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THE UNIVERSITY OF WYOMING Minutes of THE TRUSTEES January 26, 1979

A special meeting of the Trustees of The University of Wyoming was called to order by President Hines at 3:00 p.m. on January 26, 1979, in the Board Room of Old Main.

ROLL CALL

The following Trustees answered roll call: Brodrick, Bunning, Chapin, Hines,

McCue, Nolan, Quealy, Smith, Thorpe, and <u>ex officio</u> members McFadden and Luthi. Trustee members Fordyce, Gillaspie, Wilson, and <u>ex officio</u> members Governor Herschler and Mrs. Simons are recorded as being absent at this time. Mr. Fordyce and Mrs. Simons were in attendance during the morning executive session. Mr. Elliott G. Hays, Vice President for Finance; Reid C. Miller, Chairperson for the Faculty Senate; and James E. Wasserburger, Chairperson for the Staff Council, were also present.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES President Hines asked for corrections or additions to the minutes of the meetings

of December 15, 1978, and January 5, 1979. Mr. Nolan moved approval of the minutes of December 15, 1978, and January 5, 1979, as circulated. The motion was seconded by Mr. Quealy, and it carried.

RIGHT-OF-WAY EASEMENT--- At the July 1978 meeting of the Trustees, Stock Farm a two-year option was granted to Cities

Service Gas Company for a right-of-way easement, with the additional sum of \$4,905 to be paid upon execution of the option. On January 12, 1979, Cities Service Gas Company provided notice that it was exercising its option and delivered a sight draft for \$4,905. Mr. Bunning moved that the President and the Secretary of the Trustees be authorized to execute the right-of-way easement on the Stock Farm to the Cities Service Gas Company. The motion was seconded by Dr. Thorpe, and it carried.

Mr. Hays explained the recommendation that the base bid (plus alternates 1, 2, 3, and 4) from Reiman-Wuerth Construction Company be used as the base for calculating the request for additional funds from the Legislature. This recommendation provides for rejection of alternate 5 for stone facing on the east end of the building at a cost of \$80,000, or approximately \$11.50 per square foot. The calculation of the request for additional funds from the Legislature is as follows:

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Previously, the estimate of additional funds required which was furnished to the Capitol Building Commission was \$610,000 which was based upon the architect's estimate.

Mr. Chapin moved that the University request \$453,100 from the Legislature in lieu of the previous estimate provided to the Capitol Building Commission for the Half-Acre Gymnasium remodeling project; and that contingent upon approval of funds by the Legislature, the University accept the base bid plus alternates 1, 2, 3, and 4 from Reiman-Wuerth Construction Company of Cheyenne. The motion was seconded by Mr. McCue, and it carried.

Mr. Hays explained the recommendation that the base bid plus alternates 6A, 7A, and 8A from Reiman-Wuerth Construction Company be used as the base for requesting additional funds from the Legislature. Construction, Inc., Longmont, Colorado, submitted the low base bid but with the addition of 5% for the statutory preference for resident bidders does not qualify as the low bidder. Previously, the estimate of additional funds required which was furnished to the Capitol Building Commission was \$464,000 which was based upon the architect's estimate.

Mr. Bunning asked why no provision was made for movable equipment in the Family Practice Center project when it was included as an item in the Half-Acre Gymnasium project. Mr. Hays replied that funds for equipment were available in the current budget for the College of Human Medicine.

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Mr. McCue moved that the University request \$679,899 from the Legislature in lieu of the previous estimate provided to the Capitol Building Commission for the Wyoming Family Practice Building, Cheyenne; and that contingent upon approval of funds by the Legislature, the University accept the base bid plus alternates 6A, 7A, and 8A from Reiman-Wuerth Construction Company of Cheyenne. The motion was seconded by Mr. Nolan, and it carried.

POSTPONEMENT OF SABBATICAL LEAVE---Hugh G. Hansen

Due to illness, Hugh G. Hansen has requested that his sabbatical

leave be effective 1979 Fall semester instead of the present Spring semester.
Mr. Chapin moved that <u>Hugh G. Hansen</u>, Associate Professor of Economics,
be granted a postponement of his sabbatical leave until the 1979 Fall semester.
The motion was seconded by Mr. Bunning, and it carried.
SUMMER COMMENCEMENT Dr. McFadden advised that for the

Dr. McFadden advised that for the 1978 Summer Commencement, there

were 325 Summer School graduates, 200 seats were provided for commencement, and only 154 graduates actually participated. Preliminary discussion was held as to whether the University should continue its practice of having a summer commencement since there appears to be a decline in the number of individuals actually participating. A decision on whether to have summer commencement, or not, must be made before the next Trustee meeting because it is now time to begin preparations for this program. In the next few days Dr. McFadden will be assessing campus feelings with regard to this program and he will make his recommendation to the Executive Committee of the Trustees. Mr. Nolan moved that the Executive Committee review the recommendation and determine whether or not to have a 1979 Summer Commencement. The motion was seconded by Mr. Luthi, and it carried.

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REPORT OF SEARCH AND SCREENING ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Mr. Hines reported that the Search and Screening Advisory

Committee had presented a list of seven candidates for the presidency of The University of Wyoming to the Presidential Selection and Evaluation Committee of the Board of Trustees. It is anticipated that some or all of these candidates will be invited to visit campus in the near future. Their names will be released at the time of their visit.

STANDING COMMITTEE ON COMMUNITY COLLEGE RELATIONS Dr. McFadden reported that the Community College Commission has

accepted the concept of the working relationships wherein the Trustees will establish a standing committee on community college relations to meet with a comparable standing committee of the Community College Commission. Appointments will be made to this committee at the next meeting of the Trustees. ADJOURNMENT AND DATE OF NEXT MEETING There being no other business to

come before the Trustees, Mr. Bunning

moved that the meeting be adjourned at 3:30 p.m. Mr. Brodrick seconded the motion, and it carried. The next regular meeting of the Trustees is scheduled for February 15-16, 1979.
