<sup>iii</sup> Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Defender Aid clinic enrollment is limited to 6 students; 5 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, Criminal Adjudication and/or Criminal Procedure strongly recommended.

<sup>iv</sup> Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Family & Child Legal Advocacy clinic enrollment is limited to 6 students; 5 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed, additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Recommended courses: Children & the Law, Domestic Violence and Family Law.

Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, Criminal Adjudication and/or Criminal Procedure strongly recommended.

<sup>vi</sup> Offered for S/U credit ONLY. One credit per competition. Credit is given to student competitors in approved inter-school competitions. Please see our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, if you have any questions regarding which are approved competitions. Credit is applied in the semester after the student participates in the regional or national competition.

Grades are generally based on a research paper. Students must submit a completed Independent Study form to our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>x</sup> Research and writing in specialized or advanced areas of the law. Students receive one credit hour for 50 hours of work or 2 credit hours for 100 hours of work. Grades are generally based on a research paper. Students must submit a completed Independent Study form to our Registrar, Dave Bluemel, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

<sup>xi</sup> The Clinic Independent Study is meant to allow students to receive credit for continuing work completed in conjunction with a clinic or live practicum. To qualify for Clinic Independent Study credit a student must have completed at least one semester in a clinic or live practicum, and must submit a form to the clinic or practicum instructor and our Registrar, Dave Bluemel. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit.

<sup>xii</sup> **Summer Trial Institute:**

**1. Registration for this course is on a first come, first served basis**

You do not need to register for this course until March. The course is capped at 24 students, but we do keep a waitlist. We need to have exactly 24 students to make this course work (or a multiple of 4 if this course does not make it to the cap). It is very important that you make a firm commitment to this course. If for some reason you cannot take the course but you are registered, you need to drop the course immediately so you are not taking the opportunity away from a fellow student.

**2. Mandatory Seat Deposit**

There is a mandatory seat deposit of \$500 dollars for this course that you must submit to Christine before May 1<sup>st</sup>. If she does not receive your physical check by May 1<sup>st</sup>, you **WILL BE DROPPED** from the course. The check must be made out to the College of Law, and bring it to Christine in office 118. This deposit is to ensure your enrollment in the course. If you remain in the course, your deposit will be returned to you at the conclusion of the course. The **only** way the check is deposited and you are out the \$500 is if you drop the course after May 1<sup>st</sup>. **No exceptions!**

**Course Dates**

This class officially starts August 5<sup>th</sup> with email reading assignments. The classroom portion of the course begins on Sunday, August 11<sup>th</sup> and runs through August 23<sup>rd</sup>. You must physically be here the 11<sup>th</sup> -23<sup>rd</sup>, so plan your summer schedules accordingly.

- **No absences**

- i. This is a full, 3 semester class crammed into a two week period. You will be busy from morning to midnight for the full two weeks. On days you are not doing a problem, you will be serving your fellow students in a supporting role. If you miss any part of any day, it is the equivalent to missing weeks of class during the semester.

- **Optional Saturday Start**

- 3. If you are not able to attend class on Sunday, August 11, we will hold special session of class on Saturday, August 10. [If you are able to attend class on Sunday, August 11, please do so. If you are here on Sunday, there is no need for you to be here on Saturday. The Saturday class is being offered only for those who are unable to attend on Sunday. If you plan to attend this optional start let Christine know.]

**4. Tuition**

Tuition is due at the start of the course (as stated above, August 5th). To be very clear, if you drop the course during the reading week, it will be considered a withdrawal and appear that way on your transcript and **you will still be charged full tuition for the course**, as well as lose the additional \$500 seat deposit. This is a University policy. With the condensed course dates, there is no drop/add grace period for tuition.

**5. Required Texts**

<sup>xiii</sup> **Public Lands:**

Public Lands & Natural Resources Law course this upcoming May. This course will be a two (2) week intensive, three (3) credit field course running from Sunday, May 19 to Saturday, June 1, 2019. It will introduce students to the law of natural resources and public lands, with an emphasis on federal statutes that govern access to and use of natural resources such as wildlife, biodiversity, wilderness and protected lands, water resources, and forests. This course will be taught in Jackson Hole, Wyoming, and the professors will be Jason J. Czarnetzki (Elisabeth Haub School of Law at Pace University) and Sam Kalen (University of Wyoming), with guest lectures by professor Doug Wachob and other University of Wyoming faculty. We will also go on field trips and excursions using vehicles provided by the University of Wyoming. Students from Wyoming, Pace, and other law schools will be eligible to participate in the course. Students will be expected to arrange for their own travel to and from Jackson Hole. The only extra costs for the course

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will be for (a) housing; (b) University of Wyoming transportation, e.g., rental of vehicles; (c) and incidental instructional supplies, for a total extra cost (beyond just the tuition) of between \$500 to \$600 (right now, we think it will be \$500, but it could—albeit not likely—go up to \$600).
