<sup>1</sup> Civil Procedure II is a 2.0 credit course that will be offered on a compressed schedule in order to lessen the number of first year exams during the regularly scheduled exam period. Civil Procedure II will begin on Tuesday, January 22, 2019 and end on Wednesday, April 3, 2019. The final exam will be held on Friday, April, 12 2019.

<sup>2</sup> As scheduled, the class has more minutes than necessary for a 3.0 credit class. The class will not actually meet for more than the time required. However, the class is designed to end by March 15<sup>th</sup>, prior to the administration of the MPRE. The final is currently TBD.

<sup>3</sup> Oil & Gas Law is a prerequisite.

<sup>4</sup> As a prerequisite for this course, students must have received a final grade of B or higher in both Legal Writing I and Legal Writing II. Enrollment in this course is limited to 12 qualifying students on a first-come, first-serve basis by registration. If this course is oversubscribed, preference will be given to 3L students for the first week of registration. Additional students will be placed on a waitlist.

<sup>5</sup> Trusts & Estates is a prerequisite for this course.

<sup>6</sup> Water Law & Policy is a prerequisite for this course.

<sup>7</sup> Requires 3L standing & offered for S/U credit only. This class will meet every other week starting the first week of classes.

<sup>8</sup> Prerequisites are Income Taxation, Business Organizations, and Business Entities Taxation.

<sup>9</sup> Civil Pretrial Practice enrollment is limited to 12 students determined by a lottery, preference is given to third year students. The lottery form will be located in the front office, with a sign-up deadline of November 12<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 p.m.

<sup>10</sup> 3L students may register without approval. Offered for a letter grade only. Civil Legal Services clinic enrollment is limited to 8 students; 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed, additional students will be placed on a waitlist. 2L students entering their 4th semester may register upon email approval from Professor Cover.

<sup>11</sup> Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Defender Aid clinic enrollment is limited to 8 students, 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, Criminal Procedure and/or Criminal Adjudication strongly recommended. 2L students entering their 4th semester may register upon email approval from Professor McLane.

<sup>12</sup> Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. EENR clinic enrollment is limited to 8 students. Acceptance is based on an application and interview process. This clinic is run in conjunction with the Wyoming Attorney General's Office. This course is a great opportunity to acquire hands-on experience. Please note that this course requires a **year-long commitment** so students must register for this course during both the fall and spring semesters. Prerequisite: Administrative Law.

<sup>13</sup> Requires 3L standing or 2L's enrolled in Professional Responsibility, offered for a letter grade only. Family Law clinic enrollment is limited to 8 students; 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed, additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Priority will be given to students who have completed the Domestic Violence course or who will be taking it concurrently with the clinic. Recommended courses: Children & the Law, Domestic Violence and Family Law.

<sup>14</sup> Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Prosecution Assistance clinic enrollment is limited to 8 students; 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, Criminal Adjudication and/or Criminal Procedure strongly recommended.

<sup>15</sup> Offered for S/U credit ONLY. One credit per competition. Credit is given to student competitors in approved inter-school competitions. Please see our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, if you have any questions regarding which are approved competitions. Credit is applied in the semester after the student participates in the regional or national competition. The student must register for the credit and submit the form to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>16</sup> Gift & Estate Taxation and Trusts & Estates are prerequisites for this course. This course will begin in the middle of the semester with the final occurring at the end of the semester. This course will follow Gift & Estate Taxation and will remain in the same room at the same time as Gift & Estate Taxation. There will be 1 makeup class scheduled on a Friday of Professor Delaney's choosing.

<sup>17</sup> Offered for a letter grade only. Estate Planning practicum enrollment is limited to 8 students; 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed, additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Completion of Trusts & Estates prior to enrolling, plus either have taken or are currently enrolled in Professional Responsibility. New 3L students preferred, followed by new 2L students that meet class requirements, followed by returning 3L students.

<sup>18</sup> Offered for S/U credit only. A [description of the legal externships](#) available in the spring semester and an [application](#) is included on the law school website. If you are interested in an externship, you must submit an application and resume to Professor Ken Chestek at [kchestek@uwyo.edu](mailto:kchestek@uwyo.edu) by **November 15th**. 3L students may NOT take a legal clinic in the same semester in which they participate in an extern program, unless they obtain prior written permission from both the Externship Director and the Clinic Director.

<sup>19</sup> Gift & Estate Taxation will run from the beginning of the semester through the middle of the semester with the final taking place in the middle of the semester. This course will precede Estate Planning. There will be 1 makeup class scheduled on a Friday of Professor Delaney's choosing.

<sup>20</sup> Independent Study is the research and writing in specialized or advanced areas of the law. Students receive one credit hour for 50 hours of work or 2 credit hours for 100 hours of work. Grades are generally based on a research paper. Students must submit a completed Independent Study form to our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit the form to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>21</sup> Independent Study: Clinic is meant to allow students to receive credit for continuing work completed in conjunction with a clinic or live practicum. To qualify for Clinic Independent Study credit a student must have completed at least one semester in a clinic or live practicum, and must submit a form to the clinic or practicum instructor and our Registrar, Dave Bluemel. The student must register for the credit and submit the form to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>22</sup> Requires 3L standing & is offered for S/U credit only. Students who are to receive independent study credit for an unpublished Law Review article should sign up for this section. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>23</sup> Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. International Human Rights practicum enrollment is limited to 8 students; 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed additional students will be placed on a waitlist. 2L students entering their 4th semester may register upon application and approval from Faculty Director. The International Human Rights practicum is a hands-on course in international human rights. There will be case supervision sessions in addition to class time listed, at times to be arranged. Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in either Immigration Law or International Human Rights Law strongly recommended.

<sup>24</sup> Offered for S/U credit ONLY. Requires Law Review Board membership. Students receive Law Review credit in the third year only. Students must submit a completed Law Review form to our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit the form to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>25</sup> Offered for S/U credit ONLY. This section should only be used if your credit hours are maxed out on Section 1. Requires Law Review Board membership. Students receive Law Review credit in the third year only. Students must submit a completed Law Review form to our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit the form to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>26</sup> Class starts on May 19 for 2 weeks in Jackson Hole, and an email will explain the course being taught with PACE Law School.

<sup>27</sup> Minimum of 10 students required.

<sup>28</sup> Trial Practice enrollment is limited to 16 students determined by a lottery, preference is given to third year students and then students who are going to be clinic directors. The lottery form will be located in the front office, with a sign-up deadline of November 12<sup>th</sup> at 5:00 p.m.
