A regular meeting of the Trustees of The University of Wyoming was held in the Board Room of Old Main on April 23-24, 1971. President Hollon called the meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. on April 23 following a meeting as Committee of the whole.

- 1. College of Arts and Sciences. An appropriation of \$1,000 for the Department of Political Science to support organized research related to state and local governments and other agencies, the funds to be allocated as follows: \$300 for Contractual expenses, and \$700 for supplies.
- Vice President for Finance. An appropriation of \$1,500 to support the operating costs of an automobile permanently assigned to Mr. Hays for security purposes.
- 3. <u>Division of Finance and Budget</u>. An appropriation of \$4,600 for continuing costs of conversion of the University accounting system, to be allocated as follows: \$3,600 for teletype rental; \$1,000 for special forms.

The meeting was recessed for lunch at 1:00p.m. and reconvened at 1:30 p.m. with the same persons present.

- 1. Non-resident Registration Fee. Confirmation of the nonresident registration fee of \$675.25 per semester, effective September 1,
 1971, which represents the \$150 per semester increase in the non-resident
 fee included in the 1971-73 legislative budget request. It does not
 include any additional student activity fees which the Trustees may
 approve.
- 2. Board Charges. An increase of \$35.00 per year, effective September 1, 1971, for board charges in the University cafeterias in order to assure coverage for bond payments, resulting in an annual charge for room and board of \$943.00

- 3. Student Activity Fee. The assessment of an additional \$3.00 per semester, effective September 1, 1971, to all full-time students to be distributed as follows: \$1.50 to be placed in a student fee fixed account to be administered in the manner directed by the President of the University of Wyoming for the purpose of assisting disadvantaged Wyoming students; and \$1.50 to be made available to the Student Senate for expenditure.
- 4. <u>Summer Reading Clinic==College of Education</u>. The assessment of a fee of \$100 per pupil for enrollment in a Reading Clinic to be held during June 1971, the fees to be put in a revolving fund for the use of buying necessary materials and paying stipends to persons who oversee the clinic but who are not enrolled for credit.

After a review of the report submitted on the examination of the books and records of the University for the period July 1, 1969, through June 30, 1970, and noting there were no errors reported, and the recommendations for two procedural changes concerning 1) the recording of changes or adjustments as well as dates paid on catering sales slips which are filed in numerical sequence, and the restriction of the use of cafeteria receipt books to cafeteria receipts only, and 2) establishment by the Campus Police Department of a numerical control of outstanding citations issued, with preparation of monthly summaries and a fiscal report on the same, it was moved, seconded, and carried that the report be accepted and placed on file. It was understood that procedures would be established to implement the recommendations included in the report. The following statement was then signed by each Trustee present, the original to be returned to the State Examiner and a copy placed on record herewith:

It was moved, seconded, and carried that approval be granted for the establishment of the Derek J. Prowse Professorship of Science Education, with the understanding that the position will initially by supported by funds from a National Science Foundation grant and at the expiration of the grant, the title will be assigned to a regularly budgeted position in the Department of Physics. The establishment of the Derek J. Prowse Professorship of Science Education does not authorize the creation of a new position.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that authorization be granted to offer the degree Educational Specialist (Engineering Option), effective June 1, 1971, with the understanding that no additional faculty of facilities would be required to initiate this program.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that authorization be granted for the official discontinuance of the Department of General Engineering, effective July 1, 1971, and of the degree Bachelor of ScienceSCIENCE IN GENERAL in General Engineering, effective September 1, 1972.

The meeting was reconvened at 10:00 a.m. on April 24, 1971, with the same persons present as on the previous day with the exception of ex officio member Schrader, who was absent.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the recommendation of the Committee be accepted and authorization granted for calling for bids for demolition, concrete work, sidewalks, storm sewers, lawns, and plantings in the Science Center area, to be supported by funds available for site improvements in this area.

Action was deferred on a request from the Colorado Interstate Corporation for an easement sixty-six feet wide and approximately 7,488 feet long through a pasture area in West Laramie.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that in accordance with the RAILWAY EASEMENT, recommendation of the Committee the Trustees recommend to the State Board of Land Commissioners that approval be granted to change the railway right of way on the Sheridan Substation as requested by Peter Kiewit Sons Company.

(1) Change Order. It was moved, seconded and carried that the FINE ARTS CENTER recommendation of the Committee be accepted and approval granted for a

(2) Time Extension. Action was deferred on a Committee recommendation that the Trustees approve an extension of two days' time for the completion date of the Fine Arts Center because of inclement weather.

(1) New Physical Education Facility. Mr. Brodrick reported that Architects Toohey and Deines are making acceptable progress on planning for this facility, working closely with the Physical Education Department and the Physical Plant Division. Schematic drawings and cost estimates will be available for Committee consideration at their next meeting. (2) Student Union Remodeling and Addition. Mr. Brodrick reported that Architect Dehnert is well along with preliminary plans, and the plans will be available for consideration by the Trustees at their next meeting.

At the suggestion of Mr. Hines, members of the Committee will visit University Substations during the latter part of the summer. Other Trustees are invited to participate in the visitations, which will be arranged through President Carlson's office.

Mr. Brodrick stated that this concluded the report of his committee

It was moved and seconded that the 1971-72 budget be adopted as amended by the following actions: 1) the establishment of an annual salary rate of \$24,060 for Frank J. Trelease as Professor of Law on a nine-month basis for 1971-72; and 2) a change in the budget for Inter-collegiate Athletics, as discussed with Mr. Glenn Jacoby, which provided for a reduction in the number of athletic grants-in-aid awards in sports other than football and basketball, and for the withdrawal of fiscal support from the sports of tennis and soccer including affected personnel

positions, as necessary, effective July 1, 1972. It was understood that as a result of this action there would be an adjustment in the awarding of grants-in-aid so that resident and non-resident awards would be made on an equal basis and that those in the sport of golf would be resident value awards only. These changes in the budget for Intercollegiate Athletics were made to insure that the total athletic budget would remain within the amount set forth in the legislative budget, realizing that without such adjustments an additional \$116,436 would be necessary for the next biennium to care for other increases authorized in the budget for Intercollegiate Athletics after the legislative budget was prepared. Mr. Trud presented a report for the W. R. Coe Trust Fund Committee in which he pointed out that for the first time all of the interest accruing to Coe funds is being used for current expenditures and none is being used to increase the capital. The limited funds available for the Trustees' Reserve were also discussed. On call for the question, the original motion to adopt the 1971-72 budget as amended was carried.

Information concerning a supplemental budget request for the Agricultural Extension Service, which will be supported from additional Federal funds above those estimated in the legislative budget request, for the 1971-73 biennium was distributed. After reviewing the report, it was moved, seconded, and carried that the following supplementary budget request for 1971-73 be accepted by the Trustees and recommended to the Governor for his approval.

A written report concerning the issuing of \$2,500,000 in re-REVENUE BOND SALES venue bonds as authorized by the 1971 Legislature for the Student Union Addition and completion of previously authorized projects was distributed to the Trustees present. After discussing the contents of the report, it was moved, seconded, and carried that The University of Wyoming retain Dean Borthwick as its bond attorney. It was then moved, seconded, and carried that the services of Dain, Kalman & Quail, Inc., be retained as financial adviser for the sale of \$2,500,000 in revenue bonds at a cost of \$3,675, exclusive of the cost of obtaining ratings from the rating services and the bond attorney's fee which are to be paid by the University.

President Carlson announced that Governor's Day will be held on GOVERNOR'S DAY October 12, 1971, and will include the Governor's annual review of cadets as well as other academic activities.

President Carlson reported a recommendation from the University PARTICIPATION OF Cultural Affairs Committee that Trustees don academic regalia for commencement ceremonies. It was moved and seconded that Trustees don academic regalia for commencement ceremonies. On call for a vote, the motion was defeated. The Trustees concurred with a recommendation from President Carlson that the Secretary of the Trustees read the honorary

degree citations at future commencement exercises.

TRUSTEES IN COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES

For the information of the Trustees Vice President Ranz presented an informal report on several proposed changes in the academic calendar which were considered by the Faculty Senate during 1970-71. Mr. Berry announced that the student government was in the process of polling the faculty on their preference for an academic calendar, results of which will be available at the time of the next meeting of the Trustees.

Mr. Hollon reported a recent conversation he had with Governor Hathaway concerning the University of Wyoming Foundation, and his assurance to the Governor that he would take appropriate action to seek

a solution to problems arising in connection with the Foundation. It was moved and seconded that an invitation be extended to Board members of the Foundation to meet with the Trustees at their next regular meeting. A motion was made to amend the first motion so that the invitation, as extended, would supply generally information concerning the dissatisfaction with the present management of the Foundation. The motion to amend was seconded, and it carried with one dissenting vote. A vote was then called for on the original motion as amended, and it carried. It was understood that Mr. Hollon would extend the invitation on behalf of the Trustees.

Mr. Pence left the meeting and is hereafter recorded as absent.

Mr. True called attention to a conflict between the annual CHANGE II ANNUAL M meeting of the Trustees, currently scheduled for May 31-June 1, 1971, and the Memorial Day holiday, which now falls on the last Monday in May. It was moved, seconded, and carried that, subject to concurrence by Trustees Pence and Quealy, the date for the annual meeting of the Trustees should be changed to May 28-29, 1971.

Mr. True reported the dissatisfaction of the Wyoming Retail
Merchants Association with the University policy which permits the sale
of merchandise to organizations and persons not directly associated with
the University. This matter will be considered at the next meeting of
the Trustees when more information will be available.

In reply to a question raised concerning the status of the recent law suit filed against the University by the parents of a child who fell from a window in White Hall in the summer of 1970, Mr. Geraud reported that the insurance company is investigating the accident and that the case will eventually be heard in the District Court at Cheyenne.

STATUS OF LAW SUITS PENDING AGAINST THE UNIVERSITY President Carlson agreed to provide the Trustees with additional information concerning the financial status and managerial arrangements for the dormitories. He also assured the Trustees that any change in the University's policy concerning occupancy of the dormitories would be publicized, not only for the benefit of students but also for persons or organizations planning construction of living units in the Laramie area.
