classified as juniors or seniors must obtain
90	approval of the Dean of the College or School to take lower division
91	level courses at a two-year college which they desire to apply towards
92	their University degree program.
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94	6. Not more than 24 semester hours of correspondence enrollment courses may be
95	used toward fulfilling requirements for a bachelor's degree.
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97	7. The last credit applicable to degree requirements must be earned from the
98	University of Wyoming with the following exception: students of senior
99	standing may complete degree requirements elsewhere by obtaining special
100	permission of the department head, adviser, and college dean, and filing an
101	application for a degree before enrolling elsewhere.

102	8. Students will not receive university credit for language courses below the 4000
103	level in their native language.

106	9. Students will be required to complete assessment activities as determined by
107	the University of Wyoming prior to the awarding of degrees.

109	10. University, college and major requirements: As listed in the General Bulletin
110	when the student matriculates into a particular major. If a student is absent from
111	the University of Wyoming for one academic year or more, then the student
112	may be required to meet any new requirements that have been developed since
113	the original matriculation date.
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115	11. Any exceptions to undergraduate degree requirements may be granted by the
116	President or Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.
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118	12. Other requirements appropriate to the various undergraduate degrees shall be
119	established by the colleges and schools. All requirements and appropriate
120	implementing procedures shall be published in the University Bulletin as
121	directed by the Provost and Vice President for Academic Affairs.

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123	В.	Cumulative Grade Point Average Requirements
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125		1. A student must maintain a cumulative grade point average of 2.000 or better
126		based upon credit hours attempted through the University of Wyoming.
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128		2. Calculation of the cumulative grade point average shall be in accordance with
129		UW Regulation 6-715 (Scholastic Probation, Suspension, Reinstatement and
130		Academic Renewal for Undergraduate Students).
131	C.	Minimum Credit Hour Requirements
132		
133		1. A minimum of 30 credit hours must be earned from the University of Wyoming.
134		All students must complete a minimum of 42 upper division semester credit
135		hours to afford individual programs the ability to determine their own
136		requirements and/or satisfy accreditation requirements. 30 hours of this upper
137		division requirement must be earned from the University of Wyoming. Credit
138		by examination does not count towards the required 30 hours of residency
139		credit.
140		
141		2. Undergraduate students may count hours earned in graduate level classes
142		toward their undergraduate degree upper division credit requirement.
143		
144	D.	State and Federal Constitution Instruction and Examination Requirement
145		
146		1. Wyoming State statute (W.S. § 21-9-102) requires that each student receive
147		instruction in the essentials of the United States and Wyoming constitutions.
148		
149		2. This requirement is satisfied by courses approved by the University Studies
150		Committee as meeting statutory requirements. A grade of "C" or better must be
151		earned in the class.
152		
153	Е.	University Studies Degree Requirements
154		
155		1. Specific courses which satisfy general education requirements are identified
156		and approved by the college course and curriculum committees and the
157		University Studies Committee. Only those courses meeting baseline learning
158		outcomes (see UW Regulation 6-407) shall satisfy these requirements.
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160 161 162		2. It is the responsibility of the individual colleges to review and adjust their degree requirements or course offerings when necessary to assure completion of general studies requirements.
163 164 165		F. Application for Undergraduate Degree
165 166 167 168		Application for Undergraduate Degree: Prospective undergraduate degree candidates shall apply for graduation in a manner outlined by the Registrar's Office.
169 170		G. Clearance of Debts Owed the University
170 171 172 173 174 175 176 177		Degrees, or other evidence of completion of academic credits, will not be provided to students who have failed to pay requisite fees or other financial obligations owed to any division or unit of the University. The Vice President for Administration may approve alternative means by which payment of monies owed to the University may be guaranteed for payment and permit students to receive degrees and transcripts of academic work.
178	IV.	CHARACTERISTICS OF MULTIPLE/CONCURRENT MAJORS
179		Definition: One (1) baccalaureate degree (BA, BS, et al) earned with multiple majors.
180 181		A. The student must meet University requirements once.
182 183 184		B. The student must meet all college and major requirements of the major the student designates as the "primary" major <u>.</u>
184 185 186 187		C. The student must also meet all major requirements for any additional majors beyond the primary major.
188 189 190		D. One baccalaureate degree [a2] (BA, BS, et al) and diploma will be awarded, and all majors will be notated on transcript.
191 192 193		For accreditation purposes, certain colleges/majors may restrict which major/college is designated as the primary college/major.

195 196 197		Definition: Two (2) or more baccalaureate degrees (BA, BS, et al) earned.
