- 1. WHEREAS, the purpose of the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming (ASUW)
- 2. First-Year Senate is to serve our fellow students in the best manner possible; and,
- 3. WHEREAS, there has been issues keeping and filling the body due to a plethora of reasons;
- 4. however, having the body be resized to seventeen (17) will aid in the resolution of those
- 5. issues; and,
- 6. WHEREAS, the main issue/cause in resignation was due to the lack of wage-based
- 7. compensation and FYS passed a resolution, FYS Resolution #73, to address FYS wage-based
- 8. compensation, as outlined in Addendum A; and,
- 9. WHEREAS, having this body at seventeen members would increase the chance interviews would be
- 10. needed to select who is in the 111th administration of First-Year Senate; and,
- 11. WHEREAS, until this administration FYS was smaller than ASUW Senate and reducing FYS to
- 12. seventeen once again make FYS smaller than ASUW Senate; and,
- 13. WHEREAS, this still allows for diversity in students and views of the body to be present.
- 14. THEREFORE, be it enacted by the First-Year Senate (FYS) Associated Students of the University of
- 15. Wyoming (ASUW) Student Government that the First-Year Senate membership be reduced to
- 16. seventeen members, beginning in the 111th Administration; and,
- 17. THEREFORE, be it further enacted that the ASUW FYS Constitution is updated to reflect
- 18. these changes, as shown in Addendum B, and also in any other FYS working documents that
- 19. mentions how many seats are in FYS; and,
- 20. THEREFORE, be it further enacted that these changes take effect at the beginning of the 111th

- 1. WHEREAS, the purpose of the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming
- 2. (ASUW) First-Year Senate is to serve our fellow students in the best manner possible;
- 3. and,
- 4. WHEREAS, the First-Year Senate (FYS) is an integral part of ASUW because of the
- 5. representation of voices for First-Year Students at the University of Wyoming (UW);
- 6. and,
- 7. WHEREAS, in order to best represent our fellow First-Year Students a diverse and
- 8. robust voting body is required; and,
- 9. WHEREAS, the First-Year Senate's impact and influence would greatly increase if
- 10. there were more members as well as a more diverse composition; and,
- 11. WHEREAS, the biggest deterrent from joining or remaining in First-Year Senate is a
- 12. lack of fair compensation for the time commitment that it [FYS] requires; and,
- 13. WHEREAS, in order to increase membership and diversity for First-Year Senates
- 14. moving forward, a wage-based compensation mechanism for First-Year Senators would
- 15. aid in retention of members and in the filling of vacancies; and,
- 16. WHEREAS, First-Year senate has seen six resignations since the beginning of the 110th
- 17. administration, and is now operating with 12 voting members as reflected in Addendum

18. A; and,

19. WHEREAS, resignation en masse is not a stand-alone issue and has been a trend over

20. the past several years; and,

- 21. WHEREAS, many First-Year Senators are members of all three standing FYS
- 22. committees as reflected in Addendum B which hinders diversity of thought, but is the
- 23. only way to have committees worth having; and,
- 24. WHEREAS, Many First-Year Senators put in more than eight hours a week for an
- 25. uncompensated position; and,
- 26. WHEREAS, First-Year Senators are the only appointed members within a program or
- 27. entity in ASUW that do not receive any sort of wage-based compensation; and,
- 28. WHEREAS, current budget deliberations have struck down compensation mechanisms
- 29. proposed by the First-Year Senate and its advisors, and have limited forms of
- 30. compensation to scholarships, and
- 31. WHEREAS, the First-Year Senate understands the complexities accompanying
- 32. compensation for the First-Year Senate as outlined in Addendum D.
- 33. THEREFORE, to properly acknowledge and recognize comments about the initiative
- 34. and the "amazing work ethic" of the First-Year Senate from full senators and in
- 35. acknowledgement of the effort poured into ASUW by many First-Year Senators, be it
- 36. resolved that the First-Year Senate encourages the continued cooperation with all of
- ASUW to find a solution to the complex issue that is First-Year Senator compensation;
 and,
- 39. THEREFORE, be it further resolved that not fulfilling this obligation will lead to a
- 40. lack of diversity in the First-Year Senate as reflected in Addendum C; and,

Addendum C

At the beginning of the year The First-Year Senate started with 21 members. Over the winter break four members resigned many citing monetary issues within their resignation. Having already lost three members from the first semester, most likely to monetary issues, it is increasingly hard to get new members when there is currently no fair compensation for the 8hour commitment that accompanies First Year Senate. This estimate does not apply for senators in head table or those writing legislation.

This issue is larger than filling vacancies. When senators aren't offered compensation, diversity decreases in the chamber. First Year Students are left to choose between advocating and being able to sustain themselves financially. By not offering fair compensation, First Year Senate becomes a place where only those students who have the financial capabilities in the form of scholarships, family aid, and flexible jobs, etc., are the only ones that can participate. Even worse, those that can remain in the program cannot fully participate or engage with ASUW through legislation as they have to manage work, school, and sports with an already time-consuming activity creating a huge disparity in perspective and thus an inaccurate representation of First Year Student priorities and issues.

Addendum D

- 1. First-Year Senate acknowledges that during Budget Deliberations the possibilities and complexities of First-Year Senate Compensation were discussed. There were documents provided outlining the cost of potential First-Year Senate pay on a standard pay-scale of 12 dollars per hour. This, combined with reduced hours, resulted in an upward limit of 66,000 dollars. The attempted mitigation of this was the following of typical program procedure in paying exclusively executives. It was determined that Head Table constitutes First-Year Senate's executive leadership. Thus, the cost of paying these members still amounted to a total of roughly 11,000 dollars and does not address the larger issues.
- 2. First-Year Senate also acknowledges that it cannot properly function within a conventional compensation system as a program. Thus, First-Year Senate is fully open to deliberations regarding the restructuring of First-Year Senate. This comes with the full acceptance that as it stands, First-Year Senate should not be a program but rather be converted into a different body.
- 3. First-Year Senate further recognizes that regardless of the end result of these compensation deliberations, First-Year Senate members cannot universally receive payment. The only universal compensations solutions would likely revolve around supplies or supplemental materials rather than direct payment of senators.

Addendum B

ARTICLE VI

First-Year Senators

- <u>Section 1.</u> The First-Year Senate shall consist of a group of appointed First-Year students in accordance with the appointment process outlined in the First-Year Senate Bylaws: from which a Head Table shall be elected following the process outlines in the First-Year Senate Bylaws.
- Section <u>1.2.</u> Voting Membership: Each Fall, twenty-one (21) seventeen (17) First-Year students at the University shall be selected to serve as the voting members for the academic year.
- <u>Section 2 3.</u> In order to provide continuity in First-Year Senate activities and business along with providing a mechanism for timely participation by the First-Year Senate in University and ASUW processes, the First-Year Senate may create Standing, Special, and Ad-Hoc committees.
