Course prerequisites: A grade of C or better in 6 hours of psychology.

**Required Text:** McCoy, M.L. & Keen, S.M. (2009). *Child abuse and neglect 2<sup>nd</sup> Edition*. New York: Psychology Press.

**Course Goals:** This is a lecture/seminar course examining the phenomenon of child maltreatment. We will learn about different forms of child maltreatment, how they are defined, and the consequences to children who experience the maltreatment. We will focus heavily on the available research in this area and how this research can inform policy and treatment for maltreating families.

- 3. Understand the formal state and legal processes involved in child maltreatment cases.

There is one written paper and four other discussion opportunities throughout the semester. The written paper is required, but you only need to participate in 3 of the 4 discussions during the semester. Class Attendance/Participation: Class participation, coming to class, joining in discussions, etc. will account for 50 points or 11% percent of your grade. You are expected to attend every class.
