Academic Programs

- We are expanding our online graduate offerings with two new fully online certificates: one in environment and natural resources law and policy, and another in collaborative practice.
 - The **environment and natural resources law and policy certificate** equips students with foundational knowledge of environmental laws and regulatory systems governing public lands, wildlife, water and energy. Designed for those seeking practical legal and policy training without pursuing a full law degree, the certificate draws on the Haub School's and UW College of Law's expertise in natural resources law. <u>www.uwyo.edu/haub/academics/graduate-students/enr-law-and-policy-online.html</u>
 - The **collaborative practice certificate** addresses the growing demand for professionals who can lead stakeholder-driven processes and build consensus on complex resource conflicts. Students competed for a share of \$20,000 in cash prizes. The handson competition was designed to empower students with practical skills, industry exposure, and professional experience. The Haub School undergraduate students (**Elisabeth Ressler, Savannah Avey, Kara Waskowiak, and Brielle Fitzgibbon**) on the winning team pitched using the Hilton Garden Inn Laramie as an experiential learning space and pitched using the hotel's shuttle service to support those in need in Albany County.
