Dr. Stewart's commitment to sheep industry stakeholders is evidenced by 65 extension/popular press publications, 150 presentations, 400 individual sheep producer consultations, and over 15,000 indirect contacts through written and virtual extension programing. Dr. Stewart has taught 192 students in sheep-related undergraduate curriculum and has advised 10 graduate students which have placed in the lamb, wool, and allied agricultural industries. Dr. Stewart works closely with the Wyoming Wool Growers Association, American Sheep Industry Association, American Lamb Board, and is Editor-in-Chief of the Sheep and Goat Research Journal.

Keith, Jill Associate Professor

Jill Keith (Ph.D., Registered Dietitian) was appointed to the College of Agriculture & Natural Resources in 2016. Her published scholarly work includes 12 peer-reviewed manuscripts, 20 refereed field bulletins/abstracts/newsletter articles, and 16 scientific presentations including contributions to leading nutrition journals such as the *Journal of the Academy of Nutrition & Dietetics* and *Nutrients*. She is the PI or co-PI on 14 funded grant proposals, 11 of which are external funding. She has consistently very high teaching evaluations and was a recipient of student-nominated awards including the Top Prof award from the UW Cap and Gown Chapter of the Mortar Board and Promoting Intellectual Engagement in the First Year. Urszula Norton (Ph.D.) has been a member of Plant Sciences Department since 2009 and is an Adjunct in UW Program in Ecology and Evolution and Utah State University Department of Plant, Soil and Climate. Her expertise lies within Agroecology and Agroecosystem Biogeochemistry with 45% teaching, 45% research, 5% service and 5% advising responsibilities. She graduated six Ph.D. and three M.S. students and is currently mentoring three Ph.D. and three M.S. students. Her published scholarly work includes 38 peer-reviewed research articles cited over 1.5 thousand times in high-impact journals such as Oecologia, Biogeochemistry, Soil Science Society of America Journal, Soil Biology and Biochemistry, and Forest Ecology and Management. She received over 1.2 million dollars as a lead PI and has been involved in research grants amounting to over 11.5 million dollars. She is internationally recognized for her work in resilient agriculture and has proven to be an excellent adviser to individuals from underrepresented groups in agriculture and STEM disciplines. For this, she was awarded the UW CoANR Outstanding Educator Award in 2019 and UW CoANR Outstanding Adviser Award in 2011.

Currano, Ellen Professor

Ellen D. Currano (Ph.D.) was appointed to the Botany (75%) and Geology & Geophysics (25%) faculty in 2014. Professor Currano studies fossil plants in order to understand how forests responded to ancient climate change, with special focus on the fossils of Wyoming. She has taught classes in paleontology, as well as general biology. She is co-founder of The Bearded Lady Project: Challenging the Face of Science, an award-winning science-art collaboration that examines gender bias in STEM.

Kara Carnes-Holt (Ph.D.) joined the College of Education faculty in 2010. She is a professional counselor, a registered play therapist, and approved play therapy supervisor (RPT-S). She is also the founder and director of the Rocky Mountain Center of Play Therapy Studies at the University of Wyoming. Dr. Carnes-Holt has special interests in utilizing humanistic play therapy, Child Parent Relationship Therapy, and expressive arts interventions as they utilize the therapeutic relationship as the primary and foundational agent of change for children, adolescents, and their families. Dr. Carnes-Holt has traveled internationally to train individuals in play therapy, coordinates a biennial play therapy conference that features high caliber speakers in the field of play therapy, developed an online play therapy certificate program, and served as the conference chair for 2 years for

the International Association of Play Therapy. Teaching and mentoring students is top priority for Dr. Carnes-Holt and ratings on course evaluations are considered well above average for the College of Education with most ratings between 4.5-5.0 related to quality of instructor and quality of course. Dr. Carnes-Holt strives to develop research projects that inform clinical practice and integrate these findings into current teaching. During her 12 years as a counselor educator, Dr. Carnes-Holt has comprised over 25 publications including 10 book chapters and clinical treatment manuals, over 15 peer reviewed journal articles, and exceeded over 75 presentations. Dr. Carnes-Holt is the program coordinator for the Counseling program, serves on the College of Education tenure and promotion committee and other service activities such as the faculty dispute resolution committee for the University and students appeals.

Manyak, Patrick Professor

Patrick Manyak (Ph.D.) joined the College of Education faculty in 2001 and was promoted to associate professor in 2007. Since joining UW, Patrick has published 20 peer-reviewed articles, 19 of which are in top quartile journals, and has an additional two papers currently under review. In addition, he co-edited a book and has authored six book chapters. Patrick served as the editor of the English Learner department of the International Literacy Association's widely read journal, The Reading Teacher, for four years and contributed seven columns to the journal during this period. Patrick received the 2002 Distinguished Paper Award from the Northern Rocky Mountain Educational Research Association, the Mary Garland Research Fellowship from the College of Education in 2005-06, and the Everett D. and Elizabeth M. Lantz Distinguished Professorship in Education from 2020-2022. In 2009 he received a three-year 1.75 million dollar grant from the Institute of Educational Science to pursue research to develop and implement multifaceted vocabulary instruction in high-needs schools and is currently preparing another IES grant proposal. He has also received research grants from the University of Wyoming Grant-in-Aid, the UW Literacy Research Center and Clinic, and the UW School of Teacher Education. Patrick has an excellent teaching record at the undergraduate and graduate levels and has led the development of key programs in the School of Teacher Education, such as the Literacy Education minor and Literacy Endorsement Certificate. He currently serves as the Coordinator of the Elementary Education, Literacy Endorsement, and MA in Education with Concentration in Literacy programs. He is active in chairing committees for doctoral and master's students, with 10 successful Ph.D. and 30 M.A. graduates. Patrick has served on the Literacy Research Association's Student Research Award and Diversity Committees was an invited member of the National Reading First Higher Education Consortium from 2007-2009 and has served on several committees at the UW. Patrick's research, teaching, and service have directly enhanced the educational experience of public-school students in the state of Wyoming, and he has established a solid international reputation as a researcher in the field of literacy education.

Dr. Dai has secured over \$700,000 in grant funding as a PI or co-PI from agencies, including the National Science Foundation and Wyoming INBRE. Dr. Dai's current research includes jump-landing biomechanics and anterior cruciate ligament injuries, strength and balance assessments for collegiate athletes, and exoskeleton and lower-back loading. Dr. Dai serves as an associate editor for one journal and is an editorial board member for two journals. Dr. Dai received teaching and research awards from the College of Health Sciences and the UW Mid-Career Graduate Faculty Mentor Award.

Schumaker, Brant Professor

Brant Schumaker (D.V.M., M.P.V.M., Ph.D.) has been a tenure-track faculty member since October 2010. Dr. Schumaker has published 29 peer-reviewed journal articles and acquired nearly \$4-million in grant funding to support his research. He has given 116 presentations at regional/national and international meetings, of which 18 were invited talks. Dr. Schumaker's research focuses on infectious disease epidemiology with a specific focus on diseases which transmit between species. During his nearly twelve years at UW, Dr. Schumaker has taught epidemiology to undergraduate, graduate, and professional students. Dr. Schumaker played an important role in the University of Wyoming and State's response to the COVID-19 pandemic, devoting hundreds of hours to testing, tracing, data analysis, and vaccination efforts. For this work he was honored with a Meritorious Service Award from UW Academic Affairs. In 2021, Dr. Schumaker joined the WWAMI medical education program as its director, where he leads the basic science and clinical medicine curriculum for first- and second-year medical students. She continues to be the primary instructor for the children's literature courses in the college. In 2018 she was nominated by students, and then selected to receive the Promoting Intellectual Engagement (PIE) award at the university. Ms. Wofford is a Speech Language Pathologist, appointed as an assistant lecturer with the Wyoming Institute for Disabilities (WIND) and co-manager of the Wyoming Assistive Technology Resources (WATR). Ms. Wofford provides professional development in assistive technology (AT) and augmentative and alternative communication (AAC) to University of Wyoming students, professionals, individuals with disabilities, and family members throughout the state. Ms. Wofford has been instrumental in developing a collaborative tiered assessment model with professionals from across the state to provide for increased access to AT and AAC. Her advocacy work has provided for policy changes within the Wyoming State Medicaid program, allowing for increased access to communication systems for individuals with complex communication needs. Ms. Wofford looks forward to continuing to develop relationships and professional development opportunities with the UW community, professionals, individuals with disabilities, and family members throughout the state of Wyoming.

John Willford (Ph.D.) has been a faculty member since August 2014 with primary job duties (70-87.5% of job description) focusing on instruction. During his time as a faculty member, Dr. Willford has taught over 3,000 students in General Biology, a large, entry-level course and has taught hundreds of additional students in the nine other courses he has taught for UW ranging from first-semester, high-risk freshmen to first-year medical students. For his instructional efforts, Dr. Willford has received 12 student-nominated UW teaching awards and one staff-nominated UW teaching award.
