# Minutes of BOARD OF TRUSTEES March 7-8, 1969

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A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of The University of Wyoming was convened at 10:00 a.m., on March 7, 1969, in the Board Room of Old Main. President Carlson introduced new members of the Board Mrs. Winifred E. Hickey and John C. Ostlund and congratulated Mr. McBride upon his reappointment to a full six year term. He advised that the other new member of the Board, Alfred M. Pence, had been unable to arrange to be present for this meeting.

The new members were welcomed by the Board.

In the absence of a President or Vice President, both of whose terms on the Board expired on February 28, 1969, it was moved seconded, and carried that Mr. Joseph B. Sullivan be elected temporary chairman to preside until such time as officers are elected.

The following members answered the roll call: Brodrick, Hickey, Hines, Hollon, Johnson, Jones, McBride, Ostlund, Quealy, Sullivan, True, and ex officio members Carlson and Roberts. Members absent were: Governor Hathaway and Mr. Pence. Executive staff present were: Geraud, Hays, and Ranz. Dr. Robert J. McColloch and Mr. Carl Sandberg were also present representing the Faculty Senate and the Associated Students University of Wyoming respectively.

Mr. Sullivan stated that the floor was open for nominations for President. After motion was made, seconded, and carried to close nominations, Mr. C. E. "Jerry" Hollon was elected President by

written ballot. Mr. Sullivan relinquished the chair and Mr. Hollon presided.

The floor was opened for nominations for Vice President: Mr. Sullivan was nominated; upon motion duly made, seconded, and carried nominations were closed and a unanimous ballot was cast for Mr. Sullivan. President Hollon then called for nominations for Secretary since Mr. Sullivan had previously filled this office. Mr. Quealy was nominated; upon motion duly made, seconded, and carried, nominations were closed and a unanimous ballot was cast for Mr. Quealy.

He expressed his deep feeling for the University, his admiration for President Carlson, and made particularly clear that he left with no animosity for anyone at the University. He invited the Board to call upon him if he could ever be of assistance in the future.

would have a recommendation on this matter for the April Board meeting.

President Carlson referred to a proposal submitted by the School of Religion which would make the School a part of the University of Wyoming. He briefly reviewed the status of the School as an autonomous organization supported by the various churches with the University offering transfer credit for course work completed in the School up to an aggregate of six semester hours. Course work is conducted in the facilities provided by the church groups. Dr. Carlson pointed out that the School would like to have classroom space provided on campus, but he stated that he had no recommendation to make at this time.

President Carlson presented a recommendation from the Faculty Senate Committee on Tenure and Promotion for the award of the title emeritus to all retiring and retired faculty who have at least ten years of service at the University. Discussion followed concerning the present use of the title to recognize particularly distinguished service and it was the general feeling of the Board that there should be some special recognition for particularly outstanding faculty when they retired. No action was taken.
