Meeting

The Board of Trustees of the University of Wyoming was called to order at 10:00 A.M., Tuesday, March 7, in the Board room. The following members were present: President Simpson, Mr. Burwell, Mr. Sullivan, Mr. Hansen, Mrs. Patterson, Mr. Reed, Mr. Watenpaugh, Governor Crane, Miss Stolt and Dr. Humphrey.

President Humphrey then submitted his report. The first matter to be considered was continuing tenure and promotion for certain members of the faculty. THIS AGREEMENT, made and entered into as of the March, 1950 by and between the Trustees of the University of Wyoming (hereinafter called Wyoming) and the Regents of the University of Colorado (hereinafter called Colorado), WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Wyoming, by Enrolled Act No. 7, Senate, 1950, Special Session of the 30th State Legislature of the State of Wyoming, has been authorized to offer and provide training and education in professional health services in whole or in part at other institutions without the State of Wyoming and to enter into contracts with such other institutions for the training and education in such fields of students who are residents of the State of Wyoming, and to expend its funds in connection therewith, and

WHEREAS, Wyoming offers pre-medical training in its College of Liberal Arts and Colorado maintains a School of Medicine, and Wyoming and Colorado desire to enter into a contract whereby residents of the State of Wyoming may obtain medical education at Colorado, the cost of which shall be paid to Colorado by Wyoming,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual agreements hereinafter contained, it is agreed as follows:

- (1) Colorado agrees to admit into its School of Medicine, at the beginning of the Fall Quarter of the academic year 1950-1951, five students from the State of Wyoming designated by the President of the University of Wyoming with the advice of the Wyoming State Medical Board, provided, that such students shall meet all requirements and qualifications for entrance into the School of Medicine as determined by Colorado.
- (2) Wyoming shall designate two students, residents of the State of Wyoming, who are currently enrolled in the freshman class of the School of Medicine, and shall pay to the University of Colorado School of Medicine for each of said two students the sum of six hundred sixty-six dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$666.67) for the spring quarter of the academic year 1949-50. Such students shall pay to the University of Colorado School of Medicine the additional sum of two hundred twenty-one dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$221.67) for said quarter.
- (3) Wyoming agrees to pay to the University of Colorado School of Medicine the sum of eight hundred eighty-eight dollars and thirty-three cents (\$888.33) per quarter of the academic year 1950-51 for each of the students designated and accepted under paragraphs numbered (1) and (2) hereof. Colorado agrees that said sum is the total cost of the prescribed course for one quarter's education at the University of Colorado School of Medicine and that no additional charge will be made to such students for such prescribed course. Such sum shall be paid at the beginning of each quarter of the academic year

for which the student is enrolled. Should a student fail to register for any quarter no payment shall be due on his account. Should a student after registering for any quarter withdraw from the School of Medicine, Colorado shall refund to Wyoming a portion of the amount paid to Colorado calculated in accordance with Colorado's rules for refunding tuition and fees to students upon withdrawal.

- (4) Students from the State of Wyoming accepted under this contract shall be eligible for all benefits and advantages (other than those relating to tuition and fees) available to residents of Colorado enrolled in the School of Medicine and shall be awarded by Colorado the degree of Doctor of Medicine upon successful completion of their medical education.
- (5) The President of the University of Wyoming shall designate one member of the University of Wyoming faculty to serve as adviser to the Committee on Admissions of the University of Colorado School of Medicine for the consideration of applicants from the State of Wyoming.
- (6) Nothing in this agreement shall in any way prejudice any resident of the State of Wyoming not designated under this agreement who may now be studying at the University of Colorado School of Medicine or who may hereafter apply for such study outside the terms of this agreement.
- (7) This agreement shall be and continue in force from the beginning of the spring quarter of the academic year 1949-50 to the end of the spring quarter of the academic year 1950-1951. It is the intent of the parties that similar agreements or a permanent arrangement shall be made for the continuation of the medical education of students designated under this agreement and for the continuation of a program for medical education of residents of the State of Wyoming at the University of Colorado School of Medicine.

WHEREAS, the applicant has applied to the University for a grant-in-aid for the purpose of enabling the applicant to study medicine at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, which grant-in-aid, if the applicant pursues to successful completion the course leading to the degree of Doctor of Medicine, will amount to the total sum of eight thousand dollars (\$8,000,00)

WHEREAS, the University of Wyoming desires to promote and improve the medical services and facilities of the State of Wyoming by means of these grants,

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the premises and of the mutual agreements hereinafter contained, it is agreed as

- (1) The University will designate the applicant as one of the residents of Wyoming eligible to study medicine at the University of Colorado School of Medicine.
- (2) If the applicant shall meet all requirements and qualifications for entrance into the University of Colorado School of Medicine and shall be accepted by and enter upon his studies at such School of Medicine, the University agrees to pay to the University of Colorado School of Medicine for each quarter of the academic year for which the applicant is registered the sum of eight hundred eighty-eight dollars and thirty-three cents (\$888.33).
- (3) The applicant agrees to pay to the University the sum of two hundred twenty-one dollars and sixty-seven cents (\$221.67) for each quarter for which he is enrolled in said School of Medicine.
- (4) If the applicant shall successfully complete the study of medicine he agrees to apply to the Wyoming State Medical Board for admission to the practice and if admitted he agrees to practice medicine in the State of Wyoming for the period of four years next succeeding his admission.
- (5) Should the applicant fail or refuse to practice medicine within the State of Wyoming for any part of such four year period, he shall pay to the University the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2,000.00) for each year or major part thereof such failure or refusal. It is mutually agreed that said sum of two thousand dollars is liquidated damages only and not a penalty, and is the reasonable value to the University of the performance of the applicant's promise to practice within the State of Wyoming for one year.
