Winthrop, NC, Partnership Initiates NetSCOPE Activities

Iniversity-school district partnerships promote simultaneous renewal of schools with a focus on student learning and teacher preparation Engagement in collaborative learning communities takes place in a three-tiered network: professional development schools, partner schools, and satellite schools.

On June 27-29, more than 80 school district representatives - classroom teachers, curriculum specialists, district administrators, and superintendents - met in Charlotte, NC, to initiate the NetSCOPE work. Sixteen Winthrop University faculty and administrators supported the efforts, including **Tom Moore**, vice president for academic affairs. NNER governing council chair Deb Shanley and NNER executive director Ann Foster gave keynote comments that connected the local work to the NNER mission. Interactive breakout and general sessions established the foundation for authentic, collaborative work across the schools and university. The extensive partnership network is supported by a federal grant. Dean Jennie Rakestraw noted that this is an opportunity to revitalize partner school initiatives with an expanded mission of cross-school support as well university collaboration, where all can learn from and with one another. The network's overarching goals include:

This spring **Ann Foster** was invited to participate in a UNESCO conference on teacher education and sustainability. Educators from more than 50 countries gathered to talk about how to extend the role of teacher education in distributing the global, economic, educational, health, and environmental resources that sustain the earth and its people. UNESCO has the lead role in the DESD (Decade of Education for Sustainability Development). In this role, UNESCO seeks to:

- catalyze new partnerships with the private sector, with youth and media groups
- foster monitoring and evaluation
- support a research agenda and provide a forum for research on education for sustainability development (ESD)
- bring together important stakeholders such as representatives of the private sector, faith-based institutions, youth associations, indigenous people
- share good ESD practices
- link member states that have implemented ESD curricula, policies, and research with member states requesting help
- convene flexible working groups on particular topics

ESD, teacher education institutions (TEI) and teacher educators are key change agents in reorienting education to address sustainability. TEIs fulfill vital roles in the global education community. They have the potential to institute changes within educational systems that will shape the knowledge and skills of future generations. Teacher education institutions:

- educate new teachers
- provide professional development for in-service teachers by updating their knowledge and skills
- · create teacher education curricula
- carry out research
- contribute to textbooks
- provide expert advice to local schools upon request
- provide expert opinion to provincial and national ministries of education
- educate and certify headmasters, principals, and other school administrators

More information on this initiative will be presented at the tripartite council meeting and at a breakout session at the 2010 conference. Goal 1 (overarching): Improve student academic achievement in our high-need schools

Goal 2: Improve professional learning for schooluniversity faculty and teacher candidates

Goal 3: Strengthen the pre-baccalaureate preparation of teacher candidates

Goal 4: Increase support for new teachers in our high-need districts

Using the goals and accompanying strategies, participants worked to build a strong foundation for the partnership. Participants' comments reflect the energy and excitement for this collaboration:

I'm so excited about the collaboration. It will be great to give new teachers resources that I didn't receive 10 years ago when I began teaching.

I find WU's openness to our needs and the honoring of our knowledge exciting and refreshing.

We will be able to collaborate and share ideas with other teachers in and around our district, learn about current research-based and best practices.

Networking with Winthrop and other schools, having a Winthrop faculty member at our school, mentoring and the support that comes with this, how excited I am that Winthrop is making sure this partnership works.
