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Record of Minutes of

A regular meeting of the Trustees of the University of Wyoming was held on February 26-27, 1971 in the Board Room of Old Main.

President Hollon called the meeting to order at 2:00 p.m. on February 26, 1971.

The following members answered the roll call: Brodrick,
Bunning, Hickey, Hines, Hollon, Jones, McBride, Ostlund, Pence, Quealy,
Sullivan, True, and ex officio members Carlson and Archuleta. Members
absent were: ex officio members Governor Hathaway and Schrader. Executive staff present were: Jim Ranz, Vice President for Academic Affairs;
Elliott Hays, Vice President for Finance; and High B. McFadden, Vice
Président for University Extension. Dr. Philip M. Hoyt represented the
Faculty Senate.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the minutes of the meetings of January 15, 1971, and Januanuary 29, 1971, be approved as circulated.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the appointment of Alex J. McGaw as Assistant to the President for Development be approved as recommended by the President, effective March 1, 1971, the appointment to the new position to be accompanied by a monthly salary increment of \$50 for the remainder of the 1970-71 fiscal year. Mr. McGaw will continue to serve as Dean of the College of Engineering until his replacement is retained and will continue to hold tenure as a Professor of Civil Engineering.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the meeting go into executive session. The meeting reconvened in open session at 9:05 a.m. on February 27, 1971, with the same persons present as on the preceding day except Trustees Jones, Pence, Quealy, and True; ex officio member Archuleta; and Vice President Hays. Mr. Jay Bishop represented the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming.

ROLL CALL

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

ASSISTANT TO THE PRESIDENT FOR DEVELOPMENT Chairman Brodrick reported for the Committee on the meetings held on February 6, 1971, and February 26, 1971.

- 1. Fieldhouse Remodeling. Mr. Brodrick reviewed the request from Intercollegiate Athletics for remodeling on the second and third floors of the Fieldhouse to provide office space for a new member of the football coaching staff and for Mr. Eaton. In accordance with the recommendation of the Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried that an appropriation of approximately \$12,607 be authorized from the 1971-72 budget for the following purposes: \$11,950 for remodeling on the second floor of the Fieldhouse as presented in Revised Plan No. 4, and \$657 for remodeling of office space on the third floor of the Fieldhouse for Mr. Eaton.
- 2. <u>Time Extension—Gymnasium Remodeling</u>. Mr. Brodrick explained the need to provide sufficient time for the concrete subfloor to be properly cured before the Pro Turf covering is installed in the Armory of the Gymnasium. Upon recommendation of the Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried that an extension of time from March 1, 1971, to April 5, 1971, be granted to Charles Groathouse, Contractor, for the completion of the Armory portion only of the Gymnasium remodeling contract.
- 3. Fixed Equipment—Fine Arts Center. Mr. Brodrick reviewed the circumstances which led to the inadvertent omission of funds for the organ and carpeting in the Fine Arts Center from the cost estimate at the time of letting the construction bid. It was moved, seconded, and carried that approval be granted for an appropriation of \$109,600 from bond refunding surplus funds for the purchase of the organ and the carpeting in the Fine Arts Center. It was moved, seconded, and carried that the bid of \$89,600 for purchase and installation of a pipe organ in the Fine Arts Center, submitted by E. F. Walcker and Cie of Ludwigsburg, West Germany, be accepted.

PHYSICAL PLANT AND EQUIPMENT COMMITTEE REPORT

- 4. Plant Science Laboratory--Botany Portion. Chairman Brodrick reported on the considerations given to siting of the Plant Science Laboratory and to the need for the smaller part, which is to be utilized by the Department of Botany, to be located near the campus for instructional purposes. In accordance with the recommendation of the Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried that University personnel and the architects be authorized to proceed with a preliminary concept of a split laboratory, with the smaller portion to be located on University property on Fremont Street near Eighth Street, and that siting of the main structure of the Plant Science Laboratory be subject to action at a later date.
- 5. Baptist Church Request. Mr. Brodrick reported the decision of the Committee to deny a request from the First Baptist Church to purchase approximately five acres of land contiguous to the present church property on Fifteenth Street.
- 6. Schwinn Conference Center--Dubois. Mr. Brodrick reposted that no action was taken by the Committee regarding the Schwinn Conference Center pending further study of the matter.
- 7. Agriculture Building-Unit "C". Mr. Brodrick commented on a request to move the plumbing from two small rooms to larger rooms in the Agriculture Building in order to better utilize space recently vacated by the removal of the Division of Biochemistry to its new quarters. As recommended by the Committee, it was moved, seconded, and carried that an appropriation of \$1,478 from remodeling funds be approved for this purpose.
- 8. Fine Arts Center--Building Panels. Mr. Brodrick reported that the Committee had considered the colors to be used on the interior exposed panels and the exterior brick panels for the Fine Arts Center. Hopefully, samples of the brick panels will be available for the consideration of the Trustees at their next meeting.

9. <u>Fee Schedule--Wyoming Chapter</u>, American Institute of Architects. As a matter of information, Mr. Brodrick reported that Morris Jones, Division of Physical Plant, had advised the Committee of an increase in the fee schedule of the Wyoming Chapter of the American Institute of Architects.

It was pointed out that the change in Article V, Legislative Branch, Section a, to thirty members for the ASUW Senate would require a change in every instance where the numbers occurs. With this provision, it was moved, seconded, and carried that approval be granted for the eleven amendments to the Constitution of the Associated Students of the University of Wyoming (ASUW) proposed by the ASUW Senate and approved by referendum of the student body on February 1-2, 1971.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the Trustee regulation requiring use of a High School Honor Scholarship no later than the Fall semester of the academic year immediately following graduation from high school be extended one year in the case of a senior at Newcastle High School, who has been awarded a "Youth for Understanding" scholarship for study abroad during 1971-72. It was understood that this action does not establish a precedent for future requests for waivers of this Trustee regulation, which will require action by the Trustees on an individual basis.

> DEAN OF THE COLLEGE OF EDUCATION

It was moved, seconded, and carried to approve the appointment of Dr. Laurance A. Walker as Dean of the College of Education, effective March 1, 1971, as recommended by the President.

A letter addressed to the Trustees by Mr. Archuleta under date of February 10, 1971, concerning the special problems of students leving in married student housing units was read. The matter was referred to the Physical Plant and Equipment Committee for further investigation and report.

It was moved, seconded, and carried that the meeting go into executive session. After reconvening in open session, the following actions were taken.

President Carlson reported briefly on his conversations with student representatives concerning a revised University academic calendar which would provide a semester break before the Christmas recess. He agreed to present a formal report to the Trustees at their April 23-24, 1971 meeting.

Mr. Vern Shelton, Assistant to the President for Information, reported on his meeting with Wyoming broadcasters on February 22, 1971, to discuss the athletic broadcasting policy for the 1971-72 year.

ATHLETIC BROADCASTING POLICY

The meeting, which was concerned with the types of sponsors to be accepted by the University and whether the broadcasts should be on an exclusive bid basis, was attended by representatives of all three networks now carrying University of Wyoming athletics as well as by other interested broadcasters of the state. Mr. Glenn Jocoby and Mr. William Young were unable to attend the meeting but have been advised of what transpired and are in agreement with the policy set forth. In view of the fact that there was no overriding consensus on either point, Mr. Shelton stated the policy to be: 1) That the University make no specific prohibition concerning sponsorships, stating only that broadcasters are expected to display a high degree of good taste and professionalism in choosing their sponsors and must adhere to the codes of the National Collegiate Athletics Association, the Western Athletic Conference, and National Association of Broadcasters; and 2) that the University continue the broadcasting policy approved by the Trustees of The University of Wyoming on April 19, 1969. No objections were voiced.

At his request, Mr. James E. Barrett, State Attorney

General, will be invited to meet with the Trustees on March 18, 1971, to

discuss procedures to be followed in the event of campus disorders.

Committee, which met on February 26, 1971, and it was moved, seconded,

and carried that the Committee's report and recommendations be accepted;
