CHARLES B. RANGEL INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP

The Rangel Fellowship awards 45 fellowships of up to \$42,000 annually (for two years) to complete two-year master's degrees at U.S. institutions in an area of relevance to the Foreign Service, including public policy, business administration, public administration, economics, or international affairs. Fellows also receive funding for two summer internships, one on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC and another abroad at an Embassy or Consulate. Throughout the program, fellows receive personalized mentoring and professional development opportunities. Upon successful completion of the program, fellows join the Foreign Service. THOMAS R. PICKERING FOREIGN AFFAIRS GRADUATE FELLOWSHIP

The Pickering Fellowship awards 45 fellowships of up to \$42,000 annually (for two years) to complete two-year master's degrees at U.S. institutions in an area of relevance to the Foreign Service, including public administration, public policy, business administration, economics, or international affairs. Fellows also receive funding to complete two internships, one domestic at the U.S. Department of State in Washington, DC and the other abroad at an Embassy or Consulate. Throughout the program, fellows receive personalized mentoring and

DONALD M. PAYNE INTERNATIONAL DEVELOPMENT FELLOWSHIP

The Payne Fellowship Program awards 15 fellowships of up to \$38,000 annually (for two years) to complete two-year master's degrees at U.S. institutions in an area of relevance to the USAID Foreign Service, including international development or relations, economics, public health, business administration, agriculture, environmental sciences, or urban planning. The programs also funds two internships, one on Capitol Hill in Washington, DC and another abroad at a USAID mission. FELLOWSHIP ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- Candidates must be U.S. citizens.
- Candidates must have cumulative GPA of 3.2 or higher on 4.0 scale at the time of applying.
- Candidates must seek admission to a two-year, fulltime, on-campus master's degree program starting in fall 2022 at a U.S.-based institution in a field relevant to Foreign Service.

All undergraduate majors are welcome.

CHARLES B. RANGEL SUMMER ENRICHMENT PROGRAM

The Charles B. Rangel International Affairs Summer Enrichment Program is a six-week summer program designed to provide undergraduate students with a deeper appreciation of current issues and trends in international affairs, greater understanding of career opportunities in international affairs, and the enhanced knowledge and skills to pursue such careers. The Program selects 15 participants each year from universities throughout the United States. Students live at Howard University, attend for-credit classes, visit and meet with a wide range of professionals working in international affairs, and participate in a variety of programs with foreign affairs professionals at Howard and at diverse locations around Washington, D.C. Selected candidates are covered for summer program tuition, travel, housing and two meals per day; plus \$3,200 stipend. Eligibility requirements: U.S. citizenship, full-time undergraduate student with at least sophomore status, and a minimum GPA of 3.2 on a 4.0 scale. Learn more at www.rangelprogram.org.
