TITLE: ASUW Support of WyoOne IDs for Apple Wallet and Google

1. WHEREAS, the purpose of the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming

- 2. (ASUW) is to serve our fellow students in the best manner possible; and,
- 3. WHEREAS, many entities on the University of Wyoming (UW) campus utilize the
- 4. WyoOne ID for various purposes; and,
- 5. WHEREAS, as of August 2022, at least 50 colleges/universities have implemented
- 6. Mobile IDs, such as Georgetown University, Massachusetts Institute of Technology,
- 7. University of South Dakota, South Dakota School of Mines and Technology, South
- 8. Dakota State University, University of Colorado, Colorado Springs, with a full list
- 9. provided in Addendum A; and,
- 10. WHEREAS, the implementation of Mobile IDs at the University of Tennessee,
- 11. Knoxville has seen success; for example, in two years after implementation they had
- 12. more than 20,000 credentials between student, faculty, and staff, and over 80% of the
- 13. tens of thousands of transactions each day are from mobile devices, as opposed to plastic
- 14. cards, on their campus spanning 910 acres, 294 buildings, with 29,000 students, as
- 15. shown in Addendum B; and,
- 16. WHEREAS, the implementation of Mobile IDs would improve student safety by

- 17. limiting entrance of non-student actors into closed spaces such as residence halls, dining
- 18. halls, and Half Acre Gym; and,
- 19. WHEREAS, Apple Wallet and Google Wallet have two-factor authentication which
- 20. would help protect student identity and personal information; and,
- 21. WHEREAS, implementation of mobile WyoOne IDs would reduce the physical
- 22. resources to print identification cards for each new student, staff, or faculty, and replace
- 23. any lost cards; and,
- 24. WHEREAS, Mobile IDs could eliminate students not being able to get into their
- 25. residence halls or other campus locations, simply because they lost their card; and,
- 26. WHEREAS, having WyoOne IDs on Apple or Google Wallet would also allow students
- 27. to use their phone or smartwatch to utilize their dining dollars and check their balance
- 28. without needing to ask dining staff or go to a kiosk; and,
- 29. WHEREAS, hardware upgrades to Near-Field Communication (tap) technology would
- 30. be needed in approximately 100 instances across campus; and,
- 31. WHEREAS, examples include swiping to enter the Half-Acre Gym and Food Pantry
- 32. locations, checking out books at Coe Library, and entering buildings such as the
- 33. Classroom Building and Engineering Building; and,
- 34. WHEREAS, upon discussion with Information Technology Director Jesse Ballard,
- 35. upgrading the aforementioned hardware would cost approximately \$300 for each reader,
- 36. including installation and back-end connectivity; and,
- 37. WHEREAS, the program used on campus, Transact, has the ability to use NFC
- 38. technology already; and,
- 39. WHEREAS, implementation campus-wide would eventually just be a reoccurring cost of

- 40. \$4.00 per student per year, which costs less than physically printing WyoOne ID; and,
- 41. WHEREAS, the implementation of Mobile IDs, with campus-wide support and
- 42. marketing, can see up to a 50% adoption rate by students every month and up to 80%
- 43. within the school year, as shown in Addendum C.
- 44. THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Associated Students of the University of
- 45. Wyoming (ASUW) Student Government urges the University of Wyoming
- 46. to implement the option for WyoOne ID on mobile devices through Apple Wallet and
- 47. Google Wallet; and,
- 48. THEREFORE, be it further resolved that this resolution be sent to the University of
- 49. Wyoming Board of Trustees, President Ed Seidel, Interim Vice Provost & Chief
- 50. Information Officer Jen Chavez upon its passage.

Passed via Unanimous Consent

"The benefits can be seen from campus to campus. For example, the University of Tennessee, Knoxville implemented their mobile VolCard in October 2019 for nearly 29,000 students across 294 buildings on the 910-acre campus. The university is now two years into its mobile program and has more than 20,000 mobile credentials deployed on campus with students, faculty and staff. On average, the university sees tens of thousands of access and financial transactions per day, and more than 80% of those are happening with mobile devices versus plastic cards.

Campus adoption has been strong, and administrators have received positive feedback from those using the solution."

"Finally, campus-wide buy-in is essential for a smooth transition. This means that all stakeholders, including students, faculty and staff, must be willing to adopt and use the new technology. A readiness to learn and adapt to new processes, even if there are initial growing pains, can significantly ease the transition. Schools that launch mobile IDs successfully — with full campus buy-in, executive support and marketing — can see up to a 50% adoption rate by students per month, and up to 80% adoption in the school year. This means that campuses can begin to eliminate the option for a plastic card within a few years of adoption."
