Mr. Watenpaugh moved, it was seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried, that Mr. Fay E. Smith be appointed Land Coordinator and Fiscal Consultant in accordance with the following letters between Mr. Smith and President Humphrey:

Dear Mr. Smith:

You are aware of the fact that the Board of Trustees, at their meeting on May 15-17, adopted the proposed changes in the Bylaws and Regulations governing the functions of the Treasurer and Secretary of the Board of Trustees as submitted by the President upon the authorization and direction of the Board at their meeting on March 7.

The purpose of this letter is to confirm the agreements which we reached in our conference on Saturday, May 20, 1950, with regard to your title, duties, and salary under the new organization. Your title is to be "Land Coordinator and Fiscal Consultant." Your duties are to be the following:

(1) Supervision and operation of the car pool. The pool will be operated in the same manner in which it has been operated by my office during the current year, except on a much broader basis, since there will be many more cars in the pool than there are at the present time. The pool has been very successful this year, and we are convinced that, with careful, efficient, and skillful management, it will continue to be successful. As requests come in, you will assign the cars in accordance with the memorandum which has been worked out by a committee and approved by me. I gave you a copy of this memorandum during our conference on Saturday, and I am sending you another copy herewith. You will keep the records and make monthly reports as to the financial operation of the pool, including the number of miles traveled by each pool car, the cost of operation (broken down into supplies and maintenance), and the profit made each month.

You understand, I am sure, that in the operation of a car pool all new cars are bought from the profit derived from operating the cars. We have a distinct advantage over commercial car pools in this arrangement, since we are able to buy our gasoline, oil, and parts tax free. When new cars are to be purchased, authorization for their purchase will be made by the President upon your written recommendation, which must include the reasons for the necessity of the purchase. All new cars will be purchased on bids.

Mr. Forest Hall, who has operated the pool this year, will be of invaluable assistance to you in getting started on this phase of your work.

(2) Service on the Public Exercises Committee. You were recommended for this position by the Committee on Committees and approved by the faculty for the next Committee year; therefore, you will continue this duty.

(3) Service as fiscal consultant. This phase of your work will consist in furnishing to the officials of the University any information you are able to furnish with regard to the fiscal operation of the University. Because of your long period of service, we believe that you can render valuable service in this capacity.

(4) Land records work. This is an assignment on which you can also be of great assistance to the University. I have discussed the matter with you in detail on several occasions and have also discussed it with other people. I feel, and the Board feels, that we should have more detailed information on our lands than we now have. Therefore, you are to locate and make maps of the lands; bring together the deeds, where deeds exist; make recommendations for correcting any defects found in the deeds; and bring together information concerning the leases on the lands, length of time they are to run, to whom the lands are leased, and the form of the leases. You are to find the source of University ownership of the lands, that is, whether they were acquired by purchase, grant, or gift. You are to be responsible for the leasing and control of the three inactive farms, and you are to prepare information to be used by the Attorney General in drafting legislation concerning the use and sale of the grant lands and the state farms if the President and the Board decide that such legislation is necessary.

The work with the lands as outlined necessarily means that there will be several months of office work before any traveling is done, particularly for inspection of lands. I am sure it will not be necessary to do any traveling this summer. In fact, I do not see any necessity for any traveling, except perhaps for a few trips to Cheyenne, until the summer of 1951. Your time should be spent in organizing your procedures and collecting basic information.

Your salary for 1950-51 will be the amount which was set up in the budget for your former position as Comptroller and Secretary of the Board of Trustees.

Just as you were leaving my office on Saturday, you mentioned the question of keeping your car. I have given considerable thought to this matter, and since you will not be doing any traveling this summer and since you will be operating the car pool from which you may secure a car should you need to make a trip, I do not believe you should have a car especially assigned to you. Therefore, your car should be turned in to the pool by the first of June.

It is my understanding that your present secretary will continue working until about August 1. We will set up in the new budget for your department an amount sufficient to cover her salary for

the length of time she works and for whatever vacation she is entitled to receive. At the time of her resignation we will confer on a plan to provide future secretarial help for you. Since there is some money set up in the budget for the Public Exercises Committee, perhaps a part of your secretary's salary can be paid from that budget, with the remainder being charged to the car pool or some other fund. I am sure we can arrive at a satisfactory arrangement.

For the present your office will be the one recently occupied by Bowes and Hart, and if you wish you may move your present desk and chair to that office. You will be expected to sign the diplomas this year as Secretary of the Board and to call the next meeting of the Board. Following the preparation of the minutes of the May 15-17 meeting of the Board, you will be expected to turn over to the President's office all minute books and other materials and equipment which go with the office of Secretary of the Board, including the card index for the minutes.

When the Board adopted the Bylaws and Regulations set up in the Developmental Study, the President was given power to put them into effect whenever he thought the time was appropriate. Therefore, we will proceed as follows: you will be expected to relinquish your position as Comptroller and Secretary of the Board at the close of duties on May 31, at which time you will turn in all keys in your possession except the key to the outside door of the building. Of course you will receive a key for your new office.

You are to take the month of June for a vacation under the salary rate set up in the budget for you for 1949-50. Since you are entitled to more than one month of vacation, you may also take the month of July if you wish, beginning your duties as Land Coordinator and Fiscal Consultant on August 1. Your salary under the new budget will begin on July 1. The arrangement I have outlined is necessary in order to avoid setting up a budget for your new office for the month of June in the fiscal year 1949-50.

As we agreed in our conference, we will work out a statement to give to the papers concerning your shift in positions. This can be worked out together and an agreement can be reached on what should be said. I believe this statement should be released following the next meeting of the Board.

I appreciate the interest which you manifested in the new position and your willingness to undertake the duties assigned to you. If, after reading this letter, there are further points you would like to discuss with me, I shall be glad to talk to you again. If not, I shall appreciate having your written acceptance of the terms set forth in this letter.

My dear President Humphrey:

I am replying to your letter of May 23 regarding changes in by-laws. I am pleased to accept these changes and my new status as Land Coordinator and Fiscal Consultant as outlined in our conference Thursday afternoon including services on the Public Exercises Committee and supervision and operation of the car pool.

President Simpson informed me, in the executive session of the Board, that there would be no change in my salary nor in the other emoluments presently enjoyed including my office, room 204. I am of the opinion, however, that the interests of the University can best be served if I turn this office over to the President as he needs a place for the Vice-President. I can be quite well located in room 301, but it will be necessary for me to take most of the furniture and equipment now used by myself and my secretary. I will, however, leave in room 204 the rugs, draperies, ditto machine, (it's a good one) and one or more new 4-drawer filing cases; also the check signer, if I can get out from under.

I remind myself of the man who has a bull by the tail and can't let go. To make a change in this position certain things must be done.

I must be checked out by the state examiner - - as I was checked in - - preferably at 5:00 P.M., June 30. I will of course relinquish all authority other than the custodianship of cash and securities the minute the business manager is appointed.

The state examiner will count the cash, cash items and check the contents of the safety deposit box, containing bonds and other securities at the First National Bank of Laramie, and turn these properties over to the business manager.

Then - this bank must be notified that after that date I am not to be admitted to the safety deposit box. The bank must be notified that after a certain date my name is not good on University checks. As checks take some time in clearing, the date I mention here is the date appearing on the check.

The state treasurer must be notified - - I am still selling him bonds for Wyoming Hall, and he makes the checks out to me personally.

The state auditor must be notified that I can no longer approve bills for payment.

The surety bonding company must be told.

These notifications can not be made by the business manager, but must be made by yourself or an officer of the Board.

I request that the combination of the money safe be changed.

My name plate in the check signer must be destroyed, but not until the new plate for the business manager has been received.

I am Military Property Custodian for the R.O.T.C. I have a bond with the Army for \$151,716.22, the value of the several hundred firearms, motor vehicles, uniforms and many other items. There is no deputy authorized to sign my name, nor his own. I sign papers almost daily. Col. Craig can not sign. I don't know how to get out from under this one but undoubtedly Col. Craig can arrange it.

I can get along without a new budget until July 1.

I do not wish to take a vacation at this time. There is too much to be done. I must get the \$70,047.17 from the Community Facilities Service of Denver for the library and the infirmary plans immediately or we will lose it.

I wish then to make the annual state farms inspection trip with Dean Hill and Director Quayle, and Forest Hall if you wish. We are late this year now.

Next I wish to get the car pool functioning by July 1, if possible.

I shall then go to work on the grant lands, first in the state land office for many days, later hunting 'em up around the state, particularly the oil and gas lands to make sure they conform to the leases. You will recall I picked up \$1,600 a year from the Gillette farm.

As fiscal consultant I shall be pleased to help you, the Board or the business manager. I can see right now that I can be of service in getting out the new bond issue for the War Memorial Field House and Stadium.

I shall turn over to you the minute books of the Board and the card index. I recommend that a competent person be employed to make a new card index from the beginning down to the present date.

I shall turn in all keys except to the east outside door and room 301.

I am willing to leave the statement to the press to you and Miss Dorety. I am surprised it hasn't broken already.

I am quite willing to give up my membership on the following committees if you wish me to do so: Wyoming Union, Residence Classification, Retirement and Insurance, Job Classification and Salary Scales, Veterans Administration Contracts and Faculty Housing.

I shall need a land surveyor's compass with sights, size about 4 inches, for hand use, no tripod and a couple maps of Wyoming with enough detail to show townships and sections.

I am willing to release my parking space here at Old Main.

I am happy with these arrangements and will perform these duties to the best of my ability.

Any artifacts or relics recovered, together with data concerning them, become the property of the University of Wyoming. Any duplicates or facsimiles may go to the Smithsonian Institution when agreeable to the University of Wyoming.

Mr. Sullivan then moved that the following policy written by President Humphrey as directed by the Board at the May meeting regarding staff members who become candidates for public office be approved. This motion was seconded by Mr. Del Monte and carried:

V. POLICY REGARDING STAFF MEMBERS WHO BECOME CANDIDATES FOR PUBLIC OFFICE

The President, complying with the Board's instructions, has prepared the following statement of policy, agreed upon at the meeting of the Board on May 15-17, to be followed by the University in the event a member of the staff should decide to file as a candidate for county, state, or national office:

"Since a college or university provides a sanctuary for faculty members by subscribing to the principles enunciated by the American Association of University Professors in respect to academic freedom and the granting of continuing tenure following probationary service, the Board feels that the same protection provided the faculty member should also be given to the University by members of

the staff. Therefore, the Board of Trustees, at their meeting on May 15-17, adopted the regulation that a staff member who files as a candidate for county, state, or national office must resign his position prior to filing or at the same time he files as a candidate. In the event the staff member is defeated, there will be no prejudice on the part of the Board toward his re-employment should his services be needed by the University."

VII. PROGRESS REPORT ON SKI AREA AND ICE HOCKEY ARENA

For the information of the Trustees, the President presents herewith the following progress report, prepared by Athletic Director G. J. Jacoby, with regard to the proposed up-to-date ski area and modern ice hockey arena for the University of Wyoming:

Ski Area The present Snowy Range Ski Area, owned and operated by the Snowy Range Ski Club, was originally financed by individuals and business firms in this region through the medium of promissory notes at different values. At the present time we are working with the Ski Club in an effort to get definite commitments on notes held, so that the ownership may be legally transferred from the Snowy Range Ski Club to the University of Wyoming. At the present time it appears that it will take approximately \$1,500.00 to purchase the present ski area interests from the Snowy Range Ski Club. In addition to this sum of money, it will take approximately \$10,000.00 spread over a three-year period to get the ski area in first-class condition. These figures are approximations and will be revised in the final report.

Ice Hockey Arena We have been working with a number of firms on the construction of a suitable ice hockey arena. As of today, we have a report and preliminary estimates from only one firm. Plans from other construction fabricators are being drawn, but the latest information I have from these firms indicate that it will be approximately thirty days before these plans can be forwarded to us for final action.

President Humphrey then reported on comparative food prices purchased by the Food Services at Knight Hall and Wyoming Union.

President Humphrey then submitted a comprehensive report of the University Bookstore which showed the sound financial condition of this enterprise.

The State Examiner's report covering his audit of the business offices for the period July 1, 1948 to June 30, 1949 was then presented to the Board, and the letter of transmittal and comments were read in their entirety. The financial and statistical statements in support of these statements and a part of the report have been printed and included in the 58th Annual Report of the President of the Board of Trustees covering this period. This printed report was mailed to the Trustees last fall. After discussion, Mr. Watenpaugh moved that the following recommendations made by the examiner be approved and put into effect as soon as it is possible to do so. This motion was seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried.

1. We believe continuing serious consideration should be given to the appointment of an internal auditor. It is our understanding that the creation of this position has been approved by the Board of Trustees. The size and scope of the University organization and operations is such as, in our opinion, to merit the appointment as a necessary measure in strengthening internal control.
2. We urge that the work of completing and maintaining plant records be expedited in all ways practicable. Buildings, equipment, and other plant assets comprise the major portion of all university assets and the importance of their proper control cannot, in our opinion, be over-estimated.
3. It is hoped continued study will be given to the various fund groups -- Revolving Funds, Deposit Liabilities, Auxiliary Enterprises, etc., -- with a view to account consolidation, re-classification, and transfer where justified. Good work has already been done in this respect, and some duplication in the reporting of income and expenditures has been eliminated.
5. When facilities can be made available, establishment of central control over all merchandise and supplies inventories is again recommended.

President Humphrey acting in accordance with the provisions of the regulations set up in the Developmental Study then presented the regulations of the College of Agriculture.


