

## UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING REGULATIONS

Subject: Student Academic Dishonesty

Number: UW Regulation 6-802 (2-XX)

I. **PURPOSE** 

To establish the procedures and actions in cases of student academic dishonesty.

#### 13 II. **GENERAL INFORMATION**

All members of the University community are responsible for upholding academic 15 integrity. Academic integrity and ethical behavior is a matter of common concern, not a 16 private issue between an instructor and a student. Academic dishonesty is an affront to the 17 18 integrity of scholarship and a threat to the quality of learning. To maintain its credibility 19 and uphold its reputation, the University requires that students take responsibility for learning the standards of conduct for the performance of Academic Endeavors. It is an 20 Instructor's responsibility to make reasonable effort to make known the standards of 21 22 conduct for the performance of Academic Endeavors. It is through an atmosphere of mutual respect that we enhance the value of education and maintain high standards of academic 23 24 excellence. Failure on the part of the student to observe and maintain standards of 25 academic honesty requires action by the University.

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#### III. SCIENTIFIC OR RESEARCH MISCONDUCT

29 Allegations of student academic misconduct involving federal grants, scientific misconduct 30 or research misconduct shall be referred to the Vice President for Research and Economic Development to be handled pursuant to University policy. Further action under this 31 32 Regulation is dependent on the outcome of that process. Sanctions under this Regulation may be imposed when an allegation of scientific misconduct has been substantiated. Only 33 34 the sanction is appealable under this Regulation. A student may not appeal the finding of 35 scientific misconduct. If scientific misconduct has not been substantiated, but issues of academic dishonesty remain, this Regulation applies. 36

- 38 IV. **DEFINITIONS**
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40 Academic Dishonesty: An action attempted or performed that misrepresents one's involvement in an Academic Endeavor in any way, or assists another student in

42 misrepresenting his or her involvement in an Academic Endeavor. Examples of Academic Dishonesty include, but are not limited to the following: 43 44 45 A. **Cheating:** Using sources, information, study aids, notes, materials, devices, or 46 collaboration unauthorized and not explicitly approved by the Instructor. Examples 47 include but are not limited to doing a class assignment for someone else or allowing 48 someone to copy one's assignment; copying from, or assisting, another student 49 during an examination; or stealing, or otherwise improperly obtaining, copies (hard 50 copy or digital) of an examination before or after its administration. 51 52 **B**. **Complicity:** Assisting another person in any act of Academic Dishonesty. 53 54 **C**. **Fraud:** Falsifying, altering or inventing data, research, or citations for an academic 55 endeavor; fabricating, forging or otherwise misrepresenting to an instructor or an institution one's past or current academic or professional activities; impersonating 56 57 someone or allowing oneself to be impersonated for an examination or other 58 Academic Endeavor; using a ghost writer, commercial or otherwise, for any type 59 of assignment. 60 61 D. **Interference or Obstruction:** Interfering with academic efforts of other students to gain unfair advantage for personal academic advancement. Interference may 62 include but is not limited to, sabotage, harassment, tampering, bribery, or 63 intimidation of another student. 64 65 Е. 66 **Misappropriation:** Unauthorized access to an instructor's files or accounts. 67 F. 68 Multiple Submissions: Submitting, wholly or in part, the same Academic 69 Endeavor to earn credit in more than one course without explicit approval by all 70 concerned instructors. 71 72 G. **Plagiarism:** Presenting the work (i.e., ideas, data, creations) of another, wholly or 73 in part, as one's own work without customary and proper acknowledgement of 74 sources and extent of use, unless authorized by the Instructor. 75 76 H. Violation of Standards: Violations against ethical and professional standards 77 required by individual University programs, academic courses, and clinical 78 programs that may result in qualification for entry into a profession that maintains 79 standards of conduct.

## 138 V. ADMINISTRATIVE PROCEDURES

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- 140 A. Suspicion of Academic Dishonesty
  - When an instructor has reason to suspect that an act of Academic Dishonesty has been committed in a course, clinical or academic program for which the Instructor is responsible for supervision or assignment of an academic evaluation, the Instructor shall investigate the matter and may discuss the matter with the student and, at the Instructor's discretion, come to one of the following resolutions:
  - 1. If in the judgment of the Instructor, the <u>Charge</u> of Academic Dishonesty is not justified and/or there is insufficient evidence of Academic Dishonesty, then no further action is warranted.
  - 2. If, in the judgment of the Instructor, sufficient evidence of Academic Dishonesty exists, then the Instructor pursues the <u>Charge</u> of Academic Dishonesty.

   431 a finding of a second act of Academic Dishonesty, any further finding of Academic
   432 Dishonesty will result in an immediate dismissal from the University. This action
   433 is subject to the approval of or modification by the President of the University.
- 434 **C.D.** The foregoing actions shall not preclude the administrative consequences which 435 may result in the loss of benefits from such programs, scholarships and other 436 opportunities afforded students.

# 438 VII. INDIVIDUAL COLLEGE CONDUCT STANDARDS

Individual colleges and departments/schools may establish additional <u>or different</u> standards for student conduct <u>or processes for enforcing those standards, if</u> deemed appropriate for students whose degree program will result in qualification for entry into a profession that maintains standards of conduct. Any such standards <u>and processes</u> which incorporate <u>or</u> <u>enforce</u> academic dishonesty must provide, as a minimum, the sanctions described in this Regulation and must afford notice and a fair hearing.
