Collaboration Program

Natural resource practitioners are often called upon and sometimes required to work collaboratively in complex and contentious settings with people and groups who have a vested interest in whatever solutions are ultimately proposed and implemented.

CPNR focuses on:

- Collaborative leadership skills
- Designing, convening, and facilitating collaborative problem-solving processes
- Participating effectively in collaborative problemsolving processes

CPNR brings together 15-20 mid- and upper-level professionals for a 10-month training program that includes six in-depth sessions and a practicum project that applies collaborative expertise to a real-world situation.

The program invites participants to deepen their technical and leadership skills to address today's most complex environmental and natural resource issues and is inspired by the University of Wyoming's core values of inclusivity, multiplicity, fairness, and parity.

Graduates of the program go on to lead natural resource and environmental collaborative processes throughout Wyoming and the West.

CPNR Tuition & Scholarships
