Furthermore, movies can explore many different questions in the study of morality: What do we mean when we say a person is morally good? How do we justify an action as good? Do we rely upon principles, consequences, virtues, etc? How do we apply such moral reasoning in everyday life? Such moral questions bring us to the topic of moral philosophy, or ethics, which include moral theories that provide various reasons concerning how to act, how to justify decisions between the right and wrong actions, and reasons as to whether or not such theoretical claims are objective or relative. In this course, we explore various films and use readings from famous philosophers in history to help interpret and understand the moral questions and arguments presented through these films.
