I. WHY CAMBRIDGE?

Cambridge is one of the most famous places to visit in the world today and home to one of the world's great universities – the University of Cambridge. Nestled in the heart of the United Kingdom near London, Cambridge offers an unparalleled learning experience in a Harry Potter-style medieval environment that will inspire and motivate you. The City straddles the historic Cam River and is home to medieval and modern buildings, pubs, theaters, museums, restaurants, shops, book stores, and coffee houses. The Cambridge community is made up of multilingual faculty and students from all over the world who partake in academic and social life in a collegial environment. Cambridge is well-known for its great minds and contributions in the sciences (Newton, Darwin and Hawking) and international law (Coke, Lauterpacht and Crawford) and is the ideal venue for discussion and development of topical issues in these important fields.

II. PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

The purpose of the Cambridge Summer Law Institute is to provide students with the opportunity to study law at one of the pre-eminent institutions for international legal studies and bring Cambridge minds and ideas to students in an ideal learning atmosphere. For two weeks, students will explore topical international legal events in the European Union (EU) up close (e.g., the Brexit Crisis) and study the impact of these events on the development of economic and human rights law and policy under the tutelage of leading experts in the field. The program will take place at historic Hughes Hall (known informally as the “Law College”) at Cambridge, where students reside, dine and participate in lectures. Students also will dine in the Fourteenth Century Old Hall of Queens’ College and participate in lectures and events at the Lauterpacht Center for International Law, the scholarly home of International law at the University of Cambridge. The program will include a short train ride into London to visit the renowned Inns of Court to observe first-hand the world of Barristers and the practice of law at the Royal Courts of Justice.

III. ELIGIBILITY

We will accept applications from law students enrolled at any law school in the world, or graduate students in related disciplines.

IV. ADMISSIONS

To Apply, interested students must fill out the [online application form](#) and submit a non-refundable \$500 seat deposit at time of registration.

IV. 2018 PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

Dates: July 31 - August 11, 2018 (class meetings)

Location: Cambridge, England

Seat Deposit: A non-refundable \$500 seat deposit is due at time of registration. The seat deposit will be applied to the program fee at the start of the course.

Program Fee: \$2,500 (Covers Housing and Meals)

The remaining \$2,000 of the program fee (less the seat deposit) is due at the start of the course.

Tuition: Wyoming In-state tuition rate: \$1,392 (for 3 credits)

Wyoming Out-of-state tuition rate: \$2,970 (for 3 credits)

Tuition will be charged to your student account and will be due at the start of the course.

Travel: Travel is not included in the program and must be arranged by each individual student. Students will also be expected to acquire their passport and travel documents on their own.

Housing: Accommodations will be provided by the University of Cambridge, Hughes Hall and will include an accompanying meal plan in the cafeteria.

Course Title: European Trade and Human Rights Law

Prerequisites: None

Recommended Courses:

Course Overview: An intensive, two week, 3 credit course about European Trade and Human Rights Law. This year, the course will focus on the Brexit Crisis and its implications for criminal law and justice in the EU and UK. This course has two basic objectives: (1) to broaden the student's knowledge of the EU, its institutions, and criminal law & policy; and (2) to examine the extent to which EU criminal law, and its core principles of mutual recognition and cooperation, will be affected by the adjustments to freedom of movement and goods caused by Brexit.

Course Materials: A binder containing reading materials on EU law and institutions, international commercial law, and criminal law and policy issues will be provided to students prior to the start of the course. .

Course Format: Lectures by faculty members.

Other Comments: This course will not satisfy the advanced writing, experiential learning or skills requirements.

^{iv} Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Family & Child Legal Advocacy clinic enrollment is limited to 8 students; 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed, additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Recommended courses: Children & the Law, Domestic Violence and Family Law.

^v Requires 3L standing, offered for a letter grade only. Prosecution Assistance clinic enrollment is limited to 8 students; 7 determined on a first-come, first-served basis by registration. If the registration is oversubscribed additional students will be placed on a waitlist. Completion of, or concurrent enrollment in, Criminal Adjudication and/or Criminal Procedure strongly recommended.

^{vi} Offered for S/U credit ONLY. One credit per competition. Credit is given to student competitors in approved inter-school competitions. Please see our Registrar, Vonnie Jordan, if you have any questions regarding which are approved competitions. Credit is applied in the semester after the student participates in the regional or national competition.

^{ix} Research and writing in specialized or advanced areas of the law. Students receive one credit hour for 50 hours of work or 2 credit hours for 100 hours of work. Grades are generally based on a research paper. Students must submit a completed Independent Study form to our Registrar, Vonnie Jordan, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

^x Research and writing in specialized or advanced areas of the law. Students receive one credit hour for 50 hours of work or 2 credit hours for 100 hours of work. Grades are generally based on a research paper. Students must submit a completed Independent Study form to our Registrar, Vonnie Jordan, within one week after the start of the semester. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

^{xi} The Clinic Independent Study is meant to allow students to receive credit for continuing work completed in conjunction with a clinic or live practicum. To qualify for Clinic Independent Study credit a student must have completed at least one semester in a clinic or live practicum, and must submit a form to the clinic or practicum instructor and our Registrar, Vonnie Jordan. The student must register for the credit and submit to receive credit. The required form can be downloaded from the website.

^{xii} **Summer Trial Institute:**

1. Registration for this course is on a first come, first served basis

You do not need to register for this course until March. The course is capped at 24 students, but we do keep a waitlist. We need to have exactly 24 students to make this course work (or a multiple of 4 if this course does not make it to the cap). It is very important that you make a firm commitment to this course. If for some reason you cannot take the course but you are registered, you need to drop the course immediately so you are not taking the opportunity away from a fellow student.

2. Mandatory Seat Deposit

There is a mandatory seat deposit of \$500 dollars for this course that you must bring before June 1st. If I do not receive your physical check by June 1st, you **WILL BE DROPPED** from the course. The check must be made out to the College of Law, and bring it to Christine in office 113. This deposit is to ensure

your enrollment in the course. If you remain in the course, your deposit will be returned to you at the conclusion of the course. The **only** way the check is deposited and you are out the \$500 is if you drop the course after June 1st. **No exceptions!**

Course Dates

This class officially starts August 6th with email reading assignments. The classroom portion of the course begins on Sunday, August 12th and runs through August 24th. You must physically be here the 12th -24th, so plan your summer schedules accordingly.

- **No absences**

- i. This is a full, 3 semester class crammed into a two week period. You will be busy from morning to midnight for the full two weeks. On days you are not doing a problem, you will be serving your fellow students in a supporting role. If you miss any part of any day, it is the equivalent to missing weeks of class during the semester.

- **Optional Saturday Start**

3. If you are not able to attend class on Sunday, August 12, we will hold special session of class on Saturday, August 11. [If you are able to attend class on Sunday, August 12, please do so. If you are here on Sunday, there is no need for you to be here on Saturday. The Saturday class is being offered only for those who are unable to attend on Sunday.]

4. **Tuition**

Tuition is due at the start of the course (which will be the start date listed in Banner, so as stated above, August 6th). I want to be very clear, if you drop the course during the reading week, it will be considered a withdrawal and appear that way on your transcript and **you will still be charged full tuition for the course**, as well as lose the additional \$500 seat deposit. This is a University policy. With the condensed course dates, there is no drop/add grace period for tuition.

5. **Required Texts**

^{xiii} **Summer Trial Institute – Alaska**

1. **Registration**

As a Wyoming Student, you need to register in Banner as per usual, as well as through our webpage that will take you to the secure payment site for your seat deposit.

Because **registration through Banner does not open until March 1st**, if you wish to register for Alaska now, you may do so through the online registration and seat deposit payment. We'll consider that sufficient to hold your place. When Banner registration opens in the Spring, we'll send those registered via me an email to go into banner and "make it official."

2. **Mandatory Seat Deposit**

If you wish to take the Alaska version of the Summer Trial Institute, you should register for the course and pay the \$500 seat deposit **on line** through the above link by February 1st, 2018. As long as you do indeed take the course, your \$500 deposit will be applied to the \$2,500 program fee for the Alaska STI (Remember that is separate to the tuition of the course, which will be charged base on your residency rate). [If you do not attend the course, you will lose your \$500 deposit.] **No exceptions!**

We have set the deadline for the payment of seat deposits for the Alaska STI on February 1st, because we need to decide whether we have enough students to hold the course next week. The University of Alaska-Anchorage is holding dorm rooms for us. If we are not going to hold the course, we need to let them know soon. Hopefully enough of you will decide to take advantage of the Alaska option by Monday so we can commit to UAA and hold the course as scheduled. If not—i.e., if we are forced to cancel the course—you will be refunded your \$500 seat deposit.

3. **Program Fee Scholarships**

If you are one of the first ten UW students to register for the Alaska STI and pay the \$500 seat deposit, you will receive a \$2,000 scholarship which is essentially a subsidy for the remaining \$2,000 of the \$2,500 program fee. If the class has registrants beyond 10, those students will be responsible for the full balance of the program fee. [As a reminder, you will have to pay for a plane ticket to and from Anchorage, but you will have meals and dorm room rent paid during the two weeks in Anchorage via program fee].

4. **Course Dates**

Alaska Summer Trial runs from May 27th – June 8th. You must physically be in Anchorage the 27th -8th, so plan your summer schedules accordingly.

On days you are not doing a problem, you will be serving your fellow students in a supporting role.
