The annual budget and personnel meeting of the University Board of Trustees was called to order by President Hansen at 10:10 a.m. on March 5, 1962. Mrs. Bush and Mr. McCraken joined the meeting at 10:30 a.m. and Mr. Newton at 11:00. Mr. Laird was absent.

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the low salaries paid to nurses in the state probably accounted for the small number of students studying to become nurses. He added that a great many scholarships are already available to nursing students and that Laramie County had a plan for paying nursing students from that County \$50 per month on condition that they would promise to practice a corresponding number of months in Laramie County after graduation. Dr. Humphrey concluded that unless salaries for nurses could be increased he felt most hospitals might soon be staffed with one or two registered nurses who would supervise the work of nurses' aides, practical nurses, and nurses with only two years of training. He promised to look into the question of nursing students accepting summer employment in hospitals in the state. President Humphrey reminded the Board of the discussion following the 1961 Legislative session concerning the bill that had been introduced with regard to the University's Board of Trustees and the suggestion that had been made as to the possibility of the University proposing legislation as a protection against attempts that might be made to pass bills which would be damaging to the future of the University.

Dr. Humphrey gave the Trustees a summary of a study published by the U. S. Office of Education with regard to characteristics of state boards responsible for higher education: legal status, board titles, board structure, tenure, qualifications, and compensation of members. It was the consensus of the Board that information such as President Humphrey had prepared was valuable for the Trustees to have but that no legislation concerning the Board should be proposed or sponsored by the University.

Dr. Humphrey gave the Trustees copies of a letter from Dean N. W. Hilston concerning the possibility of closing the Cheyenne Horticultural Field Station and the approach the Laramie County Fair Board had made to him about the possibility of the University of Wyoming taking over the station. Dr. Humphrey stated that he and Dean Hilston were not enthusiastic about taking over the station and that there still was not any very definite information concerning the matter. He promised to keep the Board informed of developments, and Mr. McCraken added that he would see what he could learn about the situation in Cheyenne.

Attention was given next to a report from Mr. E. G. Hays, Director of Finance and Budget, concerning annuities which state universities have recently become eligible to purchase for their employees and which provide certain tax benefits to the employees. Mr. Hays' report indicated that four insurance companies had expressed an interest in selling annuities to University personnel: Equitable Life Assurance Society of the United States, Horace Mann Insurance Company, Massachusetts Mutual Insurance Company, and Prudential Insurance Company. He recommended that, if the Trustees approved the annuity plan, they also approve the requests of the companies listed.

Mr. Hays explained that the method of handling purchase of annuities for employees would have to be worked out, but he presented a suggested resolution for approval by the Trustees in the event the plan should be adopted. Some objection was expressed to the plan, principally on the basis of the possible additional cost to the University for handling the purchases.

Concluding the discussion, Mr. McCraken moved, Mr. Sullivan seconded, and it was carried (Messrs. McIntire, Peck, and Newton

follows:

RESOLUTION

WHEREAS, The Board of Trustees of the University of Wyoming has determined that it is in the best interests of the University that non-forfeitable annuity contracts be made available to its employees; and

WHEREAS, it is considered appropriate that the employees be given the election as to whether to receive said annuity contract, and by exercising said election agree to accept a reduction in salary equal to the contribution of the University for the purchase of said annuity contract; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT RESOLVED that each employee of the University of Wyoming be given the privilege of entering into a written agreement authorizing a reduction in the salary of the employee in a specified amount and for a specified term, and that for those employees who elect to accept such reduction in salary the University of Wyoming shall apply for non-forfeitable annuity contracts and purchase same for the benefit of said employees; and that the contribution of the University of Wyoming for the purchase of said annuity contracts and the payment of premiums thereon shall be in an amount equal to the reduction in salary voluntarily agreed to by the employee.

President Humphrey called attention to a detailed salary study he had mailed to the Trustees in advance of the meeting, showing how the University of Wyoming compares with other institutions in the region in salaries paid to faculty members, and explaining the difficulty the University faces in competing with other institutions for well-qualified faculty. He stated that unless some funds could be made available for increases in instructional salaries, he felt certain the University would lose many of its best qualified faculty, and its academic standing would thus be endangered.

Mr. McIntire informed the Board that he had given considerable thought to the problem and had worked out a plan which he felt would provide sufficient increases not only to enable the University to keep its best personnel but also to bring the University's salary

scale up to a point more nearly comparable to those of other institutions in the region. He proposed that all increases be given on the basis of merit and that, as a basis for determining amounts to be made available, increases be figured for the total number of people in each of the professorial ranks as follows: 101 professors @ \$700, 75 associate professors @ \$400, 83 assistant professors @ \$200, and 62 instructors @ \$100. The total amount needed for the salary increases as outlined, Mr. McIntire went on to say, would be \$123,500, and he cited several sources in the budget from which he thought funds for the proposed increases might be taken.

President Humphrey expressed appreciation to Mr. McIntire for the careful thought he had given to the problem and the soundness of the plan he had suggested. He stated that, while somefunds might be available in the current budget, he thought it might be necessary to raise fees in order to provide the additional money needed for the proposed increases. He suggested that he be permitted to consider the matter until the following day before making a recommendation.

Late in the afternoon Messrs. L. G. Meeboer, Building Program Coordinator, and R. G. Arnold, Plant Engineer, were invited into the meeting to report on the bids received for two apartment buildings, each consisting of four two-bedroom apartments, for married students. Mr. Meeboer stated that four bids had been received, that the low bid was well within the money available for the project, and that completion date had been specified as August 15, 1962. He recommended that the Board accept the low bid of Otto Builders Supply of Laramie in the amount of \$60,871.90. Mr. Reed

moved that the recommendation be approved. Mr. Peck seconded the motion and it was carried.

The Board adjourned at 5:35 p.m. and reassembled at 10:20 a.m. on March 6, with the same members present who were present for the preceding day's session except Governor Gage.

Mr. Jones informed the Board of criticism that he had heard in respect to the management of the High School Speech Festival at the University. He stated that the lack of interest shown by those in charge of the Festival, together with the excessive entry fees charged by the University, had caused a number of schools to take their speech students to Utah rather than the University of Wyoming. Mr. Jones pointed out that students participating in the Speech Festival are normally among the top students in the state, and that the University should use the Festival as an opportunity for recruiting these students.

It was the consensus of the Board that the criticism by Wyoming high school teachers and principals was merited, and that some person other than Professor Wilmer Stevens should be placed in charge of the Festival. President Humphrey promised to discuss the matter with Dean John Chalmers of the College of Arts and Sciences and make every effort to see that some improvement was made in the 1962 Festival.

President Humphrey presented a report from the Director of Finance and Budget on the final distribution made to the University under the terms of Dr. Clara F. McIntyre's will. The total value of the bequest to the University, according to the report, was \$22,361.35, of which \$7,652.52 was in cash,\$2,835.94 would be

CLARA F. MeINTYRE received from the proceeds of the sale of E, G and H bonds, and the remainder was in common stocks. President Humphrey recommended that the cash and the proceeds from the bonds be placed in a savings account at four per cent interest, that the stocks be retained intact, and that the interest from the savings account and the dividends on the stocks be used to award scholarships under the terms of the will, the award to be made for the first time in 1963-64. Mr. Peck moved that President Humphrey's recommendation be approved. Mrs. Bush seconded the motion and it was carried.

Mr. Reed suggested that consideration be given to the establishment of a corporation to handle tax-free bequests and gifts. He suggested several alternate plans: establishment of a corporation with the Trustees of the University serving as the Board of Directors; naming a separate Board of Directors reporting to the Trustees of the University; and forming an independent corporation. President Humphrey promised to ask the University's Legal Advisor to prepare a suggested plan for consideration by the Board at the next meeting.

The remainder of the morning was spent discussing the proposed changes in the By-Laws of the Board of Trustees. President Humphrey stated that the principal changes were in Articles X and XII and involved the new offices authorized by the Board; Executive Assistant to the President, Executive Assistant for Business and Plant Affairs, Executive Assistant for Information and Special Services, Executive Assistant for Student Affairs (not yet activated), and Dean of Academic Affairs. Other minor changes had been made, President Humphrey indicated, to conform to actual practice.

CORPORATION TO HANDLE BEQUESTS AND GIFTS

BY-LAWS OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES Concluding the discussion, Mr. Chamberlain moved that the By-Laws as revised be approved by the Board. Mr. McCraken seconded the motion and it was carried.

President Humphrey stated that another change would be proposed at the next meeting of the Board to provide for management of the William Robertson Coe Memorial Funds by the Executive Committee.

The Board adjourned for lunch at 12:10 p.m. and reassembled at 1:30 p.m., with the same members present who were present for the morning session.

President Humphrey suggested that plans be made for the dedication of the new buildings during Commencement. It was decided that the annual meeting of the Board should be held on May 25-26, that the Baccalaureate exercises and reception should be scheduled for May 27, and that the dedication of the new buildings should be held on the morning of May 28, with the Commencement exercises being scheduled at 2:00 p.m.

Dr. Humphrey informed the Board that the Old Timers' Club would like to have its annual banquet at the time of the April Board meeting. It was decided that the April meeting should be held on April 13-14, beginning at noon on the 13th.

Most of the afternoon was spent in considering the proposed budget for 1962-63. President Humphrey suggested that the budget be considered in its entirety and that one motion be made, including whatever amendments the Board wished to make. He stated that very few raises had been included in the budget and most of them were promotional raises. He added that he would recommend a few other raises as the various units were considered. In connection with consideration of the budgets for the offices of the Deans of Men and Women, the Trustees gave attention to the recommendation in the Addendum to the President's Report that administration of the housing program on the campus be centralized in one office. Several Trustees expressed the opinion that if a new office were to be set up, with a recommended budget of \$16,700, some saving should be effected in the budgets of the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women because of their being relieved of responsibility for housing. It was decided that a saving of \$4,736 could be realized by discontinuing the position of Assistant Dean of Men and transferring to the Housing Supervisor's office that portion of the Assistant Dean's salary charged to housing. Mr. Hays stated that one of the steno-clerks had already been transferred from the Dean of Men's office to the housing budget, thus reducing that office budget by another \$3,444. He added that an estimated \$2,000 additional could be taken from the contractual and supplies budgets of the Deans of Men and Women as a result of the reorganization.

Concluding the discussion, Mr. Peck moved that the recommendations for centralization of administration of the housing program be approved, with the understanding that President Humphrey and Mr. Hays would arrange for the transfer to the budget for the Housing Supervisor's office of those amounts included in the budgets of the Dean of Men and the Dean of Women that are paid from housing funds. Mr. Reed seconded the motion and it was carried.

nstructional staff on the basis outlined by Mr. McIntire the	

preceding day, revised to include some divisions omitted from the original study. The total shown on the revised statement was \$145,300.00, and Dr. Humphrey stated that some further revisions might be necessary after there had been time for more accurate calculations as to the number of positions involved. He added that any necessary revisions would be reported to the Board at the next meeting.

Dr. Humphrey then distributed statements showing the possible sources of funds to cover the increases. Included in the estimates was the amount of \$84,000 to be received from an increase in student fees of \$20.00 per year for resident students and \$40.00 per year for non-resident students, and the amount of \$12,546.00 to be received from an increase in Summer School fees of \$5.00 for each five-week term.

Concluding the discussion, Mr. McIntire moved that, in order for University instructional salaries to be comparable to those paid by other universities in this area, the 1962-63 budget for instruction be increased by \$155,300, such increase to be allocated by President Humphrey strictly on a merit basis as recommended in the schedule approved by the Board of Trustees; that included in this amount would be \$10,000 to be used for giving salary raises to Deans and the Director of Adult Education and Community Service; and that part of the funds authorized for salary increases be taken from increases in fees for both the regular session and the summer session, with the remainder (approximately \$59,300) being taken from funds available in the Knight Hall Food Service account. Mr. Reed seconded the motion and it was carried.

President Humphrey presented a report from the Faculty-Trustee HONORARY DEGREES Committee on Honorary Degrees, which had met at 9:00 a.m. on March 6. The Committee recommended that the honorary degree, Doctor of Laws, be awarded to the following at the 1962 Spring Commencement: Dr. William M. Fitzhugh, Monterey, California; Dr. Harold G. Merriam, Missoula, Montana; and Senator John C. Stennis, Washington, D. C. Mr. McIntire moved that the recommendations of the Committee be approved. Mr. Newton seconded the motion and it was carried.
