In line with the 2023+ Strategic Plan, the University of Wyoming continues to advance experiential learning as a central part of the student experience, intentionally bridging academic theory and real-world application. Through a diverse array of opportunities, including internships, community-engaged learning, undergraduate research, and project-based coursework, UW is expanding access to high-impact practices that deepen student engagement, strengthen skills, and enhance career readiness.

Over the past year, UW has made meaningful progress in scaling and clarifying experiential learning across programs. Efforts have included identifying and tracking experiential learning opportunities within the curriculum and strengthening partnerships with external organizations to expand internship and applied learning pathways. This work aligns closely with broader institutional priorities, including workforce development, student retention, and post-graduate success. EXECUTIVE

SUMMARY:

UW students have a strong track record of successfully competing in the NSF Graduate Research Fellowship Program. Although REDD provides training for applying for GRFPs, faculty mentoring is paramount to our students’ success in this highly coveted fellowship opportunity.

The purpose of GRFP is to help ensure the quality, vitality, and strength of the scientific and engineering workforce of the United States. The program recognizes and supports outstanding graduate students in NSF-supported science, technology, engineering, and mathematics disciplines who are pursuing research-based master’s and doctoral degrees at accredited, non-profit United States institutions of higher education. Since 1952, NSF has funded Graduate Research Fellowships. More than 40 Fellows have gone on to become Nobel laureates, and more than 450 have become members of the National Academy of Sciences.

Fellowships provide the student with a three-year annual stipend of \$37,000 along with a \$16,000 cost of education allowance accepted by the institution as payment in lieu of all tuition and mandatory fees (there is no cost to the student).

In 2026, four UW undergraduate students and three graduate students received GRFPs. One of the undergraduate students will continue her graduate studies at UW. This is significantly higher number than universities with similar size around us (e.g. Idaho, Montana or Dakota universities). CSU had only five undergraduate and three graduate students receiving GRFPs.

This presentation from the Boothby lab led by Thomas Boothby showcases a Wyoming student mentored in his lab, accepted into the GRFP program and her acceptance into PhD research at the University of Wyoming.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

In keeping with its 2023+ Strategic Plan, particularly Goals 1 (Enhance Student Success), 2 (Pursue Institutional Excellence), and 3 (Provide a Supportive Community), UW has developed multiple pathways for faculty, staff, and students to grow their leadership capabilities. During this presentation, four cohort-based leadership programs will be featured. A description of each program follows. A facilitator and participant from each program will provide an overview of their experience and the impact the program has had on their leadership development.

The UW Leadership Academy is an immersive experience for high-achieving UW students from all disciplines with a passion for leadership, innovation, and collaboration. Through this program, students explore Wyoming industries, connect with civic and business leaders, and develop and grow leadership skills.

The Ranch Management and Agricultural leadership (RMAL) program, which teaches legacy ranch management skills, includes a distinctive “Leadership Series” that is open to all UW students. The RMAL Leadership Series is also being presented through leadership seminars and training across campus for faculty, staff, and student groups on an ad hoc basis, and is conducting leadership training externally for industry and educational professionals.

The Faculty Leadership Institute’s objective is to develop faculty leadership skills and prepare faculty for leadership roles in academic administration and research. The curriculum blends individual leadership development and higher-ed specific applications, including leadership self-assessment, ethics, conflict management, law, finance, strategic planning, and external stakeholder relations.

The mission of the Presidential Leadership Institute is to empower UW’s talented staff to become exceptional leaders. PLI provides training in core leadership competencies including communication, team building, conflict management, and problem solving.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

At the September 2025 Board of Trustees meeting, Chairman Brown asked Trustees Greear, Walters, and Fall to review W.S. 21-17-109 (related to the University of Wyoming’s course of training and education in the field of professional health services including and limited to medicine, dentistry, veterinary, optometry or nursing) and the University of Wyoming’s Medical Education contract template.

On April 12, 2023, the Board of Trustees approved modifications to the template. The ad hoc Board committee was asked to determine whether they recommend additional changes to the template, specifically the following section:

Article V(b): The following circumstances may also be considered for cancellation purposes upon petition by the Student to the Review Committee:

- i. The Student's medical practice is physically located in Wyoming and consists of 100% telehealth practice.
- ii. The Student engages in part-time practice physically located in the state of Wyoming but less than 50%.
- iii. The Student is engaged in full-time practice physically located within the state of Wyoming but does not live in Wyoming.
- iv. The Student resides in Wyoming and is engaged in full-time professional pursuits within Wyoming.

In order to qualify for loan cancellation under section b (i)-(iii) the Student must also demonstrate with appropriate documentation that their practice is meeting a need in their Wyoming community due to a lack of access to the type of care they provide.

The committee met on October 10, 2025, and after reviewing all relevant materials and discussing with the College of Health Sciences Dean, the committee recommends that no further changes need to be made to the template language at this time. However, the committee discussed possible

guidance that could be provided to assist the College of Health Sciences Wyoming Medical Education Contract Review Committee, the College of Health Sciences Dean, the President, and the Board of Trustees when making decisions regarding requests for loan cancellation pursuant to Article V Section (b) of the Wyoming Medical Education Contract template.

The Committee unanimously recommends the following:

- 1) Partial year service should not satisfy any of the Article V(b) loan cancellation criteria; all criteria must be evaluated for annual periods of practice only. For example, service for seven (7) months of the year would not receive any credit for that period of service.
- 2) To be considered for loan cancellation under Article V(b)(i) and (ii), the practitioner must not only provide services in Wyoming but must also reside in Wyoming.

The Committee did not fully agree on additional guidance for V(b)(ii)-(iv); therefore, they recommend those come to the Board each time for dialogue and discussion.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

Per the UW Board of Trustees *Annual Schedule of Items to Approve, Discuss, or Report*, housekeeping modifications to UW regulations are scheduled for January. At the request of Faculty Senate, this was tabled to allow an extension of time for their review.

Attached are proposed housekeeping modifications to the following regulations:

UW Regulations 6-1 (Design, Construction, and Naming of Buildings), 6-7 (Space Assignment and Management), 6-8 (Acquisition, Retention or Disposal of Real Property), and 6-10 (University of Wyoming Public Art)

- In July 2023, the University's Internal Audit completed an audit of the University's capital construction processes. The report noted in its findings that the Section 6 UW Regulations had not been updated to reflect an April 2023 reorganization of the Finance and Administration Division. At that time, the University placed responsibility for the capital construction processes with the newly created position of Vice President for Campus Operations and the units that report to him. The University Board of Trustees approved changes in the past year to UW Regulation 6-4 (Use of University Buildings, Grounds and Services) to address firearms on campus and UW Regulation 6-9 (Project Development Policy and Procedure for UW Capital Construction Projects), which included making the appropriate housekeeping updates regarding the role change. There are no needed housekeeping updates for UW Regulation 6-6 (Regulating Smoking) or UW Regulation 6-11 (Standard Administrative Policies and Procedures-Facilities).
- Per the University's *Policies and Procedures Vetting Process* and UW Regulation 1-4 (Shared Governance), these draft modifications were sent to the Policy Review Group (VPs, Deans, Faculty Senate, Staff Senate, ASUW, Internal Auditor) for review and feedback. Only one minor cleanup edit from the College of Arts and Sciences was received and incorporated.

BACKGROUND AND POLICY CONTEXT OF ISSUE:

Wyoming Statute § 21-17-203 requires that the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees execute a bond “with approved sureties in double the sum likely to come into his hands, for the faithful discharge of his duties.” Because the Treasurer of the Board does not have access to any of the University’s bank accounts, and therefore does not have access to any University funds, it is not necessary to execute a bond to remain in compliance with the statute.

W.S. § 21-17-203 also states that “the board may from time to time appoint and authorize a person to examine and approve for payment all legal claims against the corporation. The person shall give bond with surety approved by the board, payable to the state of Wyoming in such sum as the board may fix, conditioned for the faithful performance of his duties.”

Per Section 6-2 of the Bylaws of the Trustees, the “Deputy Treasurer shall be nominated by the President of the University for appointment by the Trustees, shall be an officer of the University of Wyoming whose duties include responsibility for the receipt, custody, and expenditure of all funds of the University of Wyoming not held by the State Treasurer, and shall exercise the same responsibility with respect to any funds or monies of the Trustees of the University of Wyoming.”

Per UW Regulation 1-1, the Board has appointed the Vice President for Budget and Finance as the Deputy Treasurer: “In accordance with the Bylaws, the head of Budget and Finance shall serve as the Deputy Treasurer of the Trustees of the University of Wyoming, and shall exercise all duties and responsibilities incident to this position, including the receipt, custody and recording of all monies or funds payable to the Trustees, the Treasurer, the University, or any of its colleges, divisions, or departments and the disbursement or investment of such funds and monies as authorized by the Trustees.”

Additionally, UW DAP 7-9.1 (Receipt and Handling of University Funds) includes the following policy regarding electronic payments from a University bank account:

Automated Clearing House (ACH) payments may only be initiated by the University's Accounting Office using the bank's customer portal, which enhances the security of the transaction by the layered security features offered by these interfaces. Authorized signors will not initiate ACH payments in person at any bank branch except in limited cases. In those limited cases that an ACH would need to

be initiated in-person at a bank branch, the Deputy Vice President for Budget and Finance or the Associate Vice President for Finance will accompany one of the authorized Accounting Office Personnel.

Wire transactions will only be initiated by authorized individuals within the Accounting Office by delivery of a letter which shall include wire details to the bank. Once in receipt of this letter, the bank will confirm the wire and amount with another authorized individual within the Accounting Office.

Wire transactions for investing purposes will only be initiated by the authorized individuals within Financial Affairs on the bank's customer portal to take advantage of the layered security features offered in these interfaces. In the case that UW's operating bank is not accessible due to technical difficulties, the steps required to initiate a wire transaction for operating purposes listed in the previous paragraph will be followed.

The overnight cash institution is only authorized to wire funds to UW's operating bank account. Wires out of the overnight cash institution are deposited directly into the general fund bank account. In the case the online customer portal for overnight cash is not accessible due to technical difficulties; the Financial Affairs personnel may call the overnight cash institution to initiate the wire transaction into the general fund bank account.

The University of Wyoming Accounting Office maintains a listing of recurring wires that occur either monthly or several times per year to increase control and monitoring of these transactions. These recurring wire transactions will only be initiated by the authorized individuals within the Accounting Office on the bank's customer portal, so that that enhanced layered security features offered by the interface are utilized. In the case that a recurring wire transaction would need to be initiated in-person at a bank branch, the Deputy Vice President for Budget and Finance or the Associate Vice President for Finance will accompany one of the authorized individuals within the Accounting Office.

With these controls in place, the University recommends the Vice President for Budget and Finance continue to execute a bond in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000.00) in accordance with W.S. § 21-17-203.

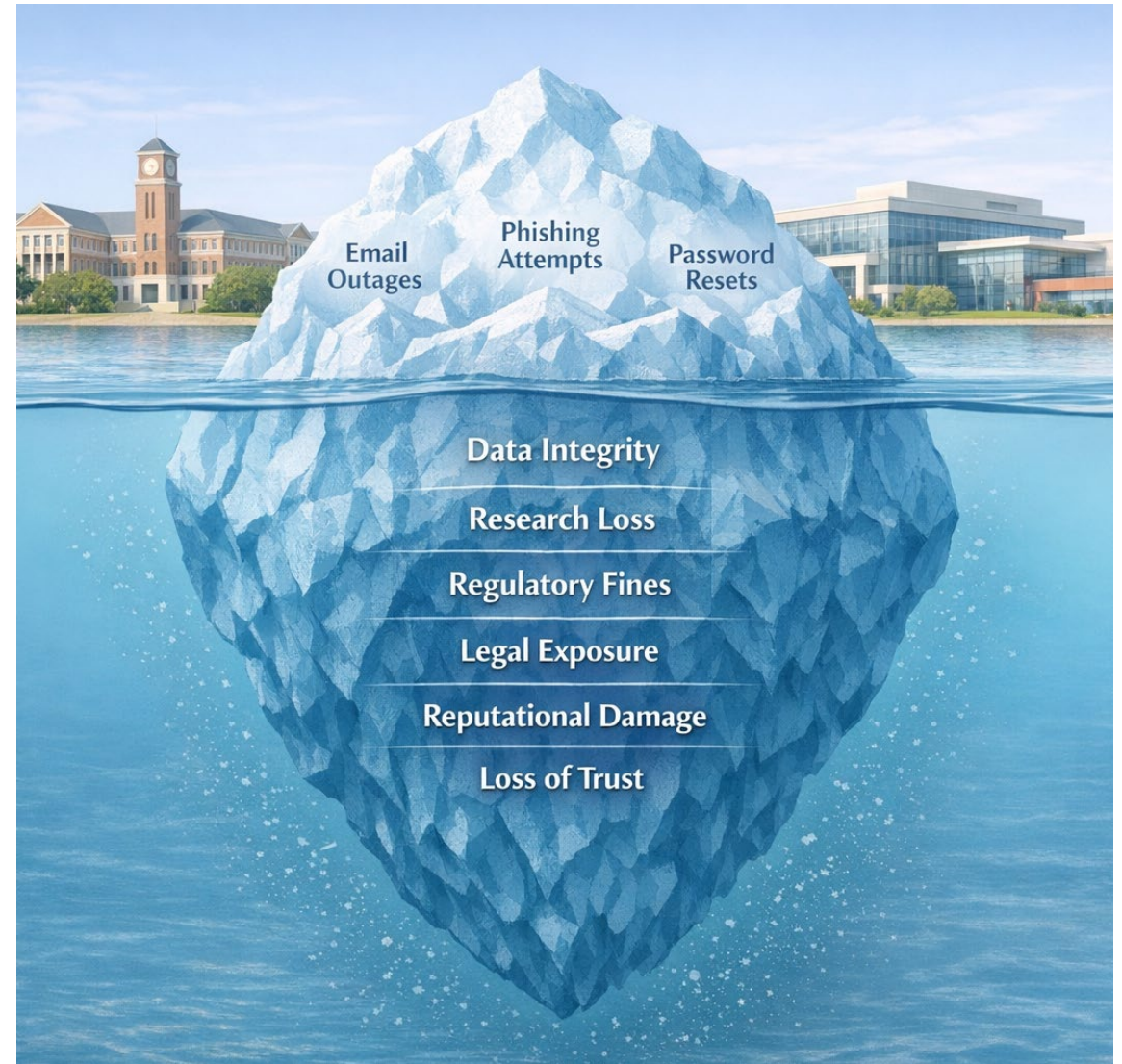

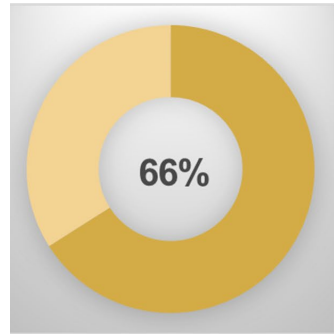

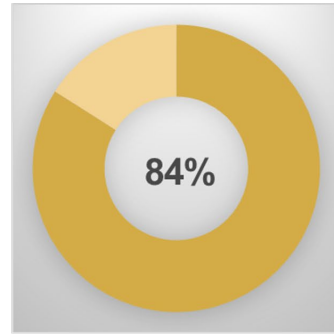




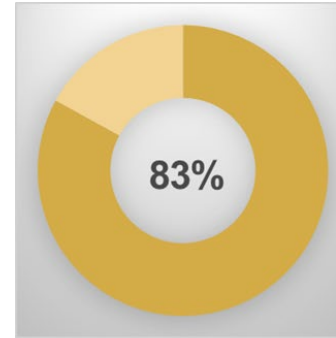
Organizations hit by ransomware in 2021 and 2022.¹



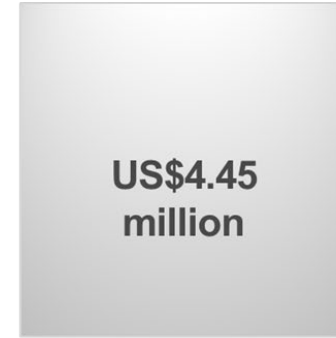
Organizations who conducted phishing simulations in 2022.²

Average cost of a data breach in 2023.

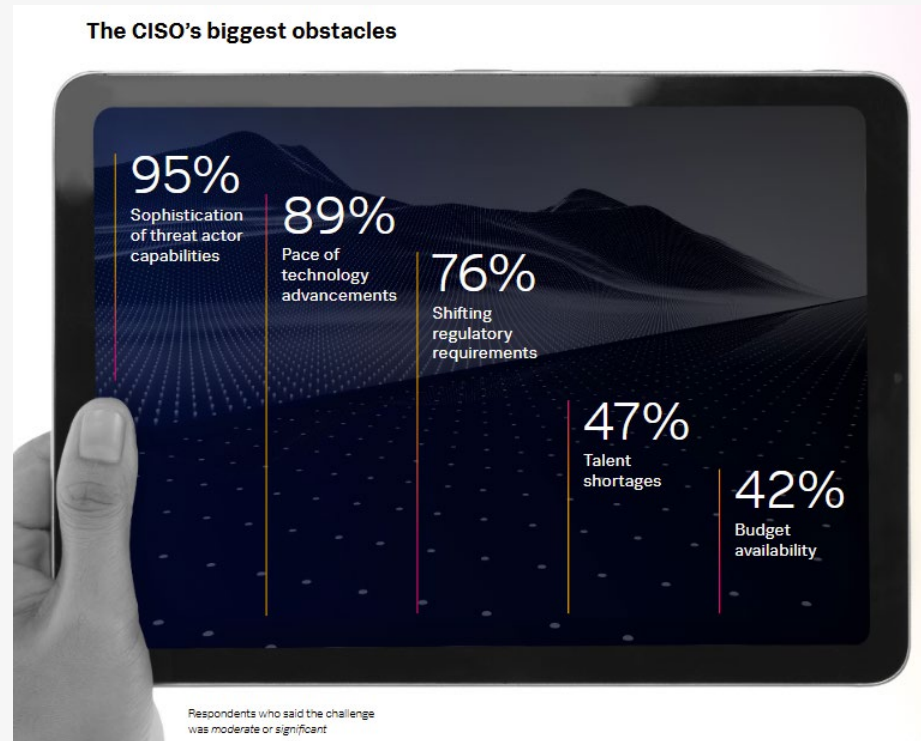


Average cost of a ransomware attack, not including the cost of the ransom.

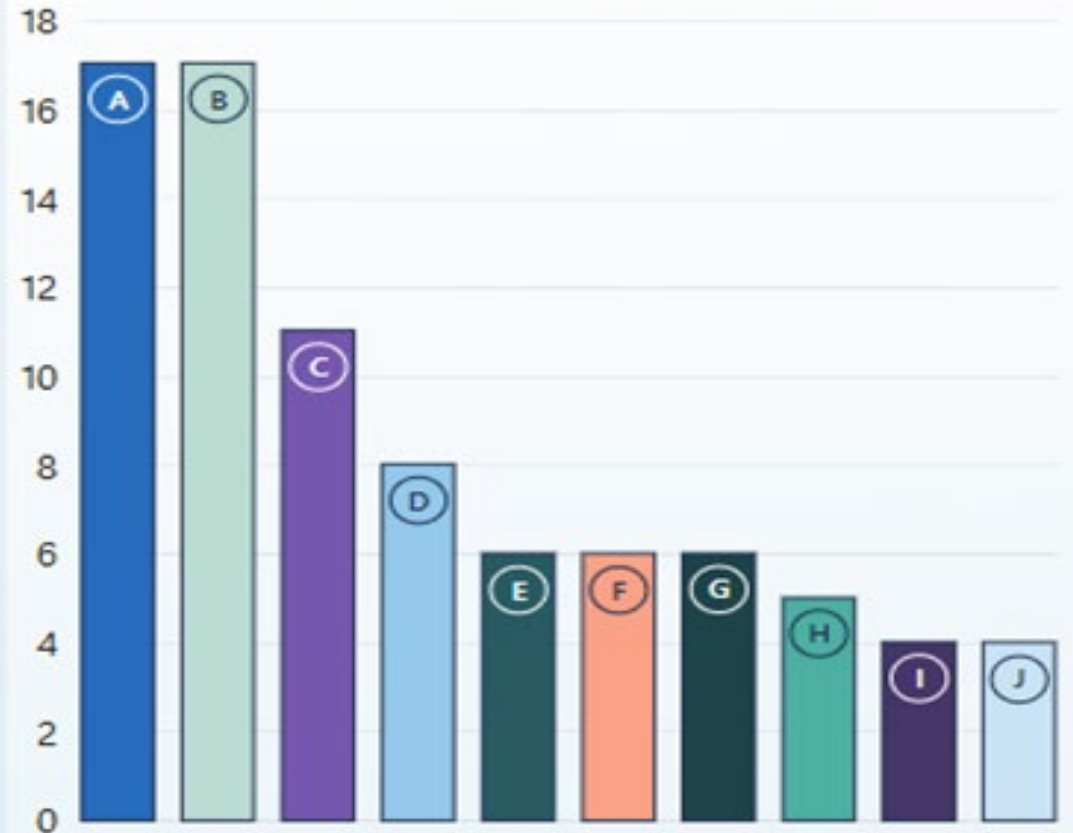

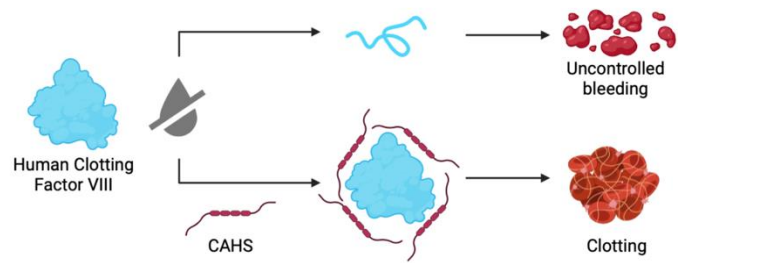

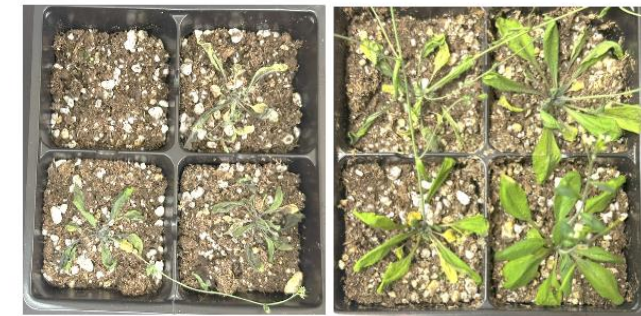

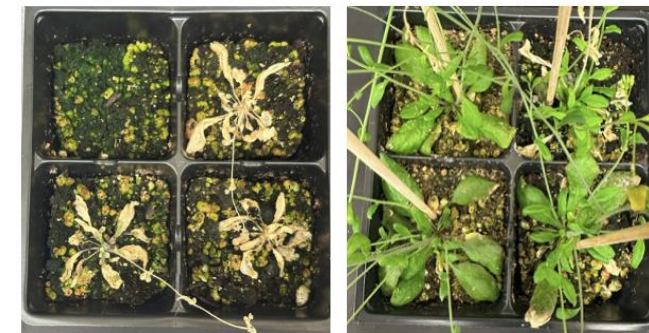

The Human Microbiome

- Trillions of microbes live in and on the human body
- Highest concentration in the gut
- Essential for:

If microbes can tune host metabolism, they can plausibly tune stress outcomes.

Expanding How We Study The Tardigrade

- *Ramazzottius varieornatus*
- Survives desiccation, radiation, vacuum
- Traditionally studied as an individual
- Question: what role does the system play?
- Hypothesis: microbes contribute metabolites/functions that buffer stress or aid recovery
- Prediction: desiccation triggers reproducible shifts in community and/or function

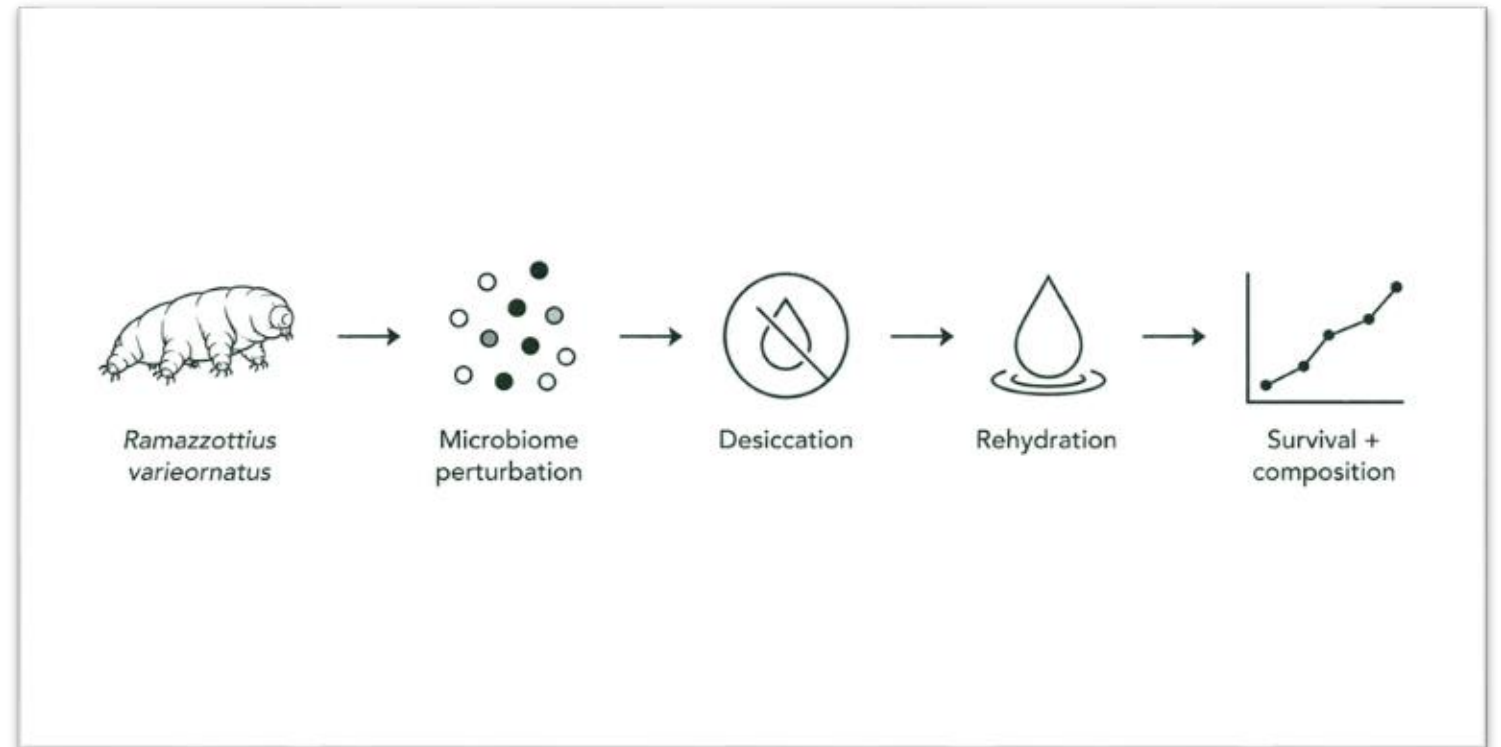


Why Study the Tardigrade Microbiome?

- Tardigrades encode molecular systems for extreme stress survival

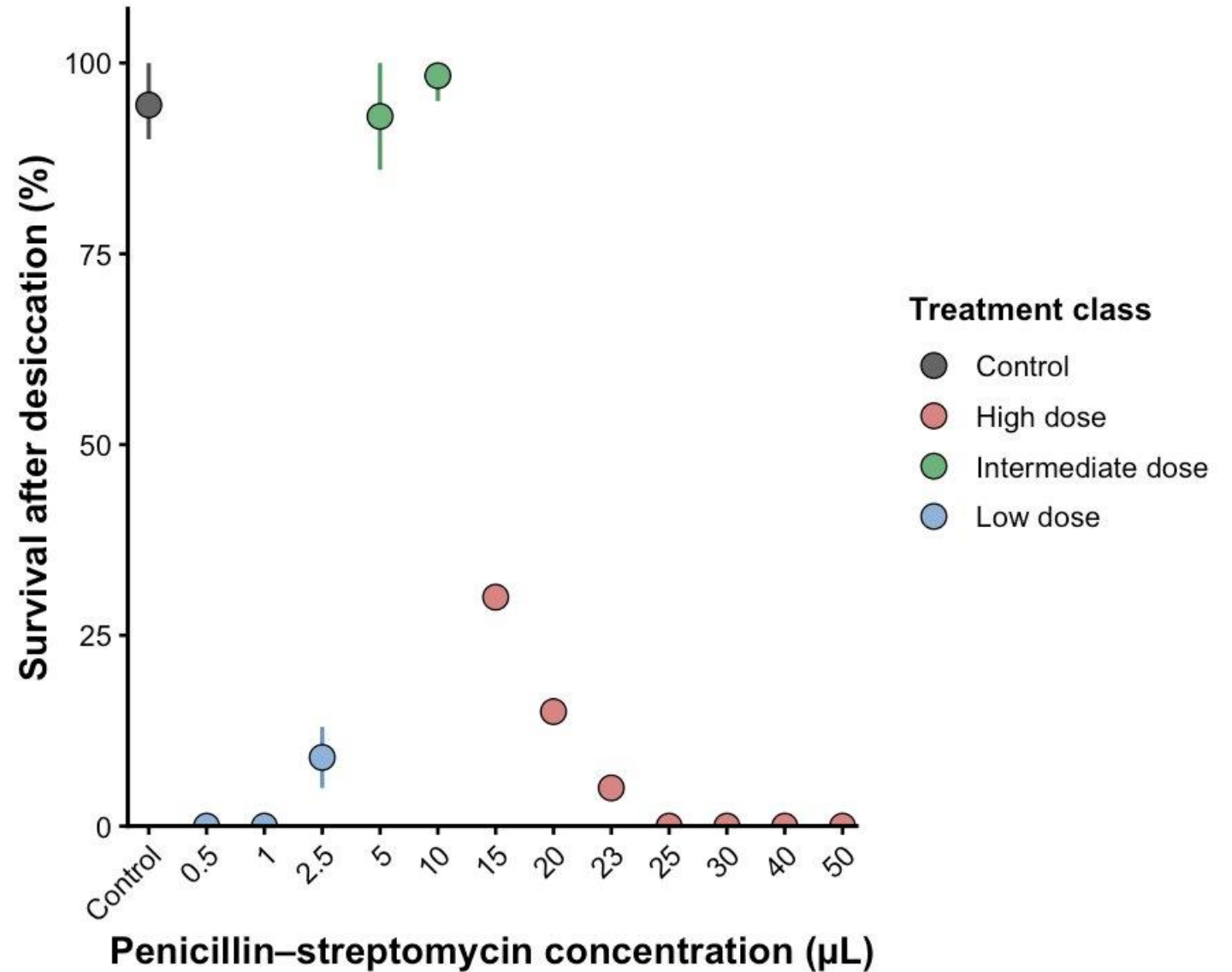

Article 1. In General (Refs & Annos)

W.S.1977 § 21-17-109

§ 21-17-109. Course in field of professional health services; authority to offer; contracts with students; repayment of funds expended; deposit of repayments

Currentness

(a) In addition to other powers heretofore granted to the trustees of the University of Wyoming, the board may offer and provide, in whole or in part at the university or in whole or in part at other institutions, universities or colleges within or without the state, a course of training and education in the field of professional health services including and limited to medicine, dentistry, veterinary, optometry or nursing.

(b) To accomplish the purposes hereof and in order that degrees in such fields of professional health services may be awarded by the university the board of trustees may enter into contracts with other institutions, universities or colleges within or without the state that maintain schools for the training and education of students in professional health services and to expend its funds in connection therewith.

(c) Students desiring to avail themselves of the opportunities under this section, before enrolling for such courses and having passed a competitive examination, must be approved by the president of the university acting with the advice of the respective state board in each particular field. No student shall be approved by the president unless the student or the student's father, mother or lawful guardian are residents of Wyoming and have been residents for not less than five (5) years immediately prior thereto.

(d) In addition to the requirements of subsection (c) of this section, before expending any funds the board of trustees shall obtain an agreement from each student whereby the student agrees to:

(i) Authorize the state of Wyoming to pay all or a portion of the cost of attendance incurred in his or her medical education as determined by any contract between the state of Wyoming and the school of medicine providing that education; and

(ii) Actively engage in professional practice or other professional pursuits in Wyoming for not to exceed three (3) years as the board requires. The taking of a family practice residency program in the state shall be credited toward the practice requirements at the rate of one-third ($\frac{1}{3}$) year of practice for each year of service in a family practice residency program in the state; or

(iii) Repay all amounts expended by the state of Wyoming under paragraph (i) of this subsection on the student's education, together with interest which shall begin accruing after the student's residency but in no event later than eight (8) years after the student enters into an agreement, upon terms specified by the board. However, interest shall begin to accrue if the board finds that the student has withdrawn from medical school or a residency program or is otherwise not making satisfactory progress toward completion of the degree or program. Money expended under this subsection shall accrue at an annual interest rate equal to that charged for federal Stafford loans at the time interest begins to accrue, which rate shall be adjusted annually to match the federal Stafford loan rate. In no event shall the interest rate be greater than eight percent (8%);

(iv) Repealed by [Laws 2011, ch. 176, § 2, eff. March 3, 2011](#).

(e) Any amounts, other than fees and tuition payments, paid by medical students in accordance with the contractual arrangements authorized under this section shall be deposited into a special fund designated the Medical School Student Fund, maintained and separately accounted for by the University of Wyoming, which fund may be added to by specific contributions from other sources. The fund may be invested, at the discretion of the president of the University of Wyoming and the dean of the College of Health Sciences, for the production of income. The investment income shall be expended by the University of Wyoming solely for direct assistance for relocation costs associated with practice in Wyoming, fees and materials for medical board examinations, rural training, dislocation, student development and scholarships to medical students as authorized by the president of the University of Wyoming and the dean of the College of Health Sciences. The principal of the fund established shall remain unimpaired and only the

income derived therefrom may be collected and expended from year to year. The amount of income expended annually pursuant to this section shall not exceed an amount equal to four percent (4%) of the previous five (5) year average market value of the fund, calculated from the first day of the fiscal year. Any unexpended income shall remain in the fund. On or before October 1 of each year, the university shall submit a report to the joint appropriations committee and the joint labor, health and social services interim committee on income to the fund and expenditures from fund earnings during the prior fiscal year.

(f) Upon recommendation of the president of the university, the board of trustees may relieve a student of the obligation to repay amounts expended under paragraph (d)(i) of this section, in whole or in part, where repayment would cause undue hardship. The university shall annually report the number of students relieved from repayment under this subsection to the joint labor, health and social services interim committee not later than October 1.

(g) Tuition and fees received by the University of Wyoming from students participating in the medical education program under this section, shall be separately accounted for by the university. These funds are to be used by the university solely for the support of education and training conducted at the university pursuant to this section. The receipt and expenditure of these funds shall be identified in the university's biennial budget request.

Wyoming Medical Education Contract

This contract is made by and between the University of Wyoming (University) and <<First>> <<Middle>> <<Last>> (Student).

WHEREAS, University is authorized by Wyoming Statute 21-17-109 to administer a contract support program for medical students; and

WHEREAS, certain terms are specified by statute and others are left to the discretion of the University Board of Trustees; and

WHEREAS, Student desires to attend medical school under the terms specified by the contract and in accordance with Wyoming statutes and any guidelines which may be established by the Board of Trustees of the University.

NOW THEREFORE, in exchange for the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, University and Student agree as follows:

I. DEFINITIONS

- a. Professional Practice: Practicing medicine as defined under Wyoming statutes.
- b. Professional Pursuits: Employment requiring a medical degree and determined by the University, in its sole discretion, to be a professional pursuit.
- c. Costs of Medical Education: All funds paid by the University of Wyoming through the Medical Education Contract Program on behalf of Wyoming students participating in a medical education contract program.
- d. Contract Support Payments: Funds required to be paid by Student annually during years two through four of their enrollment in the Medical Education Contract Program. These three payments will be considered loan payments that will reduce the balance of their medical education loan.
- e. Full-Time Professional Practice: For students in shift-work positions (e.g., hospitalists, ER physicians), full-time professional practice consists of at least 96 hours of clinical care per month. For non-shift work, full-time professional practice consists of a minimum of 40 hours of work per week with at least 24 hours per week of clinical duties.
- f. Full-Time Professional Pursuits: Employed in a position that requires an MD and a minimum of 40 hours of work per week.
- g. Review Committee: A standing review committee of at least three individuals shall be appointed by the Dean of the College of Health Sciences, to be constituted from leadership within the College.
- h. Board: The University of Wyoming Board of Trustees.

- i. School: University of Washington School of Medicine (UWSOM).
- j. Enrolled: The period of time commencing with acceptance and matriculation into a medical education program and ending with the awarding of a M.D. degree. (Students are considered enrolled in medical school until they complete the M.D. degree, whether they are engaged or not engaged in the academic pursuits that are required for completion of the medical degree. A student's enrollment will cease when the student agrees to permanently withdraw from the UWSOM medical education program, or when the UWSOM unilaterally disenrolls a student, in writing).
- k. Agreement: The Wyoming Medical Education Contract.
- l. ACGME: Accreditation Council for Graduate Medical Education. Responsible for the accreditation of most MD medical training programs in the United States.
- m. Residency Program: The first ACGME approved residency program following graduation from medical school and a second ACGME residency or fellowship program following graduation, where the second program is two years or less in length.

II. PROVISION OF MEDICAL EDUCATION

- a. The University will contract with selected medical school(s) [currently UWSOM] for the provision of medical education to students who meet Wyoming statutory guidelines and University and medical school admission guidelines.
- b. The University shall pay, directly to UWSOM, such sum of money as required by contracts between said school and the University for the educational costs of Wyoming residents who are accepted by the medical school in accordance with such contracts. Funds for these payments will be drawn from appropriations of the Wyoming State Legislature and subsequent appropriations as may be approved for the support of contracts for the medical education of Wyoming residents. Student understands and agrees that payments on his/her behalf shall be made and continued only so long as appropriations for such purposes are provided by the Legislature of the State of Wyoming.
- c. The Student shall pay to the University annual Contract Support Payments during years two through four of their medical education.
- d. The Student shall be obligated to pay directly to School any fee required by School to hold a place or position for Student at the time of approval for admission. Upon matriculation, any such fee paid by Student to the School will be refunded by the School Directly to Student. Student understands that it is his/her sole responsibility to apply to School for refund of any such fee.
- e. The University of Wyoming Medical Education Contract is designed to be a four (4) year education program. Students are expected to complete their M.D. degree within four years, though the years do not necessarily have to be consecutive. Exceeding the standard of four years of medical school training can occur because of poor academic performance or deviating from the standard four-year curriculum. Students who take longer than four years to complete their medical education may be responsible for their own out-of-state tuition costs as established by

the School and/or its University and all the medical school expenses for any additional time to complete the program.

- f. All requests for lengthening the normal consecutive four years of medical school training must be forwarded to the Review Committee with supporting documentation. These requests could include time for additional training such as Masters in Public Health or business administration, personal time off or financial, familial and/or personal health hardships. The Review Committee's determination is final.
- g. Year one of Student's medical education will be provided on the campus of University. Tuition charges for this year will be \$20,071. The payments shall be due and payable in two equal installments on or before September 30 and January 30.
- h. Yearly Contract Support Payments will be required for three (3) consecutive years starting in education year two, regardless of whether students are in the academic process of completing the M.D. requirements, engaging in other academic pursuits or engaging in other non-academic pursuits.
- i. Students are expected to engage in a residency program after completion of the M.D. degree. If Student enters a second residency program of greater than two years in length, it must first be approved by the Review Committee. Approval may be granted where the finding is that the residency or fellowship program would provide the physician additional training in a specialty for which Wyoming is underserved. A Student shall be deemed to be continuously enrolled in a residency program if the student begins a second residency or fellowship program within one year following completion of the first residency program.

III. MEDICAL EDUCATION LOAN

- a. Amounts paid by the University to the School for medical education costs in years two through four of a Student's medical education will be recorded as loan disbursements on the account of the student in the records of the University.
- b. Contract Support Payments made in years -two through four by the Student to the University will be credited against the loan balance at the time of payment.
- c. Interest shall begin accruing on the Medical Education Loan after the Student's residency, but in no event later than eight (8) years after the Student enters into this agreement. Interest shall accrue at an annual rate equal to that charged for federal Stafford loans at the time interest begins to accrue, which rate shall be adjusted annually to match the federal Stafford loan rate. In no event shall the interest rate be greater than eight percent (8%). However, interest shall begin to accrue immediately if the Board finds that the Student has withdrawn from medical school or a residency program or is otherwise not making satisfactory progress toward completion of the degree program. Further, in the event of a failure to meet a scheduled repayment of any of the installments due, the entire unpaid amount of the loan shall, at the option of the University, BECOME IMMEDIATELY DUE AND PAYABLE without any presentment, demand, or prior notice.
- d. The University shall maintain records of Costs of Medical Education made to medical school and Contract Support Payments received from Student. These records shall constitute the Student's

official loan schedule and is made a part of this contract and incorporated herein. Both parties specifically understand that the payments made to School may vary from year to year depending upon the costs of the medical education and the contract between School and the University. Upon completion of medical school a complete loan schedule will be provided to the student.

- e. In the event that support terminates before Student completes his/her medical education, Student fails to complete medical school or any other event occurs which may impair or preclude Student's ability to enter the professional practice of medicine or other professional pursuits, the Student shall remain obligated to the University for repayment of the amounts in the loan schedule that have been advanced on the Student's behalf plus applicable interest.
- f. Student shall pay to the University Contract Support Payments in the sum of \$20,874 in year 2, \$21,709 in year 3, and \$22,577 in year 4 of their medical education. This total of \$65,160 will reduce the outstanding balance of the Student's medical education loan. The payments shall be due and payable in two equal installments on or before September 30 and January 30 of each academic year Student is enrolled in medical school and receiving support pursuant to this Agreement. Failure of Student to make such payments to the University shall render the Student ineligible for further support from the University beyond that amount previously paid on behalf of the Student. Within the discretion of the Review Committee, a Student who has defaulted on his/her Contract Support Payments to the University may be reinstated to good standing and be eligible for further support if amounts in default are paid within sixty days of the due date together with the costs set forth in Section IV (a).

Student may apply to the Review Committee for an exemption or suspension of the Contract Support Payments due to undue hardship or in addition to a request for leave submitted under section II (f) of this Contract. The application for this request must be in writing, state the basis for said request and provide supporting documentation. The Review Committee's determination is final.

IV. MEDICAL EDUCATION LOAN REPAYMENT

- a. Student shall repay, as set forth herein, all financial aid under this agreement for the Student's education in the program, plus interest as specified by Wyoming statutes. In the event that Student becomes delinquent in paying charges or defaults in repaying charges, Student may be liable for attorney fees, collection fees, and any other costs incurred by University, which may include but are not limited to court costs or collection agency costs.
- b. Repayment by Student shall be made in monthly installments for a period of time not to exceed ninety-six (96) months. The repayment period shall commence one year after the date on which the Student ceases to be enrolled in a fully accredited medical school or residency program, whichever is the later as determined by the University. Monthly payments shall be calculated on

the basis of the total accumulated balance on the loan schedule, along with interest thereon as specified by Wyoming statutes, and each payment shall be as nearly equal as possible to one ninety-sixth of the total to be repaid.

- c. The Student may at his/her option prepay any amounts in excess of scheduled payments, and at Student request, the University may approve a graduated scale of installment payments.

IV. MEDICAL EDUCATION LOAN CANCELLATION

- a. If a Student resides in Wyoming and enters active full-time professional practice, that is physically located within the State of Wyoming and servicing Wyoming residents, the Student's obligation to pay to the University the scheduled installment payments shall be suspended and the balance of the loan will qualify for automatic cancellation as follows:
 - i. Upon the completion of the first year of residing in Wyoming and full-time professional practice physically located in Wyoming, one-third of the total accrued balance at that point shall be canceled. The cancellation shall apply first to interest accrued and then to principal.
 - ii. Upon completion of the second year of residing in Wyoming and full-time professional practices physically located in Wyoming, one-half of the total accrued balance at that point shall be canceled. The cancellation shall apply first to interest accrued and then to principal.
 - iii. Upon the completion of the third year of residing in Wyoming and full-time professional practice physically located in Wyoming, all remaining amounts owed to the University under the Contract, plus interest, shall be canceled.
 - iv. Upon completion of each year of residing in Wyoming and part-time professional practice s of 50% or greater physically located within the State of Wyoming the accrued balance shall be cancelled in proportion to the amount worked. The cancellation shall apply first to interest accrued and then to principal.

Residency in a family medicine residency program within the State of Wyoming shall be credited toward the practice requirement at the rate of one-third (1/3) year practice for each year of service in the residency program.

During any period of full-time professional practice or other full-time professional pursuits within the State of Wyoming, the obligation to make monthly installment payments shall be suspended, however, interest shall continue to accrue.

The University makes no guarantee or other representation as to the availability of professional practice or other professional pursuit positions in future years in Wyoming and the Student shall be responsible for seeking such opportunities. However, Student agrees to allow the University to release contact information to the Wyoming Medical Society, Wyoming Health Resource Network, and other Wyoming healthcare entities for the purposes of investigating professional practice opportunities in Wyoming.

- b. The following circumstances may also be considered for cancellation purposes upon petition by the Student to the Review Committee:

- i. The Student's medical practice is physically located in Wyoming and consists of 100% telehealth practice.
- ii. The Student engages in part-time practice physically located in the state of Wyoming but less than 50%
- iii. The Student is engaged in full-time practice physically located within the state of Wyoming but does not live in Wyoming.
- iv. The Student resides in Wyoming and is engaged in full-time professional pursuits within Wyoming.

In order to qualify for loan cancellation under section b (i)-(iii) the Student must also demonstrate with appropriate documentation that their practice is meeting a need in their Wyoming community due to a lack of access to the type of care they provide. The Review Committee will be responsible for setting the criteria used to assess this need and for periodically reviewing and amending the criteria when appropriate. To request cancellation, the Student shall submit their application for the reasons and requested amount for cancellation in writing along with supporting documentation to the Review Committee. The Review Committee will make one of two determinations: a) deny the request; or, b) recommend the Student's request for cancellation and submit for further consideration by the President. If the Review Committee determines the request should be denied, the decision is final. If the Review Committee decides to recommend the cancellation, the Dean of the College of Health Sciences will forward the recommendation and request to the President. The President or his/her designee shall review the recommendation and make a determination to either deny the request or recommend the cancellation for further consideration by the Board. If the President or his/her designee determines the request should be denied, the decision is final. If the President or his/her designee decides to recommend for cancellation, he/she shall submit the recommendation for cancellation to the Board. The Board may then choose to deny the request or approve the request. The Board's determination is final. At any stage, additional information and/or documentation may be requested from the Student regarding their request for cancellation.

c. If Student begins making monthly repayment under this paragraph and is current on their loan repayments, and prior to the expiration of forty-eight (48) calendar months beginning with the calendar month in which the first repayment was due to the University, the Student is residing in Wyoming and enters active full-time professional practice, that is physically located within the State of Wyoming, the following shall occur:

- i. The obligation to make installment payments shall be suspended, however, interest shall continue to accrue.
- ii. As used in subparagraphs iii-v of this section, "total debt" means the sum of payments the Student paid to the University prior to entering active full-time professional practice physically located within the State of Wyoming, plus the remaining accrued and unpaid debt.
- iii. Upon residing in Wyoming and the completion of the first year of full-time professional practice physically located within Wyoming, an amount equal to one-third of the total debt at that point shall be canceled. The cancellation shall apply first to interest accrued, then to principal of unpaid debt, and if all accrued interest and principal has been canceled, then prior payments under this paragraph shall be refunded to Student as necessary to cancel one-third of the total debt.

- iv. Upon completion of the second year of residing in Wyoming and full-time professional practice physically located within Wyoming, one-half of the remaining total debt at that point shall be canceled. The cancellation shall apply first to interest accrued, then to principal of unpaid debt and if all accrued interest and principal has been canceled, then prior payments under this paragraph shall be refunded to the Student as necessary to cancel one-half of the remaining total debt.
 - v. Upon the completion of the third year of residing in Wyoming and full-time professional practice physically located within Wyoming, the total debt shall be canceled, including refunding all prior payments by the Student to the University under this paragraph.
- d. Upon recommendation of the President of the University, the Board may relieve Student of the obligation to repay amounts expended under this contract, in whole or in part, where repayment would cause undue hardship. Cases of undue hardship may include the following: death, total or partial permanent physical or mental disability, caring for a member of the Student's immediate family member with total or partial permanent physical or mental disability, substantial financial hardship (bankruptcy, lawsuit judgments, etc.), unforeseen catastrophic events impeding one's ability to continue to practice medicine (e.g. fire, flood, etc.) and military service. The hardship application and supporting documentation containing the basis for the request shall be sent in writing to the Review Committee who will then make a recommendation and forward the request to the President. The President or his/her designee shall review applications for hardship and make recommendations to the Board based upon criteria set forth by the President.

V. OTHER PROVISIONS

- a. Student agrees that he/she shall not enter into any other agreement or indenture with any other agency, person or entity for financial assistance while attending medical school; which agreement shall obligate Student for personal services that would hinder or prevent entry into professional medical practice within the State of Wyoming.
- b. Student states and acknowledges that he/she is an adult of sound mind, signs this agreement of his/her own free will under no duress, and at the time of signing is not under the influence of drugs or alcohol.
- c. This Agreement shall be administered by the University of Wyoming pursuant to the contract and guidelines developed by the University. Administration shall be through:

- d. Student states and acknowledges that he/she has had full opportunity to review this agreement and discuss this agreement with any person Student desires to have review the agreement, including legal counsel.

- e. This Agreement shall be interpreted in accordance with and pursuant to the laws of the State of Wyoming.
- f. The failure to enforce any term does not constitute waiver of that term for the future nor does it constitute a modification of this agreement. This agreement may only be modified in writing signed by both parties.
- g. Neither the State nor the University waives its sovereign or governmental immunity by entering into this Agreement and each fully retains all immunities and defenses provided by law with regard to any action based on this Agreement.
- h. In the event Student breaches any terms of the contract, the University may immediately cease further payments on behalf of the Student and accelerate payment on the entire unpaid amount due without any presentment, demand, or prior notice.
- i. The State of Wyoming will support the medical education of Student as described in this contract so long as the Student abides by the Student Honor code of the UWSOM, as described in the UWSOM Student Handbook. Student shall be subject to all rules and regulations of both the medical school and/or its University and the University of Wyoming.

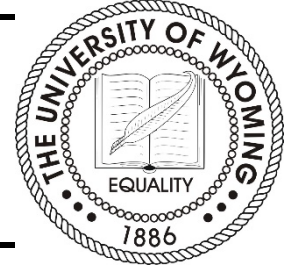

UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING REGULATIONS

Subject: Design, Construction, and Naming of Buildings

Number: UW Regulation 6-1



I. PURPOSE

To establish the guidelines for approval of design, construction, and naming of University buildings.

II. POLICY

The selection and employment of architects for the design of all buildings of the University, the adoption of plans, specifications, and details for the construction of such buildings, and the receiving of bids and awarding of contracts for design and construction of buildings shall be a function of the Board of Trustees upon recommendation of the Vice President for Campus Operations ~~Finance and Administration~~ or designee consistent with all applicable statutory requirements. Through the Vice President for Campus Operations ~~Finance and Administration~~ or designee, the Trustees shall maintain general supervision over the construction and equipping of all University buildings.

Names of buildings shall be selected by the Trustees. No building shall be named after any person actively connected with the University at the time. ~~See UW Regulation 12-2 (Naming of University Facilities, Programmatic Units, and Funded Academic Honors).~~

III. CHANGE ORDERS

The Vice President for Campus Operations ~~Finance and Administration~~ or designee is authorized to approve change orders for non-capital construction or major maintenance projects up to \$50,000. However, in no event shall the cumulative total of all changes orders for each non-capital construction or major maintenance project result in an amount that exceeds \$75,000 without Board of Trustees approval.

Approval of Change Orders for capital construction projects shall comply with UW Regulation 6-9, ~~“(Project Development Policy and Procedure for UW Capital Construction Projects).”~~ All change orders will be reported to the Trustees.

IV. PERFORMANCE AND PAYMENT BONDS

A. A faithful performance bond and a labor and materials bond, or other form of guarantee in accordance with requirements set forth below, shall be required for the construction,

major maintenance or renovation to any University building or structure or for any public work or improvement as defined in W.S. 16-6-101 when the contract price exceeds \$7,500. The bond or other form of guarantee shall be provided by the Contractor to the University after award of the contract but prior to any work commencing under the contract (W.S. 16-6-112). All bonds shall meet all Wyoming statutory requirements, be filed with the contracting department of the University, and be approved by the Office of Risk Management or designee.

B. Bonds shall be set in the following amounts:

1. For projects where the contract price exceeds \$150,000, including all amendments and change orders, the contractor shall submit a performance bond and a payment (labor and material) bond equal to 100% of the contract amount.
2. For projects between \$7,500 and \$150,000, the University may accept other forms of guarantee other than a bond, upon approval by the Vice President for Campus Operations ~~Finance and Administration~~ and when determined to be in the University's best interests.

C. The University may also require performance bonds in other types of contracts, such as material and services contracts, in order to protect the University's interests. The amount for the performance bond shall be determined by the contracting department and approved by the Director of Strategic Sourcing, Procurement, and Payment Services or designee ~~Manager of Procurement and Payment Services~~ in consultation with the Office of General Counsel.

V. ENERGY MANAGEMENT

The University shall ensure that it adheres to energy conservation and management through its design standards.

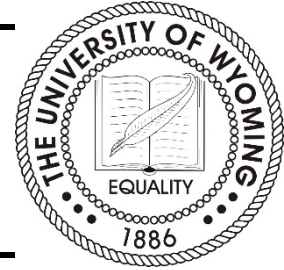

UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING REGULATIONS

Subject: Space Assignment and Management

Number: UW Regulation 6-7



I. POLICY

All University facilities, whether owned or leased, belong to the University as a whole and are considered to be an allocable resource to be utilized in the best interests of the institution. Accordingly, the proprietary interests of individual organizational units shall not exclusively define the allocation and use of campus space, especially when larger institutional interests are thereby sacrificed.

Physical space can be a limiting resource in the development, advancement and improvement of the University's academic and research programs; therefore, effective utilization of this valuable resource is essential to the success of the University, its faculty and its students. Space is a critical University-owned resource and is subject to allocation, evaluation and reallocation to meet the overall needs and priorities of the University. Stewardship of space resources is a joint effort between all University staff, faculty and student and relies upon everyone to ensure that space is used to support student success, foster collaborative research and promote positive work environments

The President has overall responsibility and authority for facilities planning and management and space allocation. This responsibility and authority have been delegated by the President to the Vice President for ~~Finance and Administration~~Campus Operations who, in consultation with the President, makes allocations of space to each of the administrative divisions. Space assigned to these administrators may be further delegated as deemed appropriate.

II. LONG-TERM SPACE REQUESTS

Divisions/Units shall submit all ongoing additional strategic space needs with the Division's proposed annual budget pursuant to UW Regulation 7-1 (Operating Budget). These requests shall be presented to the Space Allocation Committee, as designated by the President, for final action.

The Vice President for ~~Finance and Administration~~Campus Operations, as Chair of the Space Allocation Committee, shall refer all space requests that involve expenditure of funds or repurposing of space to the President, who shall make the final decision.

If Divisions/Units request additional space outside of the annual budget process, the Space Allocation Committee, in consultation with the President, shall meet as needed to

determine whether the request is warranted (i.e., critical or time-sensitive). If warranted, the Space Allocation Committee shall take final action, or refer to the President as outlined above. All space requests approved outside of the annual budget process shall be reported to the Board of Trustees during the next budget cycle.

III. ASSIGNMENT AND USE OF TEMPORARY SCHEDULED SPACES

Temporary or short-term scheduled spaces consist of all facilities not assigned long term (e.g., all instructional spaces, conference rooms, auditoria, performance rooms, University grounds, and gymnasiums available for use by the entire University community). Similar to long-term space assignments, priorities for temporary scheduled spaces shall be in accordance with University needs, not the needs of a single department, school or college. These spaces are classified in three categories:

- A. Spaces centrally scheduled through UW Operations;
- B. Spaces scheduled through the administrative office with the delegated authority for the assigned space (e.g., Wyoming Union, Intercollegiate Athletic facilities, Residence Life facilities); and
- C. Spaces where a unit is permitted scheduling priority but that can be scheduled by UW Operations after considering the needs of the priority unit. These spaces are scheduled through UW Operations.

IV. EMERGENCY SITUATION

In an emergency situation, the University's space needs, including both long-term and short-term spaces, will take priority over the needs of departments, schools or colleges.

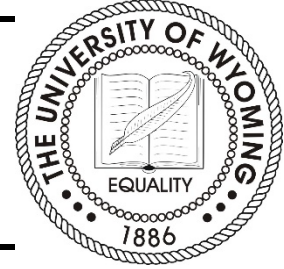

UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING REGULATIONS

Subject: Acquisition, Retention or Disposal of Real Property

Number: UW Regulation 6-8



I. PURPOSE

To establish guidelines for the acquisition, retention or disposal of real property.

II. DEFINITIONS

Disposal: Either demolition or removal of facilities and/or improvements or the sale of a facility or land.

Facility: A building or improved property owned by the University.

Land: Unimproved or agricultural property owned by the University.

No Longer Occupied: A facility or land that is not currently assigned a specific use or purpose supporting the mission of the University.

III. POLICY

It is the policy of the University of Wyoming that when land or a facility may be suitable for purchase, a facility is no longer occupied, or upon request of the University administration, an evaluation of the subject facility or land shall be made to guide decisions regarding the acquisition, retention or disposal of the facility or land.

IV. EVALUATION OF FACILITY OR LAND

A. The Vice President for ~~Finance and Administration~~Campus Operations shall establish procedures, as appropriate, to determine necessary analyses to be used in the evaluation. The analyses may include but are not limited to the following:

1. Cost-benefit analysis;
2. Site analysis;
3. Environmental analysis;
4. Needs analysis;

5. Market analysis;
 6. Title analysis; and/or
 7. Analysis of the facility's usability and flexibility.
- B.** Any evaluation regarding the acquisition, retention or disposal of real property shall be presented to the Board of Trustees Facilities Contracting Committee, who shall make a recommendation to the full Board of Trustees of the University of Wyoming for consideration.

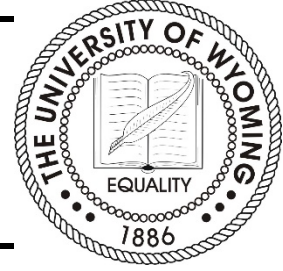

UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING REGULATIONS

Subject: University of Wyoming Public Art

Number: UW Regulation 6-10



I. PURPOSE

To outline the process for acquisitions, proposals, evaluation, and installation of public art.

II. DEFINITIONS

Defined Property: The placement of donated trees, benches, monuments, tables, and similar donated structures.

Donation: A work of public art or defined property which is donated to the University through the UW Foundation upon recommendation of the Public Art Committee and if accepted by the UW President.

Direct Selection: A work of public art purchased or commissioned from an individual artist by the University upon recommendation of the Public Art Committee.

Limited-Term Installations: Public art or defined property that may or may not be the property of the University and is installed for a specified period.

Open Competition: A work of public art selected through a competition or request for proposals for a commissioning. These commissions may include faculty, staff, students, and external artists.

Permanent Installations: Installations of public art or defined property that are the permanent property of the University and are intended to be installed for an extended period or in perpetuity.

Public Art: Art objects placed in a shared, publicly accessible space. Categories of public art may include functional, expressive, or installation art donated or commissioned, or otherwise acquired that are prominent and located in public space. Art media may include but is not limited to sculptures, painting, murals, photography, drawings, prints, mixed media, electronic media, gardens, including fountains and seating, and may include but is not limited to objects in clay, fiber, textiles, wood, metal, plastic, or other material.

Public Art Committee: The Committee that advises the President on matters relating to the selection, location, cost, financing, and installation of art and defined property in the public spaces of the university. The Committee shall consist of an Art Museum

representative, the Department of Visual ~~and Literary~~ Arts Head, an Art and Art History Program faculty member, an ASUW representative, a student representative, a faculty member approved by Faculty Senate, a Staff Senate representative, the Vice President for ~~Finance and Administration~~ Campus Operations, a UW Foundation representative, a Student Life representative, two individuals accomplished in art or design who are not employed by the University, and two Wyoming citizens who are not extensively accomplished in art or design and are not employed by the University. Terms shall be two (2) years in length, shall be staggered, and shall coincide with the University's fiscal year (July 1 to June 30). Committee members will be appointed by the President of the University.

III. PROJECT TYPES

Engagement and Education: These projects focus on ideas to create awareness, excitement, and curiosity about the existing art on campus through programs and events for students, alumni, faculty, staff, and community members.

Enhance Existing Sites: These projects feature suggestions by campus meeting participants and stakeholders where art is desired, including atriums and the tunnels connecting the student residences to the dining hall.

Integrated Art: These projects engage artists to integrate into the design of facilities and landscapes to create memorable places and amplify campus character.

Socially Engaged and Interdisciplinary Projects: These projects focus on opportunities for artists to work with students, faculty, and staff from various disciplines to create art experiences.

IV. MISSION AND VISION OF PUBLIC ART

The Public Art program enriches the cultural, intellectual, and scholarly life of the campus and the Wyoming community.

V. TYPES OF PUBLIC ART AND DEFINED PROPERTY PROPOSALS CONSIDERED

Acquisition methods of public art include the following:

- A. University generated, which are solicited proposals for public art including:
 1. An artist may be commissioned by the University.
 2. An artwork may be purchased by the University.
 3. An artwork may be loaned to the University.

University Generated public art will be solicited via requests for qualifications, requests for proposals, invitational selection, or direct selection.

- B.** Open source generated, which are unsolicited proposals presented to the University including:
 - 1. An existing artwork, which may be given as a gift or loan to the University.
 - 2. A commissioned artwork, which may be given as a loan or gift to the University.

VI. SELECTION PROCESSES FOR PROJECTS

A. Funds Available for the Project

Prior to selection of the project, the Public Art Committee shall provide written confirmation to the President that funds are available and earmarked for the entire project, including installation, and shall identify the funding source.

B. Determination of Selection Committee

The Public Art Committee will appoint an Artist Selection Committee for each public art project or group of projects to select the artist(s) and the project for a specific site. The Committee shall include representatives from the Public Art Committee, departments or units occupying the building or adjacent area, and other individuals deemed essential to the selection process by the committee.

C. Selection Processes

- 1. **Open source applications:** The application process for an open-source art project includes submitting a written description of the proposed project and the desired timeframe to be on view; visuals that clearly convey the proposed project; a summary of why this project is important for the University of Wyoming and how it addresses the public art plan; information about the artist(s) involved with the project, including bio/resume and samples of previous work; a detailed budget that outlines the total project costs, including maintenance; percentage of funds that have been raised, how much need to be raised, and all confirmed funding sources; a maintenance plan; the proposed site, if one has been predetermined; and the implementation timeline.
- 2. **Commissioning artworks:** Calls for artists to apply for opportunities are posted widely through:

- a. Request for qualifications (RFQ) where artists are invited to submit images, a resume, and a brief statement or letter of intent regarding their interest in and approach to the project.
 - b. Request for proposals (RFP) where artists are invited to submit conceptual proposals for works of art.
3. **Invitational selection:** A group of artists is invited to submit their qualifications and a panel selects from this group. The presentation may be assembled based on nominations from arts professionals, as well as curatorial input from the public art staff and Public Art Committee.
 4. **Direct selection:** In rare instances, an artist might be selected directly to create a proposal.

D. Selection Procedure

The Artist Selection Committee selects the artist(s) and the project and submits it to the Public Art Committee, and, upon recommendation of the Committee, the UW President makes the final selection.

VII. CRITERIA FOR SELECTION

All public art or defined property shall be judged against the following criteria:

- A. The relationship of the proposed project to the University's public art vision and goals as outlined in the University of Wyoming's Public Art Plan.
- B. The feasibility of implementing the project.
 1. The artist or entity proposing the artwork demonstrated they are capable of implementing the project.
 2. The proposed site is appropriate for the project and is related to the site's use and operations.
 3. The implementation schedule is realistic.
 4. The project complements other university activities.
 5. The project requires input from an architect, engineer, conservator, or other specialist.
 6. If the project needs to be reviewed by another government agency or other organizations, when and how the review will take place.

7. The level of maintenance required.

VIII. EXEMPTIONS

This regulation shall not apply to the established academic programs in the UW Student Union Gallery, UW Art Museum, College or Department galleries, including exterior space of the Visual Arts building, or student exhibitions.

If a new University building project is state-funded, the University can select to opt in to the Wyoming Art in Public Buildings program and 1% of the total construction costs for the new building project (not to exceed \$100,000) will be used to acquire works of art for permanent installation at the project site pursuant to W.S. 16-6-802. The Public Art Committee, in consultation with the University's Facilities Construction Department, shall make a recommendation to the President on whether to opt in. The President, in consultation with the Facilities Contracting Committee of the Board of Trustees, shall make the final determination on whether to opt in to W.S. 16-6-802. If the University opts in to the state program, this regulation shall not apply.

IX. DISCLAIMER

The University endeavors to maintain the public art per the original agreement but shall reserve the right to remove, reinstall, store, move, or dispose of the object at the discretion of the University and in discussion with the artist and his/her Estate. The University is obligated to retain the artwork in its original form and not alter, change, or otherwise reconfigure the work.

**SECOND REVIEW Standard Administrative Policy (SAP 2-122.2) Review -
Academic Program Review**

WHEREAS, UW *Standard Administrative Policy and Procedure* (SAP) 2-122.2 provides an opportunity for the institution and faculty to examine the quality of their academic programs as a whole, to affirm ways that the program is working well, and to implement improvements.

WHEREAS, Per the University's *Policies and Procedures Vetting Process* (see http://www.uwyo.edu/generalcounsel/files/docs/updates-to-main-page-2017/policies_vetting_process.pdf), any new or modified policy or procedure is sent to this Policy Review Group (VPs, Deans, Faculty Senate, Staff Senate, ASUW, Internal Auditor) for review and feedback.

WHEREAS, After the original draft was sent to campus related to proposed updates to the *Standard Administrative Policy and Procedure: Academic Program Review* (SAP 2-122.2), campus feedback was received from several deans and directors. The Provost's Office then incorporated their comments and updated more of the substance of the policy to reduce administrative burden for campus departments and clean up some of the program review and self-study processes.

WHEREAS, Below is a list of the proposed updates:

Definitions: in addition to cleaning up the grammar and formatting,

- Added definition of an "Academic Program" which includes certificate programs.
- Added that the Provost's Office, Deans or Directors may all initiate an earlier review of the new program if not performing as expected.
- Added doctoral degrees and certificate programs to the reviews of low producing programs.
- Removed the requirement that the Academic Planning Committee of Faculty Senate be notified of suspended admissions. Notification will still be sent to Faculty Senate, but they now have the autonomy to decide what committee they would like to review it.
- Added that programs with specialized accreditation should provide any update reports that occur between accreditation cycles to the Compliance and Review Specialist in the Provost's Office.

Section III-VI:

- Departments will provide an update report of timeline progress during the fall of the third year after the last external review visit.
- Deans, Directors, or the Provost's Office may initiate an earlier internal review upon request if a new program is not performing as expected.

- The Provost initiates the program review to Deans and Directors.
- Self-Studies are due early fall.
- The department will work with their college/school and the Provost's office to create a timeline of change/recommendations for six years leading to the next program review in year seven.
- Departments will also provide an updated progress report in the third year following the most recent review.

Appendices:

- Removed Appendix A timeline. This information will now be hosted on the website to allow for more descriptive language.
- Appendix B (now A) modified so that all that is required in a self-study is the main report and any appendices/evidence that support the main report.
- Appendix C (now B) drastically reduced so that only what is required now requested.
- Eliminated Appendix D entirely as it was a repeat of the Self-Study guidelines.
- Reduced Appendix E (now C) only contains the required questions for the external review team.
- Reduced the Appendix F (now D) due to inconsistent travel schedules to and from Laramie, the external review schedule was changed to a simple 3-day schedule with more travel time.

WHEREAS, Per the University's *Policies and Procedures Vetting Process* (see http://www.uwyo.edu/generalcounsel/files/docs/updates-to-main-page-2017/policies_vetting-process.pdf), any new or modified policy or procedure is sent to VPs, Deans, Faculty Senate, Staff Senate, ASUW, Internal Auditor for review and feedback.

We propose this be deleted from this SAP and addressed in a separate SAP.**

WHEREAS, UW policies and procedures identify Faculty Senate as a participating partner to be including in the formulation and implementation of policy governing Faculty appointment, tenure and promotion and dismissal.

WHEREAS, the current Procedures for Conducting Reappointment, Tenure and Promotion Reviews for Tenure-Stream Faculty, SAP 2-7.2 as passed by the Trustees in June 2023, **did not include consideration of requested changes in Resolution 439 as made in April 2023 before being passed to the Trustees for approval by UW Administration.**

WHEREAS, Faculty Senate was not notified of the language inserted into the document approved by Trustees, and which had been expressly opposed by Faculty Senate in the passage of Resolution 439.

WHEREAS, Good Shared Governance is conducted with openness, transparency, and a willingness to cooperate and honor serious concerns of constituents, and in the case of this SAP, final changes were not submitted to Trustees for final approval following these principles.

WHEREAS, lack of knowledge of this change and the implementation of the resulting SAP has caused confusion in the Reappointment, Tenure and Promotion process at the University of Wyoming and resulted in a questioning of UW's commitment to Shared Governance as outlined in University Regulation 1-4.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Faculty Senate of the University of Wyoming that Faculty Senate supports proposed **Reconsideration of Procedures for Conducting Reappointment, Tenure and Promotion Reviews for Tenure-Stream Faculty, SAP 2-7.2.** document and respectfully submits it to UW's administration for discussion and eventual replacement of the existing SAP 2-7.2.

**Request for Formal Policy on Internal Appointments for Senior
Administrators and University Officers**

WHEREAS, over the past several years, some permanent appointments of senior UW officials and officers have been made internally (without an external search).

WHEREAS, some of these internal appointments have been made utilizing an open internal search, others have been made by direct appointment without explanation to campus why a direct appointment was used, leading to confusion regarding whether and what the policy is for making internal appointments to such positions.

WHEREAS, the use of direct appointments undermines the ability of faculty or staff who wish to be considered for such positions to make their willingness to serve be known.

WHEREAS, this resolution does not question the performance or competence of any such past appointments but instead addresses the fact that there are staff and faculty on campus who may wish to have had the opportunity to be considered for such positions.

WHEREAS, for the purposes of transparency and inclusiveness, an open, transparent and public opportunity for staff or faculty to be considered for such positions would be desirable, both for faculty and staff morale and professional development.

WHEREAS, the use of an open, transparent and public opportunity for staff or faculty to be considered for such positions will result in greater support of those appointed and avoid questions regarding the legitimacy of the appointment.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Faculty Senate of the University of Wyoming that Faculty Senate requests an open, transparent and public internal search process be the default method of appointing senior officials and officers to UW.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, in cases where a permanent direct appointment is necessary, that the reasoning for the use of a direct appointment be disseminated to campus, or at least to campus leaders in the spirit of good shared governance to ensure trust, support and respect is maintained on campus for UW leadership and administration, while also ensuring greater opportunity for faculty and staff to be considered, and to achieve such positions in an open and transparent way.

**Considerations Regarding Appropriate Raise Pool Policy Principles for
Inflation and Market Adjustment**

WHEREAS, Faculty and Staff at UW have not been allocated general raises in compensation since 2022.

WHEREAS, the 2026 Legislative Session resulted in the appropriation of state funds to adjust state employee compensation for market and inflationary adjustments consistent with those occurring over the period 2022 to 2024, and that UW employees were included in this request.

WHEREAS, it is understood based on the justification of the request made to the Governor and passed by the Legislature that the request was to address salaries becoming uncompetitive due to inflation and specific labor market changes in specific occupations.

WHEREAS, the justification for the funds was also to make state agencies (which includes UW) more competitive in levels of compensation in a changing labor market.

WHEREAS, without appropriate compensation adjustments for each employee based on inflation and market wage changes in their specific occupations, we risk losing talent to higher paying competitors.

WHEREAS, general faculty and staff morale depends upon the perception that any compensation changes intended to address inflation and market changes are made in a clear, transparent and fair manner regarding each individual, and are not preferential to some individuals over others, and instead based only on inflation and market competitiveness metrics.

WHEREAS, the compensation adjustment funds made available by the Legislature did not address merit as a primary criteria for the distribution of funds.

WHEREAS, inflation affects all employees – for example a 10% rate of inflation reduces the purchasing power of wages paid by 10% regardless of pre-existing salary level.

WHEREAS, prices have risen (or total inflation) statewide between July 1, 2022 and June 30, 2024 by 8.7% in Wyoming, according to state numbers. Since 2022, prices have risen 12.7% to the end of 2025.

WHEREAS, specific job descriptions and occupations have not all been affected identically by labor market changes, and that market competitiveness differs by individual based on their own characteristics, areas of expertise, and job description.

WHEREAS, compression and inversion of salaries are serious threats to morale on campus and should be considered in the development of a raise policy.

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, by the Faculty Senate of the University of Wyoming that Faculty Senate requests an open, transparent and clear process for the distribution of the raise pool funds based on the above principles, specifically that wages be adjusted in a fair manner, implying wage adjustments by individual are based ONLY on 1) data regarding inflation that has occurred since the last wage increase, and 2) data that describes how current wages compare to competitive market wages in an individual's specific occupation and 3) data that describes how compression and inversion have occurred across the University.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the appropriate manner to consider such adjustments based on inflation and market wage changes is to use percentage adjustments based on documented changes in inflation and market wage. Previously used methods of wage adjustment that utilize a flat increase of a specified dollar amount across employees or class of employees results in unequal relative increases in wage across classes of employees affected. Such adjustments are inappropriate when addressing the effects of inflation and market changes by individual employee, as they are preferential to some employees over others without consideration of inflation and regardless of market changes. Preferential treatment that ignores the realities of inflation and specific competitive market wage changes, and how these factors affect every individual in similar fashion, undermines morale, trust and the sense of fairness imperative when making pay adjustments for inflation and changes in the levels of specific competitive market wages.
