

I assumed that role and handed over directorship of the Frison Institute to Jason Toohey, who did an excellent job, despite difficult circumstances. We have since suffered through the worst phases of the pandemic, and we lost George Frison, both things that impacted archaeology at UW. The arrival of the coronavirus largely halted research. The passing of George, who was
