INTRODUCTION

Welcome to the 4-H Cat Project! Whether you already have a cat at home or are just curious about learning more, this project will help you understand what it takes to be a responsible cat owner and introduce you to the basics of cat care, behavior, health, and showmanship.

Cats are unique animals with their own personalities, needs, and ways of communicating. In this lesson, we'll cover the basics of cat ownership, general care, and what it means to participate in cat showmanship. You'll learn how to provide for a cat's daily needs, handle a cat properly, and prepare for success in the 4-H Cat Project.

Lesson Plan Information

OBJECTIVE

Introduce participants to the 4-H Cat Project, explain what they can do in the project, and cover basic cat ownership and responsibilities. By the end of this lesson, youth will be able to:

- Explain the 4-H Cat Project opportunities and what you can do in the project
- Explain basic needs of a healthy, happy cats
- Demonstrate how to properly groom a cat
- Discuss the basics of showmanship

MATERIALS NEEDED

- Various grooming tools
 - Soft bristle brush
 - Slicker brush
 - Comb (fine and/or wide-toothed)
 - Nail clippers or cat nail grinder
 - Grooming wipes
 - Toothbrush and cat toothpaste
 - Ear cleaner and cotton pads
 - Flea comb
- Various Care tools
 - o Collar, leash, harness
 - Scratching Post
 - Litterbox
- Plush cat or stuffed animal

YOUTH SHOULD BRING:

No materials needed from youth!

LEARNING OPPORTUNITIES TO DO ON YOUR OWN:

- Give a demonstration on how to approach an unfamiliar cat safely
- Demonstrate how to read cat food labels
- Make community members aware of cat laws in your area through brochures or posters
- Volunteer at a local animal shelter
- Develop a plan to foster cats for deployed soldiers
- Write a letter to your local paper about the importance of having cats spayed or neutered
- Gather items such as cat food, cat toys, and brushes to donate to the animal shelter
- Create new cat owner kits for animal shelters to give out to anyone who adopts a cat
- Organize a cat show for your 4-H club or community
- Organize a community fundraiser to help benefit the local animal shelter

- Introduction to showmanship concepts on the next page




TOOLS DEMONSTRATION

From the materials needed section, set out all of the tools and encourage youth to pick them up and ask questions about them. Use the plush cat to demonstrate how to use each of the grooming tools.



CAT MATCH



Distribute Scenario Cards to half of the group or tape to the wall/ whiteboard. Then distribute solution cards to the other half of the group (or to each youth if using the wall).

Participants then either find the youth holding the correct solution for their scenario or tape their solution to the wall next to the scenario card.

Once all matches are found read them all and discuss as a group.

AT .

BASIC CAT CARE WORKSHEET, DISCUSSION & REFLECTION

- Towards the end of the meeting provide each youth with a basic cat care worksheet to review and bring to the next meeting to discuss basic cat care. (Worksheet on pages 5 & 6)
- Choose discussion topic questions that best align with the ages of youth present and check for understanding from the project meeting.

Showmanship Components



ENTERING JUDGING AREA

- Safely carry your cat using the safety carry.
- Keep the end of the leash looped over your wrist.
- Set your cat on the table facing the judge



CAT APPEARENCE & TEMPERMENT

- Ensure your cat is well groomed
- Work with your cat and socialize your cat so that a judge can handle your cat without protest from the cat



EXAMINATION

- You will be expected to show various anatomy and carry positions.
- Explain what you are showing the judge and why

YOUR APPEARANCE & ATTITUDE

- Dress neatly with closed toed shoes
- Listen and wait patiently for instructions.
- Be considerate of other people and cats.
- Be polite
- Focus on your cat (not people in the audience)
- Be confident stand tall and speak clearly



SHOWING YOUR CAT

- Overall you will be asked to present your cat to the judge, emphasize your cat's best traits. You don't need expensive or pure-breed cats for showmanship.
- You'll be expected to maintain control over your cat at all times, accidents happen however, remain calm if they do

Scenario:

Your cat's fur is full of tangles and mats. What do you do?

Scenario:

Your cat won't let you trim its nails and keeps scratching you. How can you make it easier?

Scenario:

Your cat is shedding fur everywhere! What grooming tool can help?

Scenario:

Your cat has fleas! What should you do?

Scenario:

Your cat keeps getting hairballs and vomiting them up. How can you help?

Scenario:

Your cat doesn't like being brushed and runs away. What should you try?

Solution:

Use a slicker brush and gently work through the mats, starting from the tip of the fur and working toward the skin. If the mat is severe, consult a groomer.

Solution:

Try wrapping your cat in a towel ("purrito wrap") to keep them calm, and trim nails one paw at a time while rewarding with treats.

Solution:

Use a de-shedding tool or grooming glove to remove loose fur and reduce shedding.

Solution:

Use a flea comb to remove fleas and apply veterinarian-approved flea treatment. Clean your home to prevent re-infestation.

Solution:

Brush your cat daily with a soft brush and consider feeding them a hairballcontrol diet or giving hairball remedies. Always consult your vet!

Solution:

Try short grooming sessions and use treats or a favorite toy to create a positive association with brushing.

Scenario:

Your cat's ears look dirty and have a lot of dark wax. What's the best way to clean them?

Scenario:

Your cat's breath smells bad. What can you do to help?

Scenario:

Your cat keeps scratching the furniture. How do you stop this behavior?

Scenario:

Your cat doesn't like getting a bath. What's the best way to clean them without stressing them out?

Scenario:

Your cat keeps shaking its head and scratching at its ears. What might be wrong?

Scenario:

Your cat's paws smell bad, and their claws have dirt stuck in them. How do you clean them properly?

Solution:

Use a vet-approved ear cleaner and a cotton pad to wipe out debris gently. Never use cotton swabs inside the ear canal.

Solution:

Brush your cat's teeth with cat-safe toothpaste and a small toothbrush, or offer dental treats and toys.

Solution:

Provide a scratching post or pad near the furniture and use catnip or toys to encourage its use. You can also use double-sided tape on furniture as a deterrent.

Solution:

Use pet-safe grooming wipes or a damp cloth to wipe your cat down. If a bath is necessary, use lukewarm water and be as quick and calm as possible.

Solution:

Your cat may have an ear infection or ear mites. Check with a vet to determine the best treatment.

Solution:

Use a damp washcloth or pet-safe wipes to clean between their paw pads. Trim nails regularly to prevent dirt buildup.

Scenario:

Your cat's coat looks dull and dry. How can you improve their fur condition?

Scenario:

Your long-haired cat gets mats under its legs and belly. How can you prevent this?

Scenario:

Your cat suddenly doesn't want to be touched and reacts when you try to brush them. What could be the problem?

Scenario:

Your cat keeps knocking over its water bowl and making a mess. How can you prevent this?

Scenario:

Your cat has dandruff and dry skin. What can you do to help?

Scenario:

Your cat meows loudly at night and won't let you sleep. What can you do?

Solution:

Add omega-3 fatty acids to their diet (found in fish-based foods) and brush regularly to distribute natural oils.

Solution:

Use a metal comb daily on long-haired cats, especially in friction-prone areas like the belly and legs, to prevent matting.

Solution:

Your cat might be in pain due to an injury or health issue. Stop handling them and consult a veterinarian for an exam.

Solution:

Use a heavier, non-tip water bowl or a spill-proof water fountain to prevent spills. Some cats also prefer wide, shallow bowls to avoid whisker stress.

Solution:

Increase humidity in your home with a humidifier and add omega-3 supplements to your cat's diet. Regular brushing also helps distribute natural skin oils.

Solution:

Your cat may be bored or hungry. Try feeding them before bed, offering toys, or a short play session. If it persists, consult a vet.
