The Path to College

As we enter the new year, high school seniors are one step closer to graduation, and the next big milestone, college, is just around the corner. To ensure you're headed down *The Path* to success, take time to reflect on your progress and make sure you are on track for college.

By now, most of you should have submitted your college applications. If you've applied early, you may have already heard back, while regular decision applications are likely still open. If you haven't submitted your applications yet, make sure to submit them soon and confirm that all required materials have been sent.

The FAFSA should be at the top of your to-do list. If you haven't submitted it, do so as soon as possible. It's crucial for securing financial aid, and the sooner you complete it, the more aid you could qualify for. Additionally, take the time to apply for local scholarships, many of which have deadlines early in the year. Now is also a



good time to visit the campuses of your top schools, either virtually or in person, to get a feel for each environment. If interviews are required for admissions, be sure to schedule those soon.

Looking ahead, by May 1st, you'll need to decide which college to attend and submit your enrollment deposit. As you compare offers, consider factors like financial aid packages, campus life, and your chosen major. Once you've made your decision, you'll need to secure housing, select a meal plan, and register for orientation and classes. Don't forget to check on any health forms or immunizations required for enrollment.

Remember, college readiness is about more than just checking boxes. It's about preparing yourself mentally, emotionally, and financially for the challenges ahead. Stay organized, ask for help when needed, and remain focused on your goals. With the right preparation, your transition into college life will be smooth and successful. Supporting Students Through Winter

Winter is in full swing, and with it comes a new set of challenges for students, teachers, and community members to navigate. Transportation may be less reliable as the sub-zero nightly temperatures cause battery drainages. Walking commuters may elect to stay home to avoid trudging through the snow and, while school buses make an admirable effort to keep students on time, late arrivals and an increase in truancy are par for the course during winter. Of course, safety is the number one priority when it comes to winter travel, but how might you assist your students to arrive on time and prepared to learn?

Be observant. Take note of the types of clothing your students are wearing. Are they wearing summer clothing? Do they have a sturdy winter coat? Are they wearing soggy tennis shoes? The expense of winter clothing can be a huge limiting

factor for some students. There is no expectation for teachers or counselors to single handedly clothe their students, but it helps to be aware of the local resources that might be available to students. Take note of any clothing closets available on school grounds and in your community. Many second hand stores offer voucher programs that allow low-income and otherwise under-resourced people take what they need, up to a predetermined dollar value.

Don't be afraid to start the conversation, while remembering that winter hardships are often invisible. If a student seems to be frequently arriving without a proper winter coat or footwear,

consider speaking to them privately, expressing concern, and offering help. It's crucial to approach these situations with sensitivity and respect. Frame the conversation around available support and resources that may help alleviate the burden.



Be patient with chronically absent or tardy students. Late arrivals can disrupt the classroom routine and absent students often need extra time to catch up on missed work. The whole classroom flows better when students are present, but many students have legitimate reasons to arrive late, especially during the winter. Even when students don't have a clear, justifiable explanation for their tardiness—perhaps they simply have an aversion to school—lack of empathy will only exacerbate the issue. A warm welcome, understanding, and patience can go a long way in easing their anxieties about being late.

In the end, the winter season is a time of heightened challenges, but it is also an opportunity for schools to demonstrate their commitment to the well-being of their students. By staying vigilant, supportive, and proactive, educators can help ensure that all students have the tools and support they need to succeed, regardless of the obstacles winter might bring.
