Imagination

Think "Pure Imagination" from *Willy Wonka & the Chocolate Factory*. My generation: "Imagine" by John Lennon. But really, ALL music starts with imagination. Every composer imagines what theirs sounds like before writing it down. We in the audience imagine what it'll sound like before it begins.

For some music, that's as far as it goes, just sound, no more. A Mozart symphony, a Beethoven concerto, a Bach fugue: pure sound, no further imagination needed. Great, magnificent sound, of course. But nothing else.

But some music is more: the composer imagined a scene, a story, a mountain, or a dance, and wrote music for that. When we hear it, we think, in our minds, not just the sound, but whatever it is the composer wanted to represent. Your version may differ a little from the person next to you. But if the composer was skilled, and if your imagination is in tune with the composer's, you *get it.* That's what we'll be exploring this season.

Take for instance Dvořák's 9th Symphony, which he called *From the New World*. Dvořák was Czech, but was living in New York City when he wrote it. And he tried to convey his impressions of this beautiful country. He'd studied African-American spirituals, and Native American music. He'd seen some of our scenery (he spent his summers in Iowa). All those impressions jumbled together in his mind, and he tried to transform them into a symphony.

#### DEAR FRIENDS OF THE SYMPHONY ASSOCIATION,

Every year, Dr. Griffith never ceases to amaze me in how he constructs an orchestral season entirely unlike anything he has done in the past. He may call this coming season "Worlds of Imagination," but much of the imagination must also be attributed to him. I, for one, am incredibly excited by the multitude of offerings he has put together this year, from Dvořák's New World Symphony to Prokofiev's' Romeo and Juliet suite, and works of American composers Copland, Bernstein, and Gershwin. (As one who lived in Iowa for a decade, I can assure you Iowans claim Dvořák composed his Ninth Symphony while residing in Spillville up in the northeast corner of the state in the summer of 1893.) Add to that incredible soloists, three from our own faculty and a distinguished Brazilian guitarist and we have a wonderful season on tap.

However, even imagination requires funding. As members of the Symphony Association for the University of Wyoming, our primary purpose is to provide scholarships to student musicians and to support other activities that contribute to their experience, whether it be travel to conferences, equipment purchases, concert advertising, or guest conductors. Every year we are fortunate to have a number of outstanding musicians from the U.S. and around the world accept our scholarship offers to add to the quality and diversity of the personnel of the Symphony Orchestra.  David J. Perry, President Symphony Association for the University of Wyoming Prokofiev's imagination had to be much more specific. He was asked to write a ballet on *Romeo and Juliet*. He had to imagine not only the specific scene – the balcony scene, for instance – but also imagine a dancer conveying that moment. How should that music sound?

We'll do much more. *Appalachian Spring* imagines a frontier wedding, as the couple imagine their future together: their hopes, their fears, and their joys. *Feste Romane* represents four huge festivals in ancient Rome. *Light* is just that, glittering snippets of music lighting up the concert hall. *West Side Story* sets the *Romeo and Juliet* story among New York's tenements and street gangs. Handel's *Messiah* tells its story not just with words but with musical imagery tied to exactly those words. Even light music can create a fun flight of imagination: *Caribbean Sleigh Ride* conjures up an image of Santa's sleigh soaring over a smooth, sandy beach.

Now imagine our incredible soloists. Brazilian guitarist **Eduardo Meirinhos** will bring the music of his countryman, Villa-Lobos. Violinist **John Fadial** will play the stunning violin concerto by Samuel Barber. Pianist **Theresa Bogard** will romp through the jazz-inflected piano concerto of George Gershwin. And mezzo-soprano **Magdelana Wór** will sing Mahler's poetic *Songs of a Wayfarer*.

Finally, imagine yourself in the audience. Well, that's easy. Just order your season tickets now! And while you're at it, imagine how much your support can benefit the students in the orchestra. So make a donation to the Symphony Association at the same time – but not an imaginary donation!

I'm imagining seeing each and every one of you in the audience at every concert. I certainly hope that image proves accurate. See you October 9!
