I’ve received some great ideas! To list just a few:

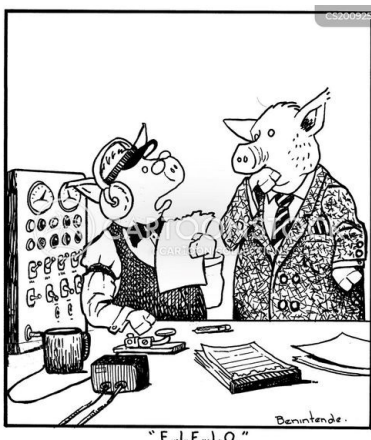
- Upgrade the digital capacities or our repeaters

## UARC Member Profile

- **Name:** Chris Price
- **Call sign:** W7JR
- **When did you first get you license?** I was first licensed as a Technician-class operator in the spring of 2011. My first FCC call sign was KJ6VCG, which I operated under as a Technician for two years. I then earned my Extra-class license and held the call sign KD6CP for the next six years. After moving to Wyoming, I changed my call sign to my current one, W7JR.
- **What is your favorite thing about Ham radio?** If I had to choose what excites me most about amateur radio, it would have to be radio propagation—specifically, the ability to use radio to make contact with a station on the other side of the Earth using just some wire and 100 watts of power.
- **What was your first transceiver?** Wouxun 2m/70cm handheld. My first high-frequency radio was a Yaesu FT-991.
- **What is your favorite food?** I'm a sucker for a good cheeseburger, loaded with all the toppings.
- **What is your most memorable experience as a HAM radio operator?** One of my most memorable experiences in amateur radio occurred in the summer of 2014 while experimenting with random-length long-wire antennas in South Dakota. I had just set up a 100-foot-long wire at approximately 20 feet above the ground. After connecting it to an automatic antenna tuner, I tuned it to the 6m band and was amazed to find it picking up beacons from the West Coast. Curious, I switched to 50.125 MHz, the single sideband calling frequency, and called CQ. To my surprise, I received a response from an operator in Washington State. At the time, I was running just 5 watts from my FT-991, yet I still made the contact. That moment truly opened my eyes to the fascinating nature of radio propagation.

# Club News

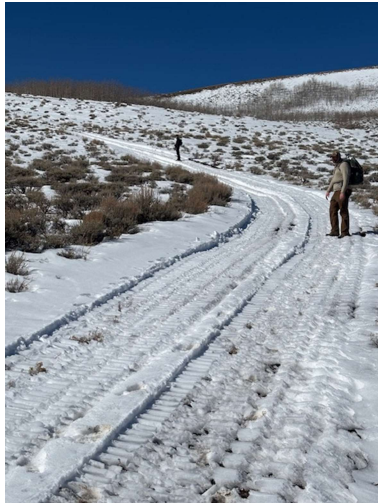
## February Fox Hunt

We were banking on the recent warm weather in the region to thaw out the south side of the mountain and allow us to climb to the top. At about the half-way point, the snow and ice were much more extreme and made the hike much more difficult. We persevered and got to the summit by 11:30am. We set up a 15m and 20m station, but finding open frequencies was a challenge due to a SSB DX contest.
