### **Back to School Tips**



#### i. Used unfinished school supplies

It's really easy to get caught up in the excitement of back to school shopping, and I know all of those new notebooks and pens look so much more enticing in their new packaging. Resist the temptation to buy all new school supplies and use up the rest of your old school supplies when you can.

By using the rest of your old supplies you can save both money and time. Much of the beginning of the school year is spent relearning content that was lost over the summer, content that is most likely still written down in your notebooks. Maybe last year you took Intro to Algebra and now this year you're taking Algebra I; those notes from last year are still going to be applicable to your current math class. Having those old notes on hand is going to make it a little easier for you to remember all of the content from last year. Only when you've truly reached the end of your notebooks and pens is it time to treat yourself to new supplies.

#### ii. Make friends!

Of course we all want friends, and sometimes it's easier said than done, but having a friend or two in every class can be incredibly beneficial for everyone involved.

If you miss a day, having a trusty friend to ask for notes or to help explain the concepts you missed can mean the difference between a 75% and an 80% when quiz day comes around. When you don't understand a lecture, asking your teacher for further explanation is a great course of action, but teachers are busy people. Whether they're planning, prepping, or actively teaching one of their other classes, teachers are overworked and it's always a good idea to have a second course of action available to you. Having friends in every class also means that you essentially have a built in study partner. Making friends allows you to use each other's strengths to counter your weaknesses when studying, so get out there and make some friends today!

#### iii. Remember to start small

As we get into the school year, the size and expected quality of assignments seems to grow exponentially. When you're staring at a checklist of assignments, getting them all done can quickly become overwhelming. Your nerves and resistance to starting a large assignment are completely understandable, but sometimes starting is the most difficult part of such a large task. If you have a week to write a ten page essay, you're not going to produce the highest quality of work if you procrastinate and don't actually start on the assignment until two days before it's due. Use all of the time allotted to increase the quality of your work; even if the first day all you're doing is jotting down themes and general ideas of the essay. It's better to start small than to not start at all, and who knows, once you've created an outline or completed the first few sets of math problems, the rest should come to you.

#### **Changes to the FAFSA**

The 2023-2024 school year is upon us, and with a new school year comes a new and improved FAFSA, known as "The Better FAFSA." In order to make sure our students are as prepared as they can be, we as educators need to educate ourselves about some of the changes coming our way!



This year the FAFSA will open in December rather than its typical October date. This is to allow time for all of the bumps in the road to be sorted out for students to avoid any hiccups upon its release. Because the FAFSA is opening late, and some institutions may not be postponing their own scholarship FAFSA completion requirements, it is HIGHLY recommended that students and parents create their FSA ID before the FAFSA opening date. This is also due to a delay in verification between creating your FSA ID and when you may begin filling out the FAFSA. So, do your part to help students by encouraging them to create their FSA IDs before the new FAFSA becomes available in December.

To help streamline "The Better FAFSA," the application process has been shortened. The Direct Data Exchange will replace the previous IRS Data Retrieval Tool and will reduce the number of questions families have to answer by pulling information from their previously filed taxes. This will include information and assets of all businesses and family farms, which differs from previous years when only family businesses with more than 100 employees were required to report asset information. Families must consent to the retrieval of information in order for the student to be eligible to receive Federal Financial Aid.

### Changes to the FAFSA (cont'd)

More changes include:

- The Student Aid Report will now be known as the FAFSA Submission Summary and will include the Student Aid Index, Application Status, federal student aid eligibility, any flags or issues that arise, and a summary of FAFSA information. Tax information will no longer be included.
- The Student Aid Index (SAI) will be replacing the Expected Family Contribution and will include a negative score of up to - \$1,500. The SAI is expected to increase the number of Pell Grant recipients.
- Every contributor (Student, Parent, Spouse) will be required to set up multi-factor authentication using a phone number, email, or authentication app.
