



Presentations: Speech vs Illustrated Talk vs Demonstration

The presentation contest allows members to give a speech, demonstration, or illustrated talk. The goal of this contest is to allow one or more 4-H members the opportunity to teach others about a project, activity, or an area of personal interest.

The greatest value of participation in this contest with a speech, demonstrations, or illustrated talk is that members can gain new skills while preparing, planning and presenting information on their chosen topic. Through these presentations, 4-H'ers can:

- Work on something they like and are interested in
- Gain new knowledge and learn about a specific subject
- Learn to plan and organize their thoughts so they can express themselves more clearly
- Emphasize the major points of a presentation with or without visuals or examples
- Increase in poise, confidence, and self-assurance
- Develop the ability to demonstrate good judgment and speak and act well before an audience
- Listen to the opinions of others
