10.5.1. Part of the letter of the Emperor Alexander to the comptrollers (rationales). My sense of justice considered it most burdensome, that the fisc should again raise a controversy concerning property which it sold in good faith and the price of which it has received. It is just to the purchaser not to have any question raised, not only by the same department (statio), but by no other as well, since the officials may contend (experiri) with each other in regard to these purchases, without disturbing the purchaser. Given April 17 (228).

10.5.2. Emperor Marcian to Polladius, Praetorian Prefect of the Orient.
Reasons of equity and honesty forbid that the fisc should disturb what it has once sold.
Given at Constantinople December 28 (451).
