Course prerequisites, co-requisites, enrollment restrictions: Enrollment in the Master of Science in Health Services Administration program, or by permission.

Course Description: The inexorable rise of computing and large-scale data storage has impacted all our lives, sometimes in profound ways. Medicine, for example, has become an information science where the tools of data analysis are as commonplace as the microscope. In the Business arena, financial markets generate rivers of intensely scrutinized data and all major global-scale retailers store analyze vast quantities of customer and transaction data. In the Social Sciences, the collection and analysis of data enables researchers to make more informed decisions about best practices. The trend is universal and unstoppable.

Statistics, as a discipline, provides us with the tools for analyzing data. The aim of a Statistician is to reason with what the data can tell us about what is happening in large populations of interest. In this course, we will learn how to reason with the inherent variation in data by creating data visualizations and by calculating summary statistics, enabling us to find the story in the data. Our sample statistics are simply estimates of what are known as population parameters. In the second half of the course, we will reason with our sample statistics to make inferences about the values of population parameters. For example, we ask what the average treatment effect of a drug found in a sample of patients tells us about how effective the drug would be on the entire population of patients with the disease or condition.

One of the aims of this course is for you to access the quality of the statistical information you consume through the news media. We begin the course by going beyond the news headlines to the source of the research to assess the quality of the research for ourselves. Throughout the course, you will develop your statistical thinking skills through media, journal, and real-world data examples. This approach helps to engrain statistical concepts and make them more palatable, engaging, and relevant to you and the world around you.

Student Learning Outcomes: This course will focus on applying the statistics learned to healthcare settings.

Required text: Donoghue, Anthony. Statistical Thinking Through Media Examples, 3rd Edition, Cognella Publishing 2022. ISBN-13: 978-1793541963.

General requirements and expectations for the course: Students should obtain the required textbook and complete assigned readings before class each week. It is acceptable for students to communicate with each other about assignments. Students are encouraged to participate in live class sessions; however, attendance will not count towards your grade.

You are encouraged to begin reading the assigned book chapters prior to the live class session on Wednesday. During the Wednesday session, Dr. Carnes will highlight key items related to the assigned readings for that week and will answer questions. An assignment on the assigned material for that week will open on Monday (before class) and must be completed before Saturday at midnight MST.

Assignments/Exams: There will be six assignments (one per week). The assignments will open on Monday and close on Saturday at midnight MST. You can complete the assignment any time within that window from Monday through Saturday. Exams will be "open book" and you will be allowed up to 90 minutes to complete each exam. Exams will open on Thursday at noon MST and must be completed by midnight on Saturday of weeks 3 and 6.

Assessment & Grading:

ASSIGNMENTS: There will be six weekly assignments including real-world exercises and mini projects to help ingrain the statistical concepts covered in class and in the textbook. The lowest graded assignment will be dropped. Assignments will be due on Saturday at midnight MST each week

EXAMS: There will be a midterm (Week 3) and final (Week 6) exam. The exams will not be cumulative. They will focus on assessing your understanding of the statistical thinking concepts you learn in class and in the textbook. There will be a minimum of calculations in the exams. The main purpose of the exams is to assess your conceptual understanding of the material.
