Because the League antedates the United States Civil Service Commission and has been so long concerned with the personnel problems and policies of the Federal government, its records are a particularly rich source of information on the programs, the people, and the organizations which helped to shape the Federal civil service as we find it today. The League's records include not only numerous letters from Presidents of the United States, but provide background data and expressions of opinion by other officials and prominent leaders on Presidential actions and policies. In the legislative area, the correspondence files reveal points of view of Congressmen and Senators on many major pieces of legislation affecting the Federal civil service.

Only limited files of early League records are included, but since 1915, approximately, they are more complete and often included background material on earlier programs as well. Since the present listing has been compiled from various sources, it is intended to serve only as a preliminary inventory and guide for further detailed processing. Occasional annotations have been included to suggest the types of information a particular file might reveal but it has not always been possible to examine and verify each individual item.

Proceedings. Due to war conditions the thirty-seventh annual meeting of the League was not held until April 11, 1918. The report of the Council covers the activities of the League for the year 1917. The annual meetings thereafter up to and including the fortieth annual meeting held in April 1921, cover respectively the preceding year's activities. The 1925 meeting was held January 12, 1926, the 1926 meeting was held May 11, 1927. Some of this material is reprinted in Good Government, and some in separate pamphlets. 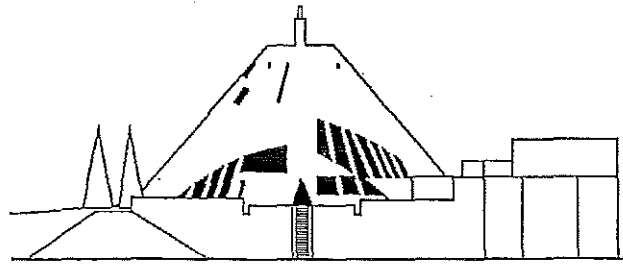


