A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of The University of Wyoming was held on February 13-14, 1970 in the Board Room of Old Main. President Hollon called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. on February 13.

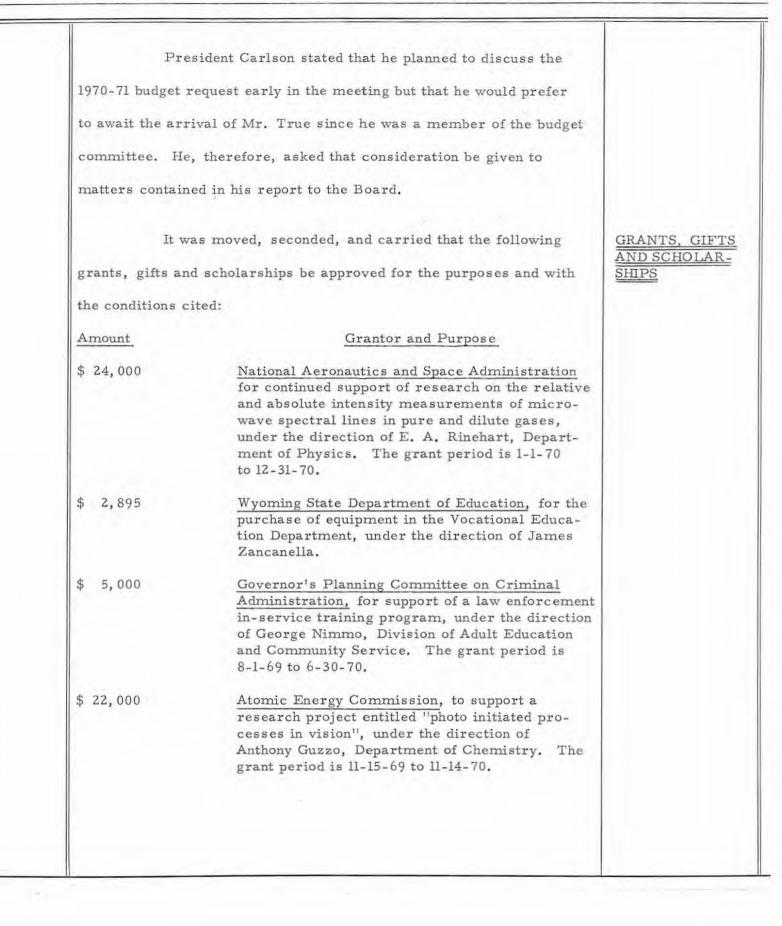
The following members answered the roll call: Brodrick, Hickey, Hines, Hollon, Johnson, Jones, McBride, Ostlund, Pence, Quealy, Sullivan and ex officio members Carlson, Roberts and MacMillan. Governor Hathaway and Mr. True were absent. Mr. True entered the meeting shortly thereafter. Also present were the following University personnel: James Ranz, Dean of Academic Affairs; Elliott Hays, Executive Assistant for Business and Plant Affairs; Joseph Geraud, Legal Advisor to the Board of Trustees, and Dr. William R. Steckel representing the Faculty Senate.

Upon motion duly made, seconded, and carried the minutes of the meeting of January 9, 1970, were approved as circulated, after correction of a typographical error on page 6 of the circulated minutes. In the paragraph on the Change in Board Regulations-Athletic Committee wherein the revised regulations are set forth the word "board" should be corrected to "broad."

It was then moved, seconded, and carried that the minutes of the meeting of December 5-6, 1969 be approved as submitted.

Mr. True joined the meeting at this time. BUDGET REQUEST President Carlson called attention to the budget request 1970-71 submitted to each Trustee in advance of the meeting. He stated that this budget had been built around a projected enrollment of 8,500 for the 1970-71 academic year. Mr. Quealy, chairman of the Trustee Budget Committee, pointed out that the request submitted to the Trustees did not represent departmental requests as such but the recommendations of the administration and budget committee. After some further discussion on budget construction, it was moved, seconded. and carried that the meeting go into Executive Session with principal

administrative officers invited to remain.

The meeting was recessed for lunch at noon and reconvened in Executive Session at 1:20 p.m. with the same members present. The meeting continued in Executive Session until recessing at 5:30 p.m. to reconvene at 9:00 a.m. on February 14, 1970.

The meeting was called to order at 9:00 a.m. with the same persons present as on the previous day. Mr. Tom Baxter of Boettcher and Company of Denver and Mr. Dean Borthwick of Cheyenne serving as Bond Counsel were invited to join the meeting.

Messrs. Baxter, Borthwick and Hays described a proposal and counter-proposal for refunding Dormitory and Dining Revenue Bonds, Series June 1, 1965 submitted to the Executive Committee of the Board during the preceding month. Mr. Hays stated that Boettcher and Company had submitted a proposal for refunding \$1,000,000 par value of Dormitory and Dining Revenue Bonds, Series June 1, 1965, at a saving of \$347,300. These bonds are scheduled to mature in the years 1992 through 1996. The proposal called for issuance by the Trustees of \$630,000 of refunding bonds, 7 1/2% coupon, to run from February 1, 1970 to June 1, 1995. Boettcher and Company would purchase the refunding bonds at par and accrued interest and the Trustees would pay Boettcher and Company \$630,000 plus accrued interest for \$1,000,000 of the 1965 bonds.

After analysis of the proposal by University staff, Mr. Hays explained that an alternate idea was proposed whereby \$450,000 of <u>BOND REFUNDING</u> RATIFICATION OF EXECUTIVE COM-MITTEE ACTION available reserve funds for the 1965 bonds would be used in conjunction with \$180,000 proceeds from issuing \$180,000 par value refunding bonds, 7% coupon, to run from February 1, 1970 to June 1, 1980. The estimated saving would be \$382,101, assuming a loss of investment earnings on the \$450,000 of reserve funds at a level rate of 7% until 1996.

He further explained that the Boettcher proposal was for immediate acceptance because that Company had only a day to day option to pick up the \$1,000,000 of 1965 bonds. Because of the time element involved, the Executive Committee of the Board was contacted and that Committee authorized proceeding with the counterproposal, contingent upon receiving an unqualified legal opinion of a firm of nationally recognized municipal bond attorneys as to the legality of refunding bonds and their exemption from Federal income taxes and further, that all provisions of the bond resolution would be mutually agreeable. The opinion is to be rendered by the legal firm of Dawson, Nagel, Sherman, and Howard of Denver, Colorado and will be furnished at the proposed time of closing of the transaction. If they are unable to furnish an unqualified opinion, the transaction cannot be completed. It was then moved, seconded, and carried that the action of the Executive Committee be ratified.

Trustee Johnson then moved adoption of the bond resolution also prepared by the firm of Dawson, Nagel, Sherman and Howard, a copy of which is inserted into the permanent minutes of this meeting as Exhibit A. and made a part thereof. Trustee Hines then moved

In presenting the report on audit required by the June 1, 1967 Bond Resolution, and prepared by Raab, Roush and Gaymon, Certified Public Accountants of Casper, submitted to the Trustees in advance of the meeting, Mr. Hays stated that he would like to comment on two of the auditors' notes: 1) that the rentals paid by the University for the use of Wyoming Hall and Graduate Hall, converted into use from dormitories to University office buildings, resulted in net revenues for each building very substantially greater than those earned when the buildings were used as dormitories and could be in excess of the fair rental value of the buildings; and 2) compliance with the requirements of the Bond Resolutions. With reference to the first point, Mr. Hays stated that property could not be rented in any other appropriate area at an equivalent rental and he felt that the rental rates established were contributing to the over-all good of the University, specifically to the student body by helping to keep down board and room charges. The Trustees agreed to proceed with the policy established. The only discrepancy pointed out in connection with compliance with requirements of the Bond Resolutions was that the required insurance certificate was not filed at the time required and that in all other matters the University has complied with the Resolutions' requirements. It was then moved, seconded and carried that the report of audit be accepted as presented.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that authorization be granted for the inauguration of a cross-enrollment program permitting Laramie County Community College students to participate in the Military Science program at the University, effective with the 1970 Fall enrollment.

Mr. Geraud reported concerning the status of the implementation of the Board as set forth in the Student Bill of Rights adopted by the ASUW Senate last spring. He stated that it had been REGULATIONS OF THE COLLEGES

STUDENT APPEALS BOARD referred to the Faculty Senate and a committee of that body was working with the Student Senate on the appropriate language. It was anticipated that it would be presented to the Trustees, through the ad hoc Trustee committee appointed to make recommendations on this matter, at the next meeting.

A question was raised concerning the University's participation in a concert tour of Europe being planned by the UW Chorale group for the summer of 1970. Dr. Carlson stated that he had been working with the group on this, that at present the University is planning to recommend the waiving of fees for at least three credit hours students could earn on the trip, support for the choir director, acting as University sponsor in arranging for the charter air flight, and that he was still working with the group involved and would come to the Board with recommendations at a later time.

President Carlson asked Mr. Ranz to report on this program which is being developed under auspices of WICHE. Mr. Ranz stated that he recently attended a meeting with representatives from other western states and that it was proposed to establish a cooperative program in mineral engineering whereby students in eight western states would be accepted for undergraduate programs in mineral engineering as residents for tuition and fee purposes. The participating instutions would be the University of Alaska, the University of Idaho, Montana College of Mineral Science and Technology, UNIVERSITY CHORALE TOUR TO EUROPE

WESTERN INTER -STATE COMMIS -SION ON HIGHER EDUCATION PRO-GRAM (WICHE) IN MINERAL PRO-DUCTION New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, the University of Nevada, the University of Utah, and the University of Wyoming. He stated that most of these programs were underrolled and that it would make a number of additional curricula open to Wyoming students at resident tuition rates. A brochure would also be prepared for residents of the eight states explaining the program.

After some discussion concerning the possible impact of this program on the University, it was moved, seconded, and carried that the University join the program on a one year basis and reexamine it at the end of that time.

Chairman Brodrick reported for the committee and the following actions were taken:

<u>Stadium Expansion</u>. Mr. Brodrick stated that the committee recommended acceptance of the low bid submitted by Reiman-Wuerth Company of Cheyenne, less all deductive alternates, except for two (#4e, electrical service, etc. on the concourse level, and #5 extended completion), and also for acceptance of that company's low bid in the amount of \$33,000 for single plank aluminum seats (Zarza), with a provision to be noted in the contract that the University will have the right to change to a different type of seating by change order should it later appear desirable, for a total bid of \$1,015,600.

The feasibility of scheduling an additional home football game for September 12, 1970 in accordance with the recent authorization by the Western Athletic Committee was also considered and the

Committee after a meeting with the University Athletic Committee recommended that no such game be scheduled in the University stadium because of the implications on construction costs. It was pointed out that the University would have until May 1, 1970 to pick up deductive alternates if funds became available. Mr. Brodrick reported that the projected date of completion is September 12, 1970 and that provision would be made for access to present facilities, including the press box, if construction were not substantially completed and for a penalty clause of \$10,000 if there were not substantial completion for the first game and with an additional penalty of \$10,000 if not substantially completed by October 12, 1970. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the recommendations of the committee be accepted.

<u>Fine Arts Center</u>. After reviewing a report of the current status of funding for this project and noting the shortage of Federal funds from the amount anticipated, it was agreed that no priorities were established by the Legislature in providing construction funds and that, if necessary, funds requested for other projects would be diverted to this purpose. It was then moved, seconded and carried that the University staff be given permission to complete plans and specifications for this project to be reviewed with the faculty, and Physical Plant personnel, Trustees, and Federal agencies in mid-March, and if approved with bids to be advertised in April and the first half of May, with bids to be opened on May 20, 1970, and, if satisfactory for the award of the contract to be authorized by the Trustees at the June 1-2, 1970 meeting in accordance with the committee recommendations.

It also was moved, seconded, and carried that an additional expenditure of \$3,000 from Fine Arts Center funds be authorized for services of Theatre Techniques, Inc., services.

The Trustees then invited into the meeting the following college of Education department heads or representatives and the meeting went into executive session, with staff invited to remain; Dr. Laurence A. Walker, newly appointed Acting Dean; Dr. Eugene Cottle, Head, Department of Curriculum and Instruction; Dr. Everett Lantz, Head, Department of Foundations of Education; Dr. John Woods, Head, Department of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation; Dr. James Zancanella, Head, Department of Vocational and Business Education; Dr. Myron Basom, representing Educational Administration; Dr. Arden J. White, representing Guidance and Counselor Education; Dr. Roger D. Fisher, representing the Division of Adult Education and Community Service; Dr. Robert C. Eicher, representing University School, and Dr. Arlan R. Peters, representing Student Teaching. Following this session, it was reported that the college of Education staff had requested the appointment of an Advisory Council from throughout the state. President Carlson and other Trustees stated they felt this would be an excellent idea and that a Council would be appointed at an early date. College of Education personnel then withdrew from the meeting.

COLLEGE OF EDUCATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Dr. Frank Trelease, Dean of the College of Law, joined the meeting to discuss a grant application prepared within the College which would permit the initiation of a clinical legal aid program. After determining that this program did not yet have the approval of the Albany District Bar Association and because of a near deadline, it was moved, seconded, and carried that a committee consisting of the members of the Board with legal training be appointed with Mr. Geraud to act as advisor to work with the Albany District Bar Association to determine if differences could be resolved, with the Committee authorized to act on behalf of the Board in approving this proposal following approval by the Albany District Bar Association. Mr. Quealy was appointed as chairman of the Committee. Dr. Carlson stated that the proposal would still have to go to the Governor for approval because of matching fund implications, and that, if received, Board approval would be required for acceptance of the funds.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the 1970-71 operating budget request be approved as submitted to each Trustee in advance of the meeting, with the following amendments; an increase of \$480 in the salary assigned Dr. Raymond W. Hooker, Business and Economic Research (this to correct an error); an addition to the salary of President Carlson, in the amount of 7% for 1970-71; an increase in the budget of Adult Education and Community Services in the amount of \$2,608, to provide for the transfer of the Wyoming GRANT APPLICA-TION - COLLEGE OF LAW

970-71 OPERATING BUDGET REQUEST Technical Assistance Program previously in the College of Commerce and Industry for which Federal funds have been withdrawn and to reorient it as Business and Industry Extension Service.

President Carlson called particular attention to the fact that included in this budget was an increase in the room charge for residence halls in the amount of \$23.00 for the academic year, and that also an advance registration fee in the amount of \$50 will be required for non-resident students to be applied to their fees at the time of registration.

Dr. Carlson reported for the Joint Trustee-Faculty Committee which had met the preceding day, and it was moved, seconded and carried that the Committee's report and recommendations be accepted. Except for the following, degree recipients will be reaffirmed and recorded when degrees are approved for the spring commencement exercises. Because of his poor health, arrangements are to be made to present the recommended degree, Doctor of Laws, honoris causa, to Mr. Jack Gage at the earliest possible time.

Upon reconvening in open session, Chairman Brodrick continued the report of this committee's meeting, and the following actions were taken:

It also was pointed out that Governor Hathaway had inquired concerning the possibility of an outside industry purchasing a tract in West Laramie, but he has been advised of the possibility of the University's using this tract to obtain the Union Pacific land. 30th Street Right of Way. It was moved, seconded, and 30th Street Right of Way carried that a deed for a right of way to the City of Laramie on 30th Street be tabled until additional information became available. Trail Lake Ranch. It was moved, seconded, and carried Trail Lake Ranch to authorize the construction of a dormitory at Trail Lake Ranch at an

approximate cost of \$4,700 to be financed from income on hand, and the construction of a duplex cabin at the ranch at an approximate cost of \$6,500 to be financed by an internal loan which will be repaid over a period of approximately five years from ranch income.

There being no further action, upon motion duly made and seconded the meeting was adjourned to reconvene in Regular session at 9:00 a.m. on March 12, 1970, when arrangements for continuing the series of visitations would be made.
