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A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the University of Wyoming was held on July 13, 1968 in the Board Room of Old Main. President Millett called the meeting to order at 9:15 a.m.

<u>Pharmacy Building</u>. President Carlson reported that the bid accepted on the Pharmacy building provided for one elevator and that the alternate for an additional elevator was not accepted. Construction funds are now available to provide for acceptance of this alternate but there is some legal question as to whether it will be possible to now pick up this one alternate. It was moved, seconded, and carried that President Millett be authorized to contact the Executive Committee for approval of acceptance of this alternate if it is found feasible and if a decision is required prior to the next scheduled Board meeting.

President Millett reported that a house north of Lewis Street on the same block in which the University held property might become available for sale and that funds could be borrowed for its purchase as for previous purchases in this area. It was moved, seconded, and carried that President Carlson, Mr. Hays and Mr. Millett be authorized to purchase this property if it becomes available before the September Board meeting at a price not to exceed that recommended by President Millett.

There being no further business, upon motion duly made, seconded, and carried the meeting was adjourned at 12:15 p.m.
