# THE UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING MINUTES OF THE TRUSTEES 

## August 20, 1924

# For the confidential information 

 of the Board of TrusteeA special meeting of the Board of Trustees was called at 3 P. M. with the following members present: Mr. Prosier, Mr. Elliott, Mr. Geddes, Mrs. Haggard, Mr. Holiday, Mr. Marshall, Dr. Crane, Mr. Fuller and Mr.

* Smith. Absent members: Mrs. Brooks, Dr. Croft, Mr. Quealy, Governor Ross and Mrs. Morton.

The first matter taken up was the public opening of bids for the various construction jobs which had been advertised for this date. Bids were received for the engineering shops, concrete work on the campus, new courtroom fumiture, plastering at the stock farm and cattle sheds at the stock farm. Architects Hitchcock and Porter were present.

For the concrete sidewalks, curbs and aprons the following bids were received:

Mr. Holliday moved that the contract be awarded to the Laramie Cash Coal Company for items one to ten inclusive with the exception of 43 item number four for the sum of $\$ 3471.72$. This motion was se conded by Mr. Geddes and carried.

For remodeling the milk room and boiler room at the stock farm the following bids were received:

Mr. Marshall moved that the bid of Walter Britten be accepted and that a contract be entered into with Mr. Briton in accordance with his bid for the sum of $\$ 581.00$. The motion was seconded by Mr. Geddes and carried.

For the erection of cattle sheds at the stock farm the bid of Jensen \& Justesen for the sum of $\$ 673$ was received. It was moved
by Mr . Holliday, seconded by Mr. Geddes and carried that the bid be accepted.

For courtroom fumiture in the University Law School bids were received as follows:

Mr. Geddes moved that the contract be awarded to Jensen \&
Justesen for $\$ 700$. The motion was seconded and carried.

Mr. Elliott moved that the contract be awarded to Alfred Wikstrom for the sunn of $\$ 44,077$. This contract requires that the north wall of the building be made of Laramie sandstone. The contract carries a bonus and penalty clause of twenty-five dollars per day; this clause does not apply to the stone facing of the north wall. The President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees are authorized to enter into a contract for Johnson Heat Control Service in all eight of the engineering shops. This motion was seconded by Mr. Holiday and carried.

Minutes of the annual meeting of the Board and of the intervening meetings of the Executive Committee were read and accepted.

Mr. Holliday moved that Dr. Crane be authorized to proceed with the construction of the feed racks and troughs under such terms and designs as he considers advisable. This motion was seconded by Mr. Geddes and carried.

Mr. Sevison, State Highway Engineer, came before the Board and

again presented his proposition for cooperative draining of land adjoining the Agronory Farm and the Woods Landing road. After discussion Mr. Marshall moved that the Board authorize the expenditure of one half the cost of this worik up to the sum mentioned in the State Highway proposition. This sum is $\$+862.00$. In the event that the total expense should exceed the sum estimated an additional expenditure by the Board to cover the difference is authorized, subject to the approval of Dr. Crane. It was moved that a contract with the State Highway Department in accordance with this motion be drawn and entered into by the President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees. The motion was seconded by Mrs. Haggard and carried.

President Crans then presented the building fund budget and the various items therein were discussed at length. Mr. Holliday moved that Mr . Hitchoock be given charge of the preparation of plans and specifications for the electrical power plant, distributing system and addition to the power house. Mr. Hitchcock will confer with such other engineers as he deems advisable and the matter of compensation for the preparation of these plans and specifications will be left with Dr. Crane.

The Secretary was instmeted to call for bids to be received at the September meeting of the Board. This motion was seconded by Mr. Marshall and carried.

Upon the recommendation of President Crane the following appointments were confirmed:

Mr. Earl D. Hay, Dean of the College of Engineering, for the period September 1, 1924 to August 31, 1925, at a salary of $\$ 5,000$.

Miss Marguerite M. Hussey, Associate Professor of Physical Fducation for Women and head of the department, for the period September 1, 1925 to June 30, 1925, at a salary of $\$ 3400$.

> Miss Mary Carson, Instructor in Home Economics, for the period September 1, 1924 to August 31,1925 , at a salary of $\$ 1700$.

Miss Katherine Waller was granted sabbatical leave of absence for the year September 1, 1924 to August 31, 1925, at $40 \%$ of her regular salary.

## Degrees

Mrs. Haggard moved that President Crane be authorized to enter into an agreement with the city of Laramie for the experimental oiling of a portion of Thornburg Street adjoining the south edge of the campus, the University to bear one half the cost of this experiment. The motion was seconded by Mr. Geddes and carried.

Mr. Holiday then presented a written report of his attendance at the meeting of the Executive Committee of the Governing Boards of State Universities and Allied Institutions which took place at Chicago in July. At the conclusion of his report Mrs. Haggard moved, seconded by Mr. Geddes, that the Board express its appreciation of the good work which Mr . Holliday has done as our representative in this organization. The motion was carried.

Upon the recommendation of Mr. Fuller Mrs. Haggard moved that Mr. Matt Mechaly of Casper be granted a permit to secure sand and gravel from the $W \frac{1}{2} \operatorname{SE} \frac{1}{4}$ and $S E \frac{1}{4} \operatorname{SE} \frac{1}{4}$ Section 12, Township 33, Range 80, at a price of ten cents per cubic yard with a minimum charge of twenty-five dollars per month. This permit is to mun for a period of two years. The motion was seconded by Mr. Geddes and carried.

There being no further business the Board adjourned sine die.
