Partial Consolidation of Faculty in Crane Hall

The need for space to handle growth of the Haub School of ENR that has been distributed in as many as 8 different buildings on campus has been partially but significantly satisfied by a move of many faculty into the 1st and 2nd Floor of Crane Hall. While we hope to eventually be part of a new facility, the current consolidation that removed faculty from Bureau of Mines and Ross Hall has already improved interaction and a sense of team.

Wyoming Outdoor Recreation, Tourism, and Hospitality (WORTH) Initiative Updates

- In consultation with Deans Beaulier and Koprowski, President Seidel, and VP Chitnis, the WORTH Initiative is considering a change to an Institute under Research and Economic Development (RED). Interim Director Dan McCoy presented this possible change to faculty senate. The move will likely align the WORTH budget currently under the Provost to RED.
