Mr. Burwell moved that \$6,615.69 be appropriated for the purchase of cast iron 6" and 8" water pipes for the Department of Buildings and Grounds. This pipe will be used for various connections needed by the construction of the new buildings. This motion was seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried.

Mr. "Scotty" Jack, from Cheyenne, then appeared before the Board to request that trust fund monies handled locally be invested in shares of his company known as the Investors' Syndicate. After discussion, the Comptroller was requested to investigate with the University's legal counsel and see if it is legally possible to invest these funds in such securities.

Mr. Burwell moved that the sum of \$2,091.65 be appropriated to improve ventilation in the Agriculture building. This money will be used to construct three small penthouses on the roof, including electric blowers, and to connect to the plenum chambers the hoods now installed on the fourth floor which are vented directly out through the roof. This motion was seconded by Dr. Cunningham and carried.

President Humphrey then mentioned that the time has arrived for the laying of cornerstones for the several new buildings now under construction and that legislative matters would require a Board meeting in February. The dates of February 13-14 were selected for this next meeting of the Board.

Mr. Sullivan moved that the sum of \$425.42 be appropriated to cover the cost of making 523 examination boards used by students taking final examinations in the auditorium. This motion was seconded by Dr. Cunningham and carried.

President Humphrey then recommended that an additional appropriation of \$2,000 be made to cover the purchase of overcoats for use by members of the University band.

Mr. Watenpaugh moved that the appropriation be made and that the lowest bid (that of Louis G. Baine) be accepted. The motion was seconded by Mr. Burwell and carried.

President Humphrey then submitted three bids covering landscaping and planting of trees, grass and shrubs on the open range. Professor C. L. Porter of the Department of Botany was invited in to discuss the matter with the Board members. After discussion the President was requested to take these bids under advisement, investigate the responsibility of the low bidder, consider the elimination or suspension of the open air theater and the effect of the elimination upon the planting and sidewalks and report

back to the Board at the next meeting.

The Board then received Mr. Frank Mockler, Legislator from Dubois, and Mr. Charles Hanner, Legislator from Worland, who wished to discuss the proposed State Employees Retirement program, its effect upon the University and the wishes of the Board of Trustees and the faculty in this regard. After discussion it was agreed by all parties that the clause in the bill permitting continuance of present retirement systems should include the University Limited Service, and that the law should be optional for all present employees of the University and compulsory for all new employees. It was also agreed that it might be possible to place a ceiling or salary limit on that portion of State employees' salaries which would be subject to the percentage assessment payable to the retirement fund.

Mr. Sullivan then moved that an appropriation of \$336.77 be made for salaries in the Registrar's office. This motion was seconded by Mr. Waten-paugh and carried.

Upon the motion of Mr. Del Monte, Dean Robert R. Bruce was granted a leave of absence from June 20 to July 30 so that he may accept an invitation to teach during the first summer session at the University of California. One month of this time would count as Dean Bruce's annual vacation, and he would receive no salary from the University for the remainder of the period. Professor A. J. McGaw was named Acting Dean of the Graduate School during Dean Bruce's absence. Mr. Sullivan seconded this motion and it was carried.

Dr. Cunningham moved, it was seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried, that the Council of the Associated Students at the Northwest Center at Powell be permitted to use a tract of land, two hundred feet square, at the southeast corner of the Powell Experiment Station as a site for a Student Union building. After completing thirty years service, if the Board of Trustees should desire it;

Upon becoming sixty-five years of age or older up to and including age sixty-nine, at the option of the Board of Trustees;

On July 1st following their becoming seventy years of age.

To be entitled to the benefits of the above provisions, an employee must have rendered fifteen or more years service to this University as a full-time paid employee.

> -3f all employee

The employment of all employees who have attained the age of seventy years and who have not rendered at least fifteen years service shall be terminated on July 1st following the attainment of such age.

-4-

Special provisions may be made for President Emeritus.

-5-

The annual salaries of all employees who have attained or who may hereafter attain limited service status shall be paid according to the following scale:

> \$1590 - \$1800 shall be paid to Deans and employees in comparable positions;

\$1200 - \$1500 shall be paid to instructors, assistant professors, associate professors, professors, and employees in comparable positions;

\$900 - \$1200 shall be paid to all other employees.

Within the several brackets the minimum salary shall be paid to those who have rendered fifteen years service. All those who have served longer than fifteen years shall be paid an annual salary of \$25.00 per year for each year over fifteen years of service in addition to the minimum salary amount above stated. if

When an employee is placed on limited service status he will be free to accept any other employment except that

-6-

- in the judgment of the University his other employment interferes with the duties he has been assigned as a limited service employee; or
- (2) he is employed by the State of Wyoming or any of its institutions or agencies

he shall not receive his payments as a limited service employee of the University during the period in which (1) or (2) applies.

The Board then discussed a proposed agreement between the University and the U. S. Department of the Interior (Bureau of Reclamation). Mr. Watenpaugh moved, it was seconded by Mr. Hansen and carried, that the Board withhold its approval of this agreement until President Humphrey has communicated with Mr. Charles F. Brannan of the Department of Agriculture and secured his approval or opinion of the agreement, as the Department of Agriculture is concerned and cordial relations between the University of Wyoming and the Department of Agriculture must not be impaired.

President Humphrey then submitted a copy of a survey covering the various kinds of insurance purchased by the University. It was decided to hold discussion of this survey until the next meeting of the Board in order to give the Trustees time to read and become familiar with the subject.

President Humphrey was requested to proceed with the organization of a state-wide Nurses Training program in cooperation with certain hospitals that are eligible to offer it. This motion was made by Mr. Hansen, seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried.

Architect Porter then appeared before the Board and presented preliminary sketches of the new field house and stadium. After discussion, Dr. Building Program Cunningham moved that these plans be approved as drawn and that we go ahead Sladium, with the project subject to the availability of funds. This motion was

seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried.

Mr. Burwell then moved that the sum of \$4,500 be appropriated from the main operating budget of the University to the War Memorial fund office to cover expenses for the completion of the program. This motion was seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried.

Mr. Burwell moved that the sum of \$35,000 from the oil royalties fund proposed for construction of the open air theater in the open range be allocated to the construction funds of the field house and stadium. This motion was seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried.

Mr. Sullivan moved that the sum of \$479.33 be appropriated to cover the cost of quarrying and cutting stone for the historical marker at Old Fort Laramie which had been requested by Senator Robert Rymill. This motion was seconded by Mr. Burwell and carried.

Mr. Watenpaugh moved that an appropriation of \$887.75 be made to be added to the \$4,000 previously appropriated to cover the cost of the Comptroller's office audit made by Raab, Roush and Company. This motion was seconded by Mr. Del Monte and carried.

Mr. Sullivan moved that an additional appropriation of \$18,000 be made for the payment of insurance premiums until the end of the fiscal year June 30. Mr. Del Monte seconded this motion and it was carried.

Mr. Watenpaugh moved that the sum of \$147.60 be made to pay taxes for the year 1948 on the Moudy land recently purchased by the University and that the sum of \$16.10 be appropriated to pay taxes on the Fred Hahn lot which the University has recently acquired upon which the taxes have not been paid.

Mr. Watenpaugh moved that an appropriation of \$1,163.36 be made for the purchase of equipment previously installed in the Natural Resources Research Institute by the United States Department of Commerce for research in the drying and briquetting of coal as the University wishes to continue this research even though the United States has withdrawn from the project. This motion was seconded by Mr. Del Monte and carried.

Mr. Watenpaugh moved, it was seconded by Mr. Sullivan and carried, that any money realized from the sale of surplus or temporary buildings such as prefabricated houses, trailers, Butler huts and row apartments be placed in a trust fund to be expended under the direction of the Board of Trustees.

Dr. Cunningham then moved that President Humphrey be requested to proceed with the procurement of plans and specifications for the erection of a new President's home on the campus. This motion was seconded by Mr. Hansen and carried.

The Comptroller was requested to investigate the possibility of reopening the barber shop in the Wyoming Union and report back to the Board at the February meeting.

Then followed a discussion of the sale of intoxicating liquors to minor students by certain bars in the City of Laramie. It was moved by Dr. Sale forbidden Cunningham, seconded by Mrs. Patterson and carried that each student's pic- to mimors ture be attached to his activity card and that the date of birth be indelibly printed or inscribed upon each card.

President Humphrey then proffered the Community College bill proposed for introduction into the Legislature which would permit the establishment of institutions offering college work beyond the high school level in certain districted areas in the State. The President has had the benefit of Community counsel from the Board and officers of the Casper Junior College and other educators. After discussion, Mr. Burwell moved that the President should confer with the Attorney General, get the bill redrafted giving consideration to the recommendations proposed by interested men in Casper, and that the bill should be introduced into the Legislature. This motion was seconded by Mrs. Patterson and carried.

MEMO. OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN UNIVERSIT

AND U.S. DEPARTMENT

OF INTERIOR (BUREAU OF RECLAMATION)

1949

The President then submitted a proposed Memorandum of Understanding between the University and the United States Department of Interior (Bureau of Reclamation) which had been submitted by the Department of Agriculture with the suggestion that if approved by the Trustees, a copy should be sent to the Bureau of Reclamation for its perusal and comment. Upon the motion of Mr. Hansen, seconded by Mr. Del Monte and carried, it was so ordered.

Mr. Hansen then moved that the following arrangements between the College of Agriculture and the Bureau of Reclamation as recommended by BUREAU OF RECLAMATION Dean Hill be approved as a temporary expedient pending execution of the FRRANGEMENTS APPROVED formal Memorandum of Understanding. This motion was seconded by Mr. Waten-HS TEMPORARY Experient. paugh and carried.

Dean Hill feels that the need for soil surveying and soil classification work is so pressing that the College of Agriculture should be given authority to negotiate contracts with the Bureau of Reclamation for this work. Such an arrangement meets with the approval of the Department of Agriculture, as a temporary expedient, as is indicated in the paragraphs from Secretary Brannan's letter to Mr. Simpson last April which Dean Hill quotes in the following letter to the President. The President requests the direction of the Trustees in settling this problem.

February 25, 1949

Dr. G. D. Humphrey Office of the President Campus

Dear Dr. Humphrey:

In a letter dated January 13, I requested that an account be established in the special grants fund from which the Agricultural College would be permitted to make payments in advance of collections with the provision that at no time are payments to exceed collections by more than \$10,000. This request was made to enable the College to enter into a contract to do

soil surveying and land classification for the Bureau of Reclamation.

You have reported that the Board of Trustees postponed the granting of this request until a satisfactory over-all memorandum of agreement is worked out. I fear that if we wait until that is accomplished we may be delayed so that we could do Little or no field work this season.

I am quite sure that the Secretary of Agriculture will approve the signing of a contract for soil survey and classification on a unit basis. My belief in this rests upon the following extract from a letter written to Mr. Milward L. Simpson, President of the University Board of Trustees, dated April 12, 1948. The underlining is mine.

"We hold that the rules of good organization and administration require that Federal funds for agricultural activities, aside from the teaching of agriculture in the classroom, be appropriated to the Department of Agriculture, whether they are to be used directly by Federal agencies or to be channeled to State agricultural agencies. The Department of Agriculture now constitutes the channel to these agencies. The establishment of other channels through non-agricultural Federal agencies, such as the Bureau of Reclamation, leads to conflicts, duplication, confusion and waste. It is recognized that certain funds for agricultural programs are now made available through such Federal agencies. It is our view that, as rapidly as possible, this situation should be corrected by the direct appropriation of all Federal funds to be used for agricultural purposes, other than formal teaching, to the Department of Agriculture or through this Department to the proper State agencies.

"Pending the attainment of this goàl, the Department believes that because of the need for agricultural services to be performed at a rate beyond the availability of current funds in this Department, it is in the interest of the success of western irrigation to agree to an arrangement whereby needed agricultural work can be financed by funds appropriated to non-agricultural agencies. However, we believe that Memoranda of Understanding designed to carry out such a procedure should indicate that arrangements made under them are but temporary expedients pending the establishment of the type of arrangements we are advocating.

"In addition, we believe that these Memoranda (including that which is under consideration) should be drafted in a manner that provides for the responsibility for the design and prosecution of research, studies, investigations and education to be vested in the agricultural agency with which the Bureau contracts and that the non-agricultural agency's contribution to the activity be limited to providing funds or other resources in a manner that will not place it in an agricultural research or investigation

policy determining or accomplishment position."	
Therefore, I am urging that a special account be set up as re- quested on January 13 and that the Agricultural College be given authority to negotiate contracts for soil surveying and soil classification with the Bureau of Reclamation.	
I believe that if we can arrange these contracts it will help speed up irrigation development and thus benefit the people of the state, and at the same time the Agricultural College will get a great deal of information on the soils of the state which will be valuable in our program of research and teaching in fu- ture years.
