Justification for Senate Resolution #1306

Presently, allocations for student publications must be approved by (in order) the University of Wyoming Publication Board, the ASUW Senate Finance Committee, the Joint ASUW Budget Conference, the ingoing ASUW Student Senate, and then reapproved by the Publications Board. Money amounts are subject to change or shifting by any of these agencies, allowing personal, political, and departmental differences to dictate funding for student publications. With yearly turnover in personnel at all levels of the approving chain, there is a great deal of fluctuation in amounts and methods of budgeting. The proposed process would allow the University of Wyoming Publications Board the ability to confidently budget for all student publications, utilizing a set upper limit. This would also eliminate the ties between the free press and the student governmental branch, thus freeing the student publications from any obligations, either real or imagined, to student government, and encouraging an independent, uncensored media, responsible only to its publisher.
