BACKGROUND AND POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

The Historic Preservation Plan for the University of Wyoming Campus was prepared in 1999 as a direct result of new construction projects in the early 1990's that triggered compliance with Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966. In 1991, it was determined that the proposed construction of the Botany Conservatory Addition would have an effect on the Aven Nelson Building and Old Main, both of which were determined to be eligible for inclusion on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). As a result, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) was drafted that specified actions to mitigate the effects of the undertaking upon historic properties. The MOU called for the survey and significance evaluation of all buildings at least 49 years old on the main Laramie campus and for preparation of a historic preservation plan.

A 2013 Legislative Session Budget Bill footnote required the University to "(iv) Report on the current practice of razing buildings constructed as part of the original campus prior to 1980, and recommend a policy which provides for approval by the legislature before razing any historic building." At the October 2013 special BOT conference call, the Board of Trustees was briefed on the University's proposed responses to the Legislative Reporting Directive. The report on that conference call stated:

"The Board believes that a more formal process is necessary in determining the historical significance of UW's older buildings. It directs the Administration Division to consult with the Wyoming State Historic Preservation Office in updating the 1990's study of UW's historical structures. The study should include an assessment of all buildings that were built prior to 1980, as well as an assessment by a professional historian. The Board of Trustees will review the revised study and consider its adoption."

The 2013 Legislative Session Budget Bill footnote also required the University to "(v) Report on the current policies for architectural features of new buildings on campus, and recommend a permanent policy for minimum standards of appearance which preserves the classical architecture represented on the buildings facing Prexy's Pasture as well as Old Main in all future construction." The report on the October 2013 special BOT conference call stated:

"The Board of Trustees will review its existing policies regarding architectural features and develop revised ones that set minimum standards that provide a clearer and more detailed direction for future building construction and renovation. These policies will recommend that new UW construction projects facing Prexy's Pasture be designed with sensitivity for

existing historic architectural features, particularly the use of sandstone ashlar masonry, color, and ornate design patterns that avoid box-like appearances. Buildings and other improvements should blend harmoniously with the historic built environment. New buildings should not block important views or visually overpower existing historic structures. Should the use of sandstone ashlar not prove feasible for new construction, other building materials that are compatible with the color and texture of sandstone masonry would be substituted.

The policy will also direct that the fundamental architectural elements that characterize the historic structures around Prexy's Pasture should be carried forward to new and renovated buildings elsewhere on campus. While adherence to architectural tradition would not be as strict for these buildings as those in the heart of campus, there should nevertheless be a clear and evident visual connection so that viewers readily recognize the building as being a part of the University's architectural landscape."

The architecture firm of TDSi, in association with the historic preservation planning consultant Historic Strategies, has completed the final draft of the Historic Preservation Plan Update. The plan updates the 1999 Historic Preservation Plan and includes an assessment of all existing campus buildings that were built prior to 1980 (that had not previously been assessed in the 1999 plan). The updated plan includes the following chapters:

- 3. Historic Contexts
- 4. Summary of Existing Conditions
- 5. Preservation Approach
- 6. Treatment Guidelines for Heritage Landscape Features
- 7. Guidelines and Recommendations for Historic Buildings

- 9. Design Guidelines for New Construction
- 10. Guidelines for Alternations and Additions

The planning process was jointly managed by the UW Facilities Planning Office and the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO). An advisory committee of historians and community members provided guidance and input to the planning process. Public meetings were held with the campus community and the larger Laramie community to: (1) gather input at the beginning of the planning process, and (2) to review, and solicit feedback on, the draft plan. The draft plan was also posted on the Wyoming Scholars Repository, and public comments were encouraged.

- October 2013 Board of Trustees was briefed on the University of Wyoming Responses to the Legislative Reporting Directive.
- June 2014 Board of Trustees authorized the contracting with the recommended first-ranked historic preservation consulting firm, TDSi, in association with Historic Strategies.

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BACKGROUND AND POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

In 2012, the Internal Revenue Service started a series of compliance initiatives surrounding tax advantaged debt. One of the initiatives was to require issuers to have written policies and procedures to monitor post-issuance compliance issues, such as disclosures and arbitrage calculations. The University of Wyoming last issued bonded debt in 2012 and since that time has worked with bond counsel to develop a set of written policies and procedures that document post-compliance activities that have been performed historically and that comply with the new IRS guidelines. External bond counsel has assisted in drafting the policy and the Audit and Fiscal Integrity Committee reviewed the proposed policy at their March 2015 meeting.

UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING BONDED DEBT POST-ISSUANCE COMPLIANCE AND DISCLOSURE POLICIES AND PROCEDURES APPROVED BY UW BOARD OF TRUSTEES: INSERT APPROVAL DATE

I. Purpose

A. <u>In General</u>. The Internal Revenue Service (the "IRS") and the Securities and Exchange Commission ("SEC") have strongly recommended that issuers of municipal bonds assist with the efforts to administer the income tax laws and securities laws by adopting written policies and procedures that are intended to assure that appropriate compliance measures are implemented by such issuers after their bonds have been issued. This document constitutes and is intended to memorialize formally the written post-issuance compliance policies and procedures (the "PICPP") that the Board of Trustees for The University of Wyoming (the "Issuer") has previously adopted or followed in connection with the issuance of the Issuer's Tax-Advantaged Bonds (as defined herein).

B. Definitions.

- 1. "Authorized Representative" means the Post-Issuance Compliance Officer of the Issuer designated in II below and any officer or staff of the Issuer designated by the Post-Issuance Compliance Officer to perform any of the functions described in this PICPP.
- 2. "Bad Use" means expenditure on projects to be used by other than a governmental user, a loan to a non-governmental person or use of a bond-financed facility by a non-governmental person. As indicated herein, such use may arise pursuant to a management agreement, research agreement, naming rights agreement, lease or any similar agreement relating to a bond-financed facility.
- 3. "Bad Payments" means any payments derived from Bad Use of bond financed property.
- 4. "Bond Counsel" means any nationally recognized bond counsel engaged by or on behalf of the Issuer to review or opine on matters covered by this PICPP.
 - 5. "Code" means the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended.
- 6. "Disposition Proceeds" means any proceeds derived from the sale of a facility financed with tax-Advantaged Bonds.
 - 7. "Governing Body" means the Board of Trustees of the Issuer.
- 8. *"Regulations"* means the Income Tax Regulations promulgated pursuant to the Code.
- 9. "*Tax-Advantaged Bonds*" means, collectively, any of the Issuer's Tax Credit Bonds, Tax-Exempt Bonds and taxable bonds to the extent they are subject to Rule 15C2-12.

- 10. "Tax Closing Documentation" means any and all covenants, certificates, instructions and information reporting documentation contained in the closing transcript or record of proceedings for any series of Tax-Advantaged Bonds, whether executed in connection with the issuance of any such series of obligations or executed post-closing.
- 11. "Tax Credit Bonds" means the one or more series of governmental purpose tax credit bonds or other form of obligations that the Issuer has previously issued or may in the future issue that entitle the Issuer, the owners of the Tax Credit Bonds, or any other permitted party to either a credit against federal income tax liability or a refundable credit from the United States Treasury.
- 12. "Tax-Exempt Bonds" means the one or more series of governmental purpose bonds or other form of tax-exempt obligations that the Issuer has previously issued or may in the future issue, the interest on which is excludable from gross income of the owners thereof pursuant to Sections 103 and 141-150 of the Code and Regulations.
- C. <u>Incorporation of Tax Closing Documentation</u>. This PICPP shall be deemed to include and hereby incorporates all Tax Closing Documentation for each issue of the Issuer's Tax-Advantaged Bonds.
- D. <u>Incorporation of Continuing Disclosure Undertaking</u>. This PICPP shall be deemed to include and hereby incorporates all Continuing Disclosure Undertaking Documentation for each issue of the Issuer's Tax-Advantaged Bonds.
- E. <u>Incorporation of Appendices</u>. This PICPP shall be deemed to include and hereby incorporates all special post-issuance compliance policies and procedures set forth in each of the Appendices hereto.

II. Overall Responsibility for Compliance

- A. <u>Assignment of Responsibility</u>. Oversight responsibility for post-issuance compliance is assigned to Manager, Financial Services, 318 Old Main, 307-766-4391. Such officer is hereby designated the Post-Issuance Compliance Officer ("PICO"). Certain specific compliance responsibilities may be assigned by the PICO to a designated Authorized Representative of the Issuer as stated below.
- B. <u>Consultation with Outside Professionals</u>. The PICO and any Authorized Representative may consult with any Bond Counsel or other municipal finance advisors or professionals that they deem appropriate to meet the requirements of this PICPP.

III. Tax Documentation Assembly and Closing Filing Requirements

A. <u>Tax Documentation Assembly</u>. The PICO will assemble and document to his or her satisfaction the location of all Tax Closing Documentation for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds of the Issuer. The PICO will keep all post-closing documentation as a supplement to the Tax Closing Documentation.

B. <u>Closing Filing Requirements</u>.

- 1. The PICO will confirm to his or her satisfaction the filing of the appropriate Form 8038-G or Form 8038-TC no later than the 15th day of the second calendar month after the close of the calendar quarter during which bonds are issued.
- 2. The PICO will confirm to his or her satisfaction whether Tax-Exempt Bonds have been issued as 'bank qualified' bonds pursuant to Section 265(b) of the Code and Regulations. If the Tax-Exempt Bonds are "bank qualified," the PICO will note as part of the Issuer's books and records the limits on additional Tax-Exempt Bonds that may be issued in the remaining portion of the calendar year.
- C. <u>Recordkeeping</u>. All documentation relating to the Tax-Advantaged Bonds assembled pursuant to the tax document assembly referred to above or pursuant to any or any other compliance topic in this PICPP will be subject to the General Recordkeeping Requirements and Records Retention requirements set forth below.
- D. <u>Coordination with Accounting Systems</u>. With respect to all compliance topics set forth in this PICPP and where relevant, the PICO will confirm recording of all information relating to any of the compliance topics set forth in this PICPP in either the Issuer's or any third-party or trustee accounting system.

If a trustee has been engaged, and there is change in the trustee, the PICO will consult with the new trustee to ensure that all investment records have been transferred and are being maintained.

- E. <u>Federal Guaranty Prohibition</u>. Upon closing, and throughout the term of the Tax-Advantaged Bonds, the PICO will determine whether more than 5% of the proceeds of a Tax-Advantaged Bonds are invested, directly or indirectly, in federally insured deposits or accounts, or if the Tax-Advantaged Bonds are otherwise directly or indirectly federally guaranteed and will consult with Bond Counsel in the event there is a question with respect to the Tax-Advantaged Bonds being federally guaranteed within the meaning of Section 149(b) of the Code.
- F. <u>Disposition of Facilities Financed with Tax-Advantaged Bonds</u>. The PICO shall consult with Bond Counsel prior to the disposition or sale of any facility financed with Tax-Advantaged Bonds and determine how any Disposition Proceeds shall be applied.

IV. Arbitrage Investment Limitations and Rebate Requirements

A. Assignment of Compliance Duty.

With respect to this compliance topic, the PICO will coordinate compliance for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds under this PICPP and the Tax Closing Documentation for each such issue. The PICO designates current financial advisor for the Issuer's bonded debt to assist complying with this topic.

B. <u>Information Assembly, Collection and Procedures</u>. If not already set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation for an issue, the PICO will determine and record the following information and establish the following procedures:

1. Basic Information.

- (a) Determine whether the Tax-Advantaged Bonds are a fixed yield issue of bonds or a variable yield issue of bonds.
- (b) Determine whether the Issuer has entered in a hedging transaction (e.g., interest rate swap, cap, floor or collar) either before, on or after the bond issue date.

With respect to all hedging transactions, determine or confirm with Bond Counsel <u>prior</u> to entering into any hedging transaction (including interest rate swaps and caps) with respect to the bonds whether or not such swap agreement is to be identified as a qualified hedge as defined in the Regulations, and if such a qualified hedge is to be entered into, determine or confirm with Bond Counsel <u>prior</u> to amending or terminating the hedge the impact of any amendment or termination of such a qualified hedge. A qualified hedge must be identified in the first information reporting form relating to a bond issue filed with the IRS on or after the date on which the qualified hedge contract is executed.

(c) Determine whether the bonds are secured by a bond insurance policy, letter of credit, or other form of credit enhancement or liquidity facility.

With respect to all bond insurance, letter of credit, other credit enhancement or liquidity facilities entered into with respect to the bonds, determine or confirm with Bond Counsel the impact of such a transaction on the bonds <u>prior</u> to entering into or amending or terminating any such credit enhancement.

(d) If the bonds have been directly purchased by a bank or financial institution, create a summary of all covenants and undertaking required by such bank or financial institution.

2. Arbitrage Investment Limitation Information.

- (a) Identify or provide for the computation of the bond yield for each issue of the Tax-Advantaged Bonds.
- (b) Identify each fund or account containing "gross proceeds" of the bonds (as that term is defined in the Regulations), including any fund or account established under agreements other than the bond ordinance, resolution, indenture or Tax Closing Documentation,

- particularly any fund or account that may be expected to be used to pay debt service on the bonds.
- (c) Identify the applicable temporary periods and investment yield restrictions with respect to each such fund or account, including the investment yield restrictions applicable at the end of each temporary period.
- (d) Confirm that the size of any "reasonably required reserve fund" for the bonds (as that term is defined in the Regulations) has not been funded in an amount more than 10% of the issue price or principal amount of the bonds as may be applicable. Identify any investment yield restrictions applicable for deposits of any other moneys into such a reserve fund in excess of the applicable limits for such reserve fund as set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation.
- (e) Record each type of investments in which gross proceeds have been invested.
 - Record whether investments were purchased at a fair market value and whether they were purchased on a negotiated basis or were put out for bid. If by bid, obtain all documentation relating to whether there was compliance with the bidding rules established for the specific investment. Consult with Bond Counsel and/or financial advisors, if needed.
- (f) Provide for the documentation, computation and payment of any yield reduction payments in the same manner as set forth for rebate payments below.

3. Rebate Information.

- (a) Determine for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds no later than the date set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation (and in no event later than the fifth anniversary date of the date of issuance of each issue), if a rebate consultant needs to be retained and the timing for hiring of such a rebate consultant. Obtain a copy of all rebate reports provided by a rebate consultant.
- (b) Establish whether each issue is eligible for any spending or small issuer exception to the rebate requirements.
- (c) Except as may otherwise be provided in the Tax Closing Documentation, establish a calendar of each date for each of the Issuer's bond issues that the Issuer will be required to make any rebate payment to the United States (generally, every 5 years and upon final payment of all bonds). Such a calendar must recognize that the dates of any required rebate payment to the United States

- must be adjusted to reflect any redemption date of a bond issue prior to final maturity.
- (d) Provide a procedure for timely filing of any required rebate payment to the United States, including the completion of any IRS Form 8038-T.

4. Special Arbitrage and Rebate Spending Procedures.

To the extent that any bond proceeds are used to reimburse the issuer for expenditures paid prior to the date of issuing the bonds, the PICO will assure that such proceeds are allocated to the reimbursement of such expenditures no later than 18 months after the later of (i) the date the expenditure was paid, or (ii) the date that the project was placed in service, but in no event more than 3 years after the expenditure was paid. In anticipation of issuing bonds, the PICO shall determine if a reimbursement resolution should be adopted prior to the issuance of such bonds.

5. Error Correction Procedures.

The PICO will document, as soon as practicable after bond closing, all steps to be taken in order to correct any incorrect expenditure of proceeds of a Tax-Advantaged Bond or Disposition Proceeds and investment and rebate compliance errors. These steps may include, but are not limited to, consultation with Bond Counsel or any of the procedures described in section VII below as may be applicable.

V. Bond Proceeds Spending Requirements

A. <u>Assignment of Compliance Duty</u>.

With respect to this compliance topic, the PICO will coordinate compliance for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds under this PICPP and the Tax Closing Documentation for each such issue. The PICO designates the UW Facilities Planning Office and the UW Accounting Office to assist complying with this topic.

B. <u>Information Assembly, Collection and Procedures</u>. If not already set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation for an issue, the PICO will determine and record the following information and establish the following procedures:

1. Basic Information.

- (a) Assemble a list of all purposes and projects to be financed by the bonds, including information on the expected useful lives of projects.
- (b) Designate which of these purposes represent capital expenditures or working capital.
- (c) Establish the exact amount of bond proceeds and all other sources of funding for the project.

- In connection with this procedure, the PICO will document all requirements applicable to such other sources of funding.
- (d) Determine the amount, if any, of bond proceeds that may be expended on payment of interest on the bonds (i.e., capitalized interest) and all applicable spending and time limits applicable to such payment of interest on the bonds.
- (e) Identify and calendar any time periods that may be applicable as to when bond proceeds must be spent.

2. Spending Limitation Procedures.

- (a) The PICO will establish such accounting controls as are necessary to guarantee that no more than the lesser of (i) 10% of the net proceeds or (ii) \$15 million will be expended on projects used by persons other than a governmental unit.
- (b) The PICO will establish such accounting controls as are necessary to guarantee that no more than 5% of net proceeds of the bonds may be used for a purpose that is unrelated to, or disproportionate to, the governmental purpose of the bond issue (e.g., a privately operated cafeteria in a government office building is generally related use; leasing of space in the government office building to private commercial tenants is unrelated use).
- (c) The PICO will establish such accounting controls as are necessary to guarantee that no more than 5% of net proceeds of the bonds are loaned to a non-governmental person.
- (d) The PICO will establish such accounting controls as are necessary to assure that all costs of issuance that are paid with bond proceeds are so paid no later than 180 days after the date of issuing the bonds.
 - The PICO will establish such accounting controls as are necessary to identify to the PICO whether there is a variance of greater than 10% in the amount of costs of issuance, credit enhancement costs and refunding or new money uses reported on the IRS Form 8038-G for the bond issue.
- (e) The PICO will establish such accounting controls, calendars and reporting procedures as are necessary to confirm that any time periods limiting spending have been met.
 - In connection with this procedure, for new money issues, the PICO will establish such accounting reports as are necessary to determine at least annually the amounts and percentages of bond proceeds that have been spent on the intended projects.

- (f) The PICO will establish such accounting controls as are necessary to confirm that the proceeds are spent on the approved projects.
- (g) The PICO will establish such accounting and review procedures as are necessary to record and approve a change from an expected qualified project to a qualified substitute project.
- (h) The PICO will establish such accounting and review procedures as are necessary to arrange for qualified expenditures of any unspent moneys that remain after completion of the original list of projects to be financed by the Tax-Advantaged Bonds.

In connection with this procedure, the PICO will prepare a written, detailed explanation regarding why such proceeds remain unspent.

In connection with this procedure, if a significant amount (i.e., more than 15%) of Tax-Exempt Bond proceeds or <u>any</u> amount of Tax Credit Bond proceeds remain unexpended as of the third anniversary date of the date of issue of the bonds, the PICO will confirm with Bond Counsel the proper steps to take to protect the qualified status of such bonds (including but not limited to the continued investment of such amounts) and will confirm with Bond Counsel whether the existence of such unspent proceeds impacts the ability of the Issuer to issue any new issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds.

(i) The PICO will establish such accounting controls, calendars and reporting procedures and such other review procedures as are necessary to confirm the actual expenditure or deemed allocation to expenditure of all bond gross proceeds by the date that is no later than 18 months after the later of the date the expenditure is paid or the date any project that is financed by the issue is placed in service. A final record of all actual expenditures or deemed allocations to expenditures must in all events be made by the date that is 60 days after the fifth anniversary date of the issuance of the bonds or 60 days after the retirement of the bonds, if earlier.

VI. Use of Bond Financed Property and Bad Use or Bad Payments Limitations

A. <u>Assignment of Compliance Duty.</u>

With respect to this compliance topic, the PICO will coordinate compliance for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds under this PICPP and the Tax Closing Documentation for each such issue. The PICO designates the UW Real Estate Operations Office to assist complying with this topic.

B. <u>Information Assembly, Collection and Procedures</u>. If not already set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation for an issue, the PICO will determine and record the following information and establish the following procedures:

1. Basic Information.

- (a) Determine as of the date of issue of the bonds how each source of funding is to be expended on or allocated to any Bad Use.
- (b) Determine the amount of bond proceeds loaned or granted to non-governmental entities.
- (c) Determine the list of payments to be derived from operation of the bond financed property and whether the bond financed property secures the repayment of the bonds.

2. Bad Use and Bad Payments Control Procedures.

- (a) The PICO will establish such monitoring procedures as are necessary to bring to the attention of the PICO for approval <u>prior</u> to execution any lease, sales contract or other disposition of bond financed property.
- (b) With respect to the operation of bond financed property, the PICO will establish such monitoring procedures as are necessary to bring to the attention of the PICO for approval <u>prior</u> to execution any naming rights, sales or licensing contract; any management or service contract, research contract; any output contracts; cell phone tower agreements; solar power contracts or windmill-generation contracts or similar types of contracts.
- (c) Immediately upon the execution of any lease, sale or other disposition that constitutes a Bad Use, and in all events no less than annually during the term of any bond issue, the PICO will provide a calculation of the amount of Bad Use and Bad Payments with respect to bond financed property.
- (d) Should the amount of Bad Use and Bad Payments approach the limits described above, the PICO will refer to the Change in Use and Remediation requirements of this PICPP and shall immediately consult with Bond Counsel as to the best course of action to respond to such a situation.

VII. Change in Use and Remediation

A. <u>Assignment of Compliance Duty</u>.

With respect to this compliance topic, the PICO will coordinate compliance for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds under this PICPP and the Tax Closing Documentation for each such issue.

B. <u>Information Assembly, Collection and Procedures</u>. If not already set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation for an issue, the PICO will determine and record the following information and establish the following procedures:

1. Basic Information.

The PICO will locate any information with respect to this compliance topic including any list of options stated in the Tax Closing Documentation that is available to remediate excess Bad Use (and Bad Payments).

2. <u>Change in Use and Remediation Procedures.</u>

- (a) Should the information collected by the PICO with respect to Bad Use and/or Bad Payments indicate that the use or payments are in excess of the prescribed limits for the bond issue, the PICO will consult with Bond Counsel as to the remedial actions available under the Regulations to correct such excess use or payments.
- (b) Should the information collected by the PICO with respect to Bad Use and/or Bad Payments indicate that the use or payments are in excess of the prescribed limits for the bond issue and the remedial actions set forth in the Regulations are not applicable, the PICO will consult with Bond Counsel as to the options that are available for voluntary correction of failures by entering into a closing agreement under the Tax-Exempt Bonds Voluntary Closing Agreement Program described in IRS Notice 2008-31.

VIII. Refundings

A. <u>Assignment of Compliance Duty</u>.

With respect to this compliance topic, the PICO will coordinate compliance for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds under this PICPP and the Tax Closing Documentation for each such issue. The PICO designates current bond counsel, current financial advisor and the UW Financial Services team to assist complying with this topic.

B. <u>Information Assembly, Collection and Procedures</u>. If not already set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation for an issue, the PICO will determine and record the following information and establish the following procedures:

1. Basic Information.

- (a) Determine the redemption dates for all refunded bonds.
- (b) Determine the list of projects being refinanced with proceeds of the bonds and any Bad Use or Bad Payments incurred with respect to such bond financed property.
- (c) Determine if the bonds to be refunded have been refunded in the past.

2. <u>Refunding Procedures</u>.

- (a) The PICO will establish such accounting reporting procedures as are necessary to assure that any refunded bonds are redeemed or retired within 90 days of the date of issue of the refunding bonds or, if the refunded bonds are not callable within 90 days, that such refunding is permitted under the Tax Closing Documentation or the Regulations and that such call date is the first call date for the refunded bonds required by the Tax Closing Documentation or the Regulations.
- (b) The PICO will apply the same policies and procedures as set forth in sections IV-V of this PICPP to any refunding bonds.
 - With respect to this procedure, the PICO will ensure that any final rebate calculations for the refunded bonds will be performed within 60 days of redemption of refunded bonds and timely filing of Forms 8038-T or Forms 8038-R with such payment as may be required, as appropriate, will be made.
- (c) The PICO will apply the same policies and procedures as set forth in sections VI-VII of this PICPP to the property being refinanced by the refunding bonds.

IX. Modification of Bond Terms and Events of Default

A. Assignment of Compliance Duty.

With respect to this compliance topic, the PICO will coordinate compliance for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds under this PICPP and the Tax Closing Documentation for each such issue. The PICO designates current bond counsel to assist complying with this topic.

B. <u>Information Assembly, Collection and Procedures</u>. If not already set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation for an issue, the PICO will determine and record the following information and establish the following procedures:

1. Basic Information.

The PICO will assemble, and make all gathered information and documentation regarding the modification of bond terms or events of default, part of the Issuer's books and records.

2. Modification of Bond Terms and Events of Default Procedures.

(a) The PICO will establish such accounting and reporting procedures as are necessary to confirm that any tax levy, tax credits or other revenues securing the bonds have been received and that the debt service on the Tax-Advantaged Bonds has been paid and

compliance with non-payment covenants with respect to the Tax-Advantaged Bonds has occurred.

In the event that any payment or other type of default occurs, the PICO will consult with Bond Counsel.

(b) The PICO will establish such reporting requirements and information gathering procedures as are necessary to identify whether any events have occurred that would have or could have triggered a deemed discharge or reissuance of the bonds. Such reporting requirements will include assembling, prior to execution, if possible, information concerning (i) changes (modifications) of any of the contractual terms of the bonds (including modifications of the bond interest rates, maturity dates or payment schedule), (ii) changes to the credit enhancement of or liquidity facility for the bonds, (iii) changes in the nature of the security for the bonds, (iv) purchase of the Tax-Advantaged Bonds by the Issuer, or (v) any deferral or default of payment of principal and interest due on the Tax-Advantaged Bonds.

With respect to this procedure, PICO should consult with Bond Counsel as to the options that are available to the Issuer for dealing with such events, including acquiring any bond security from a federal agency or instrumentality.

X. General Recordkeeping Requirements and Records Retention

- A. <u>Assignment of Compliance Duty</u>. With respect to this compliance topic, the PICO will coordinate compliance for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds under this PICPP and the Tax Closing Documentation for each such issue. The PICO designates the UW Facilities Planning Office and the UW Accounting Office assist complying with this topic.
- B. <u>Information Assembly, Collection and Procedures</u>. If not already set forth in the Tax Closing Documentation for an issue, the PICO will determine and record the following information and establish a General Recordkeeping Requirement and Records Retention Procedure. Pursuant to this procedure, the PICO will record in a retrievable paper or electronic form all of the information required by this PICPP. At a minimum for each issue of Tax-Advantaged Bonds, the PICO shall record and keep copies of:
 - the bond transcript of proceedings;
 - all resolutions (including reimbursement resolutions) and minutes pertaining to the projects financed, if not included in the bond transcript;
 - all surveys, feasibility or demand studies and any publications, brochures and newspaper articles with respect to the bonds, if not included in the bond transcript;

- all bond yield computations including supporting certificates and investment records (including trustee records) pertaining to the issue price of the bonds, proceeds of the bonds, investment agreements and related bidding documents, credit enhancement and liquidity documents, swap documents, rebate reports and rebate payments;
- all documents pertaining to the expenditure or granting of bond proceeds for the acquisition, construction or renovation of bond financed property including any trustee records, requisitions, reimbursements, draw schedules, draw requests, construction contracts, invoices, bills, land/project related appraisals, payment records, requisition statements, reimbursement records, cancelled checks, a final schedule of property financed by the bonds and final allocations of bond proceeds;
- all formal elections made for the bond financing (e.g., an election to employ an accounting methodology other than specific tracing);
- all records of trade or business use, purchase, lease, sublease or sale
 of bond financed property including any leasehold improvement
 contracts and ownership documentations such as joint venture
 arrangements, limited liability corporation arrangements or
 partnership arrangements;
- all management contracts and other service agreements, research contracts, naming rights contracts and those contracts listed in section VI.B.2.(b) of this PICPP;
- all accounting audits for bond financed property;
- all information reports filed for the bonds;
- all documentation pertaining to any prior IRS examination of Issuer and/or tax-exempt bonds; and
- all correspondence related to the above (faxes, emails and letters).
- C. The PICO will develop such procedures as are necessary to document the payments made of all principal, interest and any redemption payments on the Tax-Advantaged Bonds.
- D. All records accumulated for the bond issue shall be maintained for a period of four years following the later of (i) final maturity of the bonds or (ii) any Tax-Advantaged Bonds issued to refund the bonds.
- E. The PICO will review the bond resolutions and all ancillary agreements to assure compliance with covenants and undertakings.

F. The PICO will comply with all Continuing Disclosure Undertakings; this includes preparation and uploading of annual information to EMMA as well as the preparation and filing of material event notices.

XI. IRS Correspondence and Audits

The PICO will consult with Bond Counsel immediately upon receipt of any correspondence from, or opening of an examination of any type, with respect to Tax-Advantaged Bonds by the IRS.

XII. Periodic Review Requirements

The PICO will review the implementation of this PICPP with the Governing Body of the Issuer at least annually during the term of any Tax-Advantaged Bonds.

XIII. Training Requirements

The PICO will develop a training program that is designed to inform any successor PICO of the requirements of this PICPP and periodically to train all Authorized Representatives of their duties under this PICPP. Such a training program may be developed with internal materials or those supplied by Bond Counsel and shall include a review of the Code and the IRS's web site established for the use of the tax-exempt bond community located at http://www.irs.gov/taxexemptbond/index.html?navmenu=menu1.

XIV. Revision of PICPP

The PICO will periodically seek the advice of Bond Counsel or other municipal finance advisors or professionals that he or she deems appropriate to revise the terms of this PICPP. Such revisions shall be annually approved or ratified by the Governing Body of the Issuer.

XV. Disclosure Procedures

- A. <u>Purpose</u>. These disclosure procedures ("Disclosure Procedures") are designed to (a) ensure the completeness and accuracy of the federal securities disclosure made by the Issuer and the Issuer's Board of Trustees (the "Board") (including the Board's officers and the Issuer's staff in the exercise of their official duties) and compliance with all applicable federal and state securities laws in connection with issuance and disclosure undertakings relating to outstanding bonds issued on its behalf and annual financial information filings; and (b) promote best practices regarding disclosures disseminated to investors and the municipal securities markets by the Issuer.
- B. <u>Disclosure</u>. The controls and procedures set forth herein shall apply to all Disclosure disseminated or communicated by the Issuer. "Disclosure" includes any information or communications reasonably likely to reach investors or the securities markets, such as preliminary and final official statements relating to bonds issued for the benefit of the Issuer, filings made by the Issuer with the Municipal Securities Rulemaking Board ("MSRB") or the national repositories (whether required by contract or made voluntarily), press releases which could reasonably be construed as intended for the

financial markets, investor calls, investor roadshows, rating agency presentations and other communications, and certain postings on the Issuer's website.

C. <u>Disclosure — Issuance of Bonds</u>.

- 1. **Responsibilities of the PICO**. The PICO or his or her designee (the "Oversight Officer") shall be responsible for overseeing the compilation of both the preliminary official statement ("POS") and the final Official Statement (individually referred to herein as an "Official Statement" and collectively, the "Official Statements") to be used in connection with the offering and issuance of the associated bonds issued for the Issuer's benefit (the "Bonds") and annual financial information filings and for review of other disclosure obligations of the Issuer undertaken in connection with such bond issuance. In the carrying out of these responsibilities, the Oversight Officer shall coordinate with, and be provided with assistance from, among other professionals, Bond Counsel, the Issuer's General Counsel and the financial advisor or the Underwriter to the Issuer. This oversight responsibility shall include the following:
 - (a) develop a separate checklist or similar outline for the Issuer's Official Statements for each bond issuance benefitting the Issuer. Each of these checklists shall list the categories of information in the applicable Official Statement and identify the person or persons (whether internal to the Issuer or a third-party consultant to the Issuer) who should be responsible for reviewing or contributing the information in each portion of such applicable Official Statement (a "Contributor");
 - (b) ensure that each Contributor receives a copy of each draft of the applicable Official Statement and the checklist indicating his or her responsibilities with sufficient time to permit such Contributor to perform a thoughtful and thorough review or preparation of information for the applicable portion of the Official Statement. Gather such applicable information and comments from each Contributor;
 - (c) provide information and comments submitted by Contributors to Bond Counsel and coordinate with Bond Counsel to develop a draft POS for the Bond issue;
 - (d) distribute applicable sections of such applicable Official Statement or annual financial information filing as revised to the respective Contributors for further review and comment. Document confirmation by each Contributor that the information provided by such Contributor has been properly incorporated in such applicable Official Statement draft and is accurate and complete as so incorporated. Contributor confirmation may be provided by means of indications on checklist;
 - (e) schedule and conduct periodic internal and external meetings of Contributors, either in groups or individually, and Bond Counsel for the purpose of discussing the Issuer's financial status generally and its annual audited financial

> statements, its related programs, the related industries, and other issues affecting the Issuer and the Bonds that may be material to investors; and

- (f) review all continuing disclosure obligations in connection with the Bonds.
- 2. **Responsibilities of Contributors**. All Contributors to the Issuer's Official Statements shall be responsible for the following:
 - (a) delivery and review of comments and information as requested (by means of a checklist or otherwise) for purposes of inclusion in the applicable Official Statement;
 - (b) review of applicable portions of the revised applicable Official Statement and provide confirmation (which may be provided by means of indications on a checklist) that the information provided by such Contributor has been incorporated correctly and, as so incorporated, such portions of the applicable Official Statement present accurate and complete information to investors about the items so covered by such portions;
 - (c) attend periodic meetings (as applicable) to discuss broad issues concerning the Issuer and its Official Statements; and
 - (d) in the case of third party or expert Contributors, provide certifications and opinions relating to their contributions to Official Statements as appropriate.
- 3. **Responsibilities of Bond Counsel**. Bond Counsel shall have the following responsibilities with respect to Disclosure by the Issuer:
 - (a) provide an initial draft POS for distribution to Contributors and draft timelines for review by the Oversight Officer;
 - (b) confirm that all steps required by the Disclosure Procedures have been followed in connection with preparation of a particular Official Statement. No Official Statement relating to the Bonds shall be submitted to the Board for approval or certification until and unless Bond Counsel has completed this confirmation;
 - (c) distribute drafts of Official Statements to working group participants for review and confirm with working group participants that no issues have been raised regarding the draft Official Statements based on such review;
 - (d) perform a review and evaluation of the initial Disclosure Procedures and confirm to the Issuer whether changes to such Disclosure Procedures are recommended. Any subsequent changes to the procedures will also be reviewed by Bond Council;

- (e) review and approve any continuing disclosure obligations or statements in connection with any Bond issuance; and
- (f) cause an opinion to be provided regarding the necessity of filing a material event notice, where such an opinion is requested.

D. <u>Disclosure in Connection with Outstanding Bonds.</u>

1. Continuing Disclosure Obligations.

- (a) The Oversight Officer shall be responsible for overseeing compliance by the Issuer with its continuing disclosure obligations, including but not limited to the compilation and filing of all applicable annual financial reports.
- (b) The Oversight Officer shall also consult with its dissemination agent appointed in connection with the applicable Bond issue (the "Dissemination Agent"), Bond Counsel and the Issuer's General Counsel to determine the materiality of any events and whether an event notice is required to be filed under the circumstances.
- (c) If a determination is made that an event is material and a notice is required, the Oversight Officer shall work with the Dissemination Agent and Bond Counsel to prepare a draft of such notice in a timely manner and shall provide such draft notice to the Issuer's General Counsel for review and comment. The Dissemination Agent shall be directed to file such notice in the required repositories once the notice has been approved by the Issuer's Chairman and the Issuer's Counsel.
- (d) Generally, the process for the preparation of the annual financial information filing shall follow the guidelines set forth for disclosure made in connection with the issuance of bonds as set forth in Section 3 of these procedures.
- 2. **Voluntary Filings**. The Oversight Officer, in consultation with Bond Counsel and the Issuer's General Counsel, shall evaluate whether an event is appropriate for disclosure by the Issuer on a voluntary basis, based on investor demand or otherwise. Upon a determination that a voluntary notice should be filed, the Oversight Officer shall work with the Dissemination Agent, Bond Counsel and the Issuer's General Counsel to prepare a draft of such notice. The Dissemination Agent shall be directed to file such voluntary notice in the appropriate repositories once such notice has been approved by the Issuer's Oversight Officer, the Board and the Issuer's Counsel.
- 3. **Press Releases**. Press releases for the Issuer are prepared by the Board. The Board shall consult with Bond Counsel prior to approving press releases that relate to Disclosure.
- 4. *Investor Communications*. The Oversight Officer shall be responsible for overseeing the responses to all telephone, email and other inquiries from existing and potential investors in the Bonds. All Issuer staff shall transfer such inquiries to the

Oversight Officer (or delegated staff under his/her supervision). Investors shall be directed to information provided on the Issuer's website or shall be given a written response to any inquiry whenever practicable.

- 5. **Rating Agency Communications**. All information provided by the Issuer or for the Issuer at its direction to any rating agency providing a rating for the Bonds shall be reviewed for accuracy and completeness and approved by the Oversight Officer.
- E. <u>Training</u>. The Oversight Officer, in consultation with Bond Counsel or the Issuer's General Counsel, shall be responsible for coordinating regular training sessions for Issuer staff and Board members about their obligations under the Federal securities laws and regulations and other Federal and state laws affecting the issuance of Bonds. Training shall be provided for general background and overview purposes and, as applicable, to update Issuer staff and Board members concerning recent changes in applicable laws or regulations.

BACKGROUND AND POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

CMAR Selection - Rochelle Athletic Center - Mai

BACKGROUND AND POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

The existing 48,100 square foot Rochelle Athletic Center (RAC), completed in 2001, is one of the most widely used facilities by UW Athletics. At the time it opened, it was a state-of-the-art facility and continues to accommodate several areas utilized by all Cowboy and Cowgirl sports teams. The ground level houses an 8,600 square foot (SF) strength and conditioning area, a 4,800 SF sports medicine area, and a 5,600 SF football locker room and lounge area. The second story of the RAC houses 4,470 SF of space for the Office of Academic Support, the Cowboy football offices, meeting rooms, and displays of Cowboy football awards and outstanding players.

The proposed new 78,100 SF addition with the renovation (for a total of 126,000 SF) will provide a modern state-of-the art facility that will expand the holistic approach to the development of the student-athlete. This approach relies on a complete and interactive view of the athlete's daily status by monitoring training, conditioning, body analysis, nutrition, health, and academic load with the unique opportunity to provide High Altitude Training. The proposed addition and renovation have been envisioned to accommodate the three key areas of Academics Center, Training Table, and Sports Performance. Programmatic elements include both those functions currently located within the RAC as well as new components. The existing RAC would be renovated and expanded to create a single facility that supports the programs goals and enhances the experience for UW's student-athletes.

The proposed addition is anticipated to be located south of the existing building, creating a new, dynamic presence at the north end of War Memorial Stadium. A new central entry plaza is anticipated to be created to the west of the RAC. The new space would act as the front door to Wyoming Athletics, serving the Arena-Auditorium, Fieldhouse North, and the west stands of the stadium. To the east, Warburton plaza is anticipated to be adjusted to create a better connection between the Indoor Practice Facility and the home team locker room, which is proposed to be located at the southeast corner of the addition. The renovation is anticipated to include a remodeled and enhanced north public entry that reflects the architecture of the addition.

The total construction cost will be approximately \$33M. The University has chosen to include a CMAR in the design phase with an initial goal of concluding preconstruction by spring of 2016. The project funding is from both state and private funds. On-site construction activity could begin as early as summer of 2016.

The total budget ("all in") for the project is \$44M. The project will be funded through \$24M from private donations and \$20M from State matching funds.

The Facilities Planning Office advertised for Construction Manager-at-Risk qualifications in June 2015. Four responses were received on June 23, 2015. The Statements of Qualification (SOQs) were reviewed and narrowed to two firms by the Rochelle Athletic Center Addition/ Renovation Planning Team. The following short-listed firms were issued Requests for Proposals and were interviewed on August 6, 2015:

- Haselden Wyoming Constructors Laramie, Wyoming
- GE Johnson Construction Wyoming Jackson, Wyoming

The Planning Team based the ranking of the CMAR finalists on the qualifications of the preconstruction and construction personnel, the firms' experience and capabilities with projects similar to the Rochelle Athletic Center Addition/Renovation project, and the proposals providing the best value to the University. The ranking is as follows:

- 1. GE Johnson Construction Wyoming Jackson, Wyoming
- 2. Haselden Wyoming Constructors Laramie, Wyoming

PRIOR RELATED BOARD DISCUSSIONS/ACTIONS:

 March 2015 – Board of Trustees approved the architect/engineering firm of Pappas and Pappas Architects, Cheyenne, Wyoming, in association with DLR Group, Denver, Colorado.

WHY THIS ITEM IS BEFORE THE BOARD:

This item is for authorization by the Board of Trustees to contract with the Construction Managerat-Risk firm for the Rochelle Athletic Center Addition/Renovation project.

ARGUMENTS IN SUPPORT:

- The 2015 Legislature appropriated \$20M requiring a match of \$24M to fund the construction of the Rochelle Athletic Center Addition/ Renovation.

GLOSSARY OF PERSONNEL TERMS

Academic Professional

Person other than faculty, engaged primarily in activities that extend and support the teaching, research, extension, and service missions of the University. There are four categories of academic professional: Extension Educators, Lecturers, Research Scientists, Post-Doctoral Associates. Individuals belonging to any of the first three categories can hold extended-term-track appointments under certain conditions.

Academic-Year (AY) Appointments

Appointments in which the regular period of employment includes the fall and spring semesters (nine months) of each year, with no accrual of vacation leave. Most faculty members and academic professionals hold AY appointments. AY employees typically receive their nine-month salaries and benefits spread out over the 12 months of each calendar year.

Adjunct Faculty

An adjunct appointment is the appointment of an individual to an academic unit that recognizes special disciplinerelated expertise but carries no financial obligation per se. Adjunct appointments can include qualified non-academic personnel or faculty with other academic affiliations. Adjunct appointments carry no rights to remuneration, tenure, or employment-related privileges and are normally for three years, with renewal possible.

Archives Faculty

This special faculty designation is reserved for archivists of the American Heritage Center. Archivists are responsible for acquiring original resource material to support academic research and teaching, organizing the material physically and intellectually, and teaching faculty, students and others to use these materials. There are three archivist ranks: Assistant Archivist, Associate Archivist, Archivist.

Assistant Professor

Indicates tenure-track appointments of individuals who hold the terminal degree in their discipline. This is the usual entry-level faculty rank.

Associate Professor

In addition to the qualifications of an Assistant Professor, Associate Professors have established a strong reputation in scholarship and teaching. Generally, faculty hired as Assistant Professors are promoted to the rank of Associate Professor at the time tenure is granted.

Clinical Faculty

Clinical faculty appointments allow experts in health-related fields to contribute to the training of UW students in allied disciplines. Clinical appointments are for at most one year at a time and carry no rights to tenure or extended terms. Clinical faculty members may be salaried members of the UW faculty, in which case their reappointment is subject to annual performance reviews. There are also adjunct clinical faculty appointments, which typically involve health-care professionals whose normal employment is outside the university. Adjunct clinical appointments carry no financial commitment from the University.

Emeritus Faculty

Tenured faculty who retire after long and distinguished service are eligible for emeritus status upon their retirement. The designation is honorary and carries no necessary commitment of space or remunerative employment. By analogy, extended-term academic professionals may be eligible for emeritus status upon retirement. (Emeritus=masculine, emerita=feminine, emeriti=plural)

Extended-Term Appointment

Academic professionals who have successfully completed probationary terms (usually six years) may receive six-year appointments called extended-term appointments. The term also applies to certain librarians and archivists who hold faculty status. These employees are eligible for extended-term appointments after five-year probationary periods. Extended terms for these employees are five years in length. Academic professionals, librarians, and archivists who are in the probationary period are on the extended-term-track.

Extension Educator

These academic professionals provide non-credit education to off-campus clientele through UW's Cooperative Extension Service. There are three ranks of Extension Educators: Assistant Extension Educator, Associate Extension Educator, Senior Extension Educator. All Extension Educators are in the College of Agriculture.

Faculty

Members of the permanent faculty include tenured or tenure-track Assistant Professors, Associate Professors, and Professors. Also included are tenure-track individuals who hold the rank of Instructor while completing their terminal degrees. Librarians and archivists also hold faculty status. They are eligible for extended terms instead of tenure.

Fiscal-Year (FY) Appointments

Appointments in which the regular period of employment is the entire calendar year, with accrual of annual vacation leave. Faculty members who hold administrative positions with summer responsibilities often have FY appointments for the duration of their administrative terms.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE)

A measure of the time commitment expected of an employee or a set of employees. For example, two full-time employees or four half-time employees constitute 2.0 FTE.

Instructor

Tenure-track faculty member who does not yet hold the terminal degree in the appropriate field. UW requires verification of degrees in the form of official transcripts. UW does not grant tenure to faculty members who hold Instructor status at the time of the decision.

Leave of Absence Without Pay

Academic and administrative personnel may request leaves without pay for periods normally not in excess of one year, for purposes consistent with the professional enhancement of the employee and the advancement of the University's stature.

Lecturer

A category of academic professional involved largely in classroom instruction. Lecturers may be appointed to three ranks: Assistant Lecturer, Associate Lecturer, Senior Lecturer.

Library Faculty

This faculty designation applies to employees of the University Libraries. There are three ranks of library faculty: Assistant Librarian, Associate Librarian, Librarian.

Part-Time Employee

Any employee holding less than a full-time equivalent position (FTE less than 1.0).

Post-Doctoral Associate

Post-Docs are doctorally qualified academic professionals seeking greater professional development and research investigation, before obtaining permanent employment. Post-Doctoral appointments are temporary.

Probationary Faculty

This term refers to tenure-track faculty members who are working toward tenure and to academic professionals, library faculty, and archive faculty who are working toward extended-term contracts. The probationary term for academic professionals is generally six years, with yearly reviews and re-appointments. For librarians and archivists, it is five years. Faculty members who are on tenure-track appointments typically undergo the review for tenure in the sixth year of employment.

Professional Development Leave

Extended-term academic professionals who have completed six years of service at the University are eligible for professional development leave. The purpose of development leave is to enhance performance, to conduct special studies, or in some other way to enhance an individual's ability to contribute to the University. Development leaves can be granted with or without pay, are the prerogative of the academic unit in which the academic professional is located, and are generally similar to sabbatical leaves for faculty.

Professor

In addition to the qualification of an Associate Professor, "full" Professors have attained wide recognition in their professional fields for scholarship or other creative activity and have gained recognition for superior teaching and service.

Research Professor

Person with demonstrated superior capacity for research contributions, who is employed solely on external funds, and who holds a terminal degree. These appointments are made only at the Professor level and for not more than one year at a time. They are renewable.

Research Scientist

An academic professional whose primary responsibility is to conduct research. There are three ranks for Research Scientists: Assistant Research Scientist, Associate Research Scientist, Research Scientist.

Review Year

Year in which a reappointment review occurs for probationary employees. Normally, tenure-track faculty members undergo mandatory reappointment reviews in their first, second, and fourth years, with optional reviews in the third and fifth years. A review for the tenure decision occurs no later than the sixth year. An explanatory flow chart appears at the end of this glossary. In some cases employees start with credit toward a tenure or extended-term decision, based on their previous experience. In these cases the review year is the number of years of service at UW plus the number of years of credit.

Sabbatical Leave

Sabbatical leave may be granted to any tenured member of the faculty for the purposes of increasing professional competence and usefulness to the University. A minimum of six years service at the University must precede each period of sabbatical leave, although no right accrues automatically through lapse of time. Sabbatical leaves are normally granted for either a half year (full pay) or a full year (60% of salary). A faculty member who fails to return to the University after a sabbatical leave must repay the amount of compensation received from the University during the sabbatical. Faculty members may not use sabbatical leaves to pursue degrees.

Temporary Appointment

A short-term appointment without rights to tenure or extended term. Most temporary appointments are for one semester or one academic year.

Tenure-Track Appointment

Indicates a probationary faculty appointment prior to the award of tenure. Tenure-track positions generally require six years to tenure, but fewer years may be required based upon level of previous experience and accomplishments.


Terminal Degree

Typically the highest earned degree in a field of study. Examples include the Ph.D. (a variety of fields), the M.D. (medicine), the Ed.D. (education), M.F.A. (fine arts), M.Arch. (architecture), and J.D. (law).

Visiting Appointment

Indicates a non-permanent, non-tenure-track faculty appointment. Most visiting appointments are for one year.

SABBATICALS AND PROFESSIONAL LEAVES

1. Faculty

Any tenured member of the University faculty may apply for a sabbatical leave for the purpose of increasing the recipient's professional competence and usefulness to the University. Sabbatical leave time may be used for research, writing or study at a place of the recipient's choosing. University personnel holding tenured faculty rank whose duties are primarily administrative are also eligible for sabbatical leaves. A minimum of six years of academic service at the University must precede each period of sabbatical leave, although no right accrues automatically through lapse of time.

Sabbatical leaves are not ordinarily available for the purpose of obtaining an advanced degree. A faculty member who fails to return to the University for at least one academic year immediately following a sabbatical leave is obligated to repay the amount of compensation received from the University during the leave. Leaves for a full contract year are compensated at a rate equal to 60 percent of the employee's annual salary; leaves for a half-contract year are compensated at the employee's existing rate for the period.

In each case, the teaching responsibilities of faculty on sabbatical leave will be assumed by other instructors, and there will be no reduction in number of courses offered as a result of the sabbatical leave. Requests for sabbatical leave undergo review by the appropriate department head and dean. They are also reviewed by the Office of Academic Affairs.

This year, a total of 39 faculty members and academic professionals requested sabbatical or professional development leaves. Academic Affairs screened these requests and forwarded 36 requests with positive recommendations.

Her research may contribute to better economic policies and processes to promote healthy births and community health, especially for indigenous

communities.

Islam, Md Anowarul Associate Professor Exact Date 2015-2016
Professor Anowar Islam will focus on pasture bloat and the major problem associated with grazing of alfalfa pastures despite its high growth, quality, and production. Millions of dollars per year are lost due to pasture bloat in cattle production both in the US and Canada. Dr. Islam will collaborate with Dr. Surya Acharya to generate information that will enable cattle producers in both countries to benefit from grazing alfalfa stands and improve feed efficiency and cost effectiveness of high performance grazing systems.

Klages, Ricki L. Professor Spring 2016

Professor Ricki Klages intends to complete a large group of narrative and figurative paintings that feature elements of the landscape, still life and portraiture that visually connect to imply a complex story. These paintings will enable Professor Klages to broaden the exhibition venues and other prospects for displaying and publishing her paintings. Klages will also apply for a Ucross Foundation Residency for the spring of 2016 (applications are accepted October of 2015) for a 4-6 week residency that will enable her to focus solely on her painting in a supportive creative environment and help to reinforce her national and international reputation. Klages will also be developing a senior level course for the Department of Art, titled: Narrative/Figurative Painting, for the spring of 2017, based in part on her work undertaken during her sabbatical.

Department of Chemistry

Kubelka, Jan Associate Professor Spring 2016

Professor Jan Kubelka is proposing to enhance his expertise in theoretical and computational chemistry, which has been one of the most fruitful parts of his research, by working with some of the world's leading experts. Through projects focused specifically on his current research interests, he plans to get an in-depth training in the latest advances in the chemical theory, along with practical hands-on experience with the state-of-the-art software and development tools. Bringing this newly acquired knowledge and experience back to UW will greatly expand the research capabilities of Professor Kubelka's group and the chemistry department, and improve the quality of education and student training in the modern computational methods.

Department of Communication & Journalism

Brown, Michael R. Professor Fall 2015

Professor Michael Brown will use his sabbatical to explore the adoption and use of 'new media' in Kazakhstan. The use of new digital media is worldwide as technology becomes more readily available and accessible. Kazakhstan offers a unique opportunity to examine how developing countries are adopting digital media. The research is the result of a cooperation agreement and ongoing research collaboration between journalism department at UW and the Kazakh National University.

Department of English

McCracken-Flesher, Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Caroline McCraken-Flesher will study in Scotland to research and write the book, Writing the Way Home: Scottish/American Literary Networks from 1745 to the World Wide Web. This book will inform scholarly discussion of "home" as a focus and problem for today's global culture, build understanding of transatlantic relations and the literary exchange of ideas, contribute to UW courses on Scottish Literature, and add nuance to English's curriculum on Literatures of the Americas. While in Britain, Professor McCraken-Flesher will strengthen exchange relationships with the Universities of Stirling and Essex, and deliver the annual talk on literature at the Scottish Parliament.

Romtvedt, David M. Professor Fall 2015

Professor David Romtvedt will complete two projects. One is to work on a musical theater piece focused on John Milton's Paradise Lost and on Milton's life. The second is to continue studying the Basque language for the purpose of enhancing literary translation work in the UW Creative Writing program and to continue teaching the Basque language at the university and in Wyoming communities. Romtvedt will spend his sabbatical leave working in Wyoming and Montana as well as in Lazkao, Gipuzkoa in the Basque Country.

Thompson, Jason C. Associate Professor Spring 2016

Professor Jason Thompson proposes to write two book projects – each accepted by academic publishers – on the related subjects of Rhetoric and Game Studies; in addition, we will write one new essay on political rhetoric. Portions of these projects have been funded already (for example, the Andrew Cosman Research Fellowship at the National Museum of Play). Presentations at national and international conference will aid in developing both books.

Department of History

Helfgott, Isadora A. Associate Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Isadora Helfgott proposes to spend a year-long sabbatical working on two projects: first, she will conduct archival research in San Francisco, Chicago, St. Louis and New York in order to write an academic monograph that examines the history of fine art exhibitions at world's fairs between 1876 and 1964; second, she will build on initial work with the Sleuk Rith Institute in Cambodia, enabled by grants from four different units at UW, to assist in establishing a Museum of Memory in Siem Reap that will educate Cambodian and global audiences about atrocities committed under the Khmer Rouge regime. This work contributes to my research on the political significance of museums, and in particular how cultural institutions can facilitate reconstruction of civil society in the wake of political upheaval.

Department of Mathematics

Jafari, Farhad Professor Fall 2015

Professor Farhad Jafari requests a one-semester sabbatical leave in Fall 2015, to complete several research articles and spend several months as a long-term visitor at the IMA in Minneapolis, participating in the thematic year on Control Theory and Dynamics. This leave will lead to new collaborations and new publications, grant funding and training of doctoral students at the University of Wyoming.

Liu, Rongsong Associate Professor Calendar Year 2016
Professor Rongsong Liu is planning to visit the Centre for Computational Systems Biology, at the School of Mathematical Sciences, Fudan University, Shanghai, China. Dr. Liu also plans to spend one month each at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology to work with Lydia Bourouiba and the University of Sterling to collaborate with Jozsef Farkas. Results in terms of research papers and grant applications born of these two projects will not only provide theoretical results for biological control of diseases, but also provide scientists with insights into the design of field experiments to test biological control strategies.

Williford, Jason S. Associate Professor Fall 2015

Professor Jason Williford will investigate problems in the theory of association schemes and coherent configurations. These are combinatorial structures that provide a unified framework for studying problems in other areas of combinatorics, such as coding theory, design theory, and geometry. This research is currently funded by a grant with the NSF. The faculty is requesting leave to collaborate on this project with faculty at the University of Delaware. This will enable him to broaden the scope of the project and improve the quality and quantity of publications associated with it, ultimately aiding in future efforts to secure funding.

Department of Music

Fadial, John M. Professor Spring 2016

Professor John Fadial will use this one semester sabbatical in the spring of 2016 is to record a compact disc of music for string sextet with the Stanislas Sextet of France, sponsored by the Ensemble Stanislas, Ville de Nancy and produced by Radio France. The project also includes a pedagogical research project that will examine higher education string instrument teaching styles in the US and France through master classes and lesson observations at the Nancy Conservatory, Nancy, France.

Lamartine, Nicole C. Associate Professor Spring 2016

Professor Nicole Lameritne will attain certification in anatomy and an anatomy dissection workshop that will prepare her to answer research questions and develop a new course pertaining to conducting and musician movement. Secondly, she will travel to Beijing to teach, perform, and conduct at China Conservatory. Finally she will fulfill her duties as President-Elect for the Northwest division of the American Choral Directors Association.

Vanderborgh, Beth D. Associate Professor Spring 2016

Professor Beth Vanderborgh will use this one semester sabbatical in the spring of 2016 to record a compact disc of music for string sextet with the Stanislas Sextet of France, sponsored by the Ensemble Stanislas, Ville de Nancy and produced by Radio France. The project also includes a pedagogical research project that will examine higher education string instrument teaching styles in the US and France through master classes and lesson observations at the Nancy Conservatory, Nancy, France.

Department of Physics & Astronomy

Dahnovsky, Yuri Professor Spring 2016

Professor Yuri Dahnovsky proposes to sharpen his theoretical understanding of the microscopic processes involved in solar cell technology. He will learn new computational techniques in modeling electronics at the molecular level through collaborations and visits to the labs of Professors Alex Boldyrev (Utah State University) and Vince Ortiz (Auburn University). New computational methods will allow Professor Dahnovsky to probe new territory in molecular systems, which will benefit the training and output of his research group.

Department of Political Science

Garrison, Jean A. Professor Fall 2015

Professor Jean Garrison requests a sabbatical leave for Fall 2015 to conduct research focusing on the EU, China, and the US as global actors in energy and the environment. This project will address the multi-faceted issues surrounding the global energy and climate security debates as it investigates efforts to develop a collaborative model across the various stakeholders to address one of the planet's most complex challenges – building our path to a sustainable energy future. Professor Garrison will conduct research in Berlin, Germany, Oxford, England, Washington, DC and Shanghai, China for this project.

Department of Psychology

Wilkowski, Benjamin M. Associate Professor Spring 2016

Professor Benjamin Wilkowski plans to visit his collaborator, Dr. Thomas Denson, at the University of New South Wales to obtain training in several psycho-biological research techniques (e.g., fMRI, cortisol). He will extend his study of several approaches for mathematical modeling human social interactions, namely game theory and reinforcement learning theory. These activities will serve to improve Dr. Wilkowski's program of research, his capacity to bring grant dollars to the University of Wyoming, and will enhance his overall professional competence and usefulness to the university.

Department of Religious Studies

Flesher, Paul V.M. Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Paul Flesher intends to spend time in Israel and at key research libraries studying Sabbath worship in ancient Galilean synagogues, drawing upon archaeological discoveries, Aramaic Biblical translations and rabbinic literature. This will result in a book, Mosaics and Palestinian Targums: Torah, Temple and Sacrifice in the Synagogues of Sepphoris and Beth Alpha. The aim is to understand how worship strengthened religious knowledge and motivated Jews' adherence to Judaism at a time when Jews were under strong social, political and religious pressure to convert to Christianity and Judaism had been severely damaged by the permanent loss of Jerusalem and

its Temple.

Department of Sociology

Machalek, Richard S. Professor 2015 Fall

Professor Richard Machalek will conduct research that will consolidate over twenty-five years of research findings in the field of evolutionary sociology, a relatively new branch of sociology that he helped establish. His sabbatical research will yield a book manuscript tentatively titled Evolutionary Sociology: Toward a More Explanatory Social Science. This project will incorporate research findings and ideas from major branches of behavioral biology and sociology, thereby helping to build a bridge between life sciences and the social sciences.

Department of Statistics

Anderson-Sprecher, Richard Professor

Academic Year 2015-2016 Professor Richard Anderson-Sprecher proposes to spend the 2015-16 academic year researching topics in spatiotemporal modeling and applying knowledge gained to the analysis of sage grouse population data. Work will be done in collaboration with scientists at the Fort Collins office of The Nature Conservancy. General knowledge obtained about space-time models will benefit the Statistics graduate curriculum, and specific knowledge learned about sage grouse will benefit the scientific research community and stakeholders in ongoing discussions regarding sage grouse populations.

Global and Area Studies Program

Seitz, Thomas R. Associate Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Thomas Seitz will undertake research in Indonesia, exploring how Indonesians are attempting to build an informed electorate in the world's largest Islamic society. Seitz's research will also explore the role of colonial policies and practices in shaping the values, norms and expectations of citizens in the post-colonial societies. In the process, Professor Seitz will also broaden and deepen UW's cooperation with universities in Indonesia.

Harbour, Clifford P. Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Clifford Harbour's sabbatical leave has three parts. First, he will develop a new line of research examining the role of administrators and faculty leaders in developing civic engagement programming at two community colleges. Second, he will examine the role of educational leaders in developing a civic engagement unit in a place-based, graduate science education curriculum. Third, Professor Harbour will produce a proposal for a booklength text describing best practices for community college civic engagement programming based on his research and a systematic review and analysis of the research literature.

Department of Elementary & Early Childhood Education

Buss, Alan Richard Associate Professor 2015 Fall

The University of Wyoming is providing many new and exciting tools which aid faculty and students in their efforts to research and understand complex problems, including the new 3-D CAVE in the Shell Visualization Center. Sabbatical leave is being requested to research the costs and benefits of using these tools for instruction in energyrelated topics in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM), particularly for non-majors. Results of the research will be shared with interested UW faculty as they develop teaching materials and simulations, and more broadly through professional publications and presentations.

Madrid, Samara Dawn Associate Professor Fall 2015

With the increase of both internationalization in education and of the populations of diverse students, there is a need to prepare early childhood teachers to understand the cultural nature of teaching and child development. To address these concerns, the purpose of this research project is threefold: 1) to examine the daily life of preschool in the three diverse early childhood settings (Nepal, Laramie, and the Wind River Reservation), 2) to use the video data from the three early childhood settings to examine University of Wyoming early childhood education students' perspectives about teaching and learning as situated in cultural context and 3) Use the data set to develop college curriculum to prepare University of Wyoming students to understand how to teach the young child in cultural context.

Barker, Michael G. Professor Calendar Year 2015

Professor Michael Barker will use this sabbatical to develop information on the Live Service performance and Life Cycle Costs for steel and concrete bridges. Life Service and Life Cycle Cost research is a priority in the bridge industry. State Departments of Transportation and Counties will be visited to obtain actual histories and associated maintenance and rehabilitation costs for a data set of bridges. The impact of the study is time sensitive with the recent 10-month extension of the Highway Trust Fund and the initiation of the FHWA Long Term Bridge Performance work.

Ogden, Fred L. Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Fred Ogden will split his time between the new US National Water Center in Tuscaloosa, AL and the Smithsonian Tropical Research Institute. He will transfer UW tools developed through the NSF EPSCoR high performance computing hydrologic modeling project to the National Water Center, and supervise watershed manipulation experiments in Panama associated with his new NSF Water, Sustainability, and Climate project in the Panama Canal Watershed. Both of these activities will benefit UW through continued research vitality by Professor Ogden and his students in cooperation with national and international collaborators, writing of publications and proposals.

Urynowicz, Michael A. Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Michael Urynowicz will use his leave to focus his efforts on field demonstration of the technologies he developed at UW. He also plans to solidify relationships with industry sponsors for long-term financial support of his research by commercializing his technologies, the patents for which are owned by UW.

Name Rank Period Year(s) **Bridgeman, Jacquelyn L.** Professor Spring 2016

Professor Jacquelyn Bridgeman will be writing an interactive family law casebook. The book envisioned will be focused on a practical and experiential approach to teaching family law. In its electronic format it will integrate and embed a range of instructional technologies in order to enhance the learning experience for students and to better cater to the ways in which students learn and process information in the present day. In addition to her book project, Professor Bridgeman intends to write two articles on race, gender, and sports; one focusing on Division I football as an inherently discriminatory system and the other focused on sex segregation in sports.

Novogrodsky, Noah B. Professor Academic Year 2015-2016

Professor Noah Novogrodsky will spend a year at the Human Rights Center of the University of California, Berkeley conducting research and writing a book that addresses the globalization of human rights. The manuscript will benefit from interactions with faculty and researchers based in the Bay Area and marks a shift from thinking about human rights as state obligations in an international system to a study of the norms that bind individuals and communities in an interconnected world where borders are increasingly irrelevant.

Easton, Stephen Douglas Professor Spring 2016

Professor Stephen Easton will use his sabbatical to edit and revise historical trial files for publication and use by other law schools and bar organizations. This will enhance the reputation of the College of Law and the University by establishing the college as a source of strong education and leadership in history and trial advocacy.

Ms. Kaijsa Calkins plan to explore course offerings in research methods from other libraries or departments at other universities for syllabi, assignment descriptions and learning outcomes. Locally, she will conduct interviews/focus groups with UW humanities faculty and students about gaps/needs of graduate students and departments related to research skills. The information she gathers will inform the development of the course and may also inform broader departmental efforts to improve research—support services to graduate students. 2. Academic Professionals

The purpose of professional development leave is to allow academic professionals to enhance their performance, to conduct special studies, or in some other way to undertake planned activities related in a substantial manner to the individual's role at the University. To be eligible to apply for professional development leave, academic professionals must have been granted an extended-term contract. Initial requests may be submitted no earlier than the seventh year of academic service. If granted, the leave may be taken no earlier than the eighth year. Subsequent leaves must be preceded by a minimum of six additional years of academic service, although no right accrues automatically through lapse of time. Other conditions for professional development leave are generally those that apply to sabbatical leave for faculty. An academic professional who fails to return to the University for at least one academic year immediately following a sabbatical leave is obligated to repay the amount of compensation received from the University during the period of his or her leave.

Remarks

Phase 1 eastern reconstruction/addition portion of the Half Acre Recreation and Wellness Center was substantially completed on March 13. Campus Recreation occupied the Phase 1 portion on Monday, March 16. Punch list tasks and building technology subsystems are nearing completion post-occupancy.

Phase 2 renovation of the historic western portion of Half Acre Gymnasium commenced upon occupancy and opening of the Phase 1 addition. Renovation work is complete on the first floor, including remedial structural and floor slab construction made necessary by unforeseen subsurface and subfloor conditions. Construction is underway throughout Phase 2, including mechanical and electrical rough-in, running track structure and floor alterations, and interior layout and framing. Aquatics subcontract work related to new pool plumbing, and the new whirlpool feature is slated to be complete in early September. Phase 2 renovation completion is scheduled for October 31, 2015.
