Call Title:	Integrating eCooking in Nigeria's Clean Cooking Policy
	Implementation Plan

ate and Clean Air Coalition
The Climate and Clean Air Coalition is requesting applications to integrate a National eCooking component to the National Clean Cooking Policy Implementation Plan and to develop funding proposals for implementing ecooking.
Expected Outcomes The Government of Nigeria endorses an eCooking component to their National Clean Cooking Policy Implementation Plan by the end of the project: An exploratory study which builds on the GeCCo Nigeria eCooking Readiness Assessment 2024, and covers the following: Exploration of general ownership of other electrical appliances and uptake of appliances and implications for scenarios on eCooking. Exploration of the range of available manufacturer, supplier and consumer financing options for breaking down the high upfront cost of energy-efficient eCooking appliances. Characterise and quantify the market segments for eCooking, (e.g. on-grid/minigrid/off-grid, firewood/charcoal/kerosene/LPG users, rural/urban, low-/middle-/high-income). Consider gender dynamics. Develop an eCooking component to Nigeria's National Clean Cooking Policy Implementation Plan based on the findings of existing baseline studies and results. This will be carried out to make sure that the most appropriate technology (or blend of technologies) is promoted for each market segment. This should cover: Opportunities to embed eCooking within other national strategies, large-scale initiatives such as Mission300, and related policy instruments to facilitate integrated energy planning. Situational analysis, mission, vision and strategic objectives. Key activities, with targets, responsibility, timeframe, cost, risk assessment and staffing requirements. Barrier analysis while taking advantage of new opportunities. Engage with the Government of Nigeria to conduct stakeholders' validation workshop(s) to validate the e-Cooking component for inclusion in Nigeria's National Clean Cooking Policy Implementation Plan: Formulate a steering group (suggest no more than 10-12 organisations of key stakeholders) inclusive of all parties involved in the future validation of the strategy Present milestones throughout the strategy development process to the steering group
Include findings of eCooking baseline studies The Government of Nigeria endorses project proposals/initiatives for implementing e-cooking as projects for submission to public and private funding sources by the end of the project: 5-7 appropriate projects/initiatives with business potential for scaling e-cooking supported by the public and private sector based on the findings. The draft projects/initiatives should include: Project name Sector Description Outcomes Implementing entities Stakeholders





Design a plan to support three selected projects in coordination with public and private institutions. This plan should include the identification for financial opportunities.

Workshop delivered to key stakeholders, from the financial sector, local and national governments, private sector to identify ways to make financial instruments available to finance organic waste management projects.

Eligible Applicants:

Eligibility Criteria

To be eligible for consideration, project proposals must meet the following requirements:

- Complete and submitted before the deadline
- Submitted by a non-governmental organization (NGO), intergovernmental organization (IGO), or other not-for-profit entity.
- Requested funding is within the estimated budget amount, or includes a clear justification for additional expenses
- Project duration is less than 24 months
- Budget criteria are met and spending caps on expenses are respected.
- For-profit entities may only participate in the project as stakeholders, cofunders, or end users. Applicants are encouraged to include for-profit entities in the development of the project proposal and/or during project implementation if their ownership of the proposed solution is key to the project's success.

Evaluation Criteria

Proposals will be evaluated against the following criteria:

- Presents a clear plan to achieve the required outcomes during the lifetime of the project or soon after
- Includes a plan or activities to enable the scaling up of, replication of, or sustained use of project results over time
- Sets out a clear approach for enabling or contributing to SLCP emissions reductions and resulting co-benefits
- Involves relevant stakeholders.

Climate Services for Risk Reduction Initiative in West Africa

Programme:

JPI Climate

Objective:

Applicants are now invited to apply for the Climate Services for Risk Reduction Initiative in West Africa to develop pathways to climate-resilience by contributing to long-term multinational cooperation.

With this Joint Call, interested project consortia composed of partners from the African and European countries represented within the Group of Funding Parties (GFP) and partners from other West African countries will be invited to submit proposals. Partners from other African and European countries are eligible if they are self-funded.

The overall strategic aim of the CS4RRA-initiative is to develop pathways to climate-resilience in Western Africa and contribute to long-term multinational cooperation including strengthening joint capacity development. In doing so, CS4RRA aims at encouraging co-design of activities between African and European partners on Knowledge of the regional climate system, Innovation of climate services, and Capacity development.

Eligible Activities:

Objectives

The overall objectives are to:

Strengthen climate resilience in West Africa based on a better understanding of the impacts of climate change;

Improve climate knowledge, capacities and services for climate risk reduction and adaptation to climate change;

Strengthen African and European partnership.

Thematic Areas of Focus

West African countries face many shared challenges related to climate change, which require sustainable and innovative solutions acknowledging local knowledge and considering local needs. Climate services are a helpful way to address these challenges. The CS4RRA webinar and stocktaking conference have shown a great need for innovative and user-orientated climate and environmental services to strengthen climate resilience in West Africa.

The call recognises that achieving Climate Services for Risk Reduction in West Africa is a complex challenge crossing upon many sectors, disciplines and policy areas as well as being influenced by dynamics at local, national, regional and global levels.

Topics

Improving Early Warning Systems: There is a comprehensive need for effective multi-hazard early warning systems from sub-seasonal to seasonal scale within West Africa to reduce negative impacts of extreme weather and climate conditions. Improving operational assessment and prevention of Climate Security Risks: Security concerns linked to climate change comprise impacts on food, water, land, health, transport and energy systems. Consequences are loss of livelihoods, rising competition over natural resources, climate-related disasters as well as forced migration and displacement.

Improving financing mechanism and institutional integration of climate services: Innovative approaches stimulating job growth and providing economic perspectives could also be addressed. Therefore, close cooperation between scientists, private, and public sectors would be very valuable.

Eligible Projects

The proposals must:





Address all three pillars of CS4RRA: Knowledge, Capacity Development, and Innovation in West Africa;

Follow inter- and transdisciplinary approaches by encouraging a co-design of activities between academic and non-academic partners such as policy-makers, society and economy;

Meet specific needs related to climate change addressed by West African stakeholders:

Link research and innovation (incl. social innovation) bridging scientific excellence to social impact.

Eligible Applicants:

Eligible Countries

Eligible for funding are organizations from countries, which are represented in the Group of Funding Parties (GFP) and organisations which are located in one of the 16 West African countries, as given in the United Nations definition: Benin, Burkina Faso, Cape Verde, The Gambia, Ghana, Guinea, Guinea-Bissau, Ivory Coast, Liberia, Mali, Mauritania, Niger, Nigeria, Senegal, Sierra Leone, and Togo. Eligibility Criteria

A Project Consortium must comprise at least three eligible project partners representing at least two African institutions from two different African countries and one European institution.

In addition, the Project Consortium has to be led by a partner based in a West African country. The consortium should reflect a balanced and equitable partnership relationship between African and European project partners. Organisations can represent research and higher education entities, companies, and other legal entities such as NGOs, but the institutional restrictions of each funder apply: applicants must be eligible for funding according to the regulations of their respective national Funding Parties.

Application Requirements

A proposal may cover one or more subject areas.

A consortium can only submit one proposal.

Individual consortium members can be part of other consortia.

A given researcher is allowed to be Project Coordinator for only one proposal. Consortia submitting proposals are obliged to report submission of the same or similar proposals to other funding schemes, as well as funds awarded as a result of such submission.

The objective of this call for proposals is to stimulate the emergence of innovative space applications and services with high market potential, addressing the challenges related to Intermodal Transport of Passengers and Freight. These services will ideally support cities and regions pursuing Intermodal Transport solutions, or players in the industry such as mobility providers and couriers. This is not an exhaustive list of users. The initial areas of interest include, but not limited to, the following:

Environmental Sustainability:

Intermodal transport provides an effective solution for reducing the environmental impact of transportation. By decreasing the environmental footprint associated with moving passengers and goods, and by seamlessly integrating multiple modes of transport in a coordinated manner, it enhances efficiency and amplifies environmental benefits:

Intermodal transport systems inherently reduce road congestion, which is a major contributor to environmental degradation. Reducing the number of cars and trucks on the road means less traffic congestion leading to lower emissions and improved air quality in urban areas.

Choosing the most efficient mode of transport for each leg of the journey allows to minimize emissions. For example, transporting goods by train for long distances reduces the need for multiple truck trips, leading to a smaller overall carbon footprint. The integration of rail and ship transport into port operations offers a greener approach, not only reducing the truck traffic congestion around ports but also lowering emissions in the surrounding urban areas.

Efficiency and Flexibility:

Intermodal transport flexibility is essential for ensuring efficient and seamless journeys for passengers and goods. By integrating advanced digital solutions, it is possible to reduce delays, optimise resource utilisation and contribute to smoother and more cost-effective operations.

The UK Urban Transport Group quotes: "Greater digital connectivity and the growth of 'on-demand' transport have led to greater expectations for public transport, that its networks should adapt to customers and their convenience, rather than customers adapting their behaviour to rigid timetables and routes. In the next 10 years it is likely that people will expect more flexibility in their transport options and more seamless integration".

Safety:

Safety of passengers and vehicles requires reliable communication also in remote areas where the terrestrial coverage is scarce or even not existing. Moreover, maintaining the goods in the same unit without offloading them throughout the journey minimizes the risks of theft or damage.

Transporting goods without handling them when changing transport modes not only reduces damage and loss but can also reduce the timing and the costs. In remote or low-connectivity areas, prompt communication of critical situations is paramount for ensuring the safety of passengers. Innovative solutions to address these challenges are needed to establish reliable communication in remote or low-connectivity regions, ensuring prompt response for rescheduling needs. Moving in adverse weather conditions may require the route and the mode of transport to be updated. The ability to give an advanced weather warning is extremely important for safety and security

Programme: European Space Agency

Objective:

The European Space Agency invites feasibility studies and demonstration projects that leverage satellite technology to enhance the sustainability of sports and mass events.

Objectives

The objective of this call for proposals is to foster the development of innovative applications and services with high market potential that address the sustainability challenges inherent in sport and mass events. These solutions are envisioned to support diverse stakeholders—from event organizers, federations,





and venues to sponsors—who are committed to reducing the environmental footprint and enhancing social responsibility at large-scale events, including sports championships, music festivals, and conferences. This is not an exhaustive list of users. The initial areas of interest include, but not limited to, the following: Carbon Reduction

Mobility, logistics and transport services in line with the carbon reduction KPIs set by the event and frameworks and with the need to host a high number of users for a short period of time. E.g. autonomous electric transport of people and goods, tracking of traffic and logistics and their related emissions.

Measuring and validating direct emissions attributable to the event Nature and biodiversity protection

Security of the access to the construction sites, e.g. tracing the authorised vehicles, checking the compliance of materials and tools to the regulations, verifying the compliance of environment and places within the sites.

Monitoring the progress of construction sites and in particular land use and landscape transformations.

Promote a new level of intelligence for the sustainable use of resources in snowmaking, to achieve significant savings in water and electricity use. This is achieved by ensuring accurate planning of the amount of snow required per area and slope. Continuous comparison of planned and actual quantities and other important factors can ensure optimal planning of snowmaking, saving resources. Circular Economy

Services supporting the transition towards circular and smart cities for the sustainability of the hosting locations. like impact of large events on green spaces and urban heat islands, traffic and transportation management of the host venues and air quality control.

Tracking the supply chain by providing deep insights into each individual segment of it to assurance that the products are produced in an environmentally sustainable and ethical way. Having access to an accurate, complete view of the supply chain makes it easier to pursue proactive changes such as shifting production methods to become more sustainable or pressuring a supply partner to improve its labour practices.

Services tracking waste management to ensure accurate waste segregation, contributing to lower carbon output across the supply chain, particularly in managing Scope 3 emissions, which encompass waste disposal and its impact. Sustainable Infrastructure

Planning of sustainable new building/infrastructures (transport, energy and other utilities, connectivity) based on assessment of their environmental impact, and aiming at versatility and flexibility of their use after the events to ensure a return of the investment in the long-term.

Support the planning and placement in case of temporary and demountable venues where no long-term venue legacy need exists or can be justified (e.g. mapping of the locations and analysis of the logistics, environmental impact analysis, efficiency of the buildings, monitoring of the working sites status). Renewal, adaptation and enhancement of the use of existing facilities (e.g. smart building, digitalisation and safety of access).

Impact of environment on events

Measure of impact and risk of weather events and environmental changes on the events like extreme weather events, impact of air quality on the athletes or changes produced by the event in the host venue.

Urban Planning and Infrastructure: Accurate geospatial information supports urban planning by helping design resilient infrastructure that can withstand climate impacts, such as flooding and heatwaves.

Adapting Coastal Agriculture: implementing services to protect crops from salinity intrusion, flooding, coastal erosion, extreme weather events, and changes in precipitation patterns. These services include farming systems with improved drainage systems to mitigate flooding and saltwater intrusion, efficient irrigation systems to optimise water availability, crop diversification to incorporate a variety of crops with different tolerance levels to climate variability, and coastal defences such as seawalls and mangroves to reduce erosion and flooding.

Disaster Response and Recovery

Disaster Response and Recovery: Reliable communication during and after disasters ensures that emergency services can coordinate effectively. This is particularly important in remote and rural coastal areas where terrestrial communication infrastructure may be limited.

Nature-Based Solutions (NBS): Traditional measures to mitigate climate change primarily involved building infrastructure and heavy engineering. The current approach focuses on developing NBS. Implementing NBS, such as mangrove restoration, can enhance coastal resilience and provide multiple ecosystem services.

Port Solutions

Port Solutions: Services may involve management systems that recommend strategies such as raising the height of quays and docks, installing advanced drainage systems, and developing climate adaptation plans that include monitoring and early warning systems for extreme weather events.

Tourism and Economic Activities

Tourism: Coastal regions are popular tourist destinations, and climate change poses significant risks to this sector. Rising sea levels, coastal erosion, and extreme weather events can damage tourism infrastructure, such as hotels, resorts, and recreational facilities. Additionally, changes in temperature and precipitation patterns can affect the attractiveness of these destinations. Implementing climate adaptation strategies, such as building resilient infrastructure and promoting sustainable tourism practices, can help mitigate these impacts and ensure the long-term viability of the tourism industry.

Insurance

Insurance: Insurance is vital for climate adaptation and resilience, especially in coastal areas prone to extreme weather. It provides financial protection against economic losses from storms, flooding, and erosion. Using satellite data, insurers can better assess risks and manage claims, offering tailored products for coastal communities. This technology helps monitor natural disasters, assess damage, and provide accurate payouts, enhancing the resilience of these regions to climate change and enabling faster recovery from extreme events.

Corporate Sustainability Reporting Directive (CSRD)





CRSD: The CSRD highlights the need for companies to report physical risks and opportunities related to climate change, especially in coastal areas prone to sealevel rise, erosion, and extreme weather. Therefore, services that help companies to disclose the impacts on their assets and operations and outline strategies for resilience are needed. Key requirements include Impact, Risks, Opportunity (IRO)-1, and Environment (E1)-2—4, E1-9. The 2021 EU Adaptation Strategy stresses systemic approaches and digital technologies to reduce climate risks, while the EU Floods Directive and Maritime Spatial Planning Directive mandate flood risk management and sustainable coastal area management.
