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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

To the Board of Trustees University of Wyoming Laramie, Wyoming

We have audited the financial statements of the University of Wyoming (the "University") as of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon dated November 13, 2012. Our report includes a reference to other auditors. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Other auditors audited the financial statements of the University of Wyoming Foundation (the "Foundation"), as described in our report on the University's financial statements. This report does not include the results of the other auditors' testing of internal control over financial reporting or compliance and other matters that are reported on separately by those auditors.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

Management of the University is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over financial reporting. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the University's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control over financial reporting.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the University's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards*.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Trustees; the Fiscal and Legal Affairs Committee; management; Federal awarding agencies; and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than those specified parties.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT ON COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS THAT COULD HAVE A DIRECT AND MATERIAL EFFECT ON EACH MAJOR PROGRAM AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER COMPLIANCE IN ACCORDANCE WITH OMB CIRCULAR A-133

To the Board of Trustees University of Wyoming Laramie, Wyoming

Compliance

We have audited the University of Wyoming's (the "University") compliance with the types of compliance requirements described in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133, *Compliance Supplement* that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major Federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2012. The University's major Federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to each of its major Federal programs is the responsibility of the University's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the University's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major Federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the University's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we considered necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our audit does not provide a legal determination on the University's compliance with those requirements.

As described in items 2012-05 and 2012-06 in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, the University did not comply with requirements regarding activities allowed or unallowed and allowable costs/cost principles or reporting that are applicable to its College Access Challenge Grant Program (CFDA #84.378). Compliance with such requirements is necessary, in our opinion, for the University to comply with the requirements applicable to that program.

In our opinion, except for the noncompliance described in the preceding paragraph, the University complied, in all material respects, with the compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major Federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2012. However, the results of our auditing procedures disclosed instances of noncompliance with those requirements that are required to be reported in accordance with OMB Circular A-133 and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as items 2012-01 and 2012-02.

Internal Control over Compliance

Management of the University is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to Federal programs. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the University's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major Federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the University's internal control over compliance.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over compliance that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses and, therefore, there can be no assurance that all deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses have been identified. However, as discussed below, we identified a certain deficiency in internal control over compliance that we consider to be a material weakness and other deficiencies that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a Federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a Federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. We consider the deficiency in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as item 2012-05 to be a material weakness.

A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a Federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We consider the deficiencies in internal control over compliance described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as items 2012-01 through 2012-04, 2012-06 and 2012-07 to be significant deficiencies.

The University's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying Exhibit I – Corrective Action Plan. We did not audit the University's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on them.

Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards

We have audited the basic financial statements of the University of Wyoming as of and for the year ended June 30, 2012, and have issued our report thereon dated November 13, 2012, which indicates that the financial statements of the University of Wyoming Foundation (the "Foundation"), a discretely presented component unit, were audited by other auditors. Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the University's basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of Federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations,* and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used in financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of the Board of Trustees; the Fiscal and Legal Affairs Committee; management; Federal awarding agencies; and pass-through entities and is not intended to be and should not be used by anyone other than those specified parties.

NOTES TO SCHEDULE OF EXPENDITURES OF FEDERAL AWARDS

Note 1. Basis of Presentation

The purpose of the schedule of expenditures of Federal awards (the "Schedule") is to present a summary of the activities of the University of Wyoming (the "University") for the year ended June 30, 2012, which have been financed by the U.S. Government. The information in this Schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*. Because the Schedule presents only a selected portion of the operations of the University, it is not intended to and does not present the financial position, changes of net assets, or cash flows of the University.

For purposes of the Schedule, Federal awards have been classified into two types:

- 1. Direct Federal awards consisting of Federal assistance and Federal student financial assistance, and
- 2. Pass-through funds received from non-Federal organizations made under Federally sponsored programs conducted by those organizations.

Note 2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Expenditures reported on the Schedule are reported on the cash basis of accounting. Such expenditures are recognized following the cost principles contained in OMB Circular A-21, *Cost Principles for Educational Institutions*, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited as to reimbursement. Negative amounts shown on the Schedule represent adjustments or credits made in the normal course of business to amounts reported as expenditures in prior years. Pass-through entity identifying numbers are presented where available.

Note 3. Federal Student Loan Programs

Student loans are funded by the Federal Government under the Federal Perkins Loan Program (CFDA #84.038) and are administered directly by the University. Activity related to this loan program, if any (such as Federal and University contributions), is included in the accompanying Schedule. The University's Federal Perkins Loan Program had an outstanding loan balance of \$7,467,411 as of June 30, 2012. Loans disbursed from the Federal Perkins Loan Program were \$1,293,846 for the fiscal year ended June 30, 2012. There were no Federal capital contributions for the year ended June 30, 2012.

III. FINDINGS AND QUESTIONED COSTS FOR FEDERAL AWARDS

<u>2012-01</u>: Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards

Condition – The University did not provide a schedule of expenditures of Federal awards (SEFA) which properly identified all Federal funds expended. Specifically, we noted the following:

- 1. One award did not identify the correct CFDA number.
- 2. Expenditures for two non-Federal awards were reported as part of the Research and Development Cluster.

Criteria – Per 31 USC 7502 (Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 (Pub. L. 104-156)), each non-Federal entity that expends a total amount of Federal awards equal to or in excess of \$500,000 shall provide its auditor a schedule of Federal expenditures that is presented fairly in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

As clarified in the OMB Circular A-133 Subpart C.300, the auditee shall identify in its accounts all Federal awards received and expended in the Federal programs under which they were received. Federal program and award identification shall include, as applicable, the CFDA title and number, award number and year, name of Federal and the name of the pass-through agency.

Cause – In regards to the improper identification of the CFDA number, the award agreement was unclear as to the allocation of the award between the identified CFDA numbers. However, the Office of Sponsored Programs failed to allocate the awards on the same basis as previously received awards.

In regards to the reporting of non-Federal expenditures on the SEFA, the University did not identify the non-Federal portion of the award.

Effect – An inaccurate schedule of expenditures of Federal awards could result in the improper identification of major programs and the related audit requirements.

Recommendation – We recommend the University review the control system in place over the preparation of the schedule of expenditures of Federal awards and revise the current controls and/or implement new controls to ensure that the schedule is accurate and complete. With respect to the awards improperly reported in the SEFA, we recommend the University's systems be updated as necessary to ensure the awards are reported properly in the future.

Condition – Of the 40 expenditures selected for testing compliance with allowable costs used to meet match requirements within the Research and Development Cluster, we noted two instances in which ineligible expenditures were used to meet match requirements. The University had a total of 47 Research and Development awards with match requirements that closed during the current fiscal year. The expenditures in question resulted in questioned costs of \$10,518 (\$128 on CFDA #15.608; \$10,390 on CFDA #20.701).

Criteria – Per review of OMB Circular A-110 (2CFR215.23), all contributions, including cash and third party in-kind, shall be accepted as part of the recipient's cost sharing or matching when such contributions meet certain criteria, including that they are: (1) verifiable from the recipient's records, (2) are not included as contributions for any other federally-assisted project or program, and (3) are not paid by the Federal Government under another award, except where authorized by Federal statute to be used for cost sharing or matching.

Cause – Regarding instance one (CFDA #15.608), the Office of Sponsored Programs uses a spreadsheet to assist in the calculation of differential match amounts. However, the person responsible for the calculation misunderstood the process, which resulted in the miscalculation of the amount and an over-reporting of the expenditure used towards the matching requirement.

Regarding instance two (CFDA #20.701), in which expenditures incurred under another Federal award were used as match towards the award in question, the University could not provide sufficient documentation that the match was allowable. This resulted in the over-reporting of the expenditures used towards the matching requirement.

Effect – Without proper calculations of the expenditures reported as matching, the Federal oversight or pass-through agency could disallow the amounts as eligible match on the award. As a result, the University may be required to return the related Federal funds to the respective agency. However, in both instances noted, the awards have not yet ended, which will allow the University the opportunity to find allowable match amounts to be used towards the award requirements.

Recommendation – We recommend the University correct the cost share documentation to reflect the proper and allowable amount of match. The University should also review other Federal awards for similar instances of noncompliance and also correct those instances. In addition, we recommend the University implement procedures to review allowability of unusual and/or infrequent items used towards the matching requirement. We also recommend that the review system in place focus on those individuals with less experience with the established review processes.

Questioned Costs – \$10,518

Condition – Of the five awards selected for testing compliance with matching requirements within the Research and Development Cluster, we noted one instance (CFDA #10.Unknown) in which the award had closed on September 30, 2011 and the supporting documentation showed that the matching requirement had not been met. This did not result in a finding as upon further review, the University provided an in-kind letter received in September 2012 documenting in-kind match that had been incurred during the award's period of availability. While the University was compliant with the matching requirement, the University did not obtain and update the supporting cost share documentation in a timely manner.

Of the 40 expenditures selected for testing compliance with allowable costs used to meet match requirements within the Research and Development Cluster, we noted one instance (CFDA #15.Unknown) where the documentation relating to the match requirement was not updated in a timely manner. This did not result in a finding as the expenditure was under-reported and the award had not yet ended.

The University had a total of 39 awards with match requirements that closed during the current fiscal year within the Research and Development Cluster.

Criteria – Per review of OMB Circular A-110 (2CFR215.23), all contributions, including cash and third party in-kind, shall be accepted as part of the recipient's cost sharing or matching when such contributions meet certain criteria, including that they are verifiable from the recipient's records.

Cause – Regarding instance one (CFDA #10.Unknown), there are several departments within the University which were authorized to make expenditures from the award amount. Lack of communication between departments has caused documentation regarding expenditures and matching within the award to not be updated timely.

Regarding the second instance (CFDA #10.Unknown), the person responsible for the differential calculation was not calculating the differential regularly, as expenditures were incurred, which should be done at least quarterly.

Effect – Failure to maintain sufficient documentation in a timely manner regarding match requirements could lead to failure to meet match requirements on a closed award. As a result, the University may be required to return the related Federal funds to the respective agency.

Recommendation – We recommend the University revise its current control system to ensure that matching requirements are documented within the cost share system in a timely manner.

Condition – Of the four expenditures selected for testing compliance with suspension and debarment requirements within the Research and Development Cluster, three of the expenditures were incurred under individual project IDs to three vendors that exceeded \$25,000 and were subject to the suspension and debarment requirements. Of the three expenditures selected for testing compliance with suspension and debarment requirements within the College Access Challenge Grant Program (CFDA #84.378), two of the expenditures were incurred under individual project IDs to two vendors that exceeded \$25,000 and were subject to the suspension and debarment requirements. We noted the University did not obtain the required suspension and debarment certification for four of the five vendors to which the five applicable expenditures tested were incurred within the Research and Development Cluster (two vendors under CFDA #15.252) and the College Access Challenge Grant Program (two vendors under CFDA #84.378). We noted that any Federal funds disbursed via the University's Payment Request system would be susceptible to this control deficiency.

This did not result in a finding as the entities with which the University contracted were not suspended or debarred.

Criteria – The University must design internal controls to reasonably ensure compliance with Federal laws, regulations, and program compliance requirements. Per review of 2CFR215.13, non-Federal entities are prohibited from contracting with or making subawards under covered transactions to parties that are suspended or debarred or whose principals are suspended or debarred. Covered transactions include procurement contracts for goods or services equal to or in excess of \$25,000 and all non-procurement transactions (e.g. subawards to recipients).

Cause – The contracts in question were initiated outside the normal procurement process, which is where the suspension and debarment certification process is typically performed. Although the University has a control system in place which clearly states the suspension and debarment policies and requirements, it is not properly designed as not all of the program personnel administering Federal awards are aware of the policies and/or requirements.

Effect – If the University is not verifying that vendors with which it contracts are neither suspended nor debarred, it is possible that the University could contract with a vendor that is suspended or debarred, in which case the University may be required to return the funds expended to that vendor to the Federal oversight or pass-through agency.

Recommendation – We recommend the University review and revise its current control system to ensure that all contracts be subjected to the established procurement process, which includes the suspension and debarment certification process. If this is not feasible, we recommend that a secondary control system be established to ensure that all contracts entered into outside of the established procurement process be reviewed to ensure compliance with all of the necessary Federal requirements, including suspension and debarment.

Condition – The College Access Challenge Grant Program (CFDA #84.378) does not have a formal control system in place to document and monitor non-salary matching expenditures for compliance with allowable costs used to meet match requirements. Furthermore, a portion of the match documented as having been used towards the matching requirement for both the award years ending August 13, 2012 and August 13, 2013 was the non-Federal portion of Federal Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grant funds (FSEOG – CFDA #84.007) awarded to students. However, the FSEOG program also has its own match requirements. Therefore, using the non-Federal portion of the match matching requirements of the FSEOG program is unallowable match as these expenditures have already been used to meet the matching requirements of the FSEOG program. Questioned costs are unknown due to the lack of documentation supporting the amounts reported and a formal monitoring system.

Criteria – Per review of OMB Circular A-110 (2CFR215.23), all contributions, including cash and third party in-kind, shall be accepted as part of the recipient's cost sharing or matching when such contributions meet certain criteria, including that they are: (1) verifiable from the recipient's records, (2) are not included as contributions for any other federally-assisted project or program, and (3) are not paid by the Federal Government under another award, except where authorized by Federal statute to be used for cost sharing or matching.

Cause – The College Access Challenge Grant Program is not utilizing the University's cost-share system with respect to non-salary cost share expenditures and has not implemented a sufficient substitute control system to gather and document non-salary cost share expenditures, especially if the cost share expenditures are received from entities outside the University.

Effect – Without proper support of the expenditures reported as matching, the Federal oversight agency could disallow the amounts as eligible match on the award. As a result, the University may be required to return the related Federal funds to the respective agency. Recommendation – We recommend the College Access Challenge Grant Program implement procedures to formally document and monitor matching expenditures, including obtaining formal inkind letters from outside entities. In addition, the College Access Challenge Grant Program should utilize the University's established cost-share system, which includes additional controls over documenting and tracking cost-share, as well as ensuring that cost-share is not claimed on duplicate awards.

Condition – Of the two reports filed for performance report testing for the College Access Challenge Grant Program (CFDA #84.378), we selected the April 15, 2012 Annual Performance Report (APR) Part 1 for testing compliance with the reporting requirements. We noted six instances out of seven tested where the financial information within Part 1 of the APR did not agree to supporting documentation.

Criteria – OMB Circular A-110, performance reporting §____.51, and the laws, regulations, and the provisions of contract or grant agreements pertaining to the specific programs require that reports be complete, accurate, and supported by accounting records (if applicable).

Cause – We noted that while the College Access Challenge Grant Program has a control system in place to track expenditures, it is not functioning properly. We noted that there are no procedures in place to capture the financial information as of a specific date for the period on which the report is prepared. As a result, there is no supporting documentation for the amounts reported.

Effect – The applicable Federal oversight agency could withhold future reimbursement of expenditures incurred under the awards until corrected reports are submitted.

Recommendation – We recommend the College Access Challenge Grant Program review and revise its control system as necessary to provide documentation that will support the expenditures reported in the Annual Performance Report. In addition, we also recommend the College Access Challenge Grant Program implement additional control procedures to ensure that the review procedures over financial reporting are thorough enough to verify the information within the reports.

Condition – The College Access Challenge Grant Program (CFDA #84.378) does not have a formal control system in place to document and monitor administrative expenditures for compliance with the earmarking requirement after the initial budget is established.

Criteria – Per 20 U.S.C.1133 Part E, Section 771 (f)(3), a grantee may use not more than 6% of the total amount of the sum of the Federal share provided under this section and the non-Federal share required under this section for administrative purposes relating to the grant under this section.

Cause – The College Access Challenge Grant Program has not implemented a sufficient control system to document and track earmarking requirements.

Effect – Without proper support of the expenditures reported as administrative expense, the Federal oversight agency could disallow the amounts as eligible administrative expenses on the award. As a result, the University may be required to return the related Federal funds to the respective agency.

Recommendation – We recommend the College Access Challenge Grant Program implement procedures to formally document and monitor administrative expenditures to ensure compliance with the earmarking requirement throughout the life of the award.

Condition – Of the 40 students selected for due diligence testing within the Federal Perkins Loans program (CFDA #84.038), 14 students were tested specifically for compliance with billing and collection procedures. We noted the Financial Services Business Office did not perform certain required collection procedures for defaulted loans as follows:

- On six of the 14 selections, the second overdue notice was not sent timely as it was sent 31 days after the first overdue notice.
- On three of the 14 selections, the final demand letter was not sent timely as it was sent • 16 days after the second overdue notice.
- On two of the 14 selections, the final demand letter was never sent.

The principal of the loans in question at June 30, 2011 was \$17,471.

This is a repeat finding from the FY10 audit. After the FY10 audit was completed, remediation steps were taken and due diligence dates were adjusted in the Campus Loan Manager (CLM) system to adhere to the Federal guidelines. Some files selected for testing during the FY11 audit fell in the period of time between July 1, 2010 and the completion of the remediation steps. The two files that were missing a final demand notice were inadvertently caught in the middle of the transition and did not qualify for a notice under the revised parameters. Before being sent to collections, all accounts also receive a minimum of two phone calls and we have recently begun to send emails contemporaneously with the paper letters. This has yielded an increased response rate from borrowers. Of the total of seven files with noted issues, two have been paid in full, two are currently on payment plans, one is enrolled in school, one is in collections, and one is in forbearance status.

Based on current year testing, we determined the University amended its internal control procedures as necessary.

Of the 16 expenditures selected for testing procurement within the Research and Development Cluster, we noted that five of the expenditures were properly not required to be subjected to the University's procurement policies. Of the remaining 11 expenditures, one expenditure was improperly not subjected to the University's procurement policies. The specific expenditure selected for testing was for helicopter services in the amount of \$30,000; however, we noted a total of \$49,382 of expenditures incurred to the vendor for these services for the award in question.

2009-13: Community Development Block Grants/Brownfields Economic Development Initiative – Special Tests

We noted that the control process in place to ensure compliance with the special requirements specified within the grant agreement was not functioning as intended, as the construction contract did not contain a clause informing the contractor of the requirement for a Drug Free Work Place.

The University has not yet verified that the costs were allowable with the sponsor.

Complete. Several meetings/trainings were held with the department and procurement.

Auditor's Comment 2010-06

Based on current year testing, we determined the University has amended its internal control procedures as necessary. However, we noted the University is still in the process of obtaining approval from the grantee related to this finding. As such, this finding has not yet been resolved.

The University will modify its processes to ensure that a "Drug Free Workplace" clause is added to its Federal construction contracts. Verbal conversations have occurred with the Facilities Management Director and staff about incorporating the drug free workplace clause.

Auditor's Comment 2009-13

Based on current year testing, these controls have not yet been fully implemented. The University has represented that there have been no Federal construction contracts that have been entered into since June 30, 2009. As such, this control deficiency has not yet been resolved.
