## THE UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING Minutes of TRUSTEES

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The annual meeting of the Trustees of The University of Wyoming was held on June 1-2, 1970 in the Board Room of Old Main.

President Hollon called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. on June 1, 1970.

The following members answered the roll call: Brodrick,
Hickey, Hines, Hollon, McBride, Ostlund, Pence, Quealy, Sullivan,
and ex officio members Carlson, Roberts, and Archuleta. Members
absent were: Jones, True, and ex officio member Governor Hathaway.
Mr. True joined the meeting shortly thereafter. Executive staff
present were: James Ranz, Vice President for Academic Affairs;
Elliott Hays, Vice President for Finance; Joseph Geraud, Vice
President for Student Affairs, and Dr. William R. Steckel representing the Faculty Senate.

President Hollon stated that, in accordance with the bylaws of the Trustees which require the annual election of officers at the annual meeting, the floor was open for nominations for President. - 8. Sheridan Substation Request for Right of Way. Mr. Brodrick asked Mr. McBride to speak to this matter. Mr. McBride stated that he had that morning met with representatives of the College of Agriculture and Mr. Hays concerning the request of Peter Kiewit Sons Company for a railroad right-of-way through the Sheridan Substation on lands belonging to the University as well as State Lands Board which the University leases. Mr. McBride reported it was their recommendation that, in view of the interests of ongoing and future research, this request should be denied, and he moved the recommendation be approved. The motion was seconded and carried.
- 1. Tenure Regulations. President Carlson called upon Mr. Ranz to discuss proposed changes in Trustee Regulations concerning promotion and tenure submitted by Resolution of the Faculty Senate. Mr. Ranz noted the recommendations included changes in the scheduling of tenure decisions to the end of the fourth academic year and to give notice of nonreappointment at least twelve months before the expiration of an appointment after two or more years in the institution. President Carlson stated that no action was requested at this time but the report was to apprise the Trustees of faculty thinking on this matter. Recommendations

- 2. Joint Student-Faculty ad hoc committee to investigate ways to prevent violence on campus. President Carlson stated that this committee had been established by the Faculty Senate and consisted of four faculty, four students, and the Assistant Dean of Men. He further stated that he felt it was operating effectively and that it would be beneficial.
- 3. Program in Somalia. President Carlson stated that he had just received word that the A.I.D. program in Somalia was being terminated immediately by action of the U.S. Government. It was anticipated, however, that there would be an orderly turn-over.
- 4. AFIT-Minuteman Program in Cheyenne. President Carlson stated that the AFIT-Minuteman graduate program in Business Administration at Warren Air Force Base operated through the College of Commerce and Industry had run into difficulties because of a lack of qualified students and inadequate funding. It was now planned to terminate this program with the phase-out period to extend thorugh the 1970-71 fiscal year.
- 5. North Central Association Accreditation Visit. Mr. Ranz commented on the preliminary report of the accreditation team visit to the University during the period April 29-30, May 1-2, 1970. He stated that at the conclusion of the visit, the Team had conducted a final interview with the President and vice presidents and had made an oral report concerning some of their findings. He

advised that, in general, the report had been quite favorable and he detailed some of the comments made. A full report with recommendations will be submitted to the Association for action and will be transmitted to the University.

6. Consultant Services. In connection with the report above, mention was made of reports received at the Association of Governing Boards meeting concerning consultant services available to universities through management firms specializing in the area of higher education. It was suggested that perhaps at some future time the University might wish to investigate this further.

Mr. Pence, as chairman, reported for the committee consisting of Trustees Hines, Hickey, Ostlund and Archuleta in addition to the chairman. Mr. Pence stated that, as the committee understood its charge, it was to study and make recommendation to the Trustees on how students should be informed concerning Trustee policy on actions which would constitute grounds for suspension or dismissal. He reported that the Committee had met at 7:30 a.m. that day with Mr. Geraud and Mr. Ranz in attendance upon the request of the Committee; that the Committee had studied a resolution of the Board of Trustees of Purdue University "covering conditions of student conduct leading to suspension or expulsion from the University" which had been made available by Mr. Geraud as a possible model for a resolution by The University of Wyoming Trustees, and the Committee now wished to submit the following

recommendations:

- That the Trustees entertain the adoption of a resolution similar to the Purdue resolution with appropriate preamble;
- 2. That a Trustee committee be appointed which may consult with representatives of the faculty, staff, and student body to prepare a draft of a proposed resolution for dissemination to the Trustees prior to the July meeting;
- That the draft so disseminated be for consideration at the July meeting of the Trustees;
- 4. That in the drafting of the resolution consideration be given:
  - To a statement of policy to prevail until modified,
     amended or supplemented by designated authority,
  - To embody a student-University admission covenent,
  - c. To make available and provide a method of distribution which assures student opportunity for familiarization with the resolution.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the report of the committee be adopted and implemented. Mr. Hollon then appointed the same committee to implement these recommendations. Dr. Carlson, Mr. Geraud, and Mr. Ranz were asked to work closely with this committee in the preparation of the proposed resolution. Mr. Pence asked that suggestions for modifications in the Purdue resolution be submitted to him by June 13th.

After a short recess, President Hollon stated that he had contacted the Governor's Office and the Governor would be available to meet with the Trustees at 2:00 p.m. on July 16, 1970. Mr. Hollon then called a meeting of the Trustees of The University of Wyoming to convene at 9:00 a.m. in the Board Room of Old Main on July 16, 1970.
