THE UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING Minutes of BOARD OF TRUSTEES

December 5-6, 1969

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A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of The University of Wyoming was held on December 5 and 6, 1969, in the Board Room of Old Main. President Hollon called the meeting to order at 10:30 a.m. on December 5th.

The following members answered the roll call: Brodrick,
Hickey, Hines, Hollon, Johnson, Jones, McBride, Ostlund, Pence,
Quealy, Sullivan, True and ex officio members Carlson, Roberts and
MacMillan. Governor Hathaway was absent. Also present were the
following University personnel: James Ranz, Dean of Academic Affairs;
Elliott Hays, Executive Assistant for Business and Plant Affairs;
Joseph Geraud, Legal Advisor to the Board of Trustees, and Dr.
William R. Steckel representing the Faculty Senate.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried that the minutes of the regular meeting of October 3-4, 1969, be approved as circulated.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried that the minutes of the special meeting of October 10, 1969, be approved as circulated.

A motion was made, seconded, and carried that the minutes of the regular meeting of November 6, 1969, be approved as circulated.

It was then moved, seconded, and carried that the meeting go into Executive Session with Executive staff invited to remain.

The meeting reconvened in open session at 3:00 p.m. with four representatives of the Joint Business Council from the Wind River Indian Reservation--Vida Hawkus, Shoshoni Tribal Council; Ted Bell, Araphao Tribe and NYC Director; Leslie Milam. Education Specialist.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

EXECUTIVE SESSION Bureau of Indian Affairs, and Martin Steinwand, Administrative Manager,
Bureau of Indian Affairs, and several University American Indian
students. They discussed matters of common concern until approximately 4:30 p.m., when the visitors withdrew following which the
meeting was recessed.

The meeting was reconvened at 9:30 a.m. on December 6th with the same persons present as on the previous day with the exception of Trustees Jones and Roberts who were absent.

Chairman Brodrick reported the Committee's findings and recommendations resulting from the Committee meeting of December 4, 1969.

Stadium Expansion. The Committee noted that there were no changes in the concept of the project; architects and engineers are progressing on detailed drawings keeping in close touch with each other and with University personnel. It is anticipated that the plans and specifications will be complete by the weekend of January 8, and that the Committee would go over them at that time. As discussed at the Committee meeting Mr. Hays reported that a consulting construction cost estimating firm in Denver had been contacted and that it was agreeable to the architects to have the University enter into an agreement with this firm.

<u>Fine Arts Center</u>. The Committee noted steady progress on this project with a target bid date of March 1970.

Other Capital Outlay Projects. Mr. Brodrick noted that the Committee had reviewed other projects and members of the

Committee hoped to visit campuses in Colorado and Utah to inspect physical education facilities and possibly a plant science laboratory.

Beef Breeding Unit. After an explanation of an error that had been made in the preliminary cost estimate for this facility, it was moved, seconded and carried that the Committee recommendation be approved and the low bid of H-V Inc. of Laramie in the amount of \$76,141 accepted for construction of the Multi-Purpose Building and Cattle Shed, land leveling, and associated utilities and that University personnel be authorized to complete the project as outlined to the Committee.

Plant Science Laboratory. Mr. Brodrick reported the urgency of replacing an exhaust hood and stack located in a laboratory of the main Agricultural College Building because of an explosive condition, and it was moved, seconded, and carried that Physical Plant Division personnel be authorized to proceed at once with the removal and replacement of the exhaust hood and stack in the Plant Science Laboratory with the necessary funds to be appropriated later.

- 3. Executive Assistant for Student Affairs. It was moved, seconded and carried that an appropriation of \$5,850 be authorized to meet the cost of equipment, supplies, part-time labor, and data processing cards required to implement the issuance of a single identification card to all University students.

Wyoming National Guard

4. Wyoming National Guard. It was moved, seconded, and carried that an appropriation of \$1,480 be authorized to reimburse the Wyoming National Guard for its standby alert on October 18, 1969.

Development Farm

5. Seedskadee Development Farm. It was moved, seconded Seedskadee and carried an appropriation of \$3,000 be authorized for the 1969-70 fiscal year to permit the hiring of a year around farm laborer effective January 1, 1970 (\$2,400) and for housing repairs to accommodate this extra help (\$600), this appropriation was with the understanding that a salary commitment of \$5,004 would be included in the 1970-71 operating budget to support this additional position.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the following resolution be adopted to implement the 1969 legislative authorization for University participation in this system.

### UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING Laramie, Wyoming

#### Retirement Resolution

A supplemental TIAA-CREF retirement plan is hereby established for the University of Wyoming by SF178 passed during the 1969 Legislative session. Classes of employees eligible for participation are all permanent full-time employees earning an annual salary of \$6,600 or more.

TEACHERS INSURANCE ANNUIT ASSOCIATION (TIA. AND COLLEGE RETIREMENT EQUITIES FUND (CREF) RETIREMENT SYSTEM

- I. Participation. (a) Required: For all present employees earning an annual salary of \$8,600 or more on the effective date of this plan and immediately upon employment for all future employees in the above salary level.
  - (b) Voluntary: For all present and future employees earning more than \$6,600 but less than \$8,600. Staff members who elect TIAA-CREF must contribute additional permium to bring the total annual contribution up to a \$200 level. Participation in TIAA-CREF will be optional for all those age 60 and over even though the annual salary may be \$8,600 or over.

The Preliminary service period will be waived for an employee otherwise eligible who already owns a retirement annuity contract issued by Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association.

- II. Retirement Age. Except as provided in Section III, all participants in this retirement plan shall retire at the end of the fiscal year in which they attain age 65, herein called normal retirement age.
- III. Extension of Service. By vote of the Board of Trustees, extensions of service beyond normal retirement age may be made for definite periods not to exceed one year each, but no such extensions shall postpone retirement beyond the end of the fiscal year in which age 70 is attained.

- Contributions. Each participant in this retirement plan shall IV. contribute 5 per cent of his regular compensation; on salary between \$6,600 and \$8,600 - University of Wyoming shall deduct each such contribution from compensation payments, add 5 per cent of the participant's compensation on salary between \$6,600 and \$8,600 as its contribution, and apply the combined sum to the purchase of retirement benefits for the participant as follows:
  - (a) At the election of the participant, either 100 per cent, 75 per cent, 50 percent, or 25 per cent of such combined sum will be forwarded to Teachers Insurance and Annuity Association as a premium for a TIAA retirement annuity contract on the participant's life.
  - (b) The balance, if any, of such combined sum will be forwarded to the College Retirement Equities Fund as a premium for a CREF retirement annuity certificate for the participant's life.
- Leave of Absence. During leave of absence on part pay, the V. University of Wyoming will continue contributions based on salary paid while on leave of absence if the participant does likewise.
- VI. Contracts. Each TIAA retirement annuity contract and CREF certificate issued in accordance with Section IV of this plan is for the sole purpose of providing a retirement and/or death benefit and is the property of the individual participant.
- VII. Repurchase. In the event a participant in TIAA or TIAA-CREF leaves the employ of the University of Wyoming for reasons other than retirement or disability and requests repurchase of his annuity, the University of Wyoming will approve such repurchase provide it meets the conditions under which TIAA-CREF will

repurchase annuities automatically, and provided that the participant consents, and that the portion of the repurchase value attributable to the University of Wyoming contributions shall be paid to the University of Wyoming by TIAA-CREF.

- VIII. Amendment. While it is expected that this plan will continue indefinitely, the University of Wyoming reserves the right to modify or discontinue it at any time.
- IX. Effective Date. The effective date of this retirement plan shall be January 1, 1970.

Dr. Carlson reported his meeting with the Governor concerning this matter and that on the basis of this discussion he wished to withdraw the recommendation for a change in the policy which had been submitted at the October 3-4, 1969 Board meeting. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Board reaffirm its present policy providing a preference of 2-1/2% to Wyoming resident "suppliers" and a 5% preference to residents who "manufacture, produce, or grow" products purchased by the University.

Mr. Hoke MacMillan gave a complete report on the program whereby the Trustees had authorized an appropriation of \$10,000 to permit student recruitment of Wyoming minority students. He stated that seven students (three Black Americans and four Mexican-Americans) had been recruited, that the committee had instituted a program of continuing assistance to them, both financial and scholastic, and it was the opinion of the committee that all were making satisfactory progress.
