EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

During the 2024-2025 academic year, President Seidel asked a working group to review the University’s protest and campus activism guidelines, develop a public facing policy, create a small crisis management group, incorporate crisis communication, and educate about the intersection between first amendment, campus safety, and harassment and discrimination. The working group reviewed UW Regulation 6-4, which outlines the use of University buildings, grounds, and equipment by internal and external users, and researched and reviewed several other university policies related to demonstrations and protests. Based on this research, the group recommended edits to UW Regulation 6-4 and a new [*Standard Administrative Policy and Procedure: Demonstrations on University Grounds and Administrative Roles and Responsibilities*](#).

On August 27, 2025, per the University’s *Policies and Procedures Vetting Process* and [UW Regulation 1-4 \(Shared Governance\)](#), these modifications were sent to a defined Policy Review Group including Vice Presidents, Deans, Faculty Senate, Staff Senate, ASUW, and the Internal Auditor for review and feedback. We received and incorporated comments from the Faculty Senate Executive Committee, Staff Senate members, and the College of Arts and Sciences. Faculty Senate approved the attached version at their May 4, 2026, meeting.

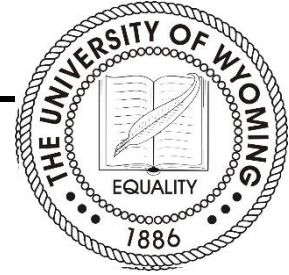

Subject: Use of University Buildings, Grounds, Facilities and ServicesEquipment

Number: UW Regulation 6-4

I. POLICY

It is the policy of the

I. PURPOSE

The University of Wyoming ~~to permit~~permits the use of University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and groundsGrounds and equipmentEquipment by internalInternal and externalExternal users, as defined within this policy, if such use is consistent with the University's ~~primary purposes~~Business Purpose, i.e. instruction, research, and public service. ~~The University retains the right to determine which activities are consistent with its primary purposes.~~

H.I. TYPES OF USE

A. Internal vs. External Users. The types of uses permitted may depend on whether the person seeking to use the space is considered an “internal” user or an “external” user. Categorization of whether one is an “internal” or “external” user under this Regulation is solely determined by the University.

“Internal users” include:

II. DEFINITIONS

Alterations: Physical modification of Buildings or Grounds that include but are not limited to altering the use or function of a space or altering electrical, plumbing or heating, ventilation or air conditioning systems within a space or modifications to and/or additions of walls.

Building: Enclosed structure or portions thereof, owned or leased by the Trustees of the University.

Business Purpose: A written description of an allowable expense that explains who or what the transaction benefits, what the transaction is for, when the goods or services will be needed, where the goods or services will be used or consumed, and why the goods or services are needed.

Dangerous weapon: Any firearm, explosive, paintball gun, airsoft gun, taser or other electronic restraint device, sling-shot, mace or pepper spray container in excess of 1 ounce, knife (blades 3” or longer except in the apartments or for cooking purposes only), precursor for explosives, brass knuckles, blowgun, dart gun, bow, arrow, and martial arts weapons, including but not limited to a star, sword, nun chuck, and club.

Equipment: All personal property, whether fixed or movable, owned, leased, or controlled by the Trustees of the University.

- ~~1. Academic or administrative departments or units of the University; Student organizations recognized by the University pursuant to UW Regulation 11-4; Faculty and staff of the University, active or retired; Organizations formally affiliated with the University, such as the University of Wyoming Foundation and University of Wyoming Alumni Association.~~

“External users” include persons: Persons, entities or organizations other than those defined as “internal users,” whose activities are consistent with the University’s ~~primary purposes~~Business Purpose.

Facility: A physical space that is provided for a specific purpose to support the University’s operations, activities, or services. A facility may include vehicles, a building, land, or a combination of both. Facilities may include, but are not limited to, auditoriums, stadiums, arenas, sports fields, and amphitheatres.

Grounds: All real property, other than Buildings, owned or controlled by the Trustees of the University.

Improvements: Cosmetic changes to Facilities and Buildings, including, but not limited to, drilling or nailing into any surface, painting, paneling, and installing carpeting.

Internal users:

- A. Academic or administrative departments or units of the University;
- B. Student organizations recognized by the University pursuant to UW Regulation 11-4;
- C. Faculty and staff of the University, active or retired; or

D. Organizations formally affiliated with the University, such as the University of Wyoming Foundation and the University of Wyoming Alumni Association.

Maintenance: Efforts to keep Facilities, Buildings, Grounds, Equipment, and systems functional.

Non-public areas: University Facilities not generally open to the public, including but not limited to: classrooms; laboratories; research areas; gymnasias; physical education or intercollegiate athletic exercise areas; child day care areas; faculty, administrative staff, or student offices; conference rooms; seminar rooms; lounges; storage areas; parking facilities; mechanical, information technology or electrical rooms; areas containing hazardous waste or energy; or other similar areas restricted to University faculty, staff or students.

Person-in-charge: An employee of the University or appropriate designated person authorized by the University to direct or administer any activity of the University, including but not limited to a Department Head, Dean, Director, or Vice President.

Public areas: University Facilities that are generally open to the public, as indicated by their physical nature, function, custom or usage.

Services: Activities performed by the University for or by students, staff, faculty, administration or the public in connection with instruction, research and service. It includes, but is not limited to, services such as audio-visual services, computing, copying, telephone, addressing, food service, services for residence halls or University apartments, scheduling and janitorial services, or similar activities.

III. TYPES OF USE

B.A. Use of Assigned Space for UWUniversity Colleges and Departments. University ~~buildings~~Facilities and Buildings and space assigned or reassigned to deans of individual colleges or to administrative officers of other individual units shall be used exclusively for University instructional, research, and service functions, or for purposes authorized in this Regulation. UW Regulation 6-7 sets forth the process for reallocation or change in assigned spaces.

C.B. Use by Internal Users for non-University Purposes. University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings, Grounds and ~~grounds and equipment~~Equipment shall not be used by an internal user for personal or private purposes unrelated to University purposes. Internal ~~users~~Users who are using University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings, Grounds, or grounds or equipmentEquipment as a

private citizen may have use of said ~~buildings, grounds or equipment~~Facilities, Buildings, Grounds, or Equipment as an ~~external user~~External User but only in accordance with the procedures set forth in this Regulation. Use of University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings, and equipmentEquipment by ~~internal users~~Internal Users for outside consulting is permitted only in accordance with ~~Presidential Directive 2-1996-1~~UW Regulation 6-7 and the ~~applicable policies set forth by Academic Affairs~~University's Standard Administrative Policy and Procedure Conflicts of Interest and Commitment Policy.

D.C. Emergencies. University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and ~~grounds~~Grounds may be used during a natural disaster or state or local emergency when authorized by the President or President's designee, as specified in any applicable ~~Memorandums~~memorandums of ~~Understanding~~understanding or contracts with other entities, or as set forth in Wyoming or Federal law.

E.D. Signs, Posters, Banners and Fliers. The time, place, and manner of free expression activities may be regulated to prevent unreasonable interference or conflict with the educational, research, housing, or other legitimate functions of the University, including the normal use by others of public areas. Similarly, the University must preserve the visual integrity of campus by providing a framework for planning and displaying temporary posters, signs and banners to ensure their usefulness and effectiveness, while minimizing visual clutter, litter, potential damage to property, disruption of campus operations, and unnecessary costs.

External ~~users~~Users who seek to publicize activities or advertise events as described in this section may only use specifically designated University spaces or locations, and must seek advanced written approval by the Vice President ~~of Administration for Operations~~ in consultation with the applicable departmental office. Solicitation or the posting of handbills without University approval is strictly prohibited.

Internal Users who seek to publicize activities or advertise events as described in this section may use spaces or locations as designated by their college, school, or division.

F.E. Prohibited Uses By External Users. The University shall not, except by written authorization of the President of the University, or designee, make University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and ~~grounds~~Grounds available to ~~external users~~External Users for the following uses or activities:

1. Any interests operated primarily for profit, such as but not limited to private, personal or commercial interests;

2. Political campaigning by, or for, candidates who have filed for public office, Persons who have publicly announced their candidacy, even if they have not filed, are considered candidates; and
3. Political campaigning for ballot measures.

G.F. Filming and Photography. Use of University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and ~~grounds~~Grounds for filming and photography is permitted in accordance with the UW Filming and Photography Policy ~~as posted on the University of Wyoming Division of Administration website.~~

G. Demonstrations. Use of University Grounds for demonstrations and protests is permitted. Unless otherwise stated in this UW Regulation, Internal and External Users are not required to reserve publicly accessible University Grounds to engage in spontaneous, legal demonstrations or protests. However, if a user wants exclusive use of the space, reservations must be made in accordance with the Central Scheduling Policy.

1. Civil Disturbance. Demonstrations shall not substantially disrupt, impair, or interfere with the following:

- a. The teaching, study, research, or administration of the University;
- b. The authorized use of University Facilities, Buildings or Grounds by others, including already approved reservations or meetings of University students, faculty, staff, administrators, or guests;
- c. The rights and privileges of other Internal or External Users, including shouting down other speakers;
- d. The flow of vehicular traffic, pedestrian traffic at the entrances and exits of buildings or the movement of persons in general; or
- e. Fire protection, law enforcement, or emergency or medical services.

2. Signs and Lights. Handheld signs are permissible but must not be left unattended or they will be considered abandoned property. Light projections, lawn and specialty signs, plaques, banners, and lettering may not be displayed on any University Buildings or structures, nor left or placed on University Grounds without the advance written approval of the Vice President for Operations.

- 3. Unprotected Speech.** While the First Amendment to the U.S. Constitution protects the right to express one's views, it also allows the University to place reasonable time, place, and manner restrictions on that expression. Speech that is not protected by the First Amendment, including incitement, true threats, fighting words, obscenity, defamation, fraud, perjury, and speech integral to criminal conduct, is prohibited. All individuals are free to express their views and opinions, regardless of how unpopular those views and opinions may be, while in or on University Buildings and Grounds, as allowable by law.

III.IV. SCHEDULING

- A. The following process and rules apply to use of University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and ~~grounds~~Grounds, as applicable, by ~~internal users~~Internal Users:
1. Use of University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and ~~grounds~~Grounds, as applicable, must be scheduled in accordance with all applicable University Regulations and policies, including but not limited to the process and procedures set forth in the Central Scheduling Policy ~~posted on the University Central Scheduling website.~~ More specific rules or processes for scheduling may apply to designated University Facilities.
 2. Normal operating hours of administrative and academic department offices are 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., Monday through Friday. ~~Summer operating hours of administrative and academic department offices are 7:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., Monday through Friday.~~ Individual departments and units may also set their individual normal operating hours outside of those listed above as defined by that department or unit.

IV.V. FEES

- A. Users may be assessed fees, charges and/or deposits for use of University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and/or ~~grounds~~Grounds, as set forth in the University Fee Book or applicable ~~Presidential Directives.~~Standard Administrative Policies and Procedures (SAPs).
- B. Any request for a reduction or waiver of any portion, or all, of a fee, charge or deposit shall be submitted to the Vice President for ~~Administration~~Operations, who shall make the final determination.

V.VI. ALTERATIONS OR IMPROVEMENTS

Internal and ~~external users~~External Users are expressly prohibited from making any alterations or improvements or performing maintenance to University ~~buildings~~Facilities,

~~Buildings~~ or ~~grounds~~Grounds. All construction, alterations, improvements or maintenance to University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings or ~~grounds~~Grounds shall be performed exclusively by, or through, UW Operations. All alterations or improvements or maintenance shall be requested through UW Operations ~~in the process set forth on the UW Operations website.~~ University departments, employees or offices authorizing or permitting any alterations or improvements to University ~~facilities~~Facilities, Buildings, or Grounds in violation of this directive shall be responsible for all subsequent costs resulting from such unauthorized alterations or improvements.

VI.VII. CONDITIONS OF USE

All persons or groups, whether internal or external, using University ~~buildings, grounds or equipment~~Facilities, Buildings, Grounds or Equipment shall follow all University Regulations and applicable city, county, state or federal ordinances and statutes. In addition, the following conditions apply to all use of University ~~buildings and grounds and equipment~~Facilities, Buildings, Grounds, and Equipment:

- A. Access to Public versus non-~~public~~Public areas of the University.** University faculty, administrative and staff personnel, and students are permitted access to ~~public~~Public areas of the University and, when engaged in a University-authorized or assigned activity, to non-~~public~~Public areas of the University. Members of the general public who are not University employees or students are permitted access to the ~~public~~Public areas of the University, provided such access is consistent with this Regulation. Members of the general public who are not University faculty or administrative or staff personnel or students are prohibited from use of non-~~public~~Public areas of the University, except upon authorization of the ~~person-in-charge~~Person-In-Charge.
- B. Animals.** University employees, students, and members of the general public are prohibited from bringing any animal, including but not limited to, dogs, cats and birds, into University ~~buildings~~Buildings or Facilities. However, animals are permitted in University ~~buildings~~Buildings as follows:
1. Individuals with disabilities who are accompanied by a service animal as defined by the Americans with Disabilities Act; ~~or~~
 2. Individuals with disabilities who have been approved by the University to have an emotional support or assistance animal while they are in their University-owned or leased housing facility as provided by the Fair Housing Act; ~~or~~
 3. Individuals who are engaged in an authorized University instructional, research, public service or athletic activity requiring the presence of animals; or

4. Individuals who reside in University housing facilities that have been specifically designated by the University as pet friendly. The Vice President for Students Affairs, or designee, is responsible for establishing and administering policies and procedures governing the Pet Friendly Housing Policy.

The University reserves the right to remove or require the removal of any animal that poses a direct threat to the health or safety of others, is not housebroken, is in violation of any University policy, or otherwise disrupts the use of campus ~~grounds~~Grounds, Buildings, or facilitiesFacilities.

- C. **Bicycles, motorcycles, mopeds, scooters, skateboards, and roller skates.** University employees, students, and members of the general public are prohibited from operating, using, or storing any bicycles, motorcycles, mopeds, scooters, skateboards, roller skates or other similar devices in a University ~~building~~Facilities or Buildings, except when expressly permitted by the Vice President for ~~Administration~~Operations or designee. Use of bicycles and non-motorized vehicles is subject to the parameters set forth in UW Regulation 6-5.
- D. **Dangerous weapons.** No ~~dangerous weapon~~Dangerous Weapon may be stored or carried in or upon University ~~facilities~~Facilities and Buildings. Any person carrying a dangerous weapon in a University ~~facility~~Facility or Building is required to relinquish the weapon to the UW Police Department voluntarily or upon request. The weapon will be returned when the person leaves the University facility, unless the UW Police Department determines that the weapon should be retained in an investigation. If a person carrying a dangerous weapon refuses to relinquish the weapon, the person shall be denied access to University ~~facilities~~Facilities or Buildings. Nothing in this paragraph prevents the carrying or storing of weapons for the following reasons: (1) by authorized Peace Officers as defined and authorized by Wyoming Statutes; (2) by individuals directly transporting weapons to and from the weapons storage facility; (3) by individuals carrying a concealed firearm pursuant to Wyo. Stat. §6-8-105; (4) by individuals in a University apartment; or (5) by individuals engaged in official University business or University-approved activities with the written permission of the responsible vice president and the UW Chief of Police.

If a concealed firearm is not being carried and concealed on a person, the firearm must be stored in a concealed biometric firearm storage container or a lock box within the individual's direct control at all times. Firearm storage container or lock box is defined as a locked, hard-sided safe, gun case, or similar secure device designed specifically for storing firearms when not in use. For the purpose of this Regulation, direct control of a firearm storage container or a lock box refers to the authority and ability to access it, even if it is not in the individual's immediate physical possession at all times. This means the individual must retain control over

the key, combination, or other access mechanisms to ensure that only authorized individuals can open or use the lock box. Additionally, the firearm storage container or a lock box must be securely placed and protected to prevent unauthorized access, theft, or misuse, allowing the individual to maintain control and oversight.

University students, faculty, and staff may be subject to disciplinary action for violation of this section, up to and including termination. All persons violating this section may also be subject to criminal sanctions in accordance with Wyoming law.

- E. Equipment and Services.** Internal and ~~external-users~~External Users authorized to use University ~~buildings~~Facilities or Buildings are required, except as otherwise authorized by the Vice President for ~~Administration~~Operations or designee, to utilize University services and ~~equipment~~Equipment when using University ~~buildings~~Facilities or Buildings. The University may impose reasonable restrictions on the use of such services and ~~equipment~~Equipment when such restrictions are necessary to avoid interruption of the University's ~~primary~~ functions.
- F. Right to reassign or substitute Buildings or Grounds.** The University reserves the right to impose such requirements on the use of University ~~buildings~~Facilities, Buildings and ~~grounds~~Grounds as it may deem necessary and reasonable and reserves the right to reassign or substitute buildings or grounds as available and in the best interests of the University.
- G. Sound amplification.** Sound amplification is permitted at all times in University ~~buildings~~Buildings and Facilities and on University ~~grounds~~Grounds during the hours of 11:45 a.m. to 1:00 p.m. and 5:00 p.m. to 6:00 p.m., provided that the written authorization for the event, indoors or outdoors, includes approval for an internal or external user to use sound amplification. The University may grant exceptions to this directive through the Vice President for ~~Administration~~Operations or designee.
- H. Structures.** No individual or group, whether an Internal or External User, may erect, place, or occupy any tent, temporary housing structure, or other temporary structure on University Facilities or Grounds without the prior written approval of the Vice President for Operations. Excluded from this restriction are temporary structures or signs placed at the ASUW Student Memorial Plaza on the east end of Prexy's Pasture to honor deceased students and temporary housing structures in authorized Athletic Department tailgate areas with applicable parking credentials.

~~VII~~VIII. SANCTIONS

Failure of an ~~internal~~Internal or ~~external user~~External User to comply with the provisions of this Regulation may, at the University's sole discretion, result in a cancellation of authorization to use University ~~buildings, grounds or equipment~~Facilities, Buildings, Grounds or Equipment, in a loss of scheduling privileges, or in disciplinary sanctions pursuant to UW Regulations and policies.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

On October 28, 2025, Tyler Stoddard, President of Young Americans for Liberty at the University of Wyoming (a Student Organization) submitted a petition to the President containing around 300 student signatures in support of updating the current dangerous weapons policy, arguing that tasers remain banned on campus, even following the recent changes to state law regarding concealed carry. Stoddard articulated that this policy leaves students without a concealed carry permit unable to effectively protect themselves, creating a serious safety concern for many on campus. On November 13, 2025, Stoddard met with President Seidel and several administrators related to this petition. President Seidel recommended that Stoddard and his Student Organization submit their petition to ASUW. On April 28, 2026, ASUW voted unanimously to approve Senate Resolution #3109:

THEREFORE, be it resolved that the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming (ASUW) Student Government strongly suggests that the Student Code of Conduct and UW Regulation 6-4 be reworded to both define the difference between direct contact CEDs and projectile stun guns (such as the TASER Energy Weapon) and explicitly allow the possession of nonprojectile CEDs, with potential language revisions as reflected in Addenda F and G or with similar language.

President Seidel supports ASUW’s resolution and recommended changes to applicable University regulations, policies, and procedures.

TITLE: ASUW’s Support for Reclassification of “TASER” in University of Wyoming Policy

DATE INTRODUCED: 04/17/2026

AUTHORS: First-Year Senator Martinez, Senators Lindsay and Shosh

SPONSORS: Senators Hansen, Keasling, and Smith; Young Americans for Liberty

1. WHEREAS, the purpose of the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming
2. (ASUW) is to serve our fellow students in the best manner possible; and,
3. WHEREAS, under current University of Wyoming regulations, “tasers” are defined
4. as “dangerous weapons,” shown in Addendum A; and,
5. WHEREAS, under current University of Wyoming Student Code of Conduct,
6. distributed by the Dean of Students Office, effective as of July 1st, 2025, “tasers” are
7. listed as weapons prohibited from being stored, used by, or in possession of students in
8. or on university facilities, outlined in Addendum A; and,
9. WHEREAS, it’s legal to purchase, possess, and carry a taser in the state of Wyoming;
10. and,
11. WHEREAS, university policy does not clarify the difference between “TASER Energy
12. Weapons” and conducted energy devices (specifically direct contact CEDs) or “stun
13. guns;” and,
14. WHEREAS, even though TASER Energy Weapons and conducted energy devices
15. (specifically direct contact CEDs) or “stun guns” are often closely associated with each
16. other and referred to under the same name, they are fundamentally different in nature

17. and operating mechanism, as reflected in Addendum B; and,

18. WHEREAS, several universities in the United States, including peer institutions such as

20. have made the distinction between projectile energy conducting weapons and

22. not listed any similar device in their “dangerous/deadly/banned” weapons policies, as

24. WHEREAS, a University of Wyoming recognized student organization has recently

25. made efforts to engage with students by gathering 665 signatures to petition upper

27. WHEREAS, survey data taken from students demonstrates an overwhelmingly

30. WHEREAS, an overwhelming majority of students polled do not consider tasers “deadly

32. WHEREAS, the majority of students polled have expressed that the possession of a

34. WHEREAS, poll and survey data collected shows a large amount of support from the





Addendum A: Current Student Code of Conduct and Regulations

Student Code of Conduct:

35. Weapons: Illegal storage, use, or possession of firearms, ammunition, explosives, dangerous chemicals, paintball gun, airsoft gun, taser or other electronic restraint device, sling-shot, mace or pepper spray container in excess of 1 ounce, knife (blades 3” or longer except in the apartments or for cooking purposes only), precursor for explosives, brass knuckles, blowgun, dart gun, bow, arrow, and martial arts weapons, including but not limited to a star, sword, nun chuck, and club. This does not include the legal carrying or storing of firearms and ammunition with a valid WY conceal carry permit, pursuant to Wyo. Stat. §6-8-105 and UW Regulation 6-4. Use of any such item, even if legally possessed, in a manner that harms or threatens others is prohibited.

UW Regulation 6-4:

“**Dangerous weapon**” includes any firearm, explosive, paintball gun, airsoft gun, taser or other electronic restraint device, sling-shot, mace or pepper spray container in excess of 1 ounce, knife (blades 3” or longer except in the apartments or for cooking purposes only), precursor for explosives, brass knuckles, blowgun, dart gun, bow, arrow, and martial arts weapons, including but not limited to a star, sword, nun chuck, and club.

Addendum B: Congress.gov Difference Between “TASER” and “Stun Gun”

Conducted Energy Devices (CEDs)

The TASER was the [first](#) CED invented for law enforcement use. Developers marketed the TASER as a less-lethal alternative to conventional firearms. Rather than expelling a bullet, [the first TASER](#) (invented in 1974) utilized gunpowder to propel barbed, dart-shaped electrodes at a subject. Upon contact, an electric current transmitted through the electrodes would override the subject's central nervous system by causing intense pain and muscle contraction, resulting in temporary incapacitation. After the introduction of the TASER, other types of CEDs emerged. [Stun guns](#) (small, hand-held devices that discharge an electric shock through direct contact) were [originally created](#) for U.S. Army use but, along with TASERS, became among the first CEDs to be used by law enforcement. Additionally, in custodial settings, officers use restraint CEDs, such as the [stun belt](#) (a CED belt placed around a subject's waist, leg, or arm that is capable of delivering electroshocks through remote control activation) to aid in the transportation of inmates with histories of aggressive behavior. [Other](#), less commonly employed CEDs include [stun shields](#) (riot shields designed to administer a contact shock through the press of a button) and [shock sticks](#) (baton-like devices equipped with two prongs at the tip capable of delivering an electric shock).

The demand for CEDs reaches beyond law enforcement. Stun guns sales [expanded](#) to the civilian market in the 1970s. Similarly, in 1993 new TASERS that used compressed nitrogen, rather than gunpowder, to expel electrodes [were deemed](#) non-lethal and safe for civilian use and became available for sale in the public market.

Addendum C: University Policy Examples

University of Iowa – Policy Manual - Community Policies

9.2 Policy

(Amended 8/29/19)

The Iowa Board of Regents has adopted administrative rules regarding Uniform Rules of Personal Conduct which are contained in the *Iowa Administrative Code* [\(681\)9.1](#). The Rules define acts of misconduct which apply at the universities governed by the Board of Regents. Subsection 9.1(2)g defines as misconduct any person, student, member of the faculty or staff, or visitor who, while on the campus or at or during any university-authorized function or event, uses or has possession of any firearms, ammunition, or other dangerous weapons, substances, or material (except as expressly authorized by the university) or of bombs, explosives, or explosive or incendiary devices prohibited by law. Any act of misconduct shall be subject to disciplinary procedures by the university.

Consistent with *Iowa Code* 724.8A, non-projectile weapons, such as stun guns, that direct an electric current, impulse, wave, or beam that produces a high-voltage pulse designed to immobilize a person are not prohibited by this policy. However, although non-projectile high-voltage pulse weapons are permissible on the university campus, they are prohibited at any facility leased, owned, or operated by University of Iowa Health Care, as well as University stadiums.

Brigham Young University – University Policy – Firearms and Weapons Policy

Weapons

Weapons prohibited by this policy include, but are not limited to

- tasers that fire a projectile
- knives with a blade longer than 3 ½ inches or that have more than one sharp edge
- airsoft, pellet, and BB guns and any firearm facsimile
- clubs and night sticks
- swords and daggers
- nunchucks
- metal knuckles
- slingshots and similar devices

Idaho State University - Policies and Procedures - Possession of Firearms

II. DEFINITIONS

- A. **Firearm:** any device which can expel a projectile that is capable of inflicting serious injury.
- B. **Dangerous Weapon:** any knife, explosive, or other item which, in its intended use, is capable of inflicting serious injury, and as otherwise defined in 18 U.S.C, section 930.
- C. **Concealed Weapon:** any deadly weapon carried on or about the person in a manner not discernible by ordinary observation, and as otherwise defined in Idaho Code § 18-3302.

Montana State University- Policy and procedures- weapons policy

Definitions:

For purposes of this policy,

"Weapon" means an instrument, article or substance that is designed, used or likely to be used to cause bodily harm or property damage. Weapons include the following items: firearms, including rifles, shotguns, handguns; bowie, dirks and knives (other than kitchen knives) with blades four (4) inches or longer, explosives, swords, nun chucks, throwing stars and other martial arts weapons, crossbows, compound bows, recurve bows, long bows, pepper spray (except for small, personal protection dispensers), BB guns, paintball guns, ammunition and non-functioning replicas that could be confused with actual firearms.

"University Premises" means the facilities and land owned, leased by or under the primary control of Montana State University-Bozeman and passenger vehicles owned, leased or otherwise under the control of the university.

Colorado State University- Student code of conduct- weapons policy

Weapons:

Illegal use or possession of firearms or other weapons such as blades larger than pocketknives; ammunition or explosives; dangerous chemicals, substances, or materials; bombs or incendiary devices; or simulated weapons; or any weapon prohibited by law or University policy. Use of any such item, even if legally possessed, in a manner that harms or threatens others is prohibited.

Addendum D: Young Americans for Liberty Policy Change Recommendations and Signature List



Policy Reform Recommendations for University of Wyoming Weapons Policy

We are writing on behalf of Young Americans for Liberty and the 378 students who have signed a petition calling for changes to the current weapons policy to permit students to carry handheld Tasers for self-defense on campus. As outlined in the university's regulations, the existing policy contains language that may result in students being punished for carrying common, non-lethal self-defense items such as Tasers. This is concerning, especially given that these items are often carried by students to protect themselves from violence and assault.

Our primary request is simple and aligns with the university's commitment to maintaining a safe campus environment. We propose that the University of Wyoming make minor modifications to the current policy to allow for and clarify the possession of Tasers for self-defense situations. This change would ensure that students are not unjustly penalized or fear taking proactive measures to protect themselves.

To that end, we have rewritten the policy to include the following adjustments to help students defend themselves.

Policy Reform Recommendations

Student Code of Conduct

35 Weapons: Possessing, using, or storing firearms, explosives (including firecrackers), weapons, ammunition, or dangerous chemicals in University facilities or in the course of any University activity without prior authorization by the University of Wyoming Police Department (UWPD). This includes, but is not limited to, BB guns, paintball guns, knives more than 3 inches long, swords, crossbows, handguns, shotguns, and rifles. See UW Regulation 6-4 for more information.

Note that any object perceived to be a weapon or used with the intent to cause bodily harm is considered a weapon.

Note: Outside of non-lethal self-defense tools like pepper spray, pepper gel, and handheld Tasers, any object perceived to be a weapon or used with the intent to cause bodily harm is considered a weapon.

UW Regulation 6-4 (Amended)

Here is the new carve-out to insert into Section D: Dangerous weapons of UW Regulation 6-4, right after the ROTC and registered student organization exemptions:



(4) Possession of non-lethal self-defense tools such as pepper spray, pepper gel, and handheld Tasers is permitted, provided these tools are used strictly for personal protection. Devices that discharge projectiles or darts remain prohibited. Misuse or brandishing of any self-defense tool in a threatening or reckless manner may be subject to disciplinary action.

This carve-out preserves the university's discretion on conduct but removes the blanket ban that currently criminalizes students who are simply trying to stay safe.

This amendment would preserve the University of Wyoming's broader security priorities while ensuring students can protect themselves when needed. Policies that fail to recognize the importance of self-defense can inadvertently deter students from carrying these essential tools, leaving them more vulnerable in critical situations.

While we understand that some may argue these policies are rarely enforced, the potential threat of punishment still hangs over students' heads. Ensuring that the university is clear on its stance regarding personal safety tools is not only in the best interest of student welfare but also a step forward in fostering a campus that prioritizes both security and individual rights.

We urge the University of Wyoming to act on this request and work with us to implement these necessary changes to the weapons policy. We believe that with this update, the University of Wyoming can continue to be a place where students feel safe and empowered to protect themselves from harm.

Through our efforts, we have successfully worked with numerous institutions across the country to create balanced policies that foster both student safety and individual rights. Below, we have provided five examples of policy reforms we have

supported as evidence of the potential impact of such measures. These examples are just five of more than 200 reforms we've implemented, with approximately 50 specifically addressing self-defense through our program, the YAL Student Rights Campaign.

I. Indiana University System

Old Policy:

"Possession of a firearm on Indiana University property is prohibited. The prohibition applies regardless of any permit to carry a firearm. The prohibition does not apply to law enforcement officers authorized to possess a firearm, either on or off duty, by the employing law enforcement agency. In rare cases, an exception to this policy may be granted for academic or research purposes. Such exception must be made by prior written authorization from the Superintendent of Public Safety and the campus police chief and the campus chancellor or provost. Possession of a dangerous article or substance as a potential weapon is also prohibited."

New Policy after working with YAL:

"Possession of a firearm on Indiana University property is prohibited. The prohibition applies regardless of any permit to carry a firearm. The prohibition does not apply to law enforcement officers authorized to possess a firearm, either on or off duty, by the employing law enforcement agency. In rare cases, an exception to this policy may be granted for academic or research purposes. Such exception must be made by prior written authorization from the Superintendent of Public Safety and the campus police chief and the campus chancellor or provost. Possession of a dangerous article or substance as a potential weapon is also prohibited. Such dangerous articles for the purposes of this policy include, but are not limited to: tasers, electronic stun weapons, stun guns, explosives such as bombs, grenades, blasting caps, and ammunition, as well as other equipment, material, and devices (e.g. knives, metal knuckles, tear gas, chemical substances) that could be or have



been used to cause harm or the fear of harm. This prohibition does not extend to personal pepper sprays; however, public event venues or other facilities on campus may still impose such a prohibition."

2. University of North Florida

Old Policy:

"4.0: It is prohibited for any person covered by this Code to possess a firearm, electric weapon or device, destructive device, or other weapon including a razor blade, box cutter, dirk, knife (other than a common pocketknife, plastic knife, or blunt-bladed table knife), metallic knuckles, slungshot, billie, tear gas gun, chemical weapon or device, or other deadly weapon on University property, University-controlled property or at University-sponsored events. The only exceptions to this prohibition are:

A sworn law enforcement officer may carry a weapon on University property, University-controlled property or to University sanctioned events;

Students may carry lawful self-defense chemical spray which is compact in nature, containing no more than two ounces of chemical, designed to be carried on or about the person solely for purposes of self-defense;

A person 18 years of age or older may maintain a firearm or other weapon for self-defense or other lawful purpose within the interior of a private vehicle, without a license, if the firearm or other weapon is securely encased or is otherwise not readily accessible for immediate use. Additionally, nothing in this section prohibits the carrying of a legal firearm other than a handgun anywhere in a private conveyance when such firearm is being carried for a lawful use. This exception shall not be construed to authorize the carrying of a concealed firearm or other weapon on a person or outside of a vehicle on University property, University-controlled property or at University-sponsored events.

Possessing and using a razor blade and/or a box cutter for lawful and intended purposes. Specifically, razor blades may be possessed and used for personal hygiene and a box cutter may be possessed and used as a tool for University-sanctioned or University-sponsored events."

New Policy after working with YAL:

"4.0: It is prohibited for any person covered by this Code to possess a firearm, electric weapon or device, destructive device, or other weapon including a razor blade, box cutter, dirk, knife (other than a common pocketknife, plastic knife, or blunt-bladed table knife), metallic knuckles, slungshot, billie, tear gas gun, chemical weapon or device, or other deadly weapon on University property, University-controlled property or at University-sponsored events. The only exceptions to this prohibition are:

A sworn law enforcement officer may carry a weapon on University property, University-controlled property or to University sanctioned events;

Students may carry lawful self-defense chemical spray which is compact in nature, containing no more than two ounces of chemical, designed to be carried on or about the person solely for purposes of self-defense;

A person 18 years of age or older may maintain a firearm or other weapon for self-defense or other lawful purpose within the interior of a private vehicle, without a license, if the firearm or other weapon is securely encased or is otherwise not readily accessible for immediate use. Additionally, nothing in this section prohibits the carrying of a legal firearm other than a handgun anywhere in a private conveyance when such firearm is being carried for a lawful use. This exception shall not be construed to authorize the carrying of a concealed firearm or other weapon on a person or outside of a vehicle on University property, University-controlled property or at University-sponsored events.



Possessing and using a razor blade and/or a box cutter for lawful and intended purposes is permitted. Specifically, razor blades may be possessed and used for personal hygiene and a box cutter may be possessed and used as a tool for University-sanctioned or University-sponsored events.

Pursuant to Florida Statute 790.06, it is not a violation of the Code of Conduct for a registered student to possess a stun gun or nonlethal electric weapon or device designed solely for defensive purposes so long as the weapon does not fire a dart or projectile."

3. SUNY Cobleskill

Old Policy:

"Possession and/or use of weapons or firearms (items, whether real or realistic, used to cause harm or threaten harm to people) of any kind, including, but not limited to: bows, arrows, archery equipment, air guns, pellet guns, dart guns, paintball guns, nerf guns, chukka sticks, ammunition, CO2 cartridges, laser pointers, fireworks, firecrackers, explosives or dangerous chemicals of any kind. Note: This applies to possession on the person, in motor vehicles, in residence rooms, and/or in other areas/facilities of the College and/or Cobleskill Auxiliary Services.

New Policy after working with YAL:

"Possession and/or use of weapons or firearms (items, whether real or realistic, used to cause harm or threaten harm to people) of any kind, including, but not limited to: bows, arrows, archery equipment, air guns, pellet guns, dart guns, paintball guns, nerf guns, chukka sticks, ammunition, CO2 cartridges, laser pointers, fireworks, firecrackers, explosives or dangerous chemicals of any kind. Note: This applies to possession on the person, in motor vehicles, in residence

rooms, and/or in other areas/facilities of the College and/or Cobleskill Auxiliary Services.

Exemptions to this Policy are as follows: The President, as the chief administrative officer of the Campus, and consistent with 8 NYCRR Part 590, grants the following exceptions to the prohibition of Weapons on Campus:

a. Military or law enforcement of the United States or the State of New York in pursuit of their official duties, as provided for under 8 NYCRR 590.1, SUNY Policy 5403.

b. Possession of pepper spray as allowed under New York State Penal Law Section 265.20(a)(4)."

4. Lindsey Wilson College

Old Policy:

"Possession or use of firearms, explosives, dangerous chemicals, or other dangerous weapons is prohibited on the A.P. White Campus. The brandishing of any weapon or any other object in a menacing or threatening manner on College owned or controlled property or at any College event is also prohibited."

New Policy after working with YAL:

"Possession or use of firearms, explosives, dangerous chemicals, or other dangerous weapons is prohibited on the A.P. White Campus. The brandishing of any weapon or any other object in a menacing or threatening manner on College owned or controlled property or at any College event is also prohibited. Pepper spray for personal protection as a means of self-defense is permitted."

5. SUNY Binghamton

Old Policy:



"The term 'weapon' means any instrument, device or object capable of inflicting physical harm or death and designed or specifically adapted for use as a weapon, or possessed, carried or used as a weapon."

New Policy after working with YAL:

"The term 'weapon' means any instrument, device or object capable of inflicting physical harm or death and designed or specifically adapted for use as a weapon, or possessed, carried or used as a weapon. This includes possession of an air gun, BB gun, paintball gun or other similar instrument. Per the University Housing Agreement, students are not permitted to have a knife longer than 6 inches in length in the residence halls. Note: Per New York state law, persons over the age of 18 years, who have not been convicted of a felony or a crime of assault, may purchase and possess a pocket-sized self-defense spray. Self-defense sprays may contain oleoresin capsicum and no other substance as the active ingredient (pepper sprays).

We strongly urge the University of Wyoming to act on this request and collaborate with us to implement these essential changes. This update will allow the university to continue its commitment to safety while respecting students' right to protect themselves.

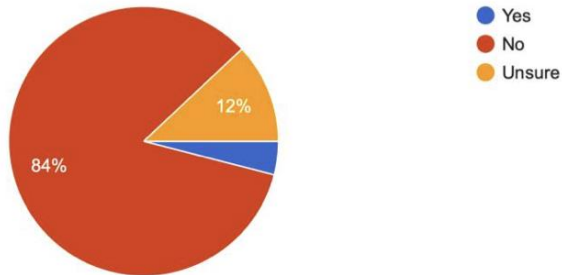

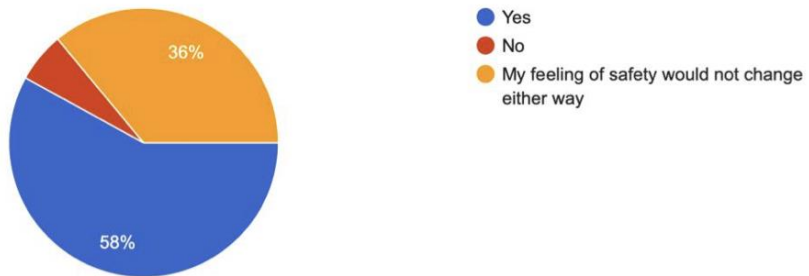
Should tasers be classified as "deadly weapons?"

100 responses



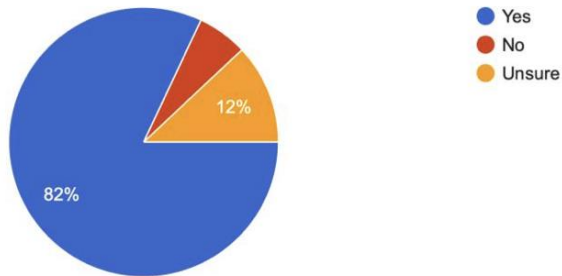
Would you feel safer if you were allowed to carry a taser on campus

Addendum F: Proposed Suggestions to the Student Code of Conduct

35. Weapons: Illegal storage, use, or possession of firearms, ammunition, explosives, dangerous chemicals, paintball gun, airsoft gun, ~~taser~~ projectile-launching electric conducting weapon (such as the TASER energy weapon) or other electronic restraint device, sling-shot, mace or pepper spray container in excess of 1 ounce, knife (blades 3” or longer except in the apartments or for cooking purposes only), precursor for explosives, brass knuckles, blowgun, dart gun, bow, arrow, and martial arts weapons, including but not limited to a star, sword, nun chuck, and club. This does not include the legal carrying or storing of firearms and ammunition with a valid WY conceal carry permit, pursuant to Wyo. Stat. §6-8-105 and UW Regulation 6-4. Use of any such item, even if legally possessed, in a manner that harms or threatens others is prohibited.

Note: Direct contact electric conducting devices would be exempt from this list.

Addendum G: Suggested Definition change to UW Regulation 6-4

UW Regulation 6-4:

“Dangerous weapon” includes any firearm, explosive, paintball gun, airsoft gun, ~~taser~~ projectile-launching electric conducting weapon (such as the TASER energy weapon) or other electronic restraint device, sling-shot, mace or pepper spray

container in excess of 1 ounce, knife (blades 3” or longer except in the apartments or for cooking purposes only), precursor for explosives, brass knuckles, blowgun, dart gun, bow, arrow, and martial arts weapons, including but not limited to a star, sword, nun chuck, and club.

Note: Direct contact electric conducting devices would be exempt from this list.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

The President’s proposed Operating Budget was presented to the Biennium Budget Committee of the Board of Trustees on April 15, 2026. The Biennium Budget Committee held FY 2027 budget hearings with university Administrative Officers on May 11-12, 2026. The Biennium Budget Committee met again on June 3, 2026, to finalize the budget recommendation to the full board. The President’s proposed budget delivered on April 15, 2026, included embedded budget reductions sufficient to cover about half of the anticipated budget shortfall of \$14,831,118. The committee then developed an allocation framework for the remainder of the shortfall based on remaining designated operating fund balance. The remaining fund balance was adjusted to remove any fund balance that is from a direct state appropriation, state statute, or fee revenue for a single specific purpose. The committee directed administration to prorate the remaining reductions in place of additional across the board percentage reductions using the developed formula. In addition the committee discussed how best the university should capture funding associated with vacant positions and asked administration to develop a plan to be provided to the Board of Trustees at the July board retreat.
